## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (14-2) vs. INDIANAPOLIS COLTS (13-4)

Sunday, January 16,2005 * Gillette Stadium $(68,756) * 4: 30$ p.m. EST
The Patriots and Colts will renew acquaintances for the fourth time in a 14month span as they stage a rematch of last season's AFC Championship Game in this year's AFC Divisional Playoffs. Indianapolis will travel to Foxborough for the second time this season as the two teams stage a reprise of the Patriots' thrilling 27-24 victory in the opening week of the season.

New England's defense tied for second in the NFL in allowing just 16.3 points per game in the regular season, but will face its toughest test of the year in trying to contain the Indianapolis offense, which led the NFL in scoring, averaging 32.7 points per game.

Two of the game's premier quarterbacks will lead their teams against each other for the sixth time in their careers. New England's Tom Brady holds a 5-0 mark against Indianapolis and turned in one of his best performances of the 2004 season in the season opener against the Colts, compiling a season-high 335 yards and three touchdown passes. Indianapolis' Peyton Manning will face the Patriots for the 12th time in his career, with the Patriots holding a 9-2 record in the previous 11 games. New England has won its last five games against Manning-led teams despite the Colts signal caller posting passer ratings of more than 90.0 in two of the three recent games between the teams.

With a victory, New England would advance to the AFC Championship Game for the fifth time in team history, the third time in four years and the fourth time in the nine seasons dating back to 1996.

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised to a national audience by CBS. The game can be seen in Boston on WBZ-TV Channel 4. Jim Nantz will handle the play-by-play duties and Phil Simms will provide analysis. Bonnie Bernstein will provide reports from the sidelines throughout the game.
RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster Gil Santos is in his 28th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer Gino Cappelletti. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 21st season as a broadcast tandem.
NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by CBS Radio/Westwood One. Bob Papa and Rick Walker will handle play-by-play duties, while Jeff Bostic will contribute reports from the sidelines.
SPANISH RADIO: A Spanish language national broadcast of the game will be provided by CBS Radio/Westwood One. Armando Quintero and Benny Ricardo will call all of the action from Foxborough.

## HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots have recorded a 23-3 (.885) record at Gillette Stadium, including regular-season and postseason games. The Patriots hold an alltime record of 6-1 in home playoff games, including victories in each of their last six home postseason contests. New England has not lost at home in the playoffs in more than 25 years, dating back to Dec. 31, 1978. The Patriots have won 19 consecutive regular-season and postseason contests at home, compiling the longest current home winning streak in the NFL. New England has not lost at home since a 30-17 defeat to the New York Jets on Dec. 22, 2002. The Patriots' .885 winning percentage at Gillette
 Stadium is the highest of any NFL team at its current home.

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## SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Colts will meet for the 67th time, as the former AFC East rivals square off in the playoffs for the second consecutive season and for the second time in 2004. The teams squared off in this year's season opener in addition to last season's AFC Championship Game at Gillette Stadium and a memorable regularseason shootout in November 2003. But
 a rivalry between the teams is nothing new. The Patriots and the Baltimore/Indianapolis Colts played twice each year from 1970 to 2001 as members of the AFC East, with the exception of the 1982 strike year. New England has had more success against the Colts than any other team in the NFL, with the Patriots' .637 winning percentage ranking as their highest against any team they have played more than 10 times. New England is 16-4 against Indianapolis since 1993, and has won 13 of the series' last 15 games, including the last five in a row dating back to the 2000 season. The games have tended to be high-scoring affairs, as the Patriots have scored 20 or more points against the Colts in 14 of their last 15 meetings and have scored 38 or more points in three of the last five clashes. ## PATRIOTS - COLTS QUICK HITS

Patriots Head Coach Bill Belichick is 6-1 against the Colts as the head man in New England and is 8-3 against Indianapolis as a head coach overall.
> Patriots QB Tom Brady is 5-0 against the Colts and owns a completion percentage of 67 percent in his five games against Indianapolis.
> Patriots K Adam Vinatieri is 30-31 in his career for a field goal percentage of .968 against the Colts.
> The Patriots have not lost a home game to the Colts since a 14-point defeat on Nov. 19, 1995.
> The Patriots and Colts have combined for more than 50 total points in each of their last five regular-season meetings.

## PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady and Peyton Manning will lead their offensive teams against each other for the sixth time and for the second consecutive year in the playoffs. Brady has compiled a 5-0 record against the Colts, helping the team put up an average of 34.2 points per game in games he has started. Brady's first NFL start came against Indianapolis in a 44-13 win on Sept. 30, 2001. Brady recorded the highest passer rating of his career (148.3) against the Colts on Oct. 21, 2001. The Patriots defense has had past success against Peyton Manning and the Colts offense, leading New England to wins in nine of the 11 games Manning has started against the Patriots.

## 2003 AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME PATRIOTS 24, COLTS 14

 January 18, 2004 * Gillette Stadium (Att: 68,436)The last time these two teams met in the postseason, a trip to Super Bowl XXXVIII was on the line as the Patriots and Colts fought for the AFC Championship. The Patriots struck first with a Tom Brady touchdown toss to David Givens in the first quarter. Kicker Adam Vinatieri added six points with 31- and 25-yard field goals during the second stanza to give New England a 13-0 lead.

The Colts put together a 12-play, 52-yard drive in the first half of the third quarter to get on the board with an Edgerrin James rush for a score. The Patriots quickly answered with another Vinatieri field goal, this one from 27 yards out. With 1:36 left in the third quarter, Vinatieri booted yet another field goal, a 21-yarder, putting New England up 21-7 and moving them a quarter closer to a Super Bowl berth. The Colts shifted to a no-huddle offense in the fourth quarter and finally hit paydirt with a Peyton Manning to Marcus Pollard touchdown pass with 2:30 remaining, cutting the Patriots' lead to 21-14. A 34-yard field goal, Vinatieri's longest on the day, with 55 seconds to go sealed the Patriots' AFC Championship title, 24-14.

## SOUTHERN HOSPITALITY

The Patriots have an all-time record of 66-41-1 (.616) against the teams that make up the AFC South. It is the only division in the NFL where the Patriots own a winning record against each team. New England owns winning marks against Tennessee (20-16-1), Indianapolis (42-24), Jacksonville (4-1) and Houston (10 ). New England has won each of its last seven games against AFC South teams, including a 6-0 mark in 2003, sweeping the division in the regular season and defeating Tennessee in an AFC Divisional Playoff Game and Indianapolis in the AFC Championship Game.

