THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints (5-0) travel to New England this weekend to face the New England Patriots (4-1) at Gillette Stadium in a key interconference matchup.

The Saints are 5-0 for the second time in four years after defeating the Chicago Bears 26-18, last Sunday at Soldier Field. The only other two times the Saints have won their first six contests are 2009 (13-0) and 1991 (7-0). The Saints are now one of only three unbeaten teams remaining on the eve of week six in the NFL. A win at Gillette Stadium, where the Patriots have posted a 44-6 record since 2007, would send New Orleans off to their week seven bye on a good note.

The Saints put together one of their most balanced victories of the season on Sunday at the Bears, as they controlled the line of scrimmage by holding onto the ball for 36 minutes and were fueled by their first turnover-free performance of the season, against a team that went into the game leading the NFL in takeaways. Displaying that efficiency through the season, the Saints are now tied for fourth in the league in turnover ratio (+6).

QB **Drew Brees** helped engineer a balanced approach for the Saints, as he completed 29 of 35 passes for 288 yards with two touchdown passes to RB **Pierre Thomas** and a 120.0 passer rating. At one point in the first half, Brees completed 11 consecutive passes.

The Saints scored on their first possession for the fourth consecutive contest, K **Garrett Hartley** kicked a 47-yard field goal, his first of four on the day. Midway through the second quarter, New Orleans extended the lead to 13-0 when Thomas, a Chicago native, caught a two-yard screen pass in his hometown.

The Saints, who have not trailed in a contest since early in their third contest this season, jumped out to a commanding 20-7 halftime lead when Thomas eluded several defenders for 25 yards on a screen pass that ended in the end zone.

Sunday's matchup will feature two clubs that have posted a combined 8-1 record through success on all three sides of the ball. The Patriots' 53 victories since 2009 lead the NFL, while New Orleans' 49 wins are tied for second in the league.

The Saints are currently ranked fourth in the NFL in total offense, second passing the ball. They rank ninth in the league in scoring with 26.8 points per game. The club ranks sixth in the NFL in third down conversion rate (43.5%). The defense is currently tied for 11th in the NFL. Keeping opponents out of the end zone has been a strength, as they are ranked fourth in the NFL (14.6 ppg.) in scoring defense and have not yet surrendered 20 points in a contest. Success has also come on third down for the defense, as they currently rank ninth in the league, holding opponents to a 35.7 conversion rate.

SAINTS-PATRIOTS CONNECTIONS

Offensive Coordinator **Pete Carmichael** prepped at Medway (Mass.) High School in football and baseball and went on to a collegiate baseball career at Boston College where he was a four-year letterman and team captain in 1994. Carmichael started his coaching career as an assistant at the University of New Hampshire in 1994...Defensive Coordinator **Rob Ryan** spent four seasons (2000-03) as the linebackers coach under **Bill Belichick** in New England, winning two Super Bowls...Wide receivers coach **Henry Ellard** played for the Patriots in 1998...New England area scout **Tim Heffelfinger** served in the same position with New Orleans from 1998-2005...Saints Tight ends coach **Terry Malone** attended the College of the Holy Cross and was a four-year starter at tight end for the Crusaders. Malone coached the Crusaders tight ends in 1985 and served as offensive line coach at Boston College in 2006...New England DE/LB **Rob Ninkovich** was a fifth round draft choice of the Saints in 2006 and spent the 2006 campaign and part of the 2008 season with the club...New Orleans WR **Marques Colston** and Patriots DB **Kyle Arrington** were teammates at Hofstra...New England K **Stephen Gostkowski** is a Baton Rouge native who prepped at Madison (Miss.) Central High School...Saints defensive line coach **Bill Johnson** and New England special teams coach **Scott O'Brien** served on the same staff in Denver from 2007- 08...New England wide receivers coach **Chad O'Shea** served as special teams/recruiting coordinator at the University of Southern Mississippi from 2000-02. Assistant head coach **Joe Vitt** and O'Shea served on the same Kansas City staff in 2003...Patriots director of college scouting **Jonathan Robinson** served as an assistant coach at Nicholls State from 1999-2001... Director of football administration **Khai Harley** earned a master's degree in sports management from Springfield College in 2001...Area scout **Josh Lucas** played S at Harvard from

THE COACHES

Sean Payton has posted a 67-34 regular season record and a 5-3 postseason mark, guiding the team to the Super Bowl XLIV Championship. He's the club's lone head coach to open a season with 13 straight wins and post a 13-game win streak and has the franchise's top winning percentage (.660). Payton's 35-16 (.686) home record and 32-18 (.640) road mark are the club's top winning percentages. In 2006, he took the Saints to the NFC Championship and was named NFL Coach of the Year by most major outlets. The Saints are one of only two teams to finish in the top 10 in net yards per game each season since 2006. Payton was hired as New Orleans' 14th head coach on Jan. 18, 2006, after serving on the Dallas Cowboys staff from 2003-05. Prior to joining the Cowboys, Payton served on the New York Giants staff from 1999-2002, including the final three seasons as offensive coordinator. His tenure was highlighted by a Super Bowl berth in his first full season as coordinator. Payton's prior NFL coaching experience came as quarterbacks coach for Philadelphia from 1997-98.

New England head coach **Bill Belichick** is in his tenth season as the head coach of the Patriots. He is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowls in four years, and has also delivered five conference titles, 10 divisions crowns and 17 playoff victories to the Patriots while delivering an overall record of 168-65. He is in his 39th season as an NFL coach and was hired by New England on January 27, 2000. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the NFL's first 16-0 regular season and is the only head coach in NFL history to win at least 13 regular-season games in five separate seasons. Belichick has led the Patriots to a winning record in each of the last 12 seasons, the second longest stretch by a coach with one franchise (Tom Landry, 16 years, Cowboys, 1970-85). In 2012, he guided the Patriots to a 12-4 record, a division title and his seventh AFC Championship game appearance.

SERIES HISTORY

New England has dominated the series, including a stretch where the Patriots won the first five games between the two clubs. New Orleans posted three-straight victories from 1989-95 – all on the road. The Saints broke a three-game losing streak with a 38-17 win over the Patriots on Monday, November 30, 2009, when they improved their record to 11-0

7 of the 12 games have been decided by a touch-down or less - including two by a field goal. The Saints have a 3-4 record in Foxborough, having dropped the last two contests. A view of the results

WEEK 3: TE Jimmy Graham

New Orleans Saints 31, Arizona Cardinals 7 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome, Sept. 22, 2013

Graham had nine catches for 134 yards and two touchdowns. His 16-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter gave the Saints the lead for good and he capped the scoring with a seven-yard TD catch in the fourth quarter. For Graham, who is the only tight end in franchise history to be honored, it is his second career Player of the Week award. He joins **Shannon Sharpe** (three) and **Alge Crumpler** (two) as the only tight ends to be named Player of the Week multiple times since the award began in 1984.

NFC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH

September: TE Jimmy Graham

Graham had 27 catches for 458 yards and six touchdowns in September as New Orleans recorded the team's first 4-0 start since 2009, when the Saints won Super Bowl XLIV. During the month, Graham's six touchdowns tied for the NFL lead, his 458 yards ranked second and his 27 catches were tied for third in the NFC. His six touchdown recep-

tions are the most by a tight end in September in NFL history. Graham had a touchdown in every game during the month and had 100+ yards in three of the four contests. In the final three games of September, Graham had 413 receiving yards, tied for the most by a tight end in a three-game span in a season in NFL history. Graham is the first tight end to be named Player of the Month since the award began in 1986.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 23, Atlanta Falcons 17; September 8, 2013 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints (1-0) defeated the Falcons (0-1) in a season opener for the first time in seven tries as the Saints ended up on the winning end of their opener for the first time since the 2010 campaign, aided by solid performances in all three phases

The Falcons opened the scoring with 8:40 left in the first quarter when QB **Matt Ryan** completed a seven-yard touchdown pass to TE **Tony Gonzalez**, powered by a previous 50-yard completion to WR **Harry Douglas**. On Atlanta's next drive, the Falcons would extend their lead to 10-0 on a 23-yard field goal by K **Matt Bryant**.

