## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (14-2) vs. NEW YORK JETS (11-5)

Sun., Jan. 16, 2011 * Gillette Stadium $(68,756) \star 4: 30$ p.m. EST
The AFC East Champion New England Patriots will aim to advance to the AFC Championship game when they clash with their divisional rivals, the New York Jets, in a Divisional Playoff Game this Sunday at Gillette Stadium. The Jets advanced to the second round of the playoffs with a 17-16 win last Saturday night against Indianapolis.

This week's game will be the third between the Patriots and Jets this season, with the teams splitting two regular-season contests. The Jets beat the Patriots, 2814, at The New Meadowlands Stadium on Sept. 19, but New England evened the season series with a 45-3 win on Monday Night Football on Dec. 6.

New England and New York will meet in the playoffs for the third time. The Patriots won a first-round game 26-14 at Giants Stadium on Dec. 28, 1985 to begin their run to the 1985 AFC Championship. The Patriots 2006 team beat the Jets, 3716, at Gillette Stadium in a first-round game on Jan. 7, 2007.

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast to a regional audience by CBS and can be seen in Boston on WBZ-TV Channel 4. WBZ-TV Channel 4. Jim Nantz will handle play-by-play duties with Phil Simms providing color. The game will be produced by Lance Barrow and directed by Mike Arnold.

## PATRIOTS CLINCH PLAYOFF BERTH FOR 12th TI ME IN KRAFT'S 17 YEARS OF OWNERSHIP

New England has qualified for the playoffs 18 times in its 51-year history. The Patriots have earned 12 playoff berths in the 17 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths that the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have 10 division crowns in the 12 playoff berths under Kraft, including eight of the last 10 seasons. The 14-2 2010 record earned the Patriots their third top
 seed in the AFC and it is the seventh time the Patriots have been seeded high enough to earn a first round playoff bye.

## PATRIOTS EARN FOURTH 14 WIN SEASON

The Patriots finished 14-2 in 2010. The Patriots have finished with at least 14 wins in four separate seasons. In addition to the 2010 season, the Patriots finished 14-2 in 2003, 14-2 in 2004 and 16-0 in 2007. The Patriots join the San Francisco 49ers as the only teams to have four 14 -win seasons.

## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS

The Patriots are the only team in the NFL to have recorded nine or more wins in each of the last 10 seasons.

## SERIES HISTORY (51-51-1)

The Patriots and Jets will meet for the 104th time, including two postseason games, since the series between the AFC East rivals began in 1960. The Jets took the lead in the series 51-50-1 following a $28-14$ win in Week 2 on Sept. 19 of the 2010 season at the New Meadowlands Stadium. The Patriots evened the
 series with a $45-3$ victory in the rematch in Week 13 on Dec. 6 in a Monday Night Football game at Gillette Stadium.
The teams split the season series in each of the last three seasons.

The Patriots are 7-3 against the Jets all-time at Gillette Stadium.

The teams have played in the postseason two times, a 1985 Wild Card game and a 2006 Wild Card game. New England beat the Jets, 26-14 in 1985 at Giants Stadium on their way to Super Bowl XX. In 2006, the Patriots defeated the Jets, 37-16, at Gillette Stadium.

The Patriots have won 13 of their last 17 games against the Jets (including one playoff game). New England is 22-13 against the Jets since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England's 51 victories over the Jets (including two playoff wins) are the second most over any single opponent, trailing only Buffalo with 61 all-time wins.

Quarterback Mark Sanchez threw three touchdowns to lead the New York Jets to a 28-14 victory over the New England Patriots at The New Meadowlands Stadium. New England jumped in front 14-10 in the first half, but the Jets scored 18 points in the second half, forced three turnovers and held the Patriots to just 80 total yards and no points The Patriots dominated the start of the game with a 7:34 drive and an 8:10 drive but came away with just one touchdown on those two possessions. Tom Brady threw two interceptions and lost a fumble on a sack in the second half. The first turnover came when Jets CB Antonio Cromartie intercepted a Brady pass at the New York 3 -yard line on a pass intended for Moss in the end zone. The Jets took over and engineered 10 -play, 80 -yard drive that ended in a field goal to cut the lead to 14-13. A 31 -yard run by RB LaDainian Tomlinson on the Jets next series helped set up a 2 -yard touchdown pass from Sanchez to WR Jerricho Cotchery and a Sanchez two-point conversion to Edwards put the Jets in front, 21-14.

