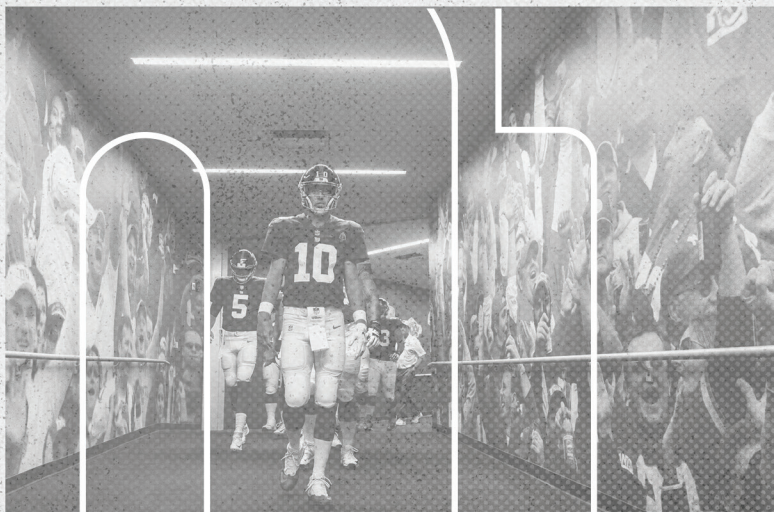

2018 OPPONENTS

The 2018 NFL scheduling formula has the Giants playing both the AFC and NFC South this season. In addition to their home-and-home series with NFC East rivals Dallas, Super Bowl Champion Philadelphia, and Washington, the Giants will host Jacksonville, NFC North Champion New Orleans, Tampa Bay, Chicago and Tennessee, who finished second in the AFC South last year. Last season, the Giants made four trips to the West Coast, including Denver, San Francisco, Oakland and Arizona. This year, they will travel to Dallas and Houston, as well as San Francisco for their second season in a row.

2017 NEW YORK GIANTS SEASON NOTES

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Notes, statistics, and milestones from the Giants' 2017 season:

*The Giants finished the season 3-13. The 13 losses are a franchise record. The three victories are the team's fewest since 1983, when the Giants finished 3-12-1 in Bill Parcells' first season as head coach.

*The Giants finished 2-6 in MetLife Stadium, their fewest home victories since they were 1-7 in 2003.

*The Giants finished 1-5 in NFC East games for the first time since 2003 and 1-11 in games vs. NFC opponents.

*The Giants scored 246 points, their lowest total since they scored 243 in 2003.

*On Dec. 4, the Giants were 2-10 when general manager Jerry Reese and head coach Ben McAdoo were dismissed from their duties. Assistant general manager Kevin Abrams was named interim GM and defensive coordinator Steve Spagnuolo became the interim head coach. The Giants were 1-3 under Spagnuolo, defeating the Washington Redskins in their season finale.

*The Giants threw 608 passes in 2017, the third-highest total in franchise history (623 in 2015, 616 in 2003). They completed 373 passes in 2017, the fourth-highest total in Giants history (392 in 2015, 383 in 2014, and 377 in 2016).

*Giants opponents threw 32 touchdown passes in 2017, the second-highest total ever allowed by the team; their opponents threw 36 touchdown passes in 1966.

*The Giants lost in Dallas on Kickoff Weekend, 19-3. They fell to 50-38-5 in season-opening games. The Giants are also 50-38-5 in road openers. They are 33-26-5 in season-opening road games.

*The Giants have played five consecutive season openers on the road, their longest such streak since they started seven consecutive seasons as visitors from 1962-68.

*The roof in Dallas was closed, so the loss was the Giants' only indoor game in 2017. The Giants are 31-24 indoors, including 2-4 in AT&T Stadium.

*The Giants' only Monday night game of the season was a 24-10 loss to Detroit in Week 2 that left them 0-2 for the fourth time in five seasons.



*The Giants are 50-40-3 in home openers.

*The Giants are 24-38-1 on Monday night, including 9-10 at home. They are 3-2 in Monday night home openers.

*On Sept. 24, the Giants lost in Philadelphia, 27-24, when rookie Jake Elliott kicked two field goals in the final 51 seconds, including a 61-yarder to win the game as time expired that was four yards longer than any field goal ever previously kicked in a Giants game. It was the first time the Giants lost when the opposition scored on the game's final play since Dec. 12, 2015, when Carolina's Graham Gano kicked a 43-yard field goal to defeat the Giants, 38-35.

*The previous record for longest field goal against the Giants was 57 yards, by Green Bay's Mason Crosby on Nov. 17, 2013 in MetLife Stadium. Six days before Elliott's record three-pointer, Detroit's Matt Prater kicked a 56-yarder, which tied Dallas' Dan Bailey for what is now the third-longest field goal ever against the Giants.

*Elliott's 61-yard kick was the third-longest game-ending field goal in NFL history, trailing only Tom Dempsey's famous 63-yarder for New Orleans on Nov. 8, 1970, and former Giant Matt Bryant's 62-yarder for Tampa Bay on Oct. 22, 2006.

*In Philadelphia, the Giants scored all 24 of their points in the fourth quarter. It was their highest-scoring fourth quarter since Sept. 16, 2012, when they scored 25 in a 41-34 comeback victory vs. Tampa Bay.

*The Giants are 28-33 in games following a Monday night game, including 10-12 since 2000.

*A week after the loss in Philly, the Giants fell again on a last-play field goal when Tampa Bay's Nick Folk kicked a 34-yard field goal as time expired to give the Buccaneers a 25-23 triumph. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, it was the first time the Giants lost consecutive games on the last play of the game since the 1970 merger.

*Prior to Folk's deciding, come-from-behind field goal, each of the previous five field goals kicked against the Giants as time expired broke a tie. The last time the Giants owned a lead when their opponents kicked a go-ahead field goal on the final play was on Dec. 28, 2009, when Minnesota's Ryan Longwell booted a 50-yarder to defeat the Giants, 20-19.

*At Tampa Bay, the Giants did not have an accepted penalty for the first time since Sept. 22, 1974, in a loss to New England.

*It was the first Giants game in which neither team committed a turnover since Dec. 23, 2012 at Baltimore.

*With a 27-22 loss to the Los Angeles Chargers on Oct. 8, the Giants fell to 0-5 for only the fifth time in franchise history. They lost their first nine games in 1976, their first five in 1979 and 1987 (when three of

them were strike-replacement games), and their first six in 2013. The Giants were also winless through their first five games in 1947 (when they started 0-7-2), and 1966 (0-4-1).

*Chargers quarterback Philip Rivers completed just 47.7% of his passes (21 of 44). It was the Giants' first loss in a game in which their opponent's completion percentage was 47.7 or less since Dec. 16, 2007, when they lost to a Washington team that completed 32% (eight-of-25).

