## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-0) at ATLANTA FALCONS (1-0) <br> Thursday, August 19, 2010 * Georgia Dome $(71,228) \boldsymbol{*} 8: 00$ p.m. EDT

The New England Patriots will travel to Atlanta to face the Falcons at the Georgia Dome in a nationally-televised game on Fox on Thursday night.
For the second consecutive week, the Patriots will conduct a joint practice session with a preseason opponent in advance of the game. The Patriots will travel to Atlanta on Monday and hold two practices at the team's headquarters in Flowery Branch, Ga. on Tuesday.

Last week, the Patriots conducted joint practice sessions with New Orleans on Tuesday and Wednesday prior to playing in the 2010 preseason-opener at Gillette Stadium last Thursday night. New England beat the Saints, 27-24 in that game.

It marked the first time the Patriots had conducted a joint practice session since working with the New York Giants in 2001

## BROADCASTINFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by FOX and can be seen in Boston on WFXT-TV Channel 25. Joe Buck will handle play-by-play duties with Troy Aikman providing color. Pam Oliver will serve as the sideline reporter.

RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 36 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster Gil Santos is in his 34th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer Gino Cappelletti. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 27th season as a tandem.

## GI LLETTE STADI UM UNVEI LS HI GH DEF VI DEO BOARDS

The August 12 preseason opener against the New Orleans Saints was the first opportunity for Patriots fans to see the new high definition Daktronics LED video boards that were installed during the offseason to enhance the in-stadium game day experience. The two screens--41.5-by-164-feet in the south end zone and 45 -by100 -feet in the north end zone--total five times the size of the original screens. It would take 1,700 televisions to fill those dimensions using a standard 37" HDTV. The new video boards also provide much greater resolution, with the ability to display more instant replays and an array of graphics, including live statistical updates and out-of-town scores. The video boards utilize more than 5 million individual LED pixels that offer superior brightness in direct sunlight, with the capability of showing up to 4.4 trillion shades of color. The image clarity also greatly enhances the wide-angle visibility of the screens from inside the stadium. "This type of video board simply didn't exist eight years ago when the stadium was built," said Patriots President Jonathan Kraft. "The resolution is incredible. It is amazing to see how far the video technology has come in the past decade."

## ROSTER REDUCTI ON DATES

The NFL roster limit during training camp is 80 players. The first mandatory preseason roster reduction date is Aug. 31, two days prior to the Patriots' final preseason game. On that date, rosters must be reduced to 75 players. On Saturday, Sept. 4, rosters must be reduced to the regular-season limit of 53 players. On Sept. 5, clubs may establish an eight-man practice squad.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and the Atlanta Falcons will clash this week for the $12^{\text {th }}$ time in the preseason and the first preseason meeting since the 2006 season when the Patriots lost 26-23 at the Georgia Dome on Aug. 11. The Patriots are 5-6 all-time against the Falcons in the preseason, including a 3-2 record in Atlanta.


The regular-season series is tied, 6 -
6 following a $26-10$ win by the Patriots against the Falcons on
 Sept. 27 last season. That game marked the Falcons' first trip ever to Gillette Stadium. The Patriots have won the last three times the teams have played in the regular-season.

Prior to those three wins, the Patriots had suffered four straight losses to the Falcons, dating back to 1989 .

The New England Patriots offense hit from every angle and the New England defense held the high-powered Atlanta Falcons to just 10 points in a $26-10$ victory in a steady rain in Foxborough. Quarterback Tom Brady threw for 277 yards, WR Randy Moss caught ten passes for 116 yards, and RB Fred Taylor gained 105 yards rushing. New England had 28 first downs, gained 445 yards in total offense and possessed the ball for 39:49.

PK Stephen Gostkowski connected on four field goals, including three on drives inside the red zone. Taylor scored on an eight-yard run in the second quarter, and Brady became the $27^{\text {th }}$ player to pass for 200 touchdowns on a 36 -yard score to TE Chris Baker in the fourth quarter.

After playing a competitive game for the first half, New England took control and dominated the rest of the way. Atlanta scored on two of its first three drives of the game, but possessed the ball for just over six minutes in the second half and gained only 78 yards of total offense against a stingy Patriots' defense. New England held RB Michael Turner to 56 yards, TE Tony Gonzales to only one catch, and QB Matt Ryan to just 17 completions and no touchdowns.