The New England Patriots moved into sole possession of first place in the AFC East with a $45-3$ romp over the New York Jets at Gillette stadium on Monday Night Football. QB Tom Brady threw four touchdown passes and 326 yards in his NFL-record $26^{\text {th }}$ straight regular-season home victory.

When Brady was not doing the damage, RB Danny Woodhead was. He registered his first 100 -yard receiving game after finishing with four receptions for 104 yards. He turned a shuffle pass at the end of the third quarter into a 50 -yard gain to help set up a fourth quarter touchdown. In the second quarter he turned a short pass into a 35 -yard gain to get into Jets territory to set up a touchdown that gave New England a 24-3 lead. The Patriots defense intercepted Jets QB Mark Sanchez on three straight series to start the second half, including two deep in New England territory. The Patriots converted all three turnovers into touchdown drives for a convincing 45-3 victory.

## PATRIOTS IN THE DIVSIONAL ROUND

The Patriots have compiled an 8-5 all-time record in divisional playoff games, including 5-1 at home and 3-0 at Gillette Stadium. Their only home loss was in 1978, the first home playoff game in franchise history.

Since the Patriots moved to Gillette Stadium in 2002, they have celebrated more regular season and postseason wins than any other team in the NFL. The Patriots have the highest point differential at home in that time and are among the top three offensive and defensive leaders at home. The Patriots home dominance is especially strong against NFC teams. With the win at home over Green Bay (12/19/10), the Patriots have now defeated all 31 NFL teams at Gillette Stadium since the venue opened in 2002.

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

New England has qualified for the playoffs 18 times in its 51year history. Twelve of those playoff berths have come in the 17 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths that the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. New England has won 13 division crowns, including eight in the past nine seasons, and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

Pittsburgh and Dallas both won 14 playoff contests between 1970 and 1979, while New England won 14 postseason games from 2000-2009.

The Patriots have now won nine or more games 14 of the 17 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

## HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots are $11-2$ at home in the playoffs in their history. Twelve of the franchise's 13 home playoff games have taken place since Robert Kraft purchased the team 17 years ago. After Kraft bought the team, the Patriots won 11 consecutive home playoff games before experiencing a home loss.

The Patriots won the AFC East seven times during the decade of 2000-09. The Patriots had a streak of five straight division titles snapped in 2008 when they finished 11-5, but lost to Miami on a tie breaker to finish in second place. The Patriots set a franchise record by finishing the 2010 season with a turnover differential of +28 , forcing 38 turnovers while allowing just 10 turnovers. The previous Patriots' team record for best turnover differential in a season was +17 , a record which was set in 2003. The previous record for fewest turnovers in a 16 -game season was 13 by the Giants and Dolphins in 2008. The Patriots led the NFL with 25 interceptions in 2010. The 25 interceptions in 2010 by the Patriots is tied for the fourth-highest single-season total in team history. The only times the Patriots have had more interceptions in a season were in 1964 (31 interceptions), 1963 (29 interceptions) and 2003 (29 interceptions)

## PATRIOTS BECOME FIRST TEAM IN NFL HISTORY TO SCORE A TD FIVE DI FFERENT WAYS IN THE

 SAME GAMEThe Patriots became the first team in NFL history to score a touchdown five different ways in the same game at Miami (10/04). The Patriots scored a rushing touchdown, a receiving touchdown, had a kickoff returned for a touchdown, blocked a field goal that was returned for a touchdown and returned an interception for a touchdown.

## DEI ON BRANCH RETURNS TO THE PATRI OTS

Deion Branch was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Seattle on Oct. 12, 2010. Originally a second-round pick of the Patriots in 2002, Branch was traded to Seattle in 2006 for a first round pick (Brandon Meriweather). Branch returns to a team that he helped win two Super Bowls. Branch was awarded the Pete Rozelle Trophy as the Most Valuable Player of Super Bowl XXXIX. His 11 receptions in the game tied the Super Bowl record, also achieved by Jerry Rice, Dan Ross and Wes Welker. On the day of Super Bowl XXXIX, Deion called a dozen of his former football coaches to thank them for the support that they gave him throughout his high school, junior college and college careers. Hours after talking to his coaches, he tied the Super Bowl record with 11 receptions and was named MVP of the game. Branch has turned in his biggest performances on the greatest stage in sports, leading all receivers in Super Bowls XXXVIII and XXXIX. He recorded a combined 21 receptions in the two games and owns two of the top seven receiving performances in Super Bowl history. His career reception total in the Super Bowl ranks third all-time, trailing only Jerry Rice (33) and Andre Reed (27).