At the start of the second quarter, K **Garrett Hartley**, who was a perfect three-for-three on field goal attempts, put the Saints on the scoreboard for the first time with a 48-yard kick. On Atlanta's next offensive play, S **Malcolm Jenkins** tackled WR **Julio Jones** and forced him to cough up the ball, which was recovered by S **Roman Harper**. Three plays later the score was tied when QB **Drew Brees** connected on a 25-yard scoring play. The reception was the 533rd of Colston's eight-year career, making him the club's all-time receiving leader. New Orleans would close out their 13-0 run in the second half to take the lead on a 31-yard field goal by Hartley.

The Falcons would retake the lead at the start of the third quarter on a four-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to Jones. However, New Orleans would strike right back on the ensuing possession, when Brees led the Saints on a 10-play, 80-yard drive ending with a seven-yard touchdown pass to TE **Jimmy Graham**. The New Orleans defense would do their part in the remainder of the third quarter, forcing two consecutive three-and-out series'.

Hartley booted his third field goal with 3:16 left in the contest, but the Falcons would quickly drive down the field trailing 23-17. New Orleans successfully defended four consecutive plays inside the seven-yard line, clinching the victory on a pass that was tipped by rookie S **Kenny Vaccaro** and caught by Harper, as he became the first Saint to record an interception and a fumble recovery in the same contest since 2002. This series ended a particularly stingy performance on third down by the New Orleans defense, where they allowed the Falcons to convert only three-of-11 third down attempts.

Brees completed 26-of-35 passes for 357 yards with two touchdowns, one interception and a 113 passer rating. Colston had five receptions for 68 yards, while Graham had four grabs for 45 yards.

WEEK 2: Saints 16, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 14; September 15, 2013 @ Raymond James Stadium – The Saints posted an impressive road comeback against Tampa Bay behind some timely plays by the arm of QB **Drew Brees**, the hands of WR **Marques Colston** and TE **Jimmy Graham** and the foot of K **Garrett Hartley**, who booted a 27-yard game-winning field goal as time expired.

The Saints would score three early points when they got the ball first and Hartley kicked a 44-yard field goal. New Orleans would then force the Buccaneers to punt, but on the next play, Brees was intercepted by LB **Dakota Watson** and QB **Josh Freeman** would drive Tampa Bay 35 yards on seven plays, ending with a five-yard touchdown pass to give Tampa Bay the lead. It would be short-lived though, as Brees quickly drove the Saints down the field, ending with a 56-yard touchdown pass to Graham.

Following a scoreless second quarter, the Buccaneers got the ball first in the second half, but Freeman would be sacked by DE **Cameron Jordan**, coughing up the ball, which was recovered by OLB **Junior Galette**. New Orleans would turn the recovery into three points when Hartley booted a 41-yard field goal. When Tampa Bay took possession again, another turnover was forced by an opportunistic defense, when S **Malcolm Jenkins** got in front of a Freeman pass and returned it 31 yards.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Buccaneers would re-take the lead when LB **Mason Foster** picked off Brees and returned the interception 85 yards to the end zone.

With timing running short, after two unsuccessful drives for New Orleans, the Buccaneers took the ball back with 6:56 remaining. They converted three first downs, however on a third-and-six play from the New Orleans 32, NT **John Jenkins** stuffed Tampa Bay RB **Doug Martin** three yards short of the chains. Tampa Bay K **Rien Lindell's** 47-yard field goal attempt sailed wide left.

1:06 left in the contest was enough for Brees as he marched the Saints up the field to the Tampa Bay nine-yard line on successive passes to Graham, RB **Darren Sproles** and WR **Marques Colston**, who had a spectacular 31-yard grab to set up the game-winning field goal.

- The win marks the first time the Saints have started 2-0 since the 2010 season.

- Following the final game-winning offensive surge, Brees ended the game with 322 yards passing and has now reached 300 yards in seven consecutive games, closing in on the NFL record of nine straight 300-yard performances he last set from 2011-12.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 3: Saints 31, Arizona Cardinals 7; September 22, 2013 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints improved to 3-0, powered by an offensive attack that gained a season-high 423 yards and a defense that allowed one touchdown and only two trips into the red zone.

The Falcons opened the scoring with 9:13 left in the first quarter when RB **Alphonso Smith** powered into the end zone on a three-yard touchdown run. After QB **Drew Brees** connected with WR **Robert Meachem** on a 27-yard scoring pass, the Saints would not trail again, forcing two Cardinals turnovers on defense.

Late in the second quarter, Brees and TE **Jimmy Graham**, who led the saints in receiving with nine receptions for 134 yards, connected on a 16-yard touchdown pass. Late in the third quarter, powered by a 29-yard pass play between Brees and Graham, K **Garrett Hartley** booted a 31-yard field goal to give New Orleans a 17-7 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, Brees led New Orleans on a seven-play, 39-yard drive, ending with a seven-yard touchdown run up the middle by the signal-caller. Brees finished his day by completing 29-of-46 passes for 342 yards with three touchdowns and one interception, six carried for 21 yards, including the touchdown and the seven-yard scoring run.

With the Cardinals in rally mode, trailing 24-7 at the start of the quarter, S **Kenny Vaccaro** picked off a pass by Arizona QB **Carson Palmer** at the New Orleans eight-yard line and returned it 29 yards. 12 plays later, Brees and Graham connected for the final time on the afternoon on a seven-yard pass play in the end zone. Palmer would put the Cardinals in hurry-up mode and would get picked off by Saints CB **Keenan Lewis** at the New Orleans 20-yard line to seal the win for the Saints.

- A swarming New Orleans defense allowed only 247 net yards and allowed Palmer to complete only 18-of-35 passes for 187 yards with zero touchdowns, two interceptions and a 43.4 passer rating.
- Brees passed for 300 yards for the eighth consecutive contest, the second-longest streak in NFL history, second to his nine-game run between 2011 and 2012.
- The New Orleans defense held the Cardinals to only 100 total net yards in the second half, while recording both of their interceptions. ILB **Curtis Lofton** led the standout defensive effort with a teams-high eight tackles (seven solo), while DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks.

WEEK 4: Saints 38, Miami Dolphins 17; September 30, 2013 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints posted an impressive Monday night victory against the Dolphins behind a powerful passing game, an opportunistic secondary and a relentless pass rush

After Miami won the coin toss and elected to defer, New Orleans took advantage of the decision and started with their most effective opening drive of the season, as QB **Drew Brees** led them down the field on a six-play, 82-yard drive that included a 48-yard completion to RB **Darren Sproles** and ended with a five-yard scoring rush by the shifty runner

The New Orleans defense would then proceed to clamp down on Miami QB **Ryan Tannehill** throughout the game, forcing him to turn over the ball four times, the first two of which occurred in the second quarter and produced their next 14 points after the opening touchdown and a 21-10 halftime lead. The Dolphins signal-caller completed only 22-of-35 passes for 249 yards with one touchdown, three interceptions, one fumble and a 57.9 passer rating.

Brees completed 30 of 39 passes for 413 yards with four touchdowns, zero turnovers and a 144.5 passer rating. Sproles finished with 222 all-purpose yards, as he carried four times for 28 yards and also had seven receptions for a game-high 114 yards with one touchdown. TE **Jimmy Graham** finished with four receptions for 100 yards with two touchdowns.

The pass rush was led by the front seven as OLB **Junior Galette**, DE **Cameron Jordan**, DE **Tyrann Walker** and OLB **Martez Wilson** each recorded sacks. S **Rafael Bush** recovered a fumble and CB **Jabari Greer** made an interception, a pair of turnovers that led to 14 points in the second quarter. CB **Chris Carr** and ILB **Will Haerring** also added picks.

- With the win, the Saints are undefeated after four games for the fourth time in the 47-year history of the franchise. The 1991 (started 7-0), 1993 (started 5-0) and 2009 (started 13-0) teams also had 4-0 or better starts
- Brees passed for 300 yards for the ninth consecutive contest, now tied with his nine-game run between 2011 and 2012 for the longest streak in NFL history.
- With four sacks for the second straight week, it marked the first time the Saints recorded at least four takedowns in two straight games since the 2009 season. With his fourth sack of the season, DE **Cameron Jordan** now leads the team and is tied for seventh in the NFL.

@ Soldier Field – The Saints improved to 5-0 as a balanced, methodical approach earned them their first win at Soldier Field since 2000 before 62,361 spectators

After forcing a three-and-out to open the contests, the Saints got the ball back and got on the scoreboard first on a 47-yard field goal by K **Garrett Hartley**. They would never look back as they would jump up to a 20-7 halftime lead, as they stayed turnover-free against the club that led the NFL in takeaways going into the contest and held onto the ball for 36 minutes. Saints QB **Drew Brees** completed 29-of-35 passes for 288 yards, two touchdowns and a 120.0 passer rating. RB **Pierre Thomas**, a Chicago native, was the recipient of both touchdown throws, as he posted nine receptions for 55 yards, also leading the team in rushing with 36 yards. TE **Jimmy Graham** led the team in receiving with 10 receptions for 135 yards.