*The Giants lost more than the game that day. Four wide receivers were injured, including three who spent the rest of the season on injured reserve: Odell Beckham, Jr. suffered a fractured left ankle, Brandon Marshall hurt his ankle, and Dwayne Harris broke his foot. Sterling Shepard suffered an ankle injury that forced him to miss the next two games.

*Despite their long list of injured players, the Giants earned their first victory of the season the following week with a 23-10 Sunday night triumph over the Broncos in Denver.

*The Giants led at halftime, 17-3, their largest lead after two quarters since Dec. 7, 2014, when they led the Titans in Tennessee, 23-0. They won that game, 36-7.

*In Denver, the Giants ran 32 times for 148 yards, a healthy 4.6-yard average. Orleans Darkwa led the way with 117 yards on 21 carries, then career-high figures. Eli Manning threw only 19 passes, completing 11 for 128 yards. He was sacked three times, giving the team 118 net passing yards. It was the first time the Giants gained more yards rushing than passing since Nov. 24, 2013, when they ran for 202 yards and passed in a 24-21 loss to Dallas.

*Roger Lewis, Jr. and Tavarres King were the only Giants wide receivers to catch passes — and they had one reception apiece. It was the first time no Giants receiver had more than one catch since Dec. 24, 2006, when Plaxico Burress, Tim Carter and Sinorice Moss each had one in a 30-7 loss to New Orleans (when the Giants had 59 net passing yards). The victory in Denver was the first Giants game in which their wide receivers totaled no more than two catches since Sept. 22, 1991, when Mark Ingram and Odessa Turner each had one catch in a 13-10 victory against Cleveland.

*The Giants improved to 22-29-1 on Sunday Night Football, including 11-17-1 on the road. They snapped a five-game Sunday night road losing streak in Denver. Their previous such victory was Dec. 1, 2013 at Washington, 24-17.

*A 24-7 loss to Seattle on Oct. 22 left the Giants 20-9 (.690) in games prior to a regular-season bye.

*The Giants' returned to action after their bye with a 51-17 loss to the Rams in MetLife Stadium. They fell to 0-4 at home for the first time since 1980.

*The 34-point loss was the Giants' worst since a 38-0

defeat at Carolina on Sept. 22, 2013 and the most one-sided at home since Nov. 15, 1998 (37-3 to Green Bay). Their largest previous deficit in MetLife Stadium was 30 points (40-10) to Indianapolis on Nov. 3, 2014.

*The Rams' 51 points were the most by a Giants opponent since Nov. 28, 2015, when the Giants lost in New Orleans, 52-49. It was the highest point total they allowed at home since Dec. 12, 1964, in a 52-21 loss to Cleveland (which was also the last home game in which they trailed by at least 38 points, as they did when it was 48-10). It was the fifth highest total given up by the Giants at home (63 by the Chicago Cardinals in 1948, 56 by the Chicago Bears in 1943, 52 by the Rams in 1948 and the Browns in 1964). The last opposing team to score 50 points in a Giants home game was Washington on Sept. 19, 1999, in a 50-21 victory.

*The Giants fell to 11-18 (.380) in games following a regular-season bye.

*The Giants lost to the Rams for the first time since Oct. 14, 2001. They had won their previous seven games against the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams, and now trail in the all-time series, 26-16.

*On Nov. 5, the Giants suffered a 31-21 defeat to the 49ers in San Francisco that dropped them to 1-8, their worst nine-game start since 1980, when they were also 1-8.

*It was the Giants' first loss to a team with no wins and at least nine losses since Nov. 20, 1966, when they fell to the 0-9 Atlanta Falcons, 27-16.

*The Giants are 10-5 against teams that entered the game 0-4 or worse since the 1970 merger. Two of the losses occurred in 2017, to the 0-4 Chargers and the 0-9 49ers. In 2016, the Giants defeated the 0-11 Browns in Cleveland, 27-13.

*The Giants earned their second victory of the season on Nov. 19, when they defeated the Kansas City Chiefs at home in overtime, 12-9. It was their first overtime game since Dec. 6, 2015, a 23-20 loss to the Jets, which broke their six-game winning streak in five-period games (plus two in the postseason). It was their first overtime victory since Dec. 22, 2013, when they won in Detroit, also by a 23-20 score. The victory was their first home overtime game since Nov. 22, 2009, when they defeated Atlanta, 34-31, in Giants Stadium. It was the Giants' first overtime game since the extra period was reduced from 15 to 10 minutes.

*The Giants are 20-15-2 in regular-season overtime games since 1974, when the extra period was first played. They are 9-10 at home, and 7-7-2 when they lose the overtime coin toss (as they vs. Kansas City).

*The triumph over the Chiefs was the Giants' first victory in which they scored no more than 12 points since their 10-7 triumph against Dallas on Dec. 11, 2016.

*The Chiefs scored all of their points on three field goals. It was the Giants first victory in which they held

their opponents without a touchdown since Dec. 18, 2016, a 17-6 win vs. Detroit.

*Rookie free agents Shane Smith (fullback) and Chad Wheeler (right tackle) each started against Kansas City. It was the first non-strike game in which the Giants started two undrafted rookies on offense since Nov. 21, 1976, when center Ralph Hill and tight end Gary Shirk were in the lineup in a 14-13 loss at Denver.

*The Giants and Chiefs didn't score many points, but they did produce a statistical oddity that hadn't occurred in an NFL game in 44 years. Both teams called on players who were not quarterbacks to throw a pass (that's not the oddity). The passes thrown by Giants running back Shane Vereen and Chiefs tight end Travis Kelce were intercepted, by safeties Daniel Sorenson and Landon Collins, respectively.

It was the first NFL game in which each team had non-quarterbacks throw interceptions since Nov. 11, 1973, when San Diego wide receiver Ron Holliday and Denver kicker Jim Turner each threw a pick in the Broncos' 30-19 victory in Denver. It was the first time players other than quarterbacks had thrown interceptions for each team in a Giants game since the 1970 merger.

*The Giants improved to 11-3 vs. the Chiefs, including 7-0 in home games.

*In their final game under McDoo, Geno Smith started at quarterback and the Giants lost to the Raiders in Oakland, 24-17, on Dec. 3. The Giants fell to 2-10, their worst 12-game record since they were 2-10 in 1976, and their worst mark since the advent of the 16-game schedule in 1978.

*The Giants finished 2-2 against the AFC West, beating Denver and Kansas City, and losing to the Chargers and Raiders. They lost to the Raiders for the first time since 2001 (beating them three times in the interim) and trail in the all-time series, 8-5.

*With the Raiders move to Las Vegas in 2020, it was the Giants' last game in Oakland, where they were 1-3.