## DEI ON BRANCH HAS CAREER LONG

The 79-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Deion Branch at Detroit ( $11 / 25$ ) is the longest reception of Branch's career. His previous best was a 66 -yard touchdown pass from Brady at Denver on Nov. 3, 2003.

According to Elias Sports Bureau, it is the longest kickoff return by an offensive lineman in NFL history. The run by Connolly topped the 48 -yard touchdown return by Atlanta's Mal Snider in 1969. The previous longest kickoff return for a Patriots offensive lineman was a 27 -yard return by G Stephen Neal on Nov. 30, 2008 vs. Pittsburgh. Connolly's previous best was a 16 -yard return vs. Miami on Nov. 8, 2009. Connolly's return set up a 2 yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Aaron Hernandez that cut the Packers' lead to 17-14. The Patriots' previous longest punt return was an 89 -yard touchdown return by Mike Haynes vs. Buffalo on Nov. 7, 1976. It is the first punt return for a touchdown by the Patriots since Troy Brown had a 68 -yard return at Carolina on Jan. 6, 2002.

## EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Julian Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed $56 \%$ of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

## GREEN-ELLIS GOES OVER 1,000 YARDS

RB Benjarvus Green-Ellis finished the 2010 season with 1,008 rushing yards, becoming the first Patriots player to top the 1,000-yard rushing mark since Corey Dillon had a team-record 1,635 rushing yards in 2004. Green-Ellis is the 11th New England player to record a 1,000-yard rushing season. Green-Ellis recorded his 1,000 -yard season without fumbling the ball all year, joining Baltimore's Ray Rice as the only NFL backs with at least 175 rushing attempts and no fumbles this season. GreenEllis and Rice are the first running backs to have a 1,000 -yard season without a fumble since DeAngelo Williams had a 1,000 yard season without a fumble in 2008.

## BEN ARVUS GREEN-ELLIS - THE LAW FIRM

Benjarvus Green-Ellis earned the nickname the Law Firm from his Patriots teammates because of his multi-part name. He was signed by the Patriots as an undrafted free agent in 2008 out of the University of Mississippi. As a rookie, he recorded touchdowns in four straight games after being called up from the practice squad in October. His knack for finding the end zone has continued this season as he has reached the end zone a career-high 12 times, including his first 2-touchdown performance vs. Minnesota (10/31). Green-Ellis also had a 112yard rushing performance against the Vikings with 62 yards on the Patriots' final fourth quarter touchdown drive that extended a 3 -point lead to a 10 -point cushion in a 28 -18 victory

## ROOKIE TIGHI ENDS ARE MAKNG AN I MPACT

Rob Gronkowski finished first among all rookie tight ends with 10 touchdown catches, while Aaron Hernandez ranked second with six. Gronkowski and Hernandez are the first pair of rookie tight end teammates with at least five TD receptions in the same season in NFL history.

## GRONKOWSKI SCORES ON HIS FIRST CATCH

Rookie TE Rob Gronkowski scored on a 1-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the fourth quarter vs. Cincinnati (9/16). It was his first NFL reception. Gronkowski is the first Patriots rookie to score a touchdown on opening day since WR Deion Branch in 2002.

Brandon Tate has blossomed into a dual threat in both the return game and the receiving game. He has returned two kickoffs for touchdowns to provide the Patriots a spark on special teams, after returning the second half kickoff vs. Cincinnati 97 yards for a touchdown and
 the second half kickoff at Miami 103 yards for a touchdown. He is the first Patriots player to return two kicks for touchdowns in a season since Kevin Faulk returned two for a touchdown in 2002. The Patriots record for most kickoff returns for a touchdown in a season is three by Raymond Clayborn in 1977. His prowess for returns carries over from his collegiate days where he holds numerous NCAA and ACC career records including the NCAA career record for combined kick and punt return yards with 3,523 . A native of North Carolina, Tate was a four-year return man for the Tar Heels. Tate suffered a knee injury against Notre Dame as a senior and missed the final seven games of the season. Tate joined the Patriots in the third round of the 2009 draft, but his rookie year was derailed by injury as he was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 14 after seeing action in only two games.