## PATRIOTS IN DIVISIONAL PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have compiled a 5-4 all-time record in divisional playoff games, including a 3-1 home mark in such contests. Recently, Patriots divisional playoff games have been close contests, with New England grinding out three-point victories in 2001 and 2003. The Patriots have won three of their last four divisional round games and have been victorious in four of their last six such contests.

> Patriots head coach Bill Belichick began his NFL coaching career 30 years ago as a special assistant for the Baltimore Colts in 1975 under head coach Ted Marchibroda.
>Patriots assistant head coach/offensive line coach Dante Scarnecchia was the offensive line coach for the Colts from 1989-90. Outside of those two seasons, Scarnecchia has been on the Patriots sidelines for each year since 1982.
> Patriots special teams coach Brad Seely got his first NFL coaching job as the special teams and tight ends coach of the Colts. He spent five years with the organization.
> Patriots quarterback Tom Brady made his first NFL start against the Colts and completed 13 of 23 passes for 168 yards in a 44-13 victory on Sept. 30, 2001.
> Patriots linebacker Rosevelt Colvin grew up in Indianapolis and attended Broad Ripple High School in the city. He went on to attend Purdue University, where he was a three-year starter.
> Patriots tackle Brandon Gorin was born on July 17, 1978, in Muncie, Ind., and earned first-team all-state honors as a defensive tackle at Southside High in Muncie. Gorin was a three-year starter at right tackle for the Purdue Boilermakers.
> Patriots tackle Matt Light earned four letters at Purdue University (1996, 1998-2000), earning All-Big Ten conference first-team honors in 2000.
> Patriots defensive back Eugene Wilson was born on Aug. 17, 1980 in Merriville, Ind. where he attended Merriville High. He earned an All-Duneland Athletic Conference selection, Conference MVP, two All-Indiana selections and Defensive Player of the Year honors.
> Patriots guard/center Gene Mruczkowski attended Purdue University, where he started all 49 games of his four-year career at guard or center.
> Colts strength and conditioning coach Jon Torine played football at Springfield College in Massachusetts, where he received his bachelor's degree in exercise science.
> Colts defensive end Dwight Freeney was born in Hartford, Conn., and attended Bloomfield High School, where he was a SuperPrep, Prep Football Report, USA Today, New Haven Register, Hartford Courant and Blue Chip Illustrated AllAmerican selection.
> Colts defensive coordinator Ron Meeks was the secondary coach for St. Louis in 2001, when Patriots linebacker Don Davis was a member of the Rams' Super Bowl XXXVI team.
> Patriots wide receiver David Givens and Colts defensive back Gerome Sapp were college teammates at the University of Notre Dame.
> Patriots wide receiver Deion Branch and Colts defensive back Anthony Floyd were college teammates at the University of Louisville.

The New England Patriots opened the 2004 regular season with a hard-fought 27-24 victory over the Indianapolis Colts. In a rematch of the 2003 AFC Championship Game, New England held onto a 3-point lead when Colts kicker Mike Vanderjagt missed a field goal with 24 seconds remaining in the game, propelling the Patriots to their first win of the season.
Quarterback Tom Brady exceeded the 300 -yard passing mark for the seventh time in his career, racking up 335 yards and three touchdowns on 26 completions on the night. Deion Branch led Patriots receivers with seven receptions for 86 yards and one touchdown. Running back Corey Dillon made his Patriots debut by leading the ground attack with 86 yards on 15 carries.

The Patriots were the first to strike on offense after Bethel Johnson returned the opening kickoff 32 yards to the New England 37 -yard line. Brady orchestrated a 9 -play, 48 -yard drive, including a 19 -yard pass to David Givens on the first offensive play, to set up Vinatieri's 32 -yard field goal with less than five minutes elapsed. On the ensuing drive, Indianapolis drove deep into Patriots territory with the help of a 42 -yard pass completion from Peyton Manning to Reggie Wayne. The Colts had the ball inside the Patriots 10 -yard line but couldn't capitalize. On second-and-goal, Tedy Bruschi lunged in front of a Manning pass and intercepted it at the 1 -yard line, ending the drive.
The second quarter began with a game-tying 32-yard field goal by Vanderjagt, capping a 10 -play, 49 -yard drive by the Colts with just under one minute elapsed in the stanza. Vanderjagt's field goal started a scoring barrage, as the Patriots and Colts combined for 27 points in the quarter. After a Patriots punt, the Colts marched 66 yards down the field, capping the drive with a 3 -yard touchdown run by Dominic Rhodes to give the Colts a 10-3 lead. The lead wouldn't last long, however, as Dillon sprung the Patriots' next drive with a 38 -yard jaunt on the first play of the drive. Brady marched the team down the field, ending the drive with a 16 -yard touchdown pass to Branch. Vinatieri's extra point knotted the score at 10 with three minutes remaining in the half. Indianapolis broke the stalemate with an 82 -yard touchdown drive, ending with a 3 -yard pass from Manning to Marvin Harrison. Vanderjagt's extra point gave the Colts a 17-10 lead with just 45 seconds left before halftime. Bethel Johnson returned the ensuing kickoff 34 yards, giving the Patriots prime field position on their last drive of the half. Brady completed three consecutive passes before spiking the ball at the Indianapolis 25 -yard line to stop the clock. Vinatieri connected on his second field goal of the night, a 43-yard attempt to bring the Patriots within three points.
The Patriots defense forced the Colts to go three-and-out on their first possession of the second half. The Patriots took advantage of the defensive effort as Brady led the team 69yards downfield, ending the drive with a 25 -yard touchdown pass to David Patten for the go-ahead score. The defense continued making big plays, recovering an Edgerrin James fumble on the New England 18-yard line, snuffing out another Colts drive. The Patriots took advantage of the turnover with an 82 -yard touchdown drive, with Brady's 8 -yard pass to Daniel Graham putting New England up 27-17 with a quarter to play

Running a no-huddle offense, the Colts opened the final quarter with a 7 -yard touchdown strike from Manning to Brandon Stokley to get within three points of the Patriots. New England preserved its 3 -point lead as the Colts drove into Patriots territory in the final minute of the game and appeared to be in position for at least a game-tying field goal. But a 12 -yard sack by Willie McGinest forced the Colts to try a 48 -yard attempt to send the game into overtime. Vanderjagt's kick went wide right with 24 seconds left on the clock to seal the Patriots' first win of the season.