The Patriots took the lead in the second quarter after taking advantage of a shanked 29-yard punt that allowed a drive to begin at midfield. Taylor gained 41 yards, including a 19-yard run and an 8 -yard touchdown run to cap a New England scoring drive that put them in front, 10-3. Atlanta tied the game at 1010 on the next series by converting a fourth-and-three from the 34 -yard line on their way to a 2 -yard touchdown run by Turner. After stopping the Patriots on the next set of downs, Atlanta drove to the New England 31-yard line before $S$ Brandon McGowan forced a fumble on a hard hit to Turner that was recovered by S James Sanders. New England responded by executing a 12-play, 58-yard drive that ended in a 33-yard field goal for a 13-10 halftime advantage. After adding a field goal for a 16-10 lead with their opening drive of the second half, head coach Bill Belichick called two fourth-down plays on a series that ended in another field goal early in the fourth quarter. Faced with a fourth-and-one from their own 24-yard line, RB Sammy Morris converted with a two-yard run up the middle. Later on the same drive the Patriots were faced with a fourth-and-three from the Atlanta 37-yard line. Brady completed a deep pass to Moss for a 21-yard gain to keep the drive alive. The conversions allowed New England to stretch a drive that went 16 plays, 70 yards and chewed up seven minutes off the play clock.

- The Patriots' 2010 opponents had an aggregate record of 136-120 (.531) in 2009
- Nine of the Patriots' 16 games will be against teams that finished with a winning percentage of .500 or better in 2009.
- The Patriots will play five games against opponents that won 10 or more games in 2009.
- Six of the Patriots eight home games in 2010 will be against teams that made the playoffs in 2009.
- The Patriots will play two of the six NFC playoff teams.
- The Patriots will play all of the teams from the AFC playoff field, including two games against AFC East rival New York Jets.
- The Patriots will host Indianapolis after traveling to face the Colts in Indianapolis four straight times.
- The Patriots will face the J ets at their new stadium.
- The Patriots will attempt to avenge the 2009 Wild Card loss to Baltimore when they host the Ravens in a rematch at Gillette Stadium. It will be Baltimore's third trip to New England in the last two seasons.


## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS

The Patriots won more than half of their games in 2009 for the ninth straight year after finishing with a $10-6$ record. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in nine straight seasons since free agency began in 1993. The Patriots are the fifth team to win more than half of their games in nine straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining the 49ers ( 16 straight from 1983-1998), the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85), the Raiders ( 11 straight from 1970-80) and the Steelers ( 9 straight from 1972-80). The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 13 of the 16 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

The New England Patriots opened the 2010 preseason with a 27-24 victory over the defending Super Bowl Champion New Orleans Saints at Gillette Stadium.

First-year WR Darnell Jenkins caught a short pass from rookie QB Zac Robinson and turned the play into a 52-yard gain to the New Orleans 12 -yard line with under two minutes to play to set up a game-winning 28-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski. The victory was clinched when LB Eric Alexander intercepted Saints QB Chase Daniel with 48 seconds to play.

QB Tom Brady started the game and played the entire first quarter, finishing the game 5-of-8 for 67 yards. The Patriots scored a field goal and a touchdown on Brady's two offensive drives, including a 14-play, 93-yard drive that was culminated by a 6 -yard touchdown run by RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis. During that drive, Brady completed three passes of 20 yards or more with a 23-yard pass to Randy Moss, a 20 -yard pass to Brandon Tate and a 21-yard pass play to Julian Edelman.

WR Julian Edelman led the team with six receptions for 90 yards, including five receptions for 78 yards in the first half with a 21-yard pass from Brady in the first quarter and a 25 -yarder in the second from backup QB Brian Hoyer.