## ADDITIONAL TATE NOTES

- Finished the season with five touchdowns (three receiving, two kickoff returns) and 432 receiving yards on 24 catches.
- Ranked third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL with a 25.8 kickoff return average, having returned 41 kickoffs for 1057 yards.
- Led the Patriots with 1,555 all-purpose yards.
- Led the team with four receptions of more than 40 yards ( 65 -yard touchdown catch vs. Minnesota on Oct. 31; 45yarder at Pittsburgh on Nov. 14 and a 42 -yard touchdown catch and 40 -yarder vs. Miami on Jan. 2).


## FRED TAYLOR AMONG NFL'S BEST

Fred Taylor ranks 15th in NFL history for most rushing yards with career totals of 2,534 carries for 11,695 yards and 66 rushing touchdowns in 153 games. He trails only New York's LaDainian Tomlinson $(13,404)$ among active running backs in rushing yards. Taylor ranks among the NFL's

## GREETI NGS FROM KAARST, GERMANY: <br> SEBASTIAN VOLLMER MAKES HIS MARK

A native of Kaarst, Germany, Vollmer did not begin playing football until the age of 14 when he started playing for the Dusseldorf club team. Vollmer helped lead his German prep school team to two national football championships. His early football success landed him an appearance in the 2004 Global Junior Championships in San Diego, which led him to a scholarship at Houston. He spoke almost no English when he signed with Houston, but he became fluent in the language as he developed from a 250 -pound tight end into a 315 -pound lineman who started his final 25 games at tackle for the Cougars. Vollmer's collegiate career created interest from the NFL where the Patriots drafted him in the second round of the 2009 draft. Nicknamed Seabass, during his playing days at Houston. The nickname has carried over to the NFL.

## DANNY WOODHEAD SET TEAM MARK FOR RUSHING AVERAGE

Danny Woodhead finished the season with 97 rushes for 551 yards, with his average of 5.68 yards per carry setting a new team record (minimum 90 rushing attempts). Woodhead topped Don Calhoun's previous team mark of 5.59 yards per carry in 1976 (129 attempts for 721 yards).

WOODHEAD GOES FROM DIVISION II TO THE NFL Danny Woodhead was a standout at Division II Chadron State in Nebraska. He averaged 178.9 yards per game and totaled 101 rushing touchdowns during his collegiate career. Woodhead's outstanding junior and senior seasons earned him two Harlon Hill Trophies, the Division II equivalent to the Heisman Trophy. He is one of just three players to ever win two or more Harlon Hill Trophies, joining Texas A\&M University-Kingsville running back Johnny Bailey, who won it three times (1987-89) before playing six seasons in the NFL for the Bears, Cardinals, and Rams. Valdosta State University's Dusty Bonner was the only other player to win the Harlon Hill Trophy multiple times (2000 and 2001). Cincinnati Bengals running back Bernard Scott (2008-Abilene Christian) joins Woodhead as active NFL running backs who have won the award.

PATRIOTS CALL ON VETERAN K SHAYNE GRAHAM Many kickers have quite a journey before landing a roster position on an NFL team. Such has been the case during kicker Shayne Graham's road to a 10 -year NFL career. He originally signed with New Orleans as a rookie free agent in 2000 and went to camp with Seattle in 2001 before finally securing a roster spot with Buffalo later that season. He then spent time with Carolina before a seven-year stint with Cincinnati. Graham went to camp with Baltimore in 2010 and had a week stint on the Giants roster. He spent time in between jobs practicing at the Virginia Tech campus with two pieces of packed luggage in his car at all times as he waited for a call for a team in need.

 NET PUNTING AVERAGEZoltan Mesko finished with a 38.4 net average to set an NFL rookie record for net punting average. His 38.4 net average is the highest of any rookie punter since the net punting average was first tracked in 1976, surpassing the 38.0 net average that Los Angeles Rams' Dale Hatcher set in 1985

MESKO CHANGES FIELD POSITI ON TO HELP PATRI OTS BEAT BALTI MORE
Mesko notched a career-long 65-yard punt in overtimetlas. Baltimore (10/17), marking the longest overtime punt in Patriots history: With the Patriots facing a fourth-and-6 from their own 16 -yard line in overtime, Mesko's 65 -yard punt significantly changed field position, giving the Ravens possession at their own 19-yard line and
 keeping the Patriots alive to win, 23-20.