## RED ZONE D

The Patriots defense thwarted three potential scoring drives by forcing three Indianapolis turnovers in the red zone. On the Colts' opening drive, Tedy Bruschi intercepted a Peyton Manning pass on the New England 1-yard line with 6:37 remaining in the first quarter, returning the ball five yards. With 5:14 remaining in the third quarter and the Patriots clinging to a 20-17 lead, Ty Warren forced an Edgerrin James fumble on the New England 18 -yard line which Eugene Wilson recovered to end the Colts' scoring threat. The Patriots capitalized on the turnover by marching 82 yards down the field and scoring on an 8 -yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Daniel Graham to go up 2717. In the fourth quarter, Wilson combined with Vince Wilfork for a touchdown-saving turnover, forcing James to fumble on the New England 1-yard line with 3:51 remaining in the game.

## TOUCHDOWN TOMMY

TOM BRADY threw for 335 yards, marking the seventh time in his career he has exceeded the 300 -yard mark. In addition, he owns two 300 -yard games in the postseason, including a $354-$ yard performance in Super Bowl XXXVIII. Brady also threw for three touchdowns, marking the 12th time in his career he has thrown for three or more scores. Brady excelled in all phases of the offensive game, registering a 111.2 passer rating. The win over the Colts marked the 16th time in Brady's career he surpassed the 100.0 passer rating plateau. He is $16-0$ all time when he registers a 100 -plus rating.

## WILLIE MAC ATTACK

WILLIE McGINEST sacked Peyton Manning for a 12 -yard loss on third-and-eight on the New England 29-yard line with 49 seconds remaining in the game. The sack forced the Colts to settle for a 48 -yard field goal attempt by Mike Vanderjagt to tie the game at 27 . Vanderjagt missed the attempt wide right with 24 seconds remaining in the contest, preserving the Patriots' victory. This marks the second consecutive season in which a big play by McGinest near the end of the game has foiled the Colts. In 2003, McGinest stopped Edgerrin James on the 1 -yard line on fourth down on the final play of a 38-34 Patriots victory in Indianapolis (11/30/03).

## KEY TURNOVER

A pair of 2003 Patriots draft picks - TY WARREN and EUGENE WILSON - combined to force a key Indianapolis turnover in the third quarter that led to the Patriots' third touchdown of the night and a 10 -point New England lead. With the Colts having cracked the Patriots' red zone, Warren reached in and punched the ball away from Edgerrin James at the Patriots' 18 -yard line with 5:14 left in the third quarter and the Patriots clinging to a 20-17 lead. Eugene Wilson pounced on the loose ball to give the Patriots possession of the ball as the Colts were threatening to score. It was the first forced fumble of Warren's career and the first fumble recovery of Wilson's career. The Patriots proceeded to drive 82 yards down the field to take a 27-17 lead.

## HUNDRED YARDS AGAINST

Running back Edgerrin James ran for 142 yards on 30 carries for the Colts, marking the first of just three 100 -yard rushers the Patriots allowed in 2004. By the end of the 2004 regular season, the Patriots had allowed just four 100-yard rushers in their last 25 games, including the playoffs. James' 142 yards are the most allowed by the Patriots since former Miami running back Ricky Williams scampered for 185 yards on Dec. 29, 2002.

## PARALLEL PICKS

TEDY BRUSCHI picked off a Peyton Manning pass at the 1 -yard line to snuff out the Colts' opening drive of the game. It marked an interesting parallel to last year's AFC Championship Game. In that game, Rodney Harrison picked off Manning in the end zone on Indianapolis' opening drive to stop an Indianapolis scoring chance and set the tone for New England's 24-14 victory.


The Patriots and their fans at Gillette Stadium have established one of the biggest home-field advantages in the country. Since its Grand Opening on Sept. 9, 2002, the Patriots have compiled a 21-3 regular-season record at their privately financed, state-of-the art stadium and capped off their second consecutive perfect home season with an 8-0 mark in 2004. Patriots fans have embraced the team's new home with unprecedented fervor, using the most fan-friendly venue in the region to express their passion for the Patriots and spur the team on to unparalleled success. In the three seasons that New England has called Gillette Stadium home, the Patriots have won two AFC East titles, hosted the second AFC Championship Game in franchise history and are preparing for their third home playoff game in less than two years.

## HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots have recorded a 23-3 (.885) all-time record at Gillette Stadium, including regular-season and postseason games. New England has won 19 consecutive regular-season and postseason contests at home, compiling the longest current home winning streak in the NFL. New England has not lost at home since a $30-17$ defeat to the New York Jets on Dec. 22, 2002. The Patriots' .885 winning percentage at Gillette Stadium is the highest of any NFL team at its current home.

## HOME WINNING STREAK: 19 GAMES

The Patriots have not lost at home in more than two full calendar years. Since Dec. 29, 2002, the calendar has turned around twice, bringing all kinds of weather to Gillette Stadium, but one thing as remained constant - every game has resulted in a Patriots victory.

Since ROBERT KRAFT purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In just 11 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team that had won just 19 of 80 games ( .311 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. In the 11 years since his purchase, only two NFL teams have won more overall games than the Patriots (116), and no team has won more games than New England since 2001 (54). When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced that it was his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won five division titles, three conference crowns and two Super Bowl championships. Since Kraft took ownership, the Patriots have won more conference championships than any other team in the NFL, claiming
 three AFC titles in the past eight seasons.

BUILDING SOLID SUPPORT
In the early 1990s, the Patriots franchise appeared destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the team's season ticket base consisted of just 17,635 fans, barely enough to support the club. But the day after Kraft's purchase of the franchise, the team shattered the previous single-day season ticket sales record, affirming support for Kraft's decision. By the start of the 1994 season, every game was a complete sellout. Eleven seasons later, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 in addition to more than 50,000 fans on a paid waiting list for season tickets.