*The Giants played their first game under Spagnuolo on Dec. 10 and lost at home to Dallas, 30-10 (the game was tied, 10-10, midway through the fourth quarter). The dismissal of McDoo and promotion of Spagnuolo was the NFL's 39th in-season coaching change since 1990. The new coaches are 14-25 in their debuts.

*The Giants, who swept the season series with Dallas in 2016, were swept by the Cowboys for the first time since 2014. The 13 total points was the Giants' lowest total in a season series vs. Dallas since 1998, when they also scored 13 points.

*The Giants had neither a sack nor a turnover vs. Dallas. Since 1990, they are 2-20 with that statistical combination.

*The Giants wore their all-white color rush uniforms



— with GIANTS on the helmets instead of the “ny” - the first time they wore white jerseys at home since Sept. 3, 2000, in a season-opening victory against Arizona.

*On Dec. 17, the Giants — 2-11 entering the game - lost to the 11-2 Eagles in MetLife Stadium, 34-29. It was the first Giants game in which one team was at least nine games over .500 and the other was at least nine games under since Dec. 30, 1990, when the 12-3 Giants faced the 1-14 Patriots in New England. The Giants won, 13-10, in their final regular-season game on the way to winning Super Bowl XXV.

*The Giants’ 29 points was their highest total since a 35-30 loss to the Eagles on Jan. 3, 2016. The teams’ 63 combined points were the most in a Giants games since that loss to Philadelphia on the final day of the 2015 season.

*The Giants held an early 20-7 lead. It was the first time they lost a game in which they led by at least 13 points since Nov. 30, 2014, when they led in Jacksonville by 21 points, but fell to the Jaguars, 25-24.

*The Giants led at halftime, 23-21. The 44 combined points were the most through two quarters in a Giants game since Nov. 1, 2015, when the New Orleans Saints (28) and Giants (21) combined for 49 points. The 23 points made it the Giants’ highest-scoring first half since Dec. 7, 2014 at Tennessee, where they led, 23-0, on their way to a 36-7 victory.

*The Giants gained 504 yards, their highest total since they finished with 525 yards in a victory against San Francisco on Oct. 11, 2015.

*For the first time in 2017, the Giants scored a first-possession touchdown when Orleans Darkwa powered his way into the end zone from a yard out 5:56 into the game. The Giants had last scored a touchdown on their opening possession a year ago — Dec. 18, 2016 vs. Detroit on Manning’s six-yard pass to Sterling Shepard.

*The Giants also scored on their next two possessions on Manning touchdown passes to Tavarres King and Shepard. They had last scored touchdowns on their first three offensive possessions on Nov. 23, 2014 vs. Dallas, when the second score was Odell Beckham, Jr.’s famous one-handed catch.

*The Giants’ final road game of the season was a 23-0 loss at Arizona on Dec. 24. They fell to 2-13, a franchise single-season record for losses. The previous mark of 12 defeats was set in 1966 (1-12-1), 1974 (2-12), 1980 (4-12), 1983 (3-12-1) and 2003 (4-12).

*The Giants finished 1-7 on the road, their worst record in a non-strike season since 1978, when they were also 1-7. They were 1-6 in the strike-shortened 1987 season, but one of those defeats was a 6-3 overtime loss in Buffalo played by strike-replacement players.

*The Giants suffered their first shutout loss since Oct. 12, 2004, a 27-0 defeat in Philadelphia. Arizona blanked an opponent for the first time since Dec. 12,

1992, and the opponent then was the Giants, who lost, 19-0, in Sun Devil Stadium.

*The Giants ended their season with an 18-10 victory at home against Washington. They finished with a 3-13 record, including 1-3 under Spagnuolo.

*Against the Redskins, the Giants rushed for 260 yards, their highest total since Dec. 21, 2008, when they ran for 301 yards in an overtime victory against Carolina.

*Washington finished with 197 yards and 10 first downs, the lowest totals by a Giants opponent since Dec. 13, 2010, when the Minnesota Vikings had 164 yards and 10 first downs in a 21-3 Giants victory.

*The Giants scored within a game’s first 17 seconds for the first time since Dec. 18, 2004, when Willie Ponder returned the opening kickoff (15 seconds). Darkwa’s touchdown marked the first time since the 1970 merger that the Giants scored a rushing or passing touchdown in the first 17 seconds of a game.

*The Giants also scored on their second possession when Eli Manning threw a 16-yard touchdown pass to Hunter Sharp just 2:18 into the game. It was the first time since the merger the Giants scored two touchdowns in the first 2:18 of a game.

*Aldrick Rosas added a 23-yard field goal to give the Giants a 15-7 lead after one quarter. It was the Giants’ highest-scoring first quarter since Dec. 7, 2014, when they scored 17 points at Tennessee.

*The Giants own the second choice in the 2018 NFL Draft. It will be the Giants’ highest selection since they chose Pro Football Hall of Fame linebacker Lawrence Taylor with the second pick in 1981.

In 2018, the NFC East will play the NFC South and the AFC South next season. Because they finished fourth in the NFC East, the Giants will face the fourth-place teams from the NFC North and NFC West.

In addition to their home-and-home series against division rivals Dallas, Philadelphia, and Washington, the Giants will host New Orleans, Tampa Bay, Jacksonville, Tennessee, and Chicago. Their non-division road games will be at Atlanta, Carolina, Houston, Indianapolis, and San Francisco.

Quarterbacks

*Eli Manning started all 15 games in which he played. When he did not play at Oakland on Dec. 3, it ended his streak of 210 consecutive regular-season starts (plus 12 in the postseason) dating back to his rookie season in 2004.

*Manning’s 210-game starting streak was the second-longest by a quarterback in NFL history, behind Brett Favre’s 297. His brother Peyton is third with 208 straight starts. Manning started every Giants game from Nov. 21, 2004 to Nov. 23, 2016, when the Giants lost in Washington on Thanksgiving night.

*Manning's streak was 90 games longer than that of any other Giants player since the 1970 merger. Offensive lineman David Diehl started 120 consecutive games from 2003-10.

The 210-game streak was more than three times longer than the previous record for a Giants quarterback. Pro Football Hall of Famer Fran Tarkenton started 69 games in a row from 1967-71.

*Manning's 210 consecutive starts was the sixth-longest streak by any player since the merger:

*Manning started the final four games of the year. In his 214 career regular-season starts, his record is 111-103 (.519).

*On Dec. 31 against Washington, Manning played in his 216th regular-season game in a Giants uniform. He shares the franchise record with Hall of Famer Michael Strahan, who played for the Giants from 1993-2007.

*Manning is one of just seven players in Giants history to play at least 14 seasons with the team:

*In 2017, Manning completed 352 of 571 passes (61.6%) for 3,468 yards, 19 touchdowns, and 13 interceptions, for a passer rating of 80.4. It was the first season since 2013 he did not throw for at least 4,000 yards or at least 20 touchdown passes.