ZOLTAN MESKO: COMING TO AMERICA
Rookie P Zoltan Mesko was born in Timosoara, Romania on the Romania-Hungary border. On Many occasions in 1989, during the communist revolutions, his family was forced to take cover to avoid gun shots from the armies. Even after the fall of the Berlin Wall, his family lived in poverty. His family left Romania when his father won a United States Permanent Resident Card (green card) in the Diversity Immigrant Visa Lottery in 1997 when Mesko was 11.

## MESKO DI SCOVERS FOOTBALL

An avid soccer player from his days in Romania, Mesko had a strong leg. It was only when he came to America that he discovered his leg could take him places. In eighth grade, Mesko was playing kickball in the gym when he kicked the ball so high that he broke a light fixture. He was given a choice: pay for the light fixture or play football. With his family still struggling with money and football being a more popular sport than soccer at his school, the choice was an obvious one-Mesko decided to play football. His leg would land him numerous Division I scholarships and admission offers from Ivy League schools. From these, Mesko chose to play football at Michigan.

WELKER LEADS TEAM IN RECEPTI ONS FOR
RECORD FOURTH STRAI GHT YEAR IN 2010
Wes Welker became the first Patriots player to lead the team in receiving in four straight years after finishing 2010 with 86 receptions. The 86 receptions tied for sixth best in the NFL. He also led the team in receiving yards (848) for the third straight year. Welker suffered a knee injury in the 2009 regular-season finale at Houston and missed New England's postseason game vs. Baltimore. Welker returned from his injury well ahead of expectations and was back in the starting lineup for the seasonopener in 2010.

## WELKER HAD THREE STRAIGHT 100 CATCH AND 1,000 YARD SEASONS

Welker registered his third straight season with at least 100 receptions (123) and 1,000 receiving yards $(1,348)$ in 2009. ## WELKER FINISHES WI TH SECOND MOST RECEPTIONS AND SECOND HI GHEST AVERAGE IN NFL HISTORY IN 2009

Welker led the NFL with 123 receptions in 2009, despite missing two games and most of the season-finale due to an injury. He averaged 8.8 receptions in the 14 games he played. The 123 receptions are a Patriots record and match Herman Moore (Detroit in 1995) for the second most receptions in a single season in NFL history, behind Marvin Harrison's NFL record of 143 receptions in 2002. Welker's 8.8 catches per game in 2009 rank second in NFL history to the 8.9 average set by Harrison in 2002. He has 18 games with nine or more catches since joining the Patriots. After just four seasons, Wes Welker ranks fourth on the Patriots' all-time receptions list with 432.


Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both USA Today and the Daily Oklahoman, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out. "I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen, when it was supposed, to I was pretty hurt by it." Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for touchdowns. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the 2004 NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game. He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

## WELKER PRESSED INTO SERVI CE AS A KI CKER

Welker was pressed into service as a kicker for the second time in his career at Cleveland ( $11 / 7 / 10$ ) and was successful on an extra point attempt and handled a kickoff both in the fourth quarter. Welker was filling in for the injured Stephen Gostkowski (thigh). While with Miami in 2004, he was pressed into action in a game at New England (10/10/04) and converted one extra point, a 29 -yard field goal and also handled kickoff duties.

## KYLE ARRI NGTON SCORES ON A 36-YARD

## INTERCEPTION RETURN

Kyle Arrington registered his first NFL interception and returned it 36 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter vs. GB (12/19). Arrington's interception return was his second touchdown of 2010. He scored when he returned a blocked field goal 35 yards for a touchdown at Miami on Oct. 4.

## PATRICK CHUNG RECORDS HIS FIRST NFL <br> BLOCKED PUNT AND BLOCKED FIELD GOAL

S Patrick Chung blocked a second half punt and field goal at Miami (10/04) to become the first NFL player to do both in a single game since Houston CB Ramon Walker had a blocked field goal and punt vs. New England on Nov. 23, 2003. Chung blocked a second half punt to give the Patriots a first down at the
 Miami 15 -yard line and set up a 12 -yard touchdown run by RB Benjarvus Green-Ellis. Chung then blocked a 53 -yard field goal attempt in the fourth quarter that was recovered by CB Kyle Arrington and returned for a touchdown. Chung was a two-time special teams player of the year during his college career at Oregon.