While playing turnover free football offensively, S **Malcolm Jenkins** sacked Bears QB **Jay Cutler** and forced him to fumble the ball as it was recovered by DE **Cameron Jordan**. ILB **David Hawthorne** and S **Kenny Vaccaro**, also added takeaways, while New Orleans held the Chicago Rushing attack to under 100 yards.

- Brees finished the day by completing 29 of 35 passes for 288 yards and two touchdown passes with zero interceptions, for a passer rating of 120.0. He completed 11 consecutive passes at one point in the first half, as he helped get the Saints off to a 20-7 halftime lead.
- Graham tied his career-high in receiving for the second time this season, as he led the team with 10 catches for 135 yards.
- In a return to his hometown, Thomas got the start and finished with nine receptions for 55 yards with two touchdowns and led the club in rushing with 36 yards.
- A stout run defense held Bears RB **Matt Forte** to only 55 yards on the ground. ILB **Curtis Lofton** led the run-stopping effort with nine tackles (eight solo).
- New Orleans has held opponents to under 20 points for five consecutive games for the first time since the 2000 campaign, when they did so for a six-game stretch. This is the longest period for the club to do so to open a season, since they held their first six opponents to under 20 points in 1992.

DOUBLE DIGIT WINS

ROSTER ROLL CALL

Of the 53 players currently on the Saints' roster, 36 were on the active roster, a reserve list or the practice squad at the end of the 2012 season. Among newcomers, the roster includes three unrestricted free agents, three veteran free agents, one trade acquisition, four draft picks and six rookie free agents.

Of the 53 players, 29 have less than four years of previous NFL experience, including 10 players who were in their first NFL training camp. The following is a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by years of experience (year entering): 13 years-1, 10 years-3, 9 years-2, 8 years-7, 7 years-4, 6 years-3, 5 years-5, 4 years-5, 3 years-7, 2 years-5, 1 year-1, rookies-10.

HIGHER EDUCATION

42 different colleges and universities are represented on the Saints' roster. Of that total, seven are represented by multiple Saints, led by three apiece from Illinois, Oklahoma and Tennessee.

MY HOMETOWN

Saints players come from 29 different states and U.S. territories. Of the 80 players currently on the team's roster, the state which claims the most members of the team is Texas with 10.

MY HOMETOWN

Saints players come from 23 different states. Of the 53 players currently on the team's roster, the state which claims the most members of the team is Texas with nine.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

As the competition for roster spots in training camp is intense as they eventually cut down from 90 to 53, a spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster. The Saints have five players who have moved up to their 53-man roster after being on NFL practice squads, three who have spent time on the Saints practice roster before being promoted.

The most notable member of the group is WR **Lance Moore**. After spending most of 2005 and 2006 on the club's practice squad, he's evolved into one of the team's

leading playmakers with career totals of 313 receptions for 3,868 yards with 36 scoring grabs, 37 overall touchdowns. In club record books, his reception total is ranked fourth, yardage total seventh, scoring grabs fifth and total touchdowns tied for sixth. Moore again ranked among the club's receiving leaders in 2012 with 65 receptions for a career-high 1,041 yards (16.0 avg.) and six touchdowns, ranking fourth on the team in receptions, second in yardage, fourth in touchdown grabs and first in yards per catch. His 313 career receptions rank 21st all-time among undrafted players since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, while his yardage total (3,868) is 24th and his 36 TD grabs are tied for 13th.

Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by the Philadelphia Eagles in 2008, FB **Jed Collins** spent parts of three seasons on the practice squads of the Eagles, Cleveland Browns, Arizona Cardinals, Chicago Bears and finally in New Orleans for most of the 2010 campaign before he won the lead blocking job in 2011 for the NFL's top-ranked offense. Collins is coming off the most productive game of his career on Sunday 11 rushing yards and four catches.

C Brian de la Puente first broke through in 2011 after spending most of his first three seasons in the NFL on five different practice squad rosters, including most of the 2010 campaign with New Orleans. After making the 2011 53-man roster out of training camp, he assumed starting center duties permanently in week seven, opening up 12 games for the offense that set an NFL record for net yards per game. He started all 16 games at center for the Black and Gold in 2012. The Saints have racked up at least 400 total net yards in 25 of the 33 games that he has opened in the middle.

T Bryce Harris was originally a member of the Falcons practice squad as a rookie in 2012 who was signed to the Saints active roster in week two. Harris has appeared in seven contests, as an asset on special teams and as an extra blocker on the offensive line, while opening one game at right tackle.

After spending most of his rookie season on the practice squad of Atlanta in 2010, S **Rafael Bush** was promoted to the active roster for one regular season game and one playoff contest. In 2011, he was signed to the Denver Broncos roster from the Atlanta practice squad at midseason and posted three special teams stops and nine defensive tackles in the postseason. In 2012, Bush ranked first on the club with a career-high 15 special teams stops and one fumble recovery with 13 defensive tackles (nine solo), one interception, a pass defense, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. In 2013, Bush has appeared in five games with one starts and posted 16 tackles (ten solo), two passes defended, a fumble recovery and one special teams stop.

TEAM NOTES

BUCKING THE ODDS

Players whose names are not called in the NFL Draft often face challenging odds in sticking on a team. Yet the Saints final 2012 53-man roster featured 25 players who had bucked convention. The current 53-man roster features 18 undrafted veterans and six undrafted rookies. Among the undrafted veterans who have enjoyed productive NFL careers are Moore, de la Puente, Collins, Bush, S **Isa Abdul-Quddus**, RB **Travaris Cadet**, CB **Chris Carr**, DE **Glenn Foster**, OLB **Junior Galette**, CB **Jabari Greer**, K **Garrett Hartley**, ILB **David Hawthorne**, ILB **Ramon Humber**, DE **Tom Johnson**, RB **Khiry Robinson** and RB **Pierre Thomas**.

After originally making the club's 53-man opening day roster as a free agent out of divisional 1-AA Fordham in 2011, Abdul-Quddus has played in 33 games with four starts and posted career totals of 46 tackles (30 solo), two interceptions, 10 passes defensed, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery, 20 special teams stops and two special teams forced fumbles.

Signed following a standout career at Appalachian State, Cadet was one of two undrafted rookies to earn a spot on the 2012 opening day roster. The Miami native ended up appearing in 13 games and finished ranked third in the NFC and tied for seventh in the NFL in kickoff return average (26.5), also chipping in seven special teams tackles.

Signed as a free agent out of Boise State by Oakland in 2005, Carr has stuck in the NFL for nine years based on his versatility on both defense and special teams. Carr saw his most extensive action of the season vs. Miami, Sept. 30, and made an acrobatic fourth quarter interception, his first since 2010.

Signed as a free agent out of Illinois following the 2013 NFL Draft, where he started 23 games on the defensive line and posted 73 tackles, four sacks, one interception and one pass defense, Foster matched his college quarterback takedown total in the preseason as he finished among league leaders and earned a spot on the 53-man roster, adding a takedown in his NFL debut vs. Arizona Sept. 22.

Signed out of Stillman in 2010, Galette has evolved into a gifted pass rusher, appearing in 37 games with six starts, posting totals of 63 tackles (43 solo), 12.5 sacks, two passes defensed, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery. and 11 special teams stops. In 2013, Galette has converted to outside linebacker in the 3-4 alignment and has posted three sacks to rank second on the team and a fumble recovery.

A 2004 undrafted signing by Buffalo out of the University of Tennessee, Greer has returned two interceptions for touchdowns as a Saint and recorded 61 passes defensed since signing with the club in 2009, the most by a Black and Gold defender over that period. In 2012, he tied for the club lead with three picks and defensed 14 passes. On Sept. 30, vs. Miami, he recorded his first pick of 2013.

Signed by New Orleans at midseason in 2008 as an undrafted free agent from Oklahoma, Hartley has made his mark as one of the most reliable kickers in club history, making 72-of-85 field goal attempts (84.7%) with 361 points. He ranks fourth in franchise record books in field goals and fourth in scoring as part of a season where he is ranked first in the NFL in scoring among kickers with 50 points.