*Manning increased his team-record totals to 7,396 passes, 4,424 completions, 51,682 yards, 339 touchdown passes, and 228 interceptions. The attempts, completions and yardage totals all leave him in sole possession of sixth place in NFL history. His 339 touchdown passes leave him eighth, three behind Tarkenton and the Chargers' Philip Rivers.

*Manning's 4,424 completions have been to 82 different receivers. Hakeem Nicks and Odell Beckham, Jr. top the list with 313 receptions apiece. Manning's 339 touchdown passes have been to 50 different receivers. Beckham is first with 38. Hunter Sharp became the 50th in the 2017 season finale.

*In two games against Philadelphia in 2017, Manning

threw 104 passes, and completed 72 for 800 yards. All three figures are Giants records for a single season against an opponent. And all three were also the high totals for any quarterback against any team in 2017. On Sept. 24 in Lincoln Financial Field, Manning completed 35 of 47 passes for 366 yards, three touchdowns and two interceptions. In the rematch on Dec. 17 in MetLife Stadium, Manning completed 37 of 57 passes for 434 yards, three touchdowns, and one interception (the game's only turnover). The 57 passes were the second-highest total of his career; he had 63 attempts at Philadelphia on Dec. 22, 2016. Manning's 37 completions were the third-highest total of his career; he completed 41 passes vs. San Francisco on Oct. 11, 2015, and 38 at Philadelphia last season. The 434 yards were the fourth-highest total of his career; Manning threw for 510 yards vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 16, 2002, 450 at Dallas on Sept. 8, 2013 and 441 vs. San Francisco on Oct. 11, 2015.

*The 366 and 434-yard games against the Eagles were Manning's only 300-yard performances of the season. The Giants are 19-26 when Manning throws for at least 300 yards in the regular season.

*Manning threw six touchdown passes against the Eagles, tying his second-highest total against an opponent in a single season. He threw seven touchdown passes against Washington in 2014 and Philadelphia in 2012. Manning also threw six touchdowns against New Orleans in 2015 — in one game.

*In the loss at Tampa Bay on Oct. 1, Manning scored the Giants' first touchdown on a 14-yard run with 3:17 remaining in the second quarter. It was a) his sixth career rushing touchdown, b) his first since Sept. 24, 2014 at Washington, and c) the longest of his career. His previous long touchdown run was a 10-yarder against the Miami Dolphins in London on Oct. 28, 2007. Five of Manning's six rushing touchdowns have been in road games. The Giants are 4-2 when Manning rushes for a touchdown.

*When the Giants hosted the Chargers on Oct. 8, the starting quarterbacks were Manning and Rivers, who were traded for each other during the 2004 NFL Draft. The game was the first in NFL history in which the opposing starting quarterbacks were from the same draft class and each came into the game with at least 300 career touchdown passes.

*The pair's 646 combined touchdown passes entering the game were the second-most by opposing starting quarterbacks from the same draft class, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famers Dan Marino and John Elway of the 1983 Draft class, who combined for 699 touchdown passes when they faced each other on Dec. 21, 1998.

*When the Giants defeated Denver for their first victory of the season, Manning completed 11 of 19 passes for 128 yards, one touchdown, and no interceptions. The 19 attempts were his lowest total in a full regular-season game since he threw 15 passes at Buffalo on Dec. 23, 2007. Manning threw 18 passes in an NFC



Divisional Playoff Game in Dallas on Jan. 13, 2008. He threw 10 passes vs. Oakland on Oct. 11, 2009, but played only five series in that game, and 19 at Minnesota on Dec. 28, 2008, but did not play in the second half.

*A 37-yard completion to Sterling Shepard with just over 10 minutes remaining against the Rams on Nov. 5 lifted Manning over the 50,000-yard mark for his career. He was the seventh player in NFL history to throw for more than 50,000 yards. The others are Peyton Manning, Brett Favre, Drew Brees, Tom Brady, Dan Marino and John Elway.

Manning threw for his 10,000th yard Nov. 18, 2007 (51st game)

Manning threw for his 20,000th yard Oct. 17, 2010 (95th game)

Manning threw for his 30,000th yard Nov. 4, 2012 (130th game)

Manning threw for his 40,000th yard Sept. 20, 2015 (171st game)

Manning threw for his 50,000th yard Nov. 5, 2017 (209th game)

*In San Francisco, Manning started his 208th consecutive regular-season game, tying his brother, Peyton, for the second-longest consecutive starts streak by a quarterback in NFL history. Peyton Manning was there to see his brother reach the milestone. They spent time together on the field during warmups. Peyton Manning started 208 straight games for the Indianapolis Colts from 1998-2010.

*Manning engineered his 35th game-winning, regular-season drive (drives in the fourth quarter or overtime in which the led the Giants from a tie or deficit to win the game) in the Giants' 12-9 victory against the Chiefs on Nov. 19. At the end of the season, he was tied with Carson Palmer for fourth among active players, behind Tom Brady (42), Drew Brees (41), and Ben Roethlisberger (30). Palmer has since retired. Atlanta's Matt Ryan has led 33 game-winning drives.

*Manning's 434 yards vs. the Eagles on Dec. 17 raised his season total to 3,070 yards. It was the 13th consecutive season he has thrown for at least 3,000 yards tying him with his brother, Peyton, for the third-longest streak in NFL history. Hall of Famer Brett Favre threw for at least 3,000 yards in 18 consecutive seasons, and Brees has an active streak of 14 straight years.

*Manning's 252 passing yards in the first two quarters were his most ever in the first half of a game. He has thrown for more yardage than that in the second half several times.

*Manning has now thrown 51 touchdown passes vs. the Eagles, his highest total against a single opponent. He has thrown for 49 scores against Dallas.

*Manning completed 10 of 28 passes for 132 yards in the finale vs. Washington. The 10 completions were his fewest in a full game since Nov. 4, 2012, when he completed 10 of 24 passes in a loss to Pittsburgh.

*Geno Smith made his Giants debut when he played the final two series of the Giants' loss to the Rams on Nov. 5. He threw two incomplete passes to become the first Giants quarterback other than Manning to throw a pass since Ryan Nassib was five-for-five at Minnesota on Dec. 27, 2015.

*Smith started and played the entire game at Oakland and completed 21 of 36 passes for 212 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions for a passer rating of 84.5. He was sacked three times for losses totaling 12 yards, and lost two fumbles.

*Smith was the first quarterback other than Manning to start a game for the Giants since Kurt Warner started at Arizona on Nov. 14, 2004, a span of 4,768 days between non-Manning starts.

*Smith started for the first time since Oct. 23, 2016, when he was with the Jets against Baltimore and threw eight passes, completing four, before suffering a season-ending torn ACL.