## PATRI CK CHUNG'S JOURNEY TO THE NFL

Long before S Patrick Chung picked up flag football as a teen, his mother, Jamaican recording artist Sophia George, had preached about being a tough man in a song. Her hit single, "Girlie Girlie" - a traditional reggae song about poking fun at a boy who was not man enough - topped the charts in 1985. Chung is aware that among his talents he was born with speed and agility - singing is not one of them. Chung, who possesses a great sense of pride in his unique heritage - his mother is Jamaican and his father is half Jamaican and half Chinese, was born in Jamaica and moved to California at age 12 where he started to play football as a freshman in high school. Chung went on to star at Oregon, where he holds the distinction of starting more games than any other defensive player in school history with 51 starts. He originally entered the draft as junior, but ultimately decided to return for his senior season. Pinned to the back of his locker is a reminder of the support he has gotten - a Jamaican flag that indicates his family's importance to him.

## GARY GUYTON HAD TWO DEFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS IN 2010



LB Gary Guyton returned a fumble 35 yards for a touchdown at Chicago (12/12) and returned an interception 59 yards for a touchdown in the season-opener vs. Cincinnati (9/12). Guyton is the first Patriots player to score two defensive touchdowns in a season since LB Tedy Bruschi returned two interceptions for touchdowns in 2003.

## GUYTON AND ARRINGTON RETURN FIRST CAREER INTERCEPTIONS FOR SCORES

LB Gary Guyton intercepted his first pass vs. Cincinnati (9/12) and returned it 59 yards for a touchdown, and CB Kyle Arrington returned his first career interception vs. Green Bay (12/19) 36 yards for a touchdown. The Patriots now have three players on the roster who have returned an interception for a score on their first career pick. James Sanders returned his first pick 39 yards for a touchdown at Buffalo on Dec. 11, 2005.

## GUYTON HAS THE WORK ETHIC

Gary Guyton was not drafted into the NFL, but through a solid work ethic was able to make the 53 -man roster and has been a solid player over the last three seasons for the Patriots. Taking a peak into his work history shows his work ethic goes beyond the football field. At the end of his rookie season, Guyton went back to Georgia Tech and worked as an office assistant at the school's research institute.
"I was an office assistant, right there at the desk," said Guyton, who worked for a small wage at Georgia Tech Research Institute. "Just a regular office assistant. Tech is my school and I enjoyed it."
"He's smart, well prepared," Bill Belichick said. "He understands. He's got a real good understanding of football. Not just his role, but where other people have to be. That's what you really want in a defensive signal-caller, someone that understands how it all works."
It's been a long road," Guyton said. "I have come far. I've achieved some things. But I don't look back, just forward."

## MAYO LED NFL WITH 193 TOTAL TACKLES

LB Jerod Mayo finished first in the NFL with a career-high 193 total tackles in 2010 with two 19-tackle games: vs. BLT (10/17) and vs. GB (12/19). He had 139 tackles as a rookie in 2008 and 114 in 2009 and with his 193 tackles in 2010 he is the first Patriots player to have three consecutive 100 -tackle seasons since
 Lawyer Milloy registered five straight 100 -tackle seasons from 1997 through 2001. His 193 tackle are the highest since LB Steve Nelson had 207 tackles in 1984 and are the third highest in team history. Mayo had ten games in 2010 with 10 -plus tackles.

Jerod Mayo learned knowledge and discipline are the keys to success while spending afternoons with his three brothers under the supervision of their grandfather, Walter Johnson, a retired Air Force veteran of 30 years. While Mayo's mother worked two jobs, Johnson taught the boys discipline, responsibility and the value of life. Those lessons helped Mayo develop a work ethic and demeanor that has earned him the nickname of "Old Soul" from his teammates. His leadership skills and talent helped him become only the second Patriot to be named AFC Rookie of the Year, earning that title in 2008 to join Michael Haynes (1976).

## DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVN MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the $11^{\text {th }}$ set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother Wasswa played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

## ADDITI ONAL MCCOURTY NOTES

- His 17 passes defended tied for seventh in the league.
- Selected to his first Pro Bowl, becoming the fourth Patriots player to be selected as a rookie (Mike Haynes, 1976; John Stephens, 1988; Curtis Martin, 1995).
- Recorded his first career interception at San Diego (10/24).
- Recorded an interception for the third straight game, and his fourth in a three-game span, with an interception vs. the NY Jets (12/6), making him the first Patriots player to intercept a pass in three consecutive games since Asante Samuel did it in 2007.
- Recorded his first career two-interception game at Detroit on Thanksgiving Day (11/25). McCourty is the first Patriots rookie to have a two-interception game since Mike Haynes had three in a game on Nov. 21, 1976 at the Jets.
- Recorded his first career sack, bringing down Matt Flynn for a 4 -yard loss on first down in the fourth quarter vs. Green Bay ( $12 / 19$ ), starting off a defensive series in which the Patriots forced a key three-and-out while trailing 27-24 in a 31-27 win.


## BRANDON MERIWEATHER HAS SECOND PRO

 BOWL SEASON IN 2010- Finished the season with three interceptions, 66 total tackles and one fumble recovery.
- Selected as a member of the AFC Pro Bowl squad, marking his second consecutive selection.
- Intercepted a Ryan Fitzpatrick pass with 2:58 left in a 3830 win vs. Buffalo (12/26) to seal the victory.


## ROB NINKOV CH'S 63-YARD FUMBLE RETURN IS

SECOND LONGEST IN TEAM HISTORY
LB Rob Ninkovich returned a second quarter fumble 63 yards at San Diego (10/24). It is the second longest fumble return in team history to the 68 -yard touchdown return by Richard Seymour at Buffalo on Oct. 3, 2004.

## ADDITIONAL NINKOVICH NOTES

- Finished the season with career-bests of 58 total tackles on defense, 4.0 sacks, two interceptions, three passes defended, three fumble recoveries and 11 special team tackles.
- His three fumble recoveries tied for first in the AFC and third in the NFL.
- Recorded his first two NFL interceptions and added a sack at Miami (10/4).
- Registered his first career two-sack game vs. Miami (1/2), taking down Tyler Thigpen for a 3 -yard loss in the second quarter and an 8 -yard loss in the fourth quarter.


## WI LFORK HAS SECOND STRAI GHT PRO BOWL <br> SEASON IN 2010

- Finished the season with 87 total tackles, second in his career to his 91 tackles in 2005.
- Named as a co-captain for the third-straight season.
- Selected as a starter for the Pro Bowl for the third time in his career (2007, 2009 and 2010).
- Credited with his first career two-sack game, vs. Miami (1/2), sacking Chad Henne for losses of nine yards and six yards on the same third-quarter possession
WILFORK WEARS HIS HEART ON HIS NECK
Vince Wilfork wears No. 75 over his shoulder pads. Underneath hangs a gold chain locket for those who were number one in his heart: his parents. In 2002, parents David and Barbara Wilfork both passed away within five months of each other, leaving the then University of Miami star without his greatest support system. Wilfork, who lost his father to diabetes, has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for diabetes-related causes. His annual draft day fundraiser, a bowling event he has held for seven years, is one of the signature fundraising events held by a pro athlete in New England. For his charity work, Wilfork was awarded the 2010 New England Patriots Ron Burton Community Service Award. While he will always cherish his National Championship and Super Bowl rings, his constant reminder lies closest to his heart, a picture of his late parents at their high school prom. "I carry them with me wherever I go," Wilfork said of his parents' keepsake. "My parents pushed me to be the best I could be. The things I do and my wife does, we do out of the kindness of our heart, and we do it for the community. I never look for anything in return. My teammates are my second family. My kids, my wife, the New England Patriots - that's all I have."


## JAMES SANDERS 2010 SEASON NOTES

- Finished the season with 63 total tackles, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery, six passes defended and career-high three interceptions.
- Named AFC Defensive Player of the Week after returning an interception 32 yards for a touchdown at Pittsburgh (11/14). It was the second time in his career that he returned an interception for a touchdown (at Buffalo, 12/11/05 as a rookie).
- Recorded his second interception in as many weeks vs. Indianapolis (11/21) when he picked off Peyton Manning at the Patriots' 6 -yard line with 31 seconds left and New England holding a three-point lead, clinching the 31-28 victory for the Patriots

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. - Quarterback Tom Brady, LT Matt Light, G Logan Mankins, LB Jerod Mayo, CB Devin McCourty, S Brandon Meriweather, WR Wes Welker and DL Vince Wilfork have been selected to represent the New England Patriots and the AFC in the 2011 Pro Bowl on Jan. 30 at Aloha Stadium in Hawaii. Brady, Mankins and Wilfork were selected as starters, while Mayo, McCourty and Meriweather were selected as reserves and Light and Welker were added as alternates.