Originally signed as a free agent out of Texas Christian in 2007 by Seattle, the hard-hitting Hawthorne has appeared in 77 career games with 56 starts, posting 413 tackles (276 solo), seven sacks, seven interceptions, 15 passes defensed, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

Originally joining the Indianapolis Colts in 2009 out of North Dakota State, Humber has appeared in 43 career games with five starts and posted 51 tackles (29 solo), one sack, two passes defensed and one forced fumble, while excelling on special teams, where he has posted 48 career stops, including three in 2013 to rank among team leaders.

After first going to training camp out of Southern Mississippi with Indianapolis in 2006 and 2007, Johnson a Moss Point, Miss. native, took his game to the Arena Football League and CFL from 2008-10. He stuck to the Saints roster in 2011 and has appeared in 30 games, posting 59 tackles, three sacks, a pass defensed and a forced fumble.

Signed out of Illinois in 2007, Thomas led the club in rushing in both 2008 and 2009 and has scored 33 career touchdowns. Overall, he ranks seventh on the club's all-time rushing list with 674 carries for 3,11 yards, while his 4.6 yards per carry average ranks fourth in club record books. He's only the third player in franchise record books to have 3,000 yards rushing and 1,500 yards receiving. His 4,994 total yards from scrimmage rank seventh in club record books and 22nd in NFL records for an undrafted player.

Signed out of West Texas A&M, the hard-running Robinson earned a roster spot in the preseason when he led the club in both rushing and receiving and led the league in rushing and total yards from scrimmage (331) when he carried 49 times for 228 yards (4.7 avg.) and posted 11 receptions for 103 yards (9.4 avg.). Robinson has seen action out of the backfield in the last three games and ranks third on the club in rushing with 19 carries for 84 yards (4.4 avg.)

TEAM NOTES**SCORING EXPLOSION**

Since Payton joined the Saints as head coach for the 2006 season, the Saints have averaged 28.1 points per game (3,291 points) in 117 regular season games, second in the NFL over the period to this weekend's opponent, New England. Since 2006, they've scored 20 or more points in 96 games (82.1%) and 30 or more points in 55 (47.0%). Three of the franchise's top five single-game point totals have occurred since Payton's arrival in 2006. In 2013, they are ranked ninth in the league (26.8 ppg.).

OFFENSIVE NOTES**DOMINATING OFFENSE**

Since 2006, when Payton was first hired as head coach, the Saints have been the NFL's top ranked offense, averaging 402.6 net yards per game.

After the New Orleans offense successfully shattered the NFL's single season net yardage total with 7,474 yards in 2011, which was previously held by the 2000 St. Louis Rams (7,075), the 2012 Saints finished ranked first in the NFC and second in the NFL in net yards per game (410.9), posting at least 450 yards in a single game on four occasions.

In 2013, the Saints currently rank third in the conference and fourth in the league, averaging 405.0 yards per game.

THROUGH THE AIR

Each season since 2006 when Payton was hired as head coach, the Saints have ranked in the NFL's top five in passing, averaging 295.5 net yards per game to lead the league during the period.

In 2012, the Saints ranked first overall among NFL passing offenses, averaging 312.3 net yards per game. In a sign of the New Orleans passing game's diversity, the Saints were only the second NFL team to have four players with 65 or more catches (TE Jimmy Graham-85, WR Marques Colston-83, RB Darren Sproles-75 and WR Lance Moore-65), joining the 1990 Houston Oilers (WR Haywood Jeffries-74, WR Drew Hill-74, WR Ernest Givins-72 and WR Curtis Duncan-66), with three of the four players playing a separate position.

In 2013, they rank second in the NFL, averaging 326.8 net passing yards per game.

HOLDING THE LINE

Since 2006, New Orleans is the least sacked club in the NFL, surrendering only 162 takedowns in 117 games. In 2012, the New Orleans offensive line, blocking for the NFL's second-ranked offense and third-ranked scoring unit, surrendered only 26 sacks, tied for third-fewest in the NFL.

Ahead is a synopsis of the offensive line:

LEFT TACKLE Charles Brown - A 2010 second round draft pick, this promising offensive lineman earned the starting left tackle job in the preseason and protects the blindside of QB **Drew Brees**. The former University of Southern California standout has opened seven games at right tackle since 2011 and the first five of 2013 at left tackle for the fourth ranked offense in the NFL.

LEFT GUARD Ben Grubbs - Grubbs joined the Saints in 2012 as an unrestricted free agent and has moved into the left guard slot after spending the first five seasons of his career with Baltimore. Originally a first round selection (29th overall) in the 2007 NFL Draft, Grubbs has played in 95 career games with 91 starts and was an integral part of the Ravens' offensive productivity in the passing game and running game as the team set or tied several team records between 2008-11. Enjoying a breakthrough campaign in 2011, Grubbs was selected to his first Pro Bowl. Since coming to New Orleans, Grubbs has opened 21 straight games at left guard.

CENTER Brian de la Puente - After spending the majority of his first three NFL seasons on the practice squads of five clubs, de la Puente assumed starting center duties early in the 2011 season. Since his inclusion into the lineup, the New Orleans offense has rolled up at least 400 yards in 26 of the 33 contests he has opened up in the middle of the offensive line. In 2012, the Southern California native has opened all five games for an offense ranked fourth in the NFL in net yards per game and ninth in scoring.

RIGHT GUARD Jahri Evans - The 2006 fourth round draft choice has made a rapid ascent from his small school roots at Bloomsburg into one of the NFL's top interior linemen and one of the top offensive linemen in franchise history. Evans has been named to four consecutive Pro Bowls since the 2009 season, all as a starter, as well as being named *Associated Press* first-team All-Pro from 2009-12. His 114 streak of straight starts which ended Sept. 22, vs. Arizona, was the longest streak to begin a career in New Orleans and the second-longest streak at the time by an active NFL guard, tied for third-longest overall among NFL players.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

SCORING DEFENSE

After ranking 31st in opponent points per game in 2012, under the coordination of **Rob Ryan**, New Orleans has risen in the rankings to fifth as they have not given up 20 points in any of their contests, marking a five-game streak of doing so for the first time since the 2000 season (six game streak). It also marks the first time that the Saints have given up below 20 points in the season's first four games since the 1992 campaign, when they did not do so until the seventh contest of the season.

PICK CITY

Since 2009, an opportunistic defense has snared 63 interceptions for 1,405 yards, 12 for touchdowns, the third-highest total of return yardage, the highest average return (21.3) and tied for the second-most returns for touchdowns in the NFL over the four-season period. With four interception returns for a touchdown in 2012, the club tied for fourth in the NFL. In 2013, New Orleans' seven interceptions tie for third in the NFL, with seven players recording one pick apiece.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

In his eighth season with the team, special teams coordinator **Greg McMahon's** units have consistently been defined by solid performances by the kicking, coverage and return games.

Stressing opportunistic play since 2006, the unit has recovered 14 fumbles, scored ten touchdowns - six on punt returns and two on blocked punts - and blocked two punts, four field goals and two extra points.

Since 2008, New Orleans has been ranked in the top 10 in kickoff return average three times and finished ranked 11th in the league in 2012, averaging 24.8 yards per return. Running back **Darren Sproles** led the club with a 26.8 kickoff return average, while rookie running back **Travaris Cadet**, who made the team as an undrafted free agent took over primary kickoff return duties for the Black and Gold at midseason and finished second among NFL rookies with a 26.5 return average, including a club-long 75-yard runback. In 2013, Sproles has sparked the club's punt return game with several long returns, as his 8.7 average is currently ranked fourth in the NFC and tenth in the NFL.

The club's current specialists have enjoyed standout performances throughout their tenures with the club. P **Thomas Morstead** was selected to his first Pro Bowl following the 2012 season and has kept up the pace, averaging 47.7 gross and 44.3 net, while creating unfavorable field position for opponents, who have the league's 11th lowest return average, during a period when the Saints have faced some of the league's elite return men. K **Garrett Hartley** has booted 12-of-14 field goals in 2013, including a game-winning 27-yard kick vs. Tampa Bay, Sept. 15 and tying a career-high by booting four field goals at Chicago on Sunday.

