After reporting to training camp on July 25, the New England Patriots will open the preseason at home against the Washington Redskins on Thursday, Aug. 9, at Gillette Stadium. For the first time since 2011, the Patriots will not conduct joint practices during training camp.

The Patriots and Redskins will square off for the 22nd time in the preseason, with the Patriots holding a 13-8 edge. The Patriots 13 preseason victories over the Redskins are their highest total over any preseason opponent. Washington defeated New England, 236, in their most recent meeting [Aug. 7, 2014] at FedEx Field. Overall, the Redskins own a 6-4 record in regular-season play over the Patriots. The two teams most recently met at Gillette Stadium on Nov. 8, 2015, when New England scored a 27-10 victory.

## EROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by the Patriots Preseason Television Network and can be seen in every New England state, as well as Alaska and Hawaii. The preseason network's flagship station is WBZ-TV CBS in Boston. Bob Socci provides play-by-play and is joined by former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak in the broadcast booth. Former Patriots linebacker Rob Ninkovich will provide sideline analysis along with WBZ-TV's Steve Burton. Patriots Football Weekly's beat writers Paul Perillo and Andy Hart will also provide insight and analysis.

## PATRIOTS LOQK TO KICK OFF ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SEASON

The 2018 New England Patriots have a chance to set or tie several NFL team records, including:
$\rightarrow$ The Patriots have made the playoffs for nine straight seasons [2009-17], tied with Dallas (1975-83) and Indianapolis (2002-10) for the most in NFL history.
$\rightarrow$ The New England Patriots enter the 2018 season with 34 postseason wins and need two more playoff victories to tie Pittsburgh for the most postseason wins all-time.
$\rightarrow \quad$ The Patriots enter this season with 214 regular season wins since 2000. The NFL record for most regular season wins over two consecutive decades is 217 by the San Francisco 49ers [1970s/1980s]. The Patriots need just four more wins to surpass the 49ers for the most regular season wins in two consecutive decades.

After three days of joint practice sessions, the New England Patriots and Washington Redskins opened the 2014 preseason with many of the Patriots regulars, including QB Tom Brady, WRs Julian Edelman and Danny Amendola, G Logan Mankins, CB Darrelle Revis and LB Jerod Mayo, taking the night off. The Redskins used that to their advantage to claim a 23-6 victory. The Patriots were shut out until scoring a touchdown with 1:23 left in regulation.

QB Ryan Mallett started at quarterback and completed 5-of-12 passes for 55 yards in the first half. Second-round pick QB Jimmy Garoppolo played the entire second half and went 9 -for-13 for 157 yards, including a 53 -yard completion and a 26-yard touchdown pass to WR Brian Tyms for the Patriots only points of the night.

Washington built a 13-0 halftime lead, out gaining the Patriots 183 yards to 87 yards and gaining 15 first downs to the Patriots five.

Washington scored on four of its first five offensive drives, including one drive that ended in a missed 46-yard field goal.

Washington started QB Robert Griffin III, who completed 2-of-4 passes for 9 yards on an 11-play, 35-yard drive that ended in a 39-yard field goal. Backup QB Kirk Cousins entered the game on the next series and drove the Redskins 60 yards before connecting with WR Aldrick Robinson on a 10-yard touchdown for a 10-0 lead.

The Patriots only scoring chance in the first half was late in the second quarter when K Stephen Gostkowski attempted a 54-yard field goal attempt that hit the right upright.

The Redskins took over and marched 47 yards to get into position for a 27yard field goal and a 13-0 lead.

Redskins QB Colt McCoy opened the second half by leading a 10-play, 65yard drive that culminated with a 7-yard touchdown pass to TE Ted Bolser that gave Washington a 20-0 lead.

Patriots rookie RB Stephen Houston fumbled to end a scoring threat deep in Washington territory. The Redskins took advantage of the turnover and drove to the New England 21-yard line for a field goal and a 23-0 lead.

## TEAM NOTES




Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 25th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kratt announced his intention to bring a championship to New
 England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles [17), conference crowns (9) and Super Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons [21] and have the fewest losing seasons [2] since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl Lll was the ninth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 24 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 19 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2017, Kraft earned his 21st winning season in 24 years of owning the franchise.

* Since purchasing the team in 1994, Robert Kraft has 30 career postseason wins as an owner, third-most in NFL history behind the Rooney Family in Pittsburgh [36] and the Green Bay Packers [34]. The Rooney Family founded the Steelers in 1933 while the Green Bay Packers were founded in 1919.
* Under Robert Kraft's guidance, the 2000-09 Patriots set the NFL record for most wins in a decade in NFL history with 126 overall wins overall. With 11 wins overall in 2018, the Patriots will tie that record for the current decade.

The Patriots victory over the New York Jets on Dec. 21, 2014 was the 250th win under Robert Kraft's tenure. His 250 wins in his first 368 total games tied Chicago's George Halas for the fastest an owner has reached 250 victories.

## PATRIOTG IN THE PLAYOFFG

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 25 times in their 58 -year history. Nineteen of those playoff berths have come in the 24 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 20 division crowns, including 15 in the last 17 seasons and 17 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

The Patriots have 298 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 298-130 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

## CAREER NOTES

Tom Brady has quarterbacked the Patriots to victories in 196 of his 251 career regular-season starts, compiling a .781 winning percentage and giving him the best record of any quarterback in the Super Bowl era [since 1966]. Brady's 155 career wins in his first 200 starts are the most in NFL history. Peyton Manning is second with 136 wins in his first 200 career starts.

Brady led the Patriots to their ninth win of the season in the victory over Miami on Nov. 26, 2017, the most ever by a 40-year old quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Brett Favre in 2009 turned 40 on Oct. 10 and led the Vikings to eight wins in their 12-win season after turning 40. Brady threw four touchdowns to push his 2017 total to 26 touchdowns, the most in a single season by a 40year old quarterback. He moved past Brett Favre (25 in 2009 after he turned 40 in October of that year with Minnesota) and Warren Moon (25 with Seattle in 1997).

Brady led the NFL with 4,577 yards passing in 2017 to become the oldest quarterback to lead the NFL.. The previous oldest player to lead the league in passing was Fran Tarkenton with 3,468 yards in 1978 at age 38 . If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked，it＇s athletic ability．A du－ al－threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school， Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts，who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft．Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father，Frank Edelman，taught him at a young age．＂I＇m still constantly trying to learn，＂Edelman told The Boston Herald．＂My dad always put it in my head，when you＇re green，you＇re growing，when you＇re ripe，you＇re lost． When you＇re done learning，you＇re done．＂

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to seven straight Pro Bowls [2011-17] for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the seventh straight season in 2017.
The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. Most of the time, there's two guys out there -fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005－ 08．Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and was a year behind his brother in eligibility．Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots，after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998－2000．His twin brother，Jason，played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999－2001． According to McCourty＇s mother，the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox．

New England has qualified for the playoffs 25 times in its 58 -year history. The Patriots have earned 19 of those playoff berths in the 24 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 20 division crowns overall (19 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16team tournament following a players' strike.


## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 17th straight year in 2017. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, moving past the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).