The eight Pro Bowl selections match the team record set in 1985 and reached again in 2007. It is the sixth Pro Bowl selection for Brady (2001, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2009, 2010) third for Light (2006, 2007, 2010), third for Mankins (2007, 2009, 2010), third consecutive for Welker (2008, 2009, 2010), third for Wilfork (2007, 2009, 2010), second for Meriweather (2009, 2010), and first for Jerod Mayo and rookie Devin McCourty.
Brady finished the 2010 season with 3,900 yards passing and an NFL-leading 36 touchdowns. He extended his streak to 355 consecutive pass attempts without an interception to set an NFL record, eclipsing Bernie Kosar's record of 308 pass attempts. Brady has reached 30 touchdown passes for the second time in his career and is one of just 13 NFL players since the 1970 merger to have at least two 30 -touchdown seasons. He also set an NFL record with at least two touchdowns and no interceptions in nine straight games, passing Don Meredith's (1965-66) previous record of six straight games. Brady was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week twice in 2010 following back-to-back four-touchdown efforts in wins at Detroit (11/25) and vs. the New York Jets (12/6).

Light has been part of eight division championships, four conference titles and three Super Bowl crowns since joining the Patriots as a second round draft pick out of Purdue in 2001. He has helped the New England offense finish in the Top 10 on offense six times, including a streak of four straight seasons in the Top 10.

Mayo earned his first Pro Bowl berth after an NFL-leading 193 total tackles, including two 19-tackle games: vs. Baltimore (10/17) and vs. Green Bay (12/19). His 193 total tackles are the third-best in team history. A first-round pick in 2008, Mayo registered 139 tackles that season and joined Mike Haynes (1976) as the second Patriots player to win the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year Award. The defensive co-captain had 1010 -tackle games in 2010 and has had three straight 100 -tackle seasons.

Mankins is going to his third Pro Bowl and his second consecutive. He went to his first Pro Bowl in 2007 when he became the first Patriots guard to earn a Pro Bowl selection since 1985 when Pro Football Hall of Famer John Hannah went to his ninth career Pro Bowl. Mankins joins Hannah as the only Patriots guards to earn Pro Bowl bids since the 1970 merger. The Fresno State product is in his sixth season with the Patriots since being selected in the first round (32nd overall) of the 2005 NFL Draft. He started nine games this season and has never missed an NFL game, starting all 89 games of his career.

McCourty is the fourth Patriots rookie to be selected to the Pro Bowl, joining Mike Haynes (1976), John Stephens (1988) and Curtis Martin (1995). McCourty, a first-round pick in 2010, started all 16 games and finished the season tied for second in the NFL with seven interceptions. The seven interceptions by a Patriots rookie are second to the eight by Mike Haynes in 1976. McCourty finished third on the team with 83 total tackles. He has also recorded seven interceptions for 110 yards, one sack, 17 passes defensed, two forced fumbles and 12 special teams tackles.

Meriweather is headed to his second consecutive Pro Bowl. He finished the 2010 season with 66 total tackles and three interceptions. He leads all current Patriots with 12 career interceptions. Meriweather intercepted a Peyton Manning pass on Indianapolis' first drive of the game and returned it 39 yards to put the Patriots in scoring position in a 31-29 victory on Nov. 21.

Welker returned from a season-ending knee injury well ahead of schedule and led the Patriots with 86 receptions for 848 yards. The 86 receptions tied for sixth best in the NFL. Welker became the first Patriots player to lead the team in receiving four straight seasons in 2010. Since joining the Patriots in 2007, Welker leads the NFL with 432 receptions.

Wilfork earned his third Pro Bowl berth after leading the Patriots defensive line with 87 total tackles. Since being selected in the first round (21st overall) of the 2004 draft out of Miami, Wilfork has helped the Patriots defense finish in the top 10 on four occasions (2004, 2005, 2007 and 2008). He recorded a season-high 10 total tackles in the Patriots' 23-20 overtime win vs. Baltimore on Oct. 17. The Patriots have an 82-24 (.774) record in Wilfork's 106 regular season games. Wilfork was selected by his teammates as a defensive co-captain in 2010 for the third straight season.