The coverage units were buoyed by a mixture of mainstays and new additions. S **Rafael Bush**, acquired off of waivers from the Denver Broncos at the conclusion of the preseason, led the team with 15 special teams tackles in 2012, while recovering a fumble on punt coverage, which would lead to a New Orleans touchdown, adding one coverage stop in 2013. Inside linebackers **Will Herring**, voted a special teams captain in 2013 and **Ramon Humber** finished tied for second on the club with 14 coverage stops apiece in 2012, while also adding one and five respectively through the season's first five games in 2013. Rookie inside linebacker **Kevin Reddick**, an undrafted free agent out of the University of North Carolina has proven to be a find, as he currently leads the team with seven special teams stops and one forced fumble.

QUARTERBACKS

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans as a free agent in 2006, Brees has thrown for 4,000 or more yards each of his seven seasons with the club, the only quarterback in National Football League history to throw for 5,000 yards in three different seasons, setting the league single-season yardage record in 2011 and ranked at or near the top in every passing category, both in single-seasons and over the seven-year period as a member of the Saints, breaking nearly every club record.
- In 2012, the seven-time Pro Bowl selection completed 422-of-670 throws (63.0%) for 5,177 yards with 43 touchdown passes, 19 interceptions and a 96.3 passer rating, as he was selected to the league's All-Star game for the fourth consecutive season. Brees finished the season ranked first in the National Football League in both passing yardage and touchdown passes. He joined Dan Marino (1984, 86), as only the second signal-caller to have two seasons with 40 or more touchdown passes and in leading the league in touchdown passes for a fourth time, tied an NFL record held also by Johnny Unitas, Len Dawson, Steve Young and Brett Favre. It also marked the fourth time in his seven seasons as a Saint he led the league in passing yards (2006, 2008, 2011). Brees also finished tied for third in the NFL in completions and ranked eighth in passer rating.
- In 2013, Brees is following up with another standout season, as he's completed 140-of-201 passes (69.7%) for 1,722 yards, 12 touchdowns, four interceptions, one rushing touchdown and a 107.4 passer rating. He's currently ranked second in the NFL in passing yardage, third in completions, fourth in completion percentage, average gain (8.57), touchdown passes and passer rating and sixth in third down passer rating (100.3).
- Few players in the modern day free agency era have made the impact that Brees has on the Saints, who is considered one of the most productive signings in league history. Since 2006, he leads the NFL with 35,293 yards, 256 touchdown passes, 4,541 attempts, 3,050 completions, a 67.2 % completion percentage, 64 games with at least 300 yards, ten with at least 400, 276 completions of 25 yards or more and ranks fourth in the league with a 98.6 passer rating.
- Brees has been selected to play in six Pro Bowls as a Saint, with seven overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, twice as the conference's starting signal-caller. Brees is the only Saints quarterback to be selected to the All-Star game more than twice. His six selections as a Saint is tied for second all-time in club record books.
- Brees has posted a 74-42 regular season record in games he's started since joining the Saints in 2006. Including his five playoff victories, he's recorded 79 total wins as a Saint, making him the winningest quarterback in franchise history. Brees' win total ranks third among NFL signal-callers since arriving in New Orleans in 2006.
- Clutch when it counts at the most important times for his team, Brees has successfully engineered 22 regular season game-winning drives in the fourth quarter and overtime as a Saint, including his most recent one against Tampa Bay, Sept. 15. He's also led a pair of comebacks in the 2009 postseason, including in overtime of the NFC Championship game and the fourth quarter go-ahead scoring drive for a touchdown in the team's Super Bowl XLIV victory.
- In his 13-year National Football League career, Brees has completed 4,175-of-6,350 passes (65.7%) for 47,641 yards, 336 touchdown throws and a 94.7 rating. He's the National Football League's all-time third-most accurate passer, is ranked fourth in completions, sixth in touchdown passes and passing yardage and seventh in passer rating. He's only the seventh player in NFL record books to throw for at least 47,000 yards.
- Until he failed to throw for a touchdown at Atlanta, Nov. 29, 2012, Brees had thrown a touchdown pass in 54 consecutive regular season games, surpassing Johnny Unitas for the longest streak in National Football League history on October 7 vs. San Diego with his 48th. The streak spanned four seasons from 2009-12.
- Twice in the past three seasons, Brees has passed for at least 300 yards in an NFL-record nine consecutive games. His most recent streak spanned both the 2012 and 2013 seasons and ended this past Sunday at Chicago.

BY THE NUMBERS

2 – Brees and Dan Marino are the only two NFL players to throw for 40 or more touchdowns twice.

3 – NFC Offensive Player of the Month awards won by Brees in his 12-year NFL career, the most monthly awards won by a Saint in franchise history. Also the NFL-record number of seasons that Brees has thrown for at least 5,000 yards (2008, 2011, 2012), most recently leading the league this past season with 5,177 passing yards, the third-highest single-season figure of all time. Brees owns two of the three top single-season passing yardage numbers in NFL record books.

4 – NFL-record number of consecutive games that Brees threw for 350 yards in 2011. Also the number of seasons that Brees has led the NFL in touchdown passes, tying an NFL record also held by Johnny Unitas, Len Dawson, Steve Young and Brett Favre. Brees will attempt to break this record in 2013.

5 – The number of seasons overall and consecutive campaigns (2008-2012) that Brees has thrown for at least 30 touchdowns. He joins Brett Favre as only the second signal-caller to throw for 30 touchdowns in five consecutive seasons, as Brees will be looking to become the NFL leader in this category in 2013. Five is also the running number of consecutive seasons Brees has been selected to the Pro Bowl, having been selected to the NFL's all-star game six times as a Saint, seven times overall.

7 – Brees is only the second player in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards in seven consecutive seasons. Also the number of consecutive seasons Brees has thrown 25 touchdown passes, making him only the second player in league record books to do so.

8 – The number of seasons Brees has thrown 25 or more touchdown passes, ranked third in NFL record books behind Peyton Manning (14) and Favre (11). Also the number of times he reached the 350-yard mark in 2011, an NFL single-season record.

9 – The NFL-record stretch of consecutive games with at least 300 yards passing, which he has accomplished twice in the past three seasons, including his most recent streak that ended Sunday at Chicago.

10 – Ten is the number of rushing touchdowns in Brees' career following a seven-yard scoring run vs. Arizona, Sept. 22. Ten is also the number of regular season contests where Brees has thrown for 400 yards, ranked second all-time.

13 – With 13 300-yard games in 2011, Brees set the NFL single-season record, surpassing the one he previously tied

with 10 in 2008. In 2012, he threw for 300 yards in ten contests, including the final five. Through the first five games of 2013, he has thrown for 300 in four.

15 – Club-record NFC Player of the Week awards won by Brees as a Saint, including his most recent one last week vs. Miami. He and New England's Tom Brady are the only two players in NFL history to win multiple conference Player of the Week Awards in four straight seasons. Brees has also been named Offensive Player of the Week three times in back-to-back years.

37 – Consecutive contests from September 8, 2011-present when he has thrown for 200 yards, a span of three seasons.

42 – The number of different players that Brees' 334 career touchdown passes have gone to. 59 have gone to WR **Marques Colston**, making them the seventh most prolific quarterback-receiver combination in NFL history.

54 – Number of consecutive regular season contests between 2009-12 with at least one touchdown pass, now the longest streak in the NFL after Brees surpassed a 52-year old record held by Johnny Unitas in vs. San Diego on October 7, 2012. The 54-game streak ended on November 29, 2012 when he did not throw a touchdown pass at Atlanta.

57 – Running NFL record number of consecutive games where Brees has thrown at least 20 completions.

58 – Number of games by Brees as a Saint where he's posted a passer rating of 100 or more (min. 10 attempts) owning a 49-9 record in these games. This is the highest total among NFL quarterbacks since 2006. Brees reached the century mark in nine contests in 2012 and has done so three times in 2013. Overall, in his 13-year career, he has reached the milestone 75 times.

65 – The number of franchise-record regular season games with 300 yards or more passing as a Saint, the highest NFL total since 2006. In his career, Brees has reached the 300-yard mark 70 times, ranking him with the second-most in league record books. Only Peyton Manning (77) has more 300-yard outings than Brees.

74 – Club-record regular season victories as a starter. Including the postseason, Brees has a 79-45 overall record as the Saints' starter. His 79 wins rank third among NFL signal-callers since his arrival in New Orleans in 2006.

67.2 – Franchise-record completion percentage as a Saint, first in the NFL during this current eight-season period.

71.2 – NFL single-season record completion percentage in 2011. His 65.7 career completion percentage is ranked third in NFL record books.