*Smith's 34 passes were the most by a Giants quarterback other than Manning since Warner threw 36 in his next-to-last start, on Nov. 7, 2004 against Chicago. Since Manning became the starter two weeks later, David Carr's 14 passes on Oct. 11, 2009 — against the Raiders — were the most thrown by another Giants quarterback.

*When Smith threw a three-yard pass to Shane Vereen for his first completion, the running back became the first Giants player to catch a pass from a quarterback other than Manning since Myles White caught a 24-yard touchdown from Ryan Nassib at Minnesota on Dec. 27, 2015.

*Smith was the first quarterback to start for both the Giants and Jets.

*Rookie Davis Webb, the Giants' third-round draft choice in 2017, was inactive for the season's first 15 games. He was in uniform but did not play in the final game.

Running Backs

*Orleans Darkwa played in 15 games with 11 starts (he was inactive at Tampa Bay on Oct. 1 with a back injury) and led the team with career-high totals of 171 carries, 751 yards, and five rushing touchdowns. He averaged 4.4 yards a carry.

*Darkwa had the Giants' only two 100-yard rushing games of the season with 117 yards at Denver on Oct. 15, and a career-high 154 yards on 20 carries vs. Washington on Dec. 31. A Giants back has exceeded 100



rushing yards in each of the last three season finales. On Jan. 3, 2016, Rashad Jennings ran for 170 yards vs. Philadelphia (Darkwa's 154 yards was the highest total by a Giants back since that performance). In 2016, Paul Perkins ran for 102 yards when the Giants ended their season in Washington.

*Darkwa averaged 7.7 yards per carry against the Redskins. The last Giants back to average at least that many yards on at least 20 carries was Tiki Barber on Dec. 30, 2006 in Washington. Barber ran for 234 yards on 23 carries, a 10.2-yard average.

*The Giants took a 6-0 lead against Washington when Darkwa took a handoff, stepped through a hole in the center of the line, and ran 75 yards for a touchdown just 17 seconds into the game. It was the Giants' longest run from scrimmage since Nov. 16, 2008, when Ahmad Bradshaw ran for 77 yards vs. Baltimore. Bradshaw was tackled at the two-yard line. Darkwa's score was the Giants' longest touchdown run since Bradshaw's 88-yarder in Buffalo on Dec. 23, 2007.

*Rookie Wayne Gallman played in each of the final 13 games after he was inactive for the first three games. Gallman finished second on the team with 476 rushing yards on 111 carries. He was also fifth on the Giants with 34 receptions for 193 yards, including a four-yard touchdown in his NFL debut at Tampa Bay on Oct. 1.

*Gallman made his debut at Tampa Bay. In that game, Gallman finished with team-high totals of 11 carries for 42 yards, and he added two catches for eight yards, including a four-yard touchdown in the third quarter. Gallman was the first Giants running back to score a touchdown of any kind in his pro debut since Sept. 11, 2005, when Brandon Jacobs — also a fourth-round draft choice — scored on a five-yard run in a victory against Arizona. He was the first Giants back to score his first career touchdown on a reception since Da'Rel Scott, who caught a 23-yard scoring pass from Eli Manning against Denver on Sept. 15, 2013. Gallman was also the first Giants running back to catch a touchdown pass in his first NFL game since Sept. 9, 1990, when Rodney Hampton — the team's first-round selection that year — scored on a 12-yard throw from Phil Simms in a 27-20 victory against Philadelphia.

*The following week, Gallman rushed for 57 yards vs. the Chargers. His 99 rushing yards, were the highest total by a Giants running back in his first two NFL games since Ron Dayne had 128 yards in 2000.

*Against Washington on Dec. 31, Gallman had season-high totals of 15 carries for 89 yards, a 5.9-yard average for the first time. He joined Darkwa to give the Giants multiple players with 15+ rush attempts and 5.9+ yards-per-attempt in the same game.

*Shane Vereen played in all 16 games and was third on the Giants in both rushing (164 yards on 45 carries) and receiving (44 catches for 253 yards). He also returned nine kickoffs for 196 yards (21.8-yard avg.).

*Vereen led the Giants with nine receptions in the season opener in Dallas, the second-highest regular-season total of his career. He caught 12 passes for New England against Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013. Vereen had 11 catches in Super Bowl XLIX vs. Seattle, a Super Bowl record for running backs.

*Vereen was the only non-quarterback to throw a pass for the Giants in 2017. But his option pass intended for Evan Engram on the Giants' first series in the victory against Kansas City was intercepted by safety Daniel Sorenson. Vereen was the first Giants player other than Manning to throw an interception since backup quarterback Curtis Painter on Dec. 29, 2013 vs. Washington (after Manning left the game with an ankle injury).

*Vereen was the first Giants running back to throw a pass since Dec. 24, 2005, when Tiki Barber tossed an incompletion in Washington. Amani Toomer was the intended receiver.

*Before Vereen, the last Giants player other than a quarterback to throw an interception was running back Bobby Duhon, against the St. Louis Cardinals on Nov. 28, 1971. On the first play of the game, Duhon's pass was picked off by defensive back Norm Thompson, leading to the first touchdown in a 24-7 Giants loss.

*Paul Perkins played in 11 games, including starts in each of the first four contests. He was inactive for four games, and did not play in one. Perkins finished with 41 carries for 90 yards and eight receptions for 46 yards.

Wide Receivers

*Second-year pro Sterling Shepard played in 11 games with 10 starts and led the Giants' wide receivers with 59 catches for 731 yards and two touchdowns. Shepard missed two games with an ankle injury, two with an illness, and the season finale with a neck injury.

*Shepard twice set his career high with 11 receptions and had the Giants' only three 100-yard receiving games of the season. He had 11 catches for a career-high 142 yards at San Francisco on Nov. 12, and 11 receptions for 139 yards vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 17. Shepard's 11-catch game vs. the 49ers was the first by a Giants player since Odell Beckham, Jr. had 11 at Philadelphia on Dec. 22, 2016. Shepard also caught seven passes for 133 yards at Philadelphia on Sept. 24. He has four career 100-yard games.

*Shepard scored both of his touchdowns on long catch-and-runs vs. Philadelphia: a career-long 77-yard reception in Lincoln Financial Field on Sept. 24, and a 67-yarder in MetLife Stadium on Dec. 17.

*Roger Lewis, Jr. was second among the team's wide-outs with 36 catches for 416 yards and two touchdowns. He scored on a 29-yard reception vs. the Chargers on

2017 SEASON IN REVIEW

*Odell Beckham, Jr. — who was inactive in the season opener in Dallas because of an ankle injury suffered in the preseason — played in four games before suffering a fractured ankle against the Chargers on Oct. 8. He finished with 25 receptions for 302 yards and three touchdowns — on catches of 10 and four yards at Philadelphia, and 48 yards vs. Los Angeles in the game in which he was hurt. He finished with 25 receptions for 302 yards and three touchdowns — on catches of 10 and four yards at Philadelphia, and 48 yards vs. Los Angeles in the game in which he was hurt.