Hoyer entered the game in the second quarter and engineered a 10-play, 79-yard touchdown drive that ended with a 5 -yard run by Laurence Maroney to build a 17-7 halftime lead. First-round pick CB Devin McCourtry returned two kickoffs for over 50 yards, including a 52-yard return to open the second half. That run helped position the Patriots for a one-yard touchdown run by Maroney for a 24-7 lead. New Orleans closed the gap to 24-21 heading into the fourth quarter after a 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by WR Larry Beavers and a 51yard pass play that set up a two-yard touchdown run. The Saints tied the game at 24-24 with 2:44 to play on a 23-yard field goal

## BRADY STARTS STRONG

QB Tom Brady started the game and played the entire first quarter, finishing the game 5-of-8 for 67 yards. The Patriots scored a field goal and a touchdown on Brady's two offensive drives, including a 14-play, 93-yard drive that was culminated by a 6 -yard touchdown run by RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis. During that touchdown drive, Brady completed three passes of 20 yards or more with a 23 -yard pass to Randy Moss, a 20 -yard pass to Brandon Tate and a 21-yard pass play to Julian Edelman.

## EDELMAN GAINS YARDS

WR Julian Edelman led the team with six receptions for 90 yards, including five receptions for 78 yards in the first half with a 21yard pass from Tom Brady in first quarter and a 25 yarder in the second from Brian Hoyer.

## HOYER PRODUCES

Backup QB Brian Hoyer entered the game in the second quarter and engineered a 10-play, 79-yard drive that ended on a 5-yard touchdown run by Laurence Maroney on his first series. Hoyer was 4 -of-5 for 49 yards on that drive. He played the entire second quarter and most of the third quarter, finishing 8-of-13 for 106 yards.

## JENKINS GETS AN OPPORTUNITY

First-year WR Darnell Jenkins set up the game-winning field goal with a short pass reception from QB Zac Robinson that was turned into a 52-yard gain to the New Orleans 12-yard line with under two minutes remaining. K Stephen Gostkowski connected on a 28-yard field goal with 57 seconds remaining to give the Patriots a 27-24 lead.

## 2010 DRAFT CLASS

Eleven of the 12 Patriots 2010 draft picks made their NFL debut, including four that were in the starting lineup. First-round pick CB Devin McCourty and second-round pick LB Brandon Spikes started against the Saints on defense, while second-round pick TE Rob Gronkowski and fourth-round pick TE Aaron Hernandez started on offense. WR Taylor Price, P Zoltan Mesko, OL Ted Larsen, OL Thomas Welch, DL Brandon Deaderick, DL Kade Weston and QB Zac Robinson saw action as reserves. Secondround pick DE Jermaine Cunningham did not dress for the game.

## MCCOURTY CAN RETURN

First-round draft pick CB Devin McCourty had two 50-yard kickoff returns in the second quarter. He returned the second half kickoff 52 yards and then added a 50 yarder later in the period. Last year as a senior at Rutgers, McCourty returned 14 kicks for 356 yards, including one that he returned 98 yards for a touchdown.

## ZOLTAN MESKO

Fifth-round draft pick Zoltan Mesko had five punts with 3 landing inside the 20-yard line.

## NEWLY ACQUIRED VETERANS

Six newly acquired veteran free agents made their Patriots debut (RB Thomas Clayton, TE Alge Crumpler, G Eric Ghiaciuc, DL Damione Lewis, LB Marques Murrell and DL Gerard Warren). Three of them were in the starting lineup with Murell starting at linebacker, Waarren on the defensive line and Crumpler starting at tight end.

## MARONEY SCORES TWICE

RB Laurence Maroney scored two touchdowns with a 5 -yard scoring run in the second quarter and a 1-yard scoring run in the third quarter.

## ALEXANDER SEALS THE WIN

LB Eric Alexander intercepted Saints QB Chase Daniel with 48 seconds to play to seal the victory.

## PATRIOTS START AT HOME

The Patriots opened the preseason at home for only the second time in the last six years and the first time since the 2008 season against Baltimore.

## SAM "BAM" CUNNINGHAM J OINS MAYO AS A TEAM CAPTAIN

LB Jerod Mayo and the newest member of the Patriots Hall of Fame, Sam "Bam" Cunningham served as game captains. Cunningham was inducted into the Patriots Hall of Fame in a ceremony prior the game.

The number of consecutive seasons Randy Moss has recorded 10 or more touchdown catches to become the first Patriots player with three seasons of 10 -plus TD catches. He had 23 in 2007, 11 in 2008 and an NFL-leading 13 in 2009. His nine seasons of 10 or more touchdowns tie Jerry Rice for the NFL record.