CLUTCH QUARTERBACK

Since coming to New Orleans in 2006, Brees has engineered 22 regular season drives in the fourth quarter or overtime for a touchdown or field goal to lead New Orleans to victory from a deficit or tie, including Sunday's win at Tampa Bay. In the 2009 playoffs, Brees engineered a game-winning overtime drive in the NFC Championship and a fourth-quarter go-ahead touchdown drive in Super Bowl XLIV.

RATING SUCCESS

With 58 regular season games (min. 10 attempts) of a passer rating of at least 100 since 2006, Brees is ranked first in the NFL. The Saints have posted a 49-9 (.845) record in these games. Brees posted a 120.0 passer rating on Sunday at Chicago.

• In 2013, Thomas has split the lead back duties with **Darren Sproles**, appearing in all five games with two starts and leads the club in rushing with 137 yards and ranks second on the club in receiving with 28 receptions for 166 yards (5.9 avg.) with a career-high two touchdown grabs this past Sunday in a return to his hometown of Chicago. Also one of the NFL's premier return men on kickoffs and punts, Sproles has returned 322 kickoffs for 8,161 yards (25.3 avg.) with two TDs and returned 178 punts for 1,516 yards (8.5 avg.) with three TDs.

TB MARK INGRAM

• A hard-nosed runner who punishes opposing defenses with a combination of power and speed, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner was chosen with a first round pick the Saints traded for in 2011. Ingram returned to the club's running back rotation in 2012 as the only Saints runner to play in all 16 games and led the team in rushing, carrying 156 times for a career-high 602 yards with a team-leading five touchdowns, converting 8-of-11 third-and-one attempts.

FB JED COLLINS

• Originally signed by Philadelphia in 2008 as an undrafted free agent and after spending time on the practice squads of five teams, including New Orleans, while his only previous experience on an active roster was for two games with Cleveland in his rookie campaign, this converted college linebacker captured the starting fullback role through his work ethic, persistence and physical nature. In his third campaign as the club's lead blocker, Collins has appeared in five games with three starts and has carried three times for 11 yards, successfully converting two-of-two third-and-one rushing attempts. and recorded six receptions for 28 yards

- This former undrafted free agent and member of the practice squad has emerged from his humble beginnings and has developed into one of Brees' most reliable targets, ranking fifth in club records with 36 touchdown catches, as part of his 313 career receptions for 3,868 yards. In addition to his receiving TD total, Moore's ranked fourth in club records in catches and seventh in yardage. His 313 career grabs rank 21st all-time among undrafted players since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, his yardage total (3,868) is ranked 24th and his 36 touchdown grabs are tied for 14th.

- In 2012, Moore ranked first on the team in yards per catch with 65 receptions for a career-high 1,141 yards (16.0 avg.) with six TDs. • For this 2013 fifth round draft pick, big plays have been common both in the preseason and the regular season. The Southern California native left the University of Oklahoma ranked fourth in school record books in receiving with 204 receptions for 2,594 yards (12.7 avg.) with 24 touchdowns. Following a preseason where he led the club in receiving yardage with nine grabs for 170 yards (18.9 avg.) and two touchdowns, Stills made his NFL debut vs. Atlanta on Sept. 8 and made two grabs for a club-best 86 yards, including a 67-yard reception, the longest by a Saint in his NFL debut in club history. In five games, he has recorded seven catches for 134 yards (19.1 avg.).

TIGHT ENDS**JIMMY GRAHAM**

• Graham has enjoyed three of the most prolific seasons by an NFL tight end since 2011, ranking fourth in the NFL in receptions and first at the position with 221 grabs for 2,885 yards (13.1 avg.) with 26 touchdowns.

• Graham became the only Saints tight end to record 1,000 yards receiving and the second NFL tight end to surpass 1,300, the second-most receiving yards by one in NFL history, when he had a club record 99 catches for 1,310 yards with 11 TDs in 2011.

• Despite being hampered by wrist and ankle injuries in 2012, Graham still managed 85 receptions for 982 yards with nine touchdowns. The converted college basketball player has enjoyed one of the most prolific campaigns for a tight end in NFL history through five games in 2013, leading the team in receiving with 37 receptions for 593 yards (16.0 avg.) with six touchdowns.

• Leading tight ends in virtually every receiving category, Graham is tied for second in the NFL in receiving, ranked first in receiving yardage, tied for second in touchdown receptions and third in first downs (28). He captured NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors for week three and his 413 receiving yards over the final three contests of September is tied with Shannon Sharpe (1996) and Dave Kocourek (1961) for the highest total by a tight end in a three-game span, making him the first tight end to earn NFC Offensive Player of the Month honors.

BENJAMIN WATSON

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Cleveland Browns in the offseason, Thomas forms a strong tandem at the tight end position with Graham. The former University of Georgia standout and 10-year NFL veteran who originally entered the NFL as a first round draft pick of the New England Patriots in 2004 has career totals of 326 receptions for 3,825 yards (11.7 avg.) with 29 touchdowns in 120 games with 90 starts. Watson recorded his first touchdown as a Saint on a four-yard grab vs. Miami, Sept. 30.

- Serving as a solid complement to Graham, Watson has appeared in all five games with two starts and has posted five receptions for 49 yards with one touchdown, while also being an asset with his presence as a blocker.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

CAMERON JORDAN

- New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California came to the Saints after a productive college career where he was stout against the run and emerged as one of the nation's elite pass rushers. Jordan in 2012 lined up in every game at left defensive end and enjoying a standout sophomore campaign with 76 tackles (52 solo) to lead the defensive line and a club-leading eight sacks, the highest total by a Saints defender since 2009, three pass defenses, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. He led the team in forced fumbles, while tying for the team lead in recoveries, tying for 15th in the NFL.

- In New Orleans' 3-4 defensive alignment, Jordan remains at end, while returning to a similar position to what he played as a college standout. He has proven to be an outstanding fit for the club's new scheme, recording 23 tackles (13 solo), a team-leading four sacks, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Jordan is tied for 12th in the NFL in quarterback takedowns.

AKIEM HICKS

- Possessing the size and strength to handle double teams, the 6-5, 324-pound Hicks was the club's top draft pick in 2012. Following two productive college seasons at Regina, Hicks' progression continued in 14 games in the regular season, where he posted 32 tackles (19 solo), one pass defense and a forced fumble as his playing time continually increased with his development along the defensive line.

- In 2013, Hicks has transitioned to defensive end in the club's 3-4 alignment where he plays opposite Jordan. He has opened all five contests, posting 15 tackles (seven solo) and one sack.

TOM JOHNSON

- After beginning his professional football playing career in NFL Europe, the Arena Football League and Canadian Football League while trying to crack an NFL roster, this Mississippi Coast native and former University of Southern Mississippi standout has found his niche close to home along the interior of the New Orleans defensive line. Johnson played an integral part on the Saints defensive line

rotation in 15 contests in 2012 and posted 33 tackles (21 solo) and two sacks on the interior. In 2013, he transitions to the defensive end position in the 3-4 and in action in two games, has posted one tackle.

TYRUNN WALKER

- This 6-3, 294-pound widebody possesses the perfect build for a 3-4 defensive end. After working on the scout team his rookie season as well as continuing to build strength, Walker, who finished with 13.5 tackles in two seasons at Tulsa is expected to be a solid contributor on the defensive line in 2013. In three games, Walker has posted six tackles (two solo) and one sack.

GLENN FOSTER

- Foster, a 6-4, 285-pound defensive tackle at Illinois, made a successful transition to end in training camp as an undrafted free agent. The powerful defender, led the team with four sacks in the preseason to help him secure a roster spot, posting a sack vs. Arizona, Sept. 22 in his NFL debut. Fully recovered from an early season ankle injury, Foster has posted four tackles (two solo), one takedown, while also assisting on special teams.

NOSE TACKLES

BRODRICK BUNKLEY

- Originally a first round (14th overall) selection in the 2006 NFL Draft by Philadelphia, Bunkley joined the Saints as an unrestricted free agent following a one-year stint with Denver. The eight-year veteran's appeared in 108 games with 81 starts and has totaled 338 tackles (198 solo), 8.5 sacks, nine passes defended and three fumble recoveries.