Bill Belichick is celebrating his 30th season as an NFL coach and is the winningest NFL head coach since the beginning of the 2001 season. In 2004, he directed the Patriots to their second consecutive 14 -win campaign, joining Mike Ditka as the only coaches in NFL history to enjoy back-to-back seasons with 14 or more regular-season victories. In addition, his 2004 squad equaled the best record in NFL history for a defending Super Bowl champion, and from 2003-04 his teams set the all-time pro football record with 21 consecutive victories. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of four Super Bowl championship teams, including two world titles in his four previous seasons as Patriots head coach. Belichick and George Seifert are the only coaches in NFL history to have won multiple Super Bowls as an assistant coach and as a head coach. His overall record of 59-27 (including a 6-0 playoff mark) gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in Patriots history.

## DEFENSIVE DOMINANCE

Coach Belichick's teams have always been renowned for having some of the stingiest defenses in the NFL. Since he first took on defensive coordinator responsibilities 20 seasons ago, Belichick's defenses have averaged fewer than 20 points per game 17 times. In 2004, the Patriots defense was tied for second in the NFL in allowing 16.25 points per game, a number that ranks third in franchise history. That dominating performance came on the heels of a 2003 season in which the Patriots defense set a franchise record and led the NFL by allowing 14.9 points per game. When looking at the best defensive performances in the 45 -year history of the Patriots franchise, Belichick's teams from 2001, 2003 and 2004 are all ranked among the top five strongest seasons. In fact, since the NFL adopted the 16 -game schedule in 1978, the years 2001, 2003 and 2004 mark the Patriots' top three stingiest defensive performances.

## TOP BILLING

Coach Belichick is widely recognized as one of the NFL's premier head coaches, and recent polls have shown how his reputation has solidified. In an SI.com election day poll of more than 90,000 voters, Belichick was selected as the active coach (in any sport) that fans would most want to call their team's shots in a title game (Belichick received 35 percent of the vote, while Duke's Mike Kryzyzewski ranked second with 27 percent). In addition, a Sports I/lustrated poll of more than 300 NFL players revealed that Belichick was the coach that players would most like to play for, receiving 45 percent of the leaguewide vote.

## BUILT BELICHICK'S WAY

Of the 62 players on the Patriots' active roster or on injured reserve, 55 were acquired since Coach Belichick arrived in New England prior to the 2000 season. In 2004, 40 different players started games for the Patriots, and of those 40 players, 35 were acquired by Belichick and Vice President of Player Personnel Scott Pioli. One of the keys to the Patriots' success has been the ability of Belichick and his staff to assemble a deep squad that can adapt to injuries to key players. The success of that philosophy was evident again this season, as the 40 starters employed by the Patriots in 2004 are almost as many as the 42 starters the team used last season, a year in which New England set an NFL record for the number of starters used by a division champion.

## POSTSEASON PROWESS

Only one head coach in NFL history has a higher postseason winning percentage than Coach Belichick, and his name is emblazoned on the Super Bowl trophy. Vince Lombardi won nine of 10 postseason games, including the first two Super Bowls as head coach of the Green Bay Packers. Coach Belichick has won seven of the eight postseason games in his career, including the last six in a row, ranking him second all-time among NFL coaches who have coached in at least six postseason games. He is a perfect $6-0$ in the postseason as head coach of the Patriots.

Tom Brady, a 27 -year-old quarterback, will go to Hawaii for the second time in his five-year career and for the first time since 2001. Now in his fourth season as the Patriots' starting quarterback, the two-time Super Bowl MVP has the best won-lost record of any quarterback with at least 40 starts in the Super Bowl Era (since 1966), compiling a 54-14 (.794) mark, including a 6-0 record in the playoffs. In 2004, Brady compiled the best cumulative passer rating of his career (92.6) and the second-highest rating in Patriots history of passers who had at least 150 attempts. His 28 touchdown passes tied his career high and ranked second in the AFC. In 2004, Brady consistently completed longer passes than in previous seasons, averaging 7.79 yards per passing attempt - more than a full yard higher than his career mark of 6.62 yards per attempt heading into this season.

Larry Izzo, the Patriots' 30-year-old special teams captain, has earned his third career Pro Bowl selection, with his last nod coming as a member of the Patriots in 2002. The nine-year veteran linebacker is in his fourth season as New England's special teams captain and led the team with 28 special teams tackles. Including this year, he has led his team in special teams stops in each of his last six seasons dating back to 1999. Since joining the Patriots in 2001, Izzo has recorded a total of 100 special teams tackles.

Richard Seymour, New England's 25 -year-old defensive lineman, has earned his third Pro Bowl trip in his fourth season as a pro. The former sixth overall pick in the 2001 NFL Draft is the first Patriot to earn as many as three Pro Bowl nods in his first four seasons in the league since Mike Haynes (four selections in four years from 1976-79) and Russ Francis (three selections in four years from 1976-78). In 2004, Seymour tied for third on the team with 5.0 sacks and scored his first career touchdown on a 68 -yard fumble return (the longest in franchise history) against Buffalo on Oct. 3. Seymour has been a starting defensive tackle for the AFC squad in each of the last two Pro Bowls.
Adam Vinatieri, a 31-year-old kicker, gets his second Pro Bowl nod and his first trip to Hawaii since 2001. The nine-year veteran completed most consistent and productive season of his career, leading the NFL with a career-high 141 points. He was successful on 31 of his 33 kicks this season, with his 93.9 percent accuracy rate setting team and franchise highs and leading all NFL kickers with at least four attempts. Vinatieri recently completed a string of 23 consecutive field goals, which is the second longest such streak in team history and is two kicks shy of the team record that he established from 1996-97. In his career, Vinatieri ranks second on the Patriots' all-time scorers list with 1,058 points and has made 17 career game-winning field goals, including the kicks that won Super Bowls XXXVI and XXXVIII.

#### Abstract

BY THE BYE Including this season, the Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye in three of the last four years, tying them with the NFC's Philadelphia Eagles for the most byes in the NFL over that span. Since the first-round bye was instituted in its current format in 1990, the Patriots have earned a bye four times (1996, 2001, 2003 and 2004), and have advanced to play in the Super Bowl each of the previous three times they have earned playoff byes. The Patriots' four byes ranks second in AFC history, trailing only the Pittsburgh Steelers' record of six byes since the current format was adopted 15 seasons ago.


## ALL-TIME PLAYOFF RESULTS

The Patriots have compiled a 13-10 record in their 23 playoff games. New England has qualified for four Super Bowls (XX, XXXI, XXXVI, XXXVIII) and also played in the 1963 AFL Championship Game.

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

New England has qualified for the playoffs 13 times in its 45year history. The Patriots have earned seven playoff berths in the 11 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths that the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. New England has won eight division crowns and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16 -team tournament following a players' strike.