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 16 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately
 preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won nine division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

## SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 171 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

## SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 16 seasons of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the NFL's highest winning percentage and have won more Super Bowl titles, more conference championships and more playoff games than any other NFL team. The Patriots have now won 9 or more games in 13 of the 16 seasons that Robert Kraft has owned the team.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. He spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 16th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100-game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100 -game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 90 -year history and the first since the NFL established a 16 -game schedule in 1978. He has led the Patriots to the Super Bowl four times and has produced seven division championships, including five straight from 2003-07. Belichick's Patriots teams own the alltime NFL records for consecutive total victories ( 21 from 200304), and established the record for consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second-best postseason record in NFL history (15-5) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (121-41). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 126-52 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

## ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super BowI XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Over his 12 -year NFL career, Randy Moss has averaged one touchdown for every 6.25 receptions, a total that is the best in NFL history among any receiver with at least 500 receptions. Moss has caught 148 touchdowns out of 926 career receptions.


## MOSS IS NFL'S PREMIER TD RECEIVER

Since entering the NFL in 1998, Randy Moss has caught 148 touchdown passes, more than any other player over that span. Since joining the Patriots via trade prior to the 2007 season, Moss has caught 47 touchdowns - also the best in the league over that span. In terms of overall touchdowns (rushing, receiving and returning), Moss has totaled 149 scores since entering the league in 1998 (148 via reception and one via punt return), a tally that ranks second only to LaDainian Tomlinson (153 touchdowns) over that span. Moss's 13 receiving touchdowns in 2009 tied for the NFL lead with Larry Fitzgerald and Vernon Davis.

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both USA Today and the Daily Oklahoman, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.
"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen when it was supposed to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for touchdowns. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the 2004 NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game. He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71 -yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

ZOLTAN MESKO: COMING TO AMERICA
Rookie P Zoltan Mesko was born in Timosoara, Romania, on the Romania-Hungary border. In 1989, during the communist revolutions, his family would survive by diving on the floor to avoid gun shots. Even after the fall of the Berlin Wall, his parents and he lived in poverty. His family was finally able to escape Romania when his father won a United States Permanent Resident Card (green card) in the Diversity Immigrant Visa Lottery in 1997. At the age of 11, Mesko came to America.

## MESKO DISCOVERS FOOTBALL

An avid soccer player from his days in Romania, Mesko had a strong leg. It was only when he came to America that he discovered his leg could take him places. In eighth grade, Mesko was playing kickball in the gym when he kicked the ball so high that he broke a light fixture. He was given a choice: pay for the light fixture or play football. With his family still struggling with money and football being a more popular sport than soccer at his school, the choice was an obvious one-Mesko decided to play football. His leg would land him numerous Division I Scholarships and admission offers from Ivy League schools. From these, Mesko chose to play football at Michigan.

## TOUGH AT HOME

The Patriots own an overall record of 59-13 (.819) at Gillette Stadium. Since their state-of-the-art facility opened at the beginning of the 2002 season, the Patriots own the NFL's best record at home. In the franchise's first 43 seasons, the Patriots never enjoyed an undefeated season at home. In the past eight seasons at Gillette stadium, the Patriots have celebrated four undefeated seasons (2003, 2004, 2007 and 2009).

## DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEV N MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft ( $27^{\text {th }}$ overall), CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with the Tennessee Titans, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are now only the $11^{\text {th }}$ set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother Wasswa played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

## ALL IN THE FAMILY: TE ROB GRONKOWSKI

Rookie TE Rob Gronkowski grew up playing football against his brothers in the backyard. Now, he has a chance to play against them in the NFL. Dan Gronkowski, the oldest of the bunch, is currently in his second season as a TE for the Detroit Lions, while 23 -year old Chris is currently in camp with the Dallas Cowboys as a fullback. The Gronkowski's are among 27 different sets of brothers currently in the NFL, yet they are the only family that can claim to have three siblings in the league. If both Rob and Dan make their respective rosters, the two would match-up against one another this Thanksgiving when the Patriots travel to Detroit on Thursday, November 25.

## The Team df the Decade

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that just 16 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s.