JOHN JENKINS

- With imposing size, tremendous strength and the ability to take on multiple blockers, the club's 2013 third round pick manned the center of Georgia's defense for two seasons at nose guard, where he was named team Defensive Co-MVP as a senior. He opened 20-of-27 games at Georgia where he recorded 78 tackles (36 solo), four sacks for a loss of 26 yards, eight stops for losses of 32 yards, one interceptions, a pass defense, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. Jenkins rotates with Bunkley to anchor the middle of the New Orleans defensive line, appearing in all five regular season games with four starts, plugging the middle while posting 17 tackles (nine solo).

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

JUNIOR GALETTE

- Galette's a speed-rushing player who's also excelled on the special teams coverage units. He was one of two undrafted free agents to make the Saints opening day roster in 2010. In 2012, he played an extensive role in the club's defensive end rotation, playing in 12 games with one start and posting 22 tackles (18 solo), ranking third on the team with a career-high five takedowns and one fumble recovery, while also tying a career-best by adding four stops on the club's special teams unit. In 2013, Galette has transitioned to the outside linebacker position in the club's 3-4 defensive alignment which will utilize his strength of rushing the passer. In the season's first five games, Galette has posted 12 tackles (nine solo), three sacks and one fumble recovery.

MARTEZ WILSON

- Originally drafted out of the University of Illinois in 2011, Wilson appeared in all 16 games in 2012 and posted 18 tackles (12 solo), three sacks, two pass defenses, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He also excelled on special teams, where he ranked fourth on the club with 13 stops (12 solo) and blocked a punt in the season opener vs. Washington, Sept. 9. The club's 3-4 alignment allows Wilson to move back to the linebacker position he played in college, as they seek to take advantage of his pass rush and run-stopping abilities and natural instincts in coverage. He posted his first sack of 2013 vs. Miami, Sept. 30.

PARYS HARALSON

- A student of the game, Haralson has played linebacker in a 3-4 his entire NFL career, joining New Orleans late in the preseason from San Francisco. He will contribute to the position group after missing 2012 with a triceps tear. Posting two sacks in the 2013 preseason, the Mississippi native has returned to the form where he was a key contributor in San Francisco in 2011, when he posted 39 tackles, a career-high three forced fumbles and two sacks, following up with four tackles (one solo) and a quarterback takedown in his Saints debut vs. Atlanta, Sept. 8.

- A fifth-round draft pick of the 49ers in 2006, Haralson entered the starting lineup in 2007 and has posted 22.5 career sacks. In 2008, he posted a career-high eight takedowns, tied for second in the NFC at his position.

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

CURTIS LOFTON

- A second round selection of Atlanta in 2008, Lofton joined the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2012 and followed up with his most productive NFL season. The versatile linebacker, who shored up the middle for New Orleans, has started 84 of the 85 career games he's appeared in and totaled 775 tackles (502 solo), five sacks, three interceptions, ten forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and 27 pass defenses. In 2013, Lofton leads the team with 41 stops (20 solo) and has added two passes defended and one forced fumble.

- In his new uniform manning the middle in 2012, Lofton led the Saints in tackles with 157 stops (94 solo), adding a sack, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and ten pass defenses. While also leading the team in stops, it was the highest tackle total for a Saints defender since 1997, while he also set a career-high in fumble recoveries, tying for the team lead and for 15th in the NFL. In 2013, as the Saints transition to a 3-4, Lofton's run-defending and leadership abilities in the middle of the New Orleans defense will be integral to this change.

- During his six-year NFL career, Lofton has recorded double-digit tackle totals in 38 games. With his team-best 157 tackles, Lofton reached double-digit figures in seven contests in 2012 and has done so twice in 2013.

- The durable Lofton's opened 72 straight contests, the fourth-longest games started streak for an NFL linebacker, at a position that is among the most hard-hitting in the league.

DAVID HAWTHORNE

- The five-year veteran emerged from being an undrafted special teams contributor into being the club's top tackler his final three seasons with the Seahawks, recording 100 or more stops three straight times. Hawthorne has played in 77 career games with 56 starts and totaled 413 tackles (276 solo), seven sacks, seven interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 15 pass defenses, four forced fumbles, three recoveries and 15 special teams stops.
- In 2012, the former TCU standout appeared in 11 games and started ten contests at both the weakside and strongside positions and posted 43 tackles (20 solo). Upon his return from a hamstring injury, Hawthorne settled in on the strongside, however in 2013, he will have the opportunity to move back to the inside where he excelled for the majority of his snaps in Seattle. Opening alongside Lofton in the middle of the 3-4 defense, Hawthorne has opened up all five games on the interior currently is the club's second leading tackles as he has posted 34 tackles (16 solo) and one sack.

JONATHAN VILMA

- Vilma brings a wealth of experience and success to the New Orleans defense. The University of Miami (Fla.) product is one of the NFL's top linebackers and has earned three Pro Bowl selections in his career, two coming as a Saint following the 2009 and 2010 campaigns.
- Through nine NFL seasons, Vilma's recorded 988 total tackles (642 solo), 12 interceptions, 10.5 sacks, 11 forced fumbles, ten fumble recoveries and 41 passes defended, starting 121 of the 124 regular season games he's played in for the Saints and New York Jets.

• After successfully rehabilitating from a knee injury that caused him to miss the first five contests, Vilma appeared in 11 games in 2012 with 10 starts from the weakside position, posting 49 tackles (21 solo), one sack, one interception return for a TD and three pass defenses. While currently on reserve/injured-designated to return following knee surgery in training camp, Vilma will be eligible to return at midseason to an inside position in the 3-4, rotating with Lofton, David Hawthorne, Will Herring, Ramon Humber and Kevin Reddick.

WILL HERRING

- Herring came to New Orleans in 2011 as an unrestricted free agent after spending his first four NFL seasons with the Seattle Seahawks. In 86 games with 11 starts, he's posted career totals of 94 tackles (71 solo), one sack, three interceptions, five pass defenses, two forced fumbles and 55 special teams stops.
- Herring was an asset both on defense in special teams in 2012, appearing in all 16 games with one start on the outside, posting seven tackles (four solo) and 14 special teams stops to tie for second on the club. While continuing to be one of the club's leaders on the team's special teams units, as he was elected a team captain on the unit for the first time, Herring will also serve in a rotation at inside linebacker in 2013, where he has recorded two tackles, one special teams stop and a pick.

RAMON HUMBER

- After starting his career with the Indianapolis Colts in 2009 as an undrafted free agent in 2009 and facing the Saints in Super Bowl XLIV, Humber came to New Orleans late in the 2010 season and has been a special teams standout, while also contributing on defense. The former North Dakota State standout has appeared in 52 games with five starts, tallying 51 tackles (29 solo), one sack, two passes defended, one forced fumble and 48 special teams stops.
- After tying for second on the club with 14 special teams tackles in 2012, Humber made a push for playing time at inside linebacker during the preseason where he led the club with 20 tackles (16 solo) and one sack. In the regular season, he's posted four solo defensive stops, one pass defense and five special teams tackles.

KEVIN REDDICK

• This two-time team captain at the University of North Carolina joined the Saints as a free agent following the draft and immediately got to work with his blue-collar mentality from his Tar Heel days where he registered 275 tackles, 8.5 sacks, 36 stops for a loss, two interceptions, 16 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Appearing in both contests, Reddick has made one assisted tackle in limited action at inside linebacker and also leads the team with seven special teams stops, while adding a forced fumble on coverage.

CORNERBACKS

JABARI GREER

• Greer was a significant offseason addition in 2009 as a free agent signing from Buffalo that has bolstered the Secondary. One of the NFL’s fastest players, Greer has returned two interceptions for touchdowns as a Saint, four overall in his eight-year NFL career which began as an undrafted free agent.

• In 2013, Greer, the most experienced member of New Orleans’ secondary, has opened all five games and recorded 21 tackles (17 solo), one interception and one pass defended, including his first pick of the season, Sept. 30 vs. Miami.

COREY WHITE

• The club’s 2012 fifth round draft pick out of Division 1-AA Samford University, White entered the starting lineup in his NFL debut in the season opener in substitute for an injured Greer and also opened the second game of the season. He became the first Saints cornerback to start the season opener since 2002.

• Seeing extensive action in ten contests with four starts in 2012 before being placed on injured reserve with a season-ending knee injury, White posted 32 tackles (28 solo), one interception, three pass defenses and four special teams stops. White made his biggest play when he posted his first career interception, in addition to four tackles (two solo) and one pass defense vs. Atlanta, Nov. 11. In 2013, a healthy White has appeared in all five games, posting seven defensive tackles, (five solo), one pass defense and one special teams stop, while using his speed to be an asset on the club’s coverage units.