*Beckham's first appearance of the season was as a reserve vs. Detroit on Sept. 18. It was the first game in which he played as a reserve but did not start since he made his NFL debut vs. Atlanta on Oct. 5, 2014.

*Beckham's nine receptions vs. the Eagles on Sept. 24 increased his career total to 301, in his first 45 games, an NFL record for the fewest number of games needed to reach 300. Anquan Boldin held the old record of 47 games.

*The game in Philadelphia was the 10th in which Beckham had at least two touchdown catches, a Giants record. Beckham had been tied at nine with Joe Morrison (1959-72) and Homer Jones (1964-69).

*Beckham's 25 receptions increased his career total to 313 and moved him into 10th place on the Giants' all-time list, five behind another former first-round draft choice, Hakeem Nicks (who caught five passes from quarterbacks other than Manning).

*Tavarres King played in eight games with three starts, and had 18 receptions for 240 yards and three touchdowns.

*Against Philadelphia on Dec. 17, King caught just two passes, but he made the most of them, scoring on touchdowns of 13 yards in the first quarter and 57 yards in the third. King later left the game with a concussion and did not play in the final two games.

*Brandon Marshall played in the first five games before suffering a season-ending ankle injury against the Chargers on Oct. 8. The 12-year veteran and first-year Giant finished with 18 catches for 154 yards.

*Rookie free agent Travis Rudolph had eight receptions for 101 yards, with a long catch of 29 yards. Darius Powe made his NFL debut with two catches for 13 yards vs. Dallas on Dec. 10, but broke his foot in the game, sidelining him for the remainder of the season. Hunter Sharp played in the final two games and caught five passes for 54 yards, including a 16-yard touchdown in the season finale vs. Washington. He became the 50th different receiver to catch a regular-season touchdown pass from Manning.

Tight Ends

*Evan Engram, the Giants' 2017 first-round draft

choice, played in the first 15 games with 11 starts (he missed the season finale with a rib injury). He finished the season with team-high totals of 64 catches and six touchdowns. His 722 receiving yards were just nine less than Shepard's team-high 731.

*Engram's 64 receptions was the fifth-highest total by a tight end in team history. The top spot is held by Jeremy Shockey (74 catches in 2002). Mark Bavaro (1986) and Shockey (2006) had 66-catch seasons, and Shockey caught 65 passes in 2005.

*Engram was the first rookie tight end to lead the Giants in receptions. His six touchdown catches were a franchise record for a rookie tight end, surpassing Bob Tucker's previous record of five, set in 1970. Engram set the mark on a 10-yard pass from Smith at Oakland. *Engram was among the most productive rookie pass-catchers in franchise history:

*Jerrell Adams played in all 16 games with one start and had eight catches for 92 yards.

Offensive Line

*The Giants used 10 different starting offensive line combinations, their highest single-season total since the 1970 merger. That was the NFL's third-highest total in 2017 behind Detroit and Green Bay, which each used 11.

*John Jerry was the only lineman to start all 16 games. He started four games at right guard and 12 at left guard. Jerry has the Giants' longest active regular-season starting streak, at 39 games.

*Third-year pro Ereck Flowers started the first 15 games at left tackle before missing the season finale with a groin injury.

*Justin Pugh started all eight games in which he played, three at left guard and five at right tackle. A back injury prevented Pugh from playing in the other eight games, including the season's final seven games. He was placed on injured reserve on Dec. 14.

*Weston Richburg started the season's first four games at center before suffering a concussion at Tampa Bay on Oct. 1. He was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 4. Brett Jones started the final 12 games at center.

*Rookie free agent Chad Wheeler started five games — three at right tackle, one as an extra lineman, and the season finale at left tackle. In the last of those games, rookie sixth-round draft choice Adam Bisnowaty made his NFL debut as the starter at right tackle. It was just the second time since the 1970 merger the Giants started two rookie offensive tackles. On Dec. 6, 2015, Flowers and Bobby Hart started at left and right tackle, respectively, against the Jets. Hart was released a day before the final game of the 2017 season.

*Jon Halapio played in his first 10 career games, starting the last six at right guard.

*Jerry suffered a concussion in the first quarter of the season-ending 18-10 victory over Washington and was replaced by John Greco, who joined the team on Nov. 14. The Giants' offensive line for most of that game had Jones at center, Halapio and Greco at guard and Wheeler and Bisnowaty at tackle. Of those players, only Jones and Wheeler were on the opening-day roster, and none of them started a game until Week 5, when Jones replaced Richburg at center.

Defense

*Safety Landon Collins led the Giants in tackles for the third consecutive season, with 99 tackles (74 solo), 23 more than runner-up Damon Harrison. He finished with 108 and 125 tackles in his first two seasons.

*Collins was selected as a starter on the NFC Pro Bowl team, his second straight appearance in the game. He was the only Giants player elected.

*Collins earned his third NFC Defensive Player of the Week Award after registering 14 tackles (10 solo) and an interception in a 12-9 overtime victory over Kansas City on Nov. 19.

*Collins fractured his forearm on Dec. 24 in Arizona, was placed on injured reserve two days later, and missed the season finale vs. Washington. That ended his team-long starting streak at 47 games (plus one playoff game). Before the injury, Collins had started every game in his three-year career. Because of the injury, Collins was unable to play in the Pro Bowl.

*Jason Pierre-Paul started all 16 games and led the Giants with 8.5 sacks. It was the fourth time in his eight Giants seasons he has led the team in sacks. The 8.5 sacks was his third-highest total, after 16.5 sacks in 2011 and 12.5 in 2014.

*Olivier Vernon, the 2016 sacks leader, was second in 2017 with 6.5, despite missing four games with an ankle injury. Vernon's streak of consecutive games played ended at 84 when he suffered an ankle injury that forced him to miss four contests from Oct. 8-Nov. 5.

*Linebacker Devon Kennard, who had 4.5 sacks as a rookie in 2014, and then 1.0 in 2015-16, had 4.0 sacks in 2017.

*Cornerbacks Janoris Jenkins and Ross Cockrell tied for the team lead with three interceptions. Jenkins returned two of his picks for touchdowns, a 43-yarder at Denver on Oct. 15, and a 53-yarder at Washington on Nov. 23. He was the first Giants player to score twice on interception returns in the same season since safety Percy Ellsworth in 1998. Jenkins played in 10 games, missing six with an ankle injury (he was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 29), and one due to suspension.

*Harrison started all 16 games for the second year in a row with the Giants and the fifth consecutive season overall (including three with the Jets). He was second on the team with 76 tackles (51 solo), including 1.5 sacks.