## TITLE DEFENSE

The Patriots finished the 2004 regular season with a 14-2 record, equaling the best regular-season record in NFL history by a defending Super Bowl champion. New England finished at 14-2 for the second consecutive season and tied five other teams for the most victories by a defending champion in the Super Bowl Era (since 1966). The 1998 Denver Broncos were the last defending champs to finish with a 14 -win campaign, joining San Francisco (1989 and 1990), Chicago (1986) and Washington (1983) as the only teams to defend their titles with 14 wins in the regular season. Out of the five teams that have previously accomplished the feat, two have repeated as champions - the 1998 Broncos and the 1989 49ers.


## FOURTEEN WINS

The Patriots have compiled consecutive 14 -win seasons, becoming the third team to win at least 14 games in back-toback seasons since the NFL adopted the 16-game schedule in 1978. The last team to pull off the feat was the San Francisco 49ers, who posted identical 14-2 marks in 1989 and 1990. In an interesting contrast, the Patriots were a combined 6-26 over those same two seasons (1989-90). The other team to accomplish back-to-back seasons of at least 14 wins was the Chicago Bears, who went 15-1 in 1985 and followed that up with a 14-2 performance in 1986.

## SNAPSHOTS OF SUCCESS

New England's NFL-record 21-game winning streak is over, but the Patriots are still in the midst of one of the most prosperous periods for any team in NFL history. The recent run of success began with a 29-26 overtime victory against the San Diego Chargers on Oct. 14, 2001, sparking a streak of 53 wins in the Patriots' last 66 games. The Patriots entered that contest with a 1-3 record, and Tom Brady was making just the third start of his career against a 3-1 San Diego team. New England rallied back from a 26-16 deficit with less than four minutes left in the game, beginning a stretch of 13 wins in the final 15 games of the 2001 season as the Patriots won their first title in Super Bowl XXXVI. Below are some snapshots highlighting the Patriots' current winning run.

## RISING TO THE OCCASION

Since the beginning of the 2003 season, the Patriots are 19-1 against teams with records of .500 or better. In 2003, the Patriots were $10-0$ against teams that finished the season with a mark of . 500 or higher, including an 8-0 mark against playoff teams. In the 2004 regular season, the Patriots were 9-1 against teams that finished with records of .500 or better, including a 5 1 mark against playoff teams.


## FANTASTIC FINISHES

One of the oldest mantras in sports is that it doesn't matter where you start a season, but it does matter where you finish it. The Patriots have done a remarkable job of finishing strong over the past two-plus seasons, as they have compiled a 36-5 (.878) record after November 1 since the 2001 season.

## BEAST OF THE EAST

New England has the best record among AFC East teams in division games since the beginning of the 2001 season (20-6). The New York Jets rank second with a $13-13$ record and Miami is third with a 12-14 mark. Buffalo has an 8-18 record (see below). In their last 23 divisional games, the Patriots are 19-4.

## WHAT A RUSH

The Patriots' finished the 2004 season with their highest yards-per-carry average in 19 years. The Patriots ran the ball 524 times for a total of 2,134 yards, an average of 4.07 yards per carry. It marked the first season in which New England has topped 4.0 yards per carry since the 1985 team averaged 4.13 yards per rush ( 2,331 yards on 565 carries). In that season, New England's rushing charge was led by Craig James' 1,227 yards (263 att). This season, running back Corey Dillon set a team record with 1,635 yards ( 345 att ), for an average of 4.7 yards per rush.

## HOT WHEN IT'S COLD

The Patriots are 20-2 since 1993 when the kickoff temperature is 35 degrees or colder. New England has won 11 consecutive games when the temperature has been 35 or less, including two such victories this season. The last time the Patriots lost a game in temperatures of 35 degrees or below was on Dec. 24, 2000, when they dropped a 27-24 decision to Miami on a 31-degree day at Foxboro Stadium.

## OUT IN FRONT

The Patriots set an NFL-record from 2003-04 by scoring first in 20 consecutive regular-season games, besting the mark previously set by the 1978 Miami Dolphins, who scored first in 15 straight games. Before San Francisco jumped out to a 7-0 lead in the 2004 regular-season finale, the last time New England did not get on the board first was on Nov. 23, 2003 at Houston, when the Texans jumped out to a 3-0 lead at Reliant Stadium. New England also scored first in each of its three playoff games last season, raising its overall mark to 23 consecutive games scoring first, including playoffs. The Patriots' record included 14 touchdowns and nine field goals.

## SIX PACK

In its Week 13 win at Cleveland, New England scored six touchdowns, recording the most in a game since the Patriots also found the end zone six times on Dec. 1, 1996 in a 45-7 win at San Diego. The Cleveland game marked the fifth time in team history the Patriots had scored six touchdowns on the road, tying the team's all-time road mark for touchdowns in a game. The game marked the 17th time in the Patriots' 695-game history that they scored six or more touchdowns. New England has scored six or more touchdowns in just four games in the last 20 years.

## O.T. IS THE PLACE TO BE

The Patriots have won eight straight overtime games and own the longest overtime winning streak in NFL history, including playoff games. The streak includes New England's 16-13 "Snow Bowl" win over Oakland in the 2001 Divisional Playoffs (01/19/02).


## WORKING OVERTIME

The Patriots have won their last eight overtime games (including the playoffs). New England's eight-game overtime winning streak is the longest in NFL history. New England has not lost in overtime since Buffalo won $16-13$ at Foxboro Stadium on Nov. 5, 2000. Since that time, the Patriots have won eight straight, including five games in which they scored on their first possession of overtime.

## THE GREATEST SHOW IN SNOW

The Patriots are 7-0 all-time in snowy games in Foxborough. The Patriots did not play under snowy conditions in the 2004 regularseason, but two of the Patriots' last three home playoff games have involved frozen precipitation, with both contests ending in memorable victories. In 2003, New England played in three games under snowy conditions. The AFC Championship Game was played under light but consistent snowfall as the Patriots reached the Super Bowl in front of the Gillette Stadium faithful. On Dec. 7, 2003, New England played Miami at the end of a two-day snowstorm that dumped 30 inches of snow in the Foxborough area. The Patriots won that game, 12-0, to clinch their third AFC East title in three seasons.