KEENAN LEWIS

• Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Pittsburgh Steelers at the start of the offseason, this New Orleans native returns home to join the Saints secondary. Over the course of his four-year career in Pittsburgh, Lewis appeared in 45 games with 17 starts, registering 111 tackles (94 solo), one interception, 34 passes defended and one forced fumble.

• In 2012, his final season in Pittsburgh, Lewis stepped into the starting lineup for the first time for the NFL’s top-ranked defense both overall and against the pass, and posted 78 tackles (63 solo), an NFL-leading 28 passes defended and one forced fumble.

• Lewis has been a smooth fit to the secondary for his hometown team, opening all five contests opposite Greer and recording 13 tackles (nine solo), one interception and two passes defended.

PASS DEFENDER

In 2012, Keenan Lewis led the entire NFL with 28 passes defended as a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

SAFETIES

ROMAN HARPER

• For eight seasons, this hard hitter’s been one of the team’s most consistent and dependable performers. The club’s second round draft choice in 2006 and the longest-tenured member of the secondary, Harper’s started all 101 games he’s played in and recorded 711 stops (505 solo), 17 sacks, seven interception returns for 105 yards, 53 passes defended, 13 forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. He’s the only Saints safety to have been selected to two Pro Bowls.

- In 2012, Harper ranked second on the club with 124 stops (91 solo), two interceptions, nine pass defenses and one forced fumble.
- Harper got off to a rousing start in 2013 before being sidelined with a knee injury, helping key a defensive resurgence by the unit, posting four tackles, one fumble recovery and a game-saving interception in the end zone late in the fourth quarter on vs. Atlanta, Sept. 8. It marked the first time that a Saint had posted both an interception and a fumble recovery in a game since S **Jay Bellmay** did so at Washington on Oct. 18, 2002.

HARD HITTER

Harper, one of the NFL's fiercest blitzers, has posted 17 sacks since 2006, first in the NFL by defensive backs during this period, tied for 10th all-time by defensive backs and first by Saints defensive backs. One of the club's biggest playmakers and disrupters on the back end of the defense, his 13 forced fumbles since 2006 ranks first on the club over the period, tied for sixth by NFL defensive backs and ranked first all-time among Saints safeties.

MALCOLM JENKINS

• A consensus All-American at Ohio State and the top-rated defensive back in the 2009 NFL Draft, where he was picked 14th overall, Jenkins was converted by the Saints to the safety position in 2010, where he has shown a nose for the end zone, as he has returned one fumble and two interceptions for touchdowns in the last four seasons, as part of career totals of 340 tackles (243 solo), two sacks, five picks, 34 passes defended, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

• In 2012 despite missing the last three games with a hamstring injury, Jenkins finished ranked third on the club in stops with 95 tackles (70 solo), one interception return for a TD, five passes defended and a blocked field goal. Known for making big plays at opportune times, the defensive team captain's biggest tackle of 2012 occurred, Oct. 21, at Tampa Bay, when he stopped Buccaneers WR **Vincent Jackson** at the New Orleans one-yard line as he caught up to him following a 95-yard pass play. New Orleans would eventually end up stopping Tampa Bay on four plays on a crucial goal line stand.

• Voted a team captain for the second straight season, Jenkins has gotten off to a quick start as he forced fumble by Falcons WR **Julio Jones** that was recovered by Harper in the opener vs. Atlanta, Sept. 8. He also chipped in five tackles (one solo). On Sept. 15 at Tampa Bay, Jenkins picked off QB **Josh Freeman** and returned it 31 yards. On Sunday at Chicago, he sacked Bears QB **Jay Cutler**, forcing a fumble that was recovered by teammate **Cameron Jordan**. Jenkins has filled up the stat sheet, posting 21 tackles (14 solo), one sack, one interception, two passes defended and a team-leading two forced fumbles, while adding a special teams stop.

ISA ABDUL-QUDDUS

• This former undrafted free agent who snagged a roster spot out of Division 1-AA Fordham as a rookie with his play on special teams has impressed on both coverage units and defense. Appearing in 15 contests with three starts in 2012, Abdul-Quddus filled up the stat sheet by posting 36 tackles (24 solo), two interceptions, eight pass defenses and one fumble recovery and nine special teams stops. After suffering an ankle injury at the conclusion of the pre-season that sidelined him for the first three games, he's posted one tackle in limited defensive action in two games in 2013.

RAFAEL BUSH

- Claimed off of waivers at the conclusion of the 2012 pre-season, this second-year safety was a constant on the club's special teams units, while also becoming an integral part of the club's multiple defensive back packages. In 2012, Bush appeared in all 16 games, ranking first on the club with 15 special teams tackles and one fumble recovery, while also chipping in 13 defensive tackles (nine solo), a 40-yard interception return, one pass defense, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

- Joining Abdul-Quddus as another diamond from the Division 1-AA ranks, Bush has started the first two games of his NFL career in consecutive weeks as a third safety and has posted 16 tackles (14 solo), two passes defended and one fumble recovery, while also adding one stop on special teams.

KENNY VACCARO

- A first-team All-American at the University of Texas and one of the top-rated defensive backs in the 2013 NFL Draft, the club's first-round pick is a versatile defender who is expected to immediately become an asset on defense. He started 32-of-51 games for the Longhorns and finished his college career with 264 tackles, two sacks, 16 stops for losses, five interceptions, 21 passes defended, four forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, two blocked kicks and 14 special teams stops. As a senior in 2012, he earned first-team All-American and All-Big 12 as he totaled a team-leading 107 tackles, four stops for a loss, two interceptions, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and a recovery.

- Vaccaro made his regular season debut in Black and Gold vs. Atlanta, Sept. 8, a memorable one, as he opened the contest in a nickel package and stayed on the field for every defensive snap except for one. The hard-hitter posted seven tackles, but his most significant play of the contest was the last defensive snap when he broke up a pass in the end zone that was picked up by Harper for an interception to help preserve New Orleans' 23-17 victory. He has filled up the stat sheet as a candidate for NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year as he has opened all five games in the New Orleans secondary and ranks among club leaders with 32 tackles (26 solo), one sack, one interception and two pass defenses, while also making contributions on special teams.

• P Thomas Morstead, the club's fifth round draft pick in 2009, was among the nation's top punters at Southern Methodist University and continued that trend in his three years with the Saints. In 2012, he enjoyed one of the finest seasons by a Saints punter, ranking second in the NFL in both net (43.2) punting average and gross (50.1), as he was selected to the Pro Bowl and named an *Associated Press* second-team All-Pro.

- After setting an NFL record with 68 touchbacks in 2011, 45 of Morstead's kickoffs sailed into the end zone for touchbacks in 2012, tied for sixth in the NFL, to assist the New Orleans defense in the battle for field position.

MORSTEAD IS SAINTS LEADER

Thomas Morstead has established himself as one of the most productive punters in NFL history through three seasons as a member of the Saints after being picked by the club in the fifth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. - Signed by New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent from Seattle in 2011, Herring has been a stalwart on the special teams units the past two seasons. In 2013, the newly elected special teams captain has one stop to add to his career total of 55.

- After ranking among team leaders with 11 special stops as a rookie in 2011, Wilson, a converted linebacker, has been important to the Saints both on defense and special teams, where he finished ranked fourth on the club with a career-high 13 stops and a blocked punt, which was recovered and returned for a touchdown.

- Acquired off of waivers from the Denver Broncos for his special teams acumen at the final 53-man roster cutdown, Bush, a second-year veteran, made an immediate impact as he led the Saints as he finished his first season in New Orleans and first full NFL campaign ranked first on the club with a career-high 15 special teams stops, also adding a fumble recovery and also became a valued member of the secondary, posting 16 tackles (14 solo), two passes defensed and one fumble recovery, while also adding one stop on special teams.

- Beating the odds to secure a roster spot as an undrafted free agent, Reddick, a hard-hitting linebacker from the University of North Carolina was a two-time team captain for the Tarheels who posted 275 career tackles. His tackling ability will be an asset on special teams, where he leads the team with seven stops and one forced fumble.

- Sweeting is an undrafted free agent from Georgia Tech who also secured a roster spot based on his speed and coverage skills that were displayed in the preseason. On Sept. 15 at Tampa Bay, he recorded his first career special teams tackle.