*Vernon and Harrison intercepted passes in consecutive games vs. San Francisco and Kansas City, the first career pick for each. It was first time Giants defensive linemen intercepted passes in back-to-back games since Nov. 2-9, 1952 — when it was actually one player. Defensive end Jim Duncan picked off throws in victories on the road against the Chicago Cardinals, and in the Polo Grounds vs. San Francisco.

*Second-year safety Darian Thompson also started every game and finished third on the team with 75 tackles (61 solo). He also had one interception and six passes defended.

*Defensive tackle Dalvin Tomlinson was the third consecutive Giants second-round draft choice to start all 16 games as a rookie, joining Collins (2015) and Shepard (2016). Richburg, the 2014 second-round selection, played in all 16 games, but started "only" 15. Tomlinson was the first Giants rookie defensive lineman to

2017 SEASON IN REVIEW

start 16 games since Barry Cofield in 2006.

*Tomlinson was selected to the Pro Football Writers All-Rookie team.

*Linebacker Kelvin Sheppard, playing in his 100th regular-season game, picked up his first two career interceptions in the Dec. 31 season finale vs. Washington. He was the first Giants linebacker with two interceptions in a game since Dec. 7, 1997, when Jessie Armstead picked off two passes in Philadelphia. Sheppard also had six tackles (five solo) in the game.

*Linebacker and defensive captain Jonathan Casillas started all eight games in which he played, but missed the remaining eight games with a neck injury that eventually landed him on injured reserve on Dec. 6. Casillas had 34 tackles (24 solo).

*Rookie linebacker Calvin Munson played in 14 games with five starts, and finished fifth on the team with 55 tackles (35 solo). He had 2.0 sacks. When Munson started at middle linebacker vs. Detroit in Week 2, he became the first rookie free agent linebacker to start for the Giants since Mark Herzlich vs. Philadelphia and at New Orleans on Nov. 20 and 28, 2011.

*Second-year pro B.J. Goodson had a Giants season-high 18 tackles (14 solo) in the season opener in Dallas. But Goodson did not play the following week and missed nine games with shin and ankle injuries, and finished the season on injured reserve.

Special Teams

*First-year kicker Aldrick Rosas made 18 of 25 field goal attempts, 20 of 23 extra point tries, and led the Giants with 74 points.

*Rosas made all three of his attempts from 50 or more

yards, succeeding from 50, 51, and 52 yards. His three field goals of at least 50 yards put him in a five-way for the most by a Giants kicker in a single season. Josh Brown holds the record with four in 2014.

*Rosas missed a field goal attempt in three consecutive games from Oct. 15-Nov. 5. It was the first time the Giants missed three-point tries in three consecutive games since Dec. 3-16, 2012, when the kicker was Lawrence Tynes.

*Brad Wing booted a career-high 95 punts and had a 44.1-yard gross average and a 36.7-yard net average. He placed 19 punts inside the 20. Wing also had the first two blocked punts of his career.

*Dwayne Harris, the return specialist who was a 2016 Pro Bowler, suffered a season-ending broken foot on Oct. 8 vs. the Chargers. Kalif Raymond, signed to the Giants' practice squad on Nov. 1 and the active roster on Nov. 14, had team-high totals of six punt returns (4.7-yard avg.) and 11 kickoff returns (16.9-yard avg.).

*Safety Nat Berhe led the Giants with 10 special teams tackles (seven solo). Andrew Adams (six solo) and Zak DeOssie (four solo) each had six.

*In his 11th season, DeOssie, the team's long-snapper, played in all 16 games for the 10th time. He has played in 172 regular-season games, the 11th-highest total in franchise history.



PAT SHURMUR

HEAD COACH

- Pat Shurmur was named the 18th head coach in Giants history on Jan. 22, 2018.
- A 20-year NFL coaching veteran, Shurmur joined the Giants after a two-year stint with the Minnesota Vikings, including the last 27 games as offensive coordinator. In 2017, he was named the NFL Assistant Coach of the Year by the Pro Football Writers Association.
- This is the second head coaching assignment for Shurmur, who led the Cleveland Browns from 2011-12.



MIKE SHULA

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

- Mike Shula is in his first season as the Giants' offensive coordinator.
- Shula is a 31-year coaching veteran. This is his 27th season as an NFL assistant, and he also served four years as the head coach at the University of Alabama. Shula spent the previous seven seasons with the Carolina Panthers, including the last five as offensive coordinator.



JAMES BETTCHER

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

- James Bettcher is in his first season as the Giants' defensive coordinator.
- Bettcher comes to the Giants after five seasons with the Arizona Cardinals, the last three as defensive coordinator. In those three years, the Cards' defense was consistently among the NFL's best in yardage allowed, ranking fifth in 2015 (321.7), second in 2016 (305.2) and sixth in 2017 (310.9). Arizona was also one of the league's most effective run-stopping units each season, finishing, respectively, sixth (91.3), ninth (94.9), and sixth again (89.6).



THOMAS MCGAUGHEY

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

- This season, Thomas McGaughey begins his second stint with the Giants and his first as the team's special teams coordinator. He has previously been a coordinator for three other NFL teams.
- McGaughey was the Giants' assistant special teams coach from 2007-10. Before rejoining the Giants, he was most recently the Carolina Panthers' special teams coordinator for two seasons. Initially hired as Carolina's assistant special teams coach in February of 2016, McGaughey was named special teams coordinator six months later when the late Bruce DeHaven transitioned to the role of senior advisor to special teams.



LOU ANARUMO

DEFENSIVE BACKS COACH

- Lou Anarumo is in his first season as the Giants' defensive backs coach, a position he held the previous six years with the Miami Dolphins.
- In 2017, strong safety Reshad Jones led the Dolphins with 122 tackles and was selected as a starter on the AFC Pro Bowl team. Cornerback Xavier Howard was one of 25 NFL players with at least four interceptions, including one he returned 30 yards for a touchdown.



ANTHONY BLEVINS

ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS COACH

- Anthony Blevins is in his first season as the Giants' assistant special teams coach. He spent the previous five years as a coaching assistant/special teams with the Arizona Cardinals.
- During his time with the Cardinals, Blevins helped special teamer Justin Bethel get selected to three consecutive Pro Bowls (2013-15) after leading the team in special teams tackles each season. Kicker Chandler Catanzaro tied the NFL record for the most consecutive field goals to begin a career (17) and established a franchise rookie record with 114 points in 2014.



BOBBY BLICK

DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

- Bobby Blick is in his second season as the Giants' defensive assistant.
- Blick came to the Giants from the Army West Point Football staff, where he was the director of player personnel in 2016. Prior his arrival at West Point, Blick served as special teams coordinator and director of recruiting at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama.