## ON POINT

In 2004, the Patriots enjoyed one of the most productive scoring seasons in team history. The Patriots scored 437 points in the regular season, ranking fourth in the NFL with an average of 27.3 points per game. New England's 437 points fell just four points shy of the team record ( 441 pts), set in 1980. New England scored more than 30 points in five games this season and exceeded the 40 -point plateau in two contests. The Patriots were especially productive during the team's last nine regularseason games, averaging 29.9 points per game over that period.


## GETTING DEFENSIVE

In their game against Baltimore on Nov. 28, the Patriots held the Ravens to just 124 total net yards and zero touchdowns on the day, New England's most stifling defensive performance of the season. The 124 yards was the fewest allowed by the Patriots defense in 2004, one yard less than the 125 yards Buffalo was able to gain on the Patriots on Nov. 14 at Gillette Stadium. It was the second time this season that the Patriots did not allow an offensive touchdown, with the other game also coming against the Bills at home. Taking into account the Bills and Ravens games, the Patriots allowed a total of just 249 net yards and no offensive touchdowns in back-to-back home games.

## IN THE (END) ZONE

New England tied a team record with 15 touchdowns over a three-game span from Dec. 5 to Dec. 20. The only other time the Patriots scored that many touchdowns in a three-game period was in the franchise's inaugural season of 1960, when they saw the end zone 15 times from Nov. 4 to Nov. 18 of that season. New England scored six touchdowns against Cleveland on Dec. 5 and followed that up with a five-touchdown performance against Cincinnati on Dec. 12 before seeing the end zone four times against Miami on Dec. 20. Below is a comparison of the most productive three-game stretches in team annals.

## NOT HALF BAD

One of the keys to New England's recent success has been the ability to close out victories by protecting second-half leads. The Patriots recently set the NFL's post-merger record with 31 consecutive victories in games in which they led at halftime, preserving every halftime lead they held from Oct. 28, 2001 until falling victim to a fourth-quarter rally by the Miami Dolphins on Dec. 20, 2004. New England also set the NFL mark with 38 straight wins in games in which they led after three quarters, protecting every lead over nearly a four-year span from Dec. 24, 2000 until the Miami loss on Dec. 20, 2004.

## RECORDING SUCCESS

TOM BRADY has quarterbacked the Patriots to victories in 48 of his 62 regularseason starts during his career, compiling a .774 winning percentage and giving him the best record of any active quarterback in the NFL who has a full season of starts under his belt. Including the playoffs, he is 54-14 (.794) as a starter. Including
 preseason, he is 61-17 (.782).


## OVERDRIVE IN OVERTIME

TOM BRADY owns a career record of 7-0 in overtime, including the postseason. Brady is the all-time NFL leader in overtime wins without a defeat. COMEBACK KID
TOM BRADY has engineered 16 game-winning drives to break a tie or take the lead in the fourth quarter or overtime in his career. He has accomplished the feat twice in the Super Bowl, most recently engineering a 47-yard drive with just over a minute remaining to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He led seven comebacks in 2003, including a fourthquarter comeback to break a 14-14 tie against Tennessee in the AFC Divisional Playoffs in addition to comebacks against Houston, Indianapolis, Miami, Tennessee and Denver in the regular season. Brady's record also includes his dramatic performance to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVI and his heroics in the snow against the Oakland Raiders in the 2001 Divisional Playoffs, giving him four comebacks in six postseason starts.

## HE RATE ME

TOM BRADY set a career high with eight passer ratings over 100.0 this season and is $24-0$ in his career when posting a rating of 100.0 or higher. Brady's 127.1 rating against Cincinnati on Dec. 12 was his highest of the season, the fourth highest rating of his career and his highest in more than two years, since posting a 147.6 rating at Buffalo on Nov. 3, 2002.

## CLOSE CALLS

Tom Brady has compiled a sparkling 18-2 record as a starter in games where the final margin was less than a touchdown, including a 4-0 postseason record in such games. In games decided by three points or fewer, Brady is 12-2. In the 2003 season, Brady led the team to nine victories by six points or fewer, including two in the playoffs. Since Brady took over as the starting quarterback early in the 2001 season, the Patriots have lost just two games by less than a touchdown.

## LEADING MAN

Dillon finished third in the NFL in rushing yardage in 2004, gaining a career-high 1,635 yards. His yardage total was just 62 yards behind Curtis Martin's NFL-leading total of 1,697 yards. Dillon played in 15 of 16 games this season, averaging 109.0 yards per game in which he played. Projected over a 16-game span, Dillon's average yards-per-game figure would put him on track for a 1,744-yard season. ## 1,600-YARD MARK

Corey Dillon recorded the first 1,600-yard season in the 45-year history of the Patriots franchise, totaling 1,635 yards on 1,487 carries. Prior to this season, no Patriot running back had exceeded the 1,500 -yard mark, and just two times in team history had a running back broke the 1,300-yard barrier. Dillon's yardage total is the highest total in franchise history, besting Curtis Martin's total of 1,487 yards in 1995.

## BREAKING THE BARRIER

On his 5 -yard run in the first quarter against Baltimore on Nov. 28, Corey Dillon passed the 1,000-yard mark in just his 10th game of the season, achieving the milestone in the fewest games of any rusher in Patriots history. The previous team record was set by Curtis Martin in 1997 and Jim Nance in 1966, both of whom passed the 1,000 -yard mark in their 11th game. Dillon was inactive with a thigh injury at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31 and averaged 109.0 yards per game in the 15 regular-season games he played in this season.

## BALANCED ATTACK

Corey Dillon and David Givens have each gained 100 yards in the same game three times this season, marking the only times since 1997 that the Patriots have had a 100-yard rusher and a 100 -yard receiver in the same game. Dillon and Givens both broke the 100 -yard mark in their respective categories at Arizona (9/19), against the N.Y. Jets (10/24) and at St. Louis (11/7). Prior to this season, the last time the Patriots achieved the feat was on Nov. 2, 1997, when Curtis Martin ran for 104 yards and Shawn Jefferson gained 108 receiving yards at Minnesota.

## COREY SCORES

Corey Dillon scored 12 rushing touchdowns in the 2004 season, tying him for third on the club's single-season rushing touchdowns list. Dillon's 12 rushing scores are a career high and are tied with Antowain Smith's 2001 total and Steve Grogan's 1976 total. Curtis Martin owns the franchise record of 14 scores, which he accomplished in both 1995 and 1996. This season, Dillon also recorded one receiving touchdown, bringing his total number of touchdowns to 13. That figure is tied for third on the team's single-season list for total touchdowns.

## TROY BROWN: 2-WAY STANDOUT

Patriots players under Head Coach Bill Belichick have become famous for their versatility, but TROY BROWN took that notion to a whole new level in 2004. The former Pro Bowl wideout ranks third among New England's all-time leading receivers, but when injuries depleted the Patriots' secondary in the middle of the
 year, Brown took his athleticism to the other side of the ball, pitching in as a defensive back in the Patriots' nickel packages. What was initially described as an emergency measure paid big dividends for Brown and the Patriots as he recorded three interceptions, tying him for second on the team. Brown tallied 17 tackles ( 15 solo) and was credited with five pass defenses. In addition to his work on offense and defense, Brown served as the team's primary punt returner, tallying 20 returns for 133 yards.


## PATRIOTS ALL-TIME LISTS

## BRANCHING OUT

Despite missing seven games due to injury, DEION BRANCH finished third on the team with 35 receptions for 454 yards and four touchdowns. Branch's three biggest games of the season all came in important Patriots victories. He opened the campaign by tying for the team lead in both receptions (7) and receiving yards (86) while scoring a touchdown in the Patriots' 27-24 victory over Indianapolis. On Nov. 22, in his first game back after a seven-game absence, he turned in a 105-yard, 6-catch performance with a touchdown on Monday Night Football in a 27-19 win over the Chiefs. Finally, in a late-season road battle against a 10-4 New York Jets team, Branch led all Patriots with seven receptions for 82 yards and a touchdown as New England picked up crucial late-season momentum.

## GOLDEN GRAHAM

Tight end DANIEL GRAHAM turned in another strong campaign in 2004, tying for the team lead with a career-high seven touchdown catches. The third-year tight end topped his scoring output from his first two seasons combined. He also tied Christian Fauria's 2002 total as the most touchdown grabs by a Patriots tight end since Ben Coates grabbed eight scores in 1997. In addition to his receiving duties, Graham continued to play a key role in the Patriots running game as a blocker. The former 2002 first-round draft pick helped the team average more than 4.0 yards per carry for the first time since 1985.

## FLY PATTEN

DAVID PATTEN was one of the NFL's most opportunistic receivers this season, as his average of 18.2 yards per catch ranked fourth in the league among players with at least 35 receptions. Patten also set a career high with seven touchdowns, as he rebounded from an injury that caused him to miss 10 games in 2003. Patten's 44 catches and 800 yards both ranked second on the team and his seven touchdowns tied Daniel Graham for the lead among all Patriots receivers.

## GIVENS LEADS THE WAY

DAVID GIVENS led the Patriots in receiving with a career-high 56 receptions and 874 yards. Last season, Givens tied for the team's postseason lead with 17 catches on the heels of a 34 -catch regular season. Givens exceeded the 100 -yard receiving mark four times this season, becoming the first Patriot to record four 100 -yard games in a season since Terry Glenn did it in 1999. He got his first career 100-yard game at Arizona on Sept. 19, 2004 ( 120 yards), then followed that with three consecutive centurymark games against the N.Y. Jets (10/24) at Pittsburgh (10/31) and at St. Louis (11/7).

## MR. FIRST DOWN

DAVID GIVENS' first 30 catches this season all resulted in first downs for the Patriots, and 47 of his 56 total catches recorded first downs. New England's leading receiver averaged 15.6 yards per catch, and has shown a knack for the big play, grabbing three passes of more than 40 yards and 14 passes of 20 yards or more.

## ABLE VRABEL

In proving to be one of the NFL's most versatile players, linebacker MIKE VRABEL made important contributions for the Patriots on offense and defense in 2004. At his regular position of linebacker, he ranked second on the team with 5.5 sacks and finished fourth on the team with 76 tackles ( 59 solo). As a situational tight end in short-yardage situations, he also caught two touchdown passes. Vrabel snared the third score of his regular-season career on a 1-yard grab from Tom Brady in the regular-season finale against San Francisco. Including his 1 -yard touchdown catch in Super Bowl XXXVIII, Vrabel has scored on all four of his NFL receptions. Vrabel's other touchdown this season came on a 2 -yard catch at St. Louis on Nov. 7. He also scored on a 1-yard grab at San Diego on Sept. 29, 2002. In addition to Vrabel's contributions on offense and defense, he also notched five special teams tackles.

## TED JOHNSON

TED JOHNSON has enjoyed a resurgence in his career in his 10th season in New England. The veteran linebacker ranked third on the team with 112 tackles ( 74 solo), his highest tackle total in six seasons, dating back to a 142-stop performance in 1998. Johnson started 15 of 16 games for the Patriots at inside linebacker, marking his highest number of starts and games played since starting all 16 contests in 1997. The run-stuffing specialist's solid job this season helped the Patriots defense rank sixth in the NFL against the run, allowing the opposition just 98.3 total rushing yards per game.

## Defense News and Notes

## WILLIE MAC ATTACK

WILLIE McGINEST ranks fourth on the Patriots' all-time sacks list with 72.0 career sacks. He led the team with 9.5 sacks in the 2004 season, continuing a run of strong play dating back to late last year. Including his NFL-leading 5.0 sacks in the 2003 postseason, McGinest has recorded 14.5 sacks in his last 19 games.
 He is the Patriots' career postseason sack leader and ranks third all-time in NFL postseason history with 11.5 career postseason sacks, trailing only Bruce Smith (14.5) and Reggie White (12.0). The Patriots' all-time regular-season sack leaders are listed below.

BIG PLAY BRUSCHI
TEDY BRUSCHI forced three fumbles this season, and two of them were recovered for touchdowns by the Patriots. Against the Ravens on Nov. 28, Bruschi sacked Kyle Boller for an 18-yard loss and forced him to fumble in the fourth quarter. The ball rolled into the end zone, where Jarvis Green pounced on it for a touchdown and
 a 24-3 Patriots lead. Bruschi's other forced fumble came against Buffalo on Oct. 3, when he stripped the ball from Drew Bledsoe on a rushing play and Richard Seymour recovered the ball and returned it 68 yards for a score. Bruschi has a solid history of creating turnovers that become touchdowns. From 2002-03, he became the first player in NFL history to return four consecutive interceptions for touchdowns.

## TEDY BRUSCHI: FULL TILT, FULL TIME

TEDY BRUSCHI is the first player in NFL history to return four consecutive interceptions for touchdowns, a feat accomplished from 2002-03. Bruschi ranks second on the Patriots all-time list with four career picks brought back for touchdowns. Teammate Ty Law holds the club record with six interceptions returned to the end zone. Bruschi's four interception returns are listed below.

## WARREN REPORT

TY WARREN settled comfortably into a role as a starter in 2004, as the former 2003 first-round draft pick started all 16 games at defensive end for the Patriots. Warren's 64 tackles trailed only three-time Pro Bowler Richard Seymour for the lead among Patriots defensive linemen. In addition, Warren's run stopping helped the Patriots rank sixth in the NFL in rushing defense.

## HOT ROD

RODNEY HARRISON led the Patriots in tackles for the second consecutive year, recording 138 stops ( 96 solo), as he continued to be a leader in the New England secondary. His tackle total was just two stops short of his career high, set last season in his first year in New England. In his two seasons in
 Foxborough, Harrison has notched 278 tackles, marking the most productive two-season stretch of his 11 -year NFL career. He recorded a career-high 20 tackles ( 12 solo) at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, 2004. In 2003, his first season in New England, Harrison led the team with a career-high 140 tackles ( 105 solo).

## HARRISON LEADS ALL NFL DEFENSIVE BACKS

For the second consecutive season, Rodney Harrison led all NFL defensive backs in tackles. According to the day-of-game statisticians, Harrison recorded 129 tackles (89 solo), tops among all defensive backs in the NFL. His tackle total ranked ninth among all NFL players, trailing only eight middle linebackers. In 2003, Harrison was credited with 125 total tackles by day-of-game crews, a figure that again led all NFL defensive backs.

## RICHARD SEYMOUR: "BIG SEY"

Defensive lineman RICHARD SEYMOUR was named to his third consecutive Pro Bowl this season and was voted a defensive captain by his teammates. His 67 tackles and 5.0 sacks were tops among Patriots defensive linemen. In addition, he scored his first career touchdown on Oct. 3 at Buffalo, scooping up a Drew Bledsoe fumble caused by Tedy Bruschi and rumbling 68 yards for the score and a decisive 31-17 advantage for the Patriots. Seymour became the first Patriots defensive lineman to score a touchdown since Willie McGinest recovered a fumble in the end zone in a 30-28 win over the New York Jets in the 1999 season opener.

## BLUE STREAK

RANDALL "BLUE" GAY was signed by the Patriots as an undrafted rookie free agent following the 2004 draft, and has proven to be a key part of the success of New England's secondary this season. Gay started in nine of 15 games on the season, including eight of the final nine games after All-Pro Ty Law suffered a foot injury at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31. But Gay made contributions throughout the season, totaling 38 tackles ( 34 solo) and two interceptions. His first pick came against Miami on Oct. 10, then he made his first career start two weeks later on Oct. 24. He scored his first career touchdown on a 41-yard fumble return in the third quarter at Cleveland on Dec. 5. On that play, Gay scooped up a William Green fumble caused by Richard Seymour and used the whole field to elude Cleveland defenders and reach the end zone.

## MEAN GENE

EUGENE WILSON led the team with four interceptions this season, and continued to be a versatile presence in the secondary, logging productive time at cornerback and at safety. His season totals also included a career-high 67 tackles ( 51 solo), and he tied for the team lead with three forced fumbles. Two of his interceptions came against Arizona on Sept. 19, marking the first multiple-pick game of his career. All of Wilson's interceptions this season kick-started Patriots scoring drives, with the team notching 24 points off of his four picks.

## TAKING AIM

ADAM VINATIERI is the most accurate kicker in franchise history and ranks fifth among the most accurate kickers in NFL history. He has recorded an 82.1 percent conversion rate ( $243 / 296$ ) over his nineyear career. He was 31 -for-33 in 2004, setting a career high for accuracy with a 93.9 percent success rate. He has
 connected on 90 of his last 104 kicks, good for an 86.5 percent clip.

## SCORING MACHINE

ADAM VINATIERI is the second leading scorer in Patriots history, totaling 1,058 points in his nine full seasons with the club. Vinatieri made the team as a rookie free agent in 1996 and has scored 100 points or more in each of his nine seasons, joining Jason Elam of the Denver Broncos as the only two kickers in NFL history to accomplish the feat. Vinatieri has kicked the most field goals in Patriots history, having tallied 243 successful boots in a Patriots uniform.

## EMAN

ADAM VINATIERI nailed his second Super Bowl-winning field goal, booting a 41 -yarder through the uprights with four seconds left to give the Patriots a 32-29 victory over Carolina in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He is the only kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winning field goal in the final minute of the Super Bowl and has accomplished the feat twice, including his 48 -yarder to win Super Bowl XXXVI. Out of the Patriots' six playoff wins since 2001, four were decided on game-winning boots by Vinatieri. In all, Vinatieri has kicked 17 game-winning field goals in his career, including nine in the past three seasons. His gamewinners are listed below:

BETHEL JOHNSON recorded his second career kickoff return for a touchdown when he returned the opening kickoff 93 yards for a score at Cleveland on Dec. 5. It was the longest kickoff return of Johnson's two-year career and the longest kickoff return for a Patriot since Kevin Faulk returned one 95 yards against the New York Jets on Nov. 14, 1999. The last time the Patriots had a kickoff returned for a touchdown was when Johnson scampered 92 yards for a score at Indianapolis on Nov. 30, 2003.

## A SPECIAL PLAYER

LARRY IZZO led the team with 27 special teams tackles and has led his team in special teams stops in each of his last five NFL seasons. Since pacing the Miami Dolphins with 33 special teams tackles in 1999, the two-time Pro Bowler has set the mark on his team in every season since then, including every year since he joined the Patriots in 2001. He has recorded 99 special teams tackles in a Patriots uniform over the last four full seasons and is in his fourth year as New England's special teams captain.

## BROKEN RECORD

The Patriots recorded a one-game winning streak 21 consecutive times, setting an all-time record for the 85 -year history of pro football. Using their game-by-game, week-by-week approach to remain focused, the Patriots did not lose a game for more than a year. Following a 20-17 loss at Washington on Sept. 28, 2003, the Patriots did not lose for 398 days, until the streak was snapped in a 34-20 loss at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, 2004.