JOE DANOS

**PERFORMANCE MANAGER /
ASSISTANT STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH**

- Joe Danos is in his sixth season as the Giants' performance manager and assistant strength and conditioning coach.
- Danos came to the Giants from Florida State University, where he spent three seasons as an assistant strength and conditioning coach with the football team. Danos joined the Seminoles' staff in January 2010, following head strength and conditioning coach Vic Vitoria from Southern Methodist University, where he spent the previous three years (2007-09) serving as his top assistant.



GARY EMANUEL

DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

- Gary Emanuel, a 37-year coaching veteran, is in his first season as the Giants' defensive line coach.
- Emanuel spent the previous six seasons as the defensive line coach of the Indianapolis Colts. In 2017, Emanuel's group which included former Giants tackle Johnathan Hankins, who recorded 44 tackles and two sacks.



HAL HUNTER

OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

- Hal Hunter, who has 35 years of coaching experience on the collegiate and professional levels, is in his first season as the Giants' offensive line coach.
- Hunter's most recent NFL coaching stint was as the Cleveland Browns' offensive line coach in 2016, when left tackle Joe Thomas was selected to the last of his 10 consecutive Pro Bowls.



CRAIG JOHNSON

RUNNING BACKS COACH

- Craig Johnson is in his fifth season as the Giants' running backs coach, his 19th coaching in the NFL, and his 35th as a football coach.
- In 2017, Johnson was instrumental in the development of Wayne Gallman. A fourth-round draft choice, Gallman finished second on the team with 476 rushing yards, and fifth with 34 receptions.



ROB LEONARD

ASSISTANT LINEBACKERS COACH

- Rob Leonard is in his sixth season on the Giants' coaching staff, and his first as the team's assistant linebackers coach.
- Leonard was the team's assistant defensive line coach in 2017. He spent his first four seasons with the Giants as a defensive assistant.



BILL MCGOVERN

LINEBACKERS COACH

• Bill McGovern, who has more than three decades of coaching experience, is in his third season as the Giants' linebackers coach, and his sixth year in the NFL.

• In 2017, he helped develop young backers B.J. Goodson and Calvin Munson, who together accounted for 108 tackles despite missing a combined 11 games because of injuries. In 2016, the linebackers contributed significantly to the NFL's most-improved defense. Jonathan Casillas, voted the Giants' defensive captain by his teammates, finished second on the team with 92 tackles (59 solo).



PRATIK PATEL

**DIRECTOR OF PERFORMANCE NUTRITION/
ASSISTANT STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH**

• Pratik Patel is in his second season as the Giant's Director of Performance Nutrition/Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach.

• Patel came to the Giants from the University of Oregon, where he was the Athletic Department's Director of Sports Nutrition since October 2014. Patel's job was to develop and direct the Sports Nutrition Department and manage the daily nutrition needs for 18 athletic teams and sports.



TOM QUINN

ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS

• Tom Quinn is in his 13th consecutive season as a member of the Giants' coaching staff. This year he is an assistant special teams coach, the position he held in his first season with the team in 2006. In 2007, Quinn became the Giants' special teams coordinator, a position he held through the 2017 season.



RYAN ROEDER

QUALITY CONTROL/OFFENSE

• Ryan Roeder is in his sixth season as the Giants' offensive assistant coach.

• Roeder came to the Giants from Princeton University, where he served as tight ends coach and directed the kickoff return and punt return units. In 2012, he helped tight end Mark Hayes earn All-Ivy League honors.



TYKE TOLBERT

WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

- Tyke Tolbert, a 15-year NFL coaching veteran in his first season coaching the Giants' wide receivers, a position he previously held with Arizona, Buffalo, Carolina, and Denver.
- Tolbert spent the previous seven years with the Broncos, who won Super Bowl 50 in February 2016.



DESHEA TOWNSEND

ASSISTANT DEFENSIVE BACKS COACH

- Deshea Townsend, a former 13-year NFL players, is in his first season as the Giants' assistant defensive backs coach and his fifth season as an NFL coach. Townsend spent the previous two years as the Tennessee Titans' secondary backs coach.
- Townsend won two Super Bowls (XL and XLIII) as a player with the Steelers.



LUNDA WELLS

TIGHT ENDS COACH

- Lunda Wells is in his seventh season on the Giants' coaching staff and his first as the team's tight ends coach.
- Wells spent the previous five seasons as the team's assistant offensive line coach, first under Pat Flaherty and then Mike Solari. In 2017, Wells helped tutor a line that was constantly in transition. The Giants used 10 different starting combinations, their highest single-season total since the 1970 merger. That was the NFL's third-highest total in 2017 behind Detroit and Green Bay, which each used 11.



AARON WELLMAN

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH

- Aaron Wellman is in his third season as the Giants' strength and conditioning coach and third in the NFL following a 20-year career at the Division I collegiate level.
- When he arrived in 2016, Wellman significantly changed the Giants' offseason and in-season training regimens, and the result was a substantial decrease in the number of season-ending injuries suffered by Giants players.



BEN WILKERSON

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

- Ben Wilkerson is in his first season as the Giants' assistant offensive line coach, the same position he held the previous three seasons for the Chicago Bears.
- Wilkerson helped coach an offensive line that paved the way for Jordan Howard to rush for 2,435 yards and 15 touchdowns in the 2016-17 seasons. Last year, the Bears ranked 11th in the NFL with a 4.2-yard average per carry.



This offseason, the Giants actively participated in the NFL's free agency signing period. Notable acquisitions include LB **Alec Ogletree** (acquired via trade), RB **Jonathan Stewart**, and LT **Nate Solder**. All three players are expected to contribute immediately this season.

LB ALEC OGLETREE



Originally a 1st-round (30th pick overall) draft choice by the St. Louis Rams in 2013, veteran linebacker **Alec Ogletree** was traded to the Giants on March 14, 2018 for 4th and 6th-round draft picks. Ogletree has started all 67 regular-season games in which he's played, missing only four games in 2015 due to an ankle injury. He had 155 tackles as a rookie, 169 the following season, 171 in 2016, and 95 last year. In his career, Ogletree has totaled 645 tackles (475 solo), 5.5 sacks, 6 interceptions (including 2 returned for touchdowns), 43 passes defended, 13 forced fumbles and 2 fumble recoveries.

QUOTABLE: "He gives us our defensive quarterback. He was a two-time captain with the Rams, voted on by his teammates. He's a leader, and that's very important to us."

- GENERAL MANAGER **DAVE GETTLEMAN**

Originally a first-round (17th pick overall) draft choice by the New England Patriots in 2011, the Giants signed left tackle **Nate Solder** as a free agent on March 15, 2018. Solder has played in 98 regular-season games with 95 starts - 81 at left tackle, 11 at right tackle, and 3 as a tackle-eligible tight end. He also started all 16 postseason games in which he's played, including the last 13 at left tackle. Solder served as a pillar on an offense that is annually one of the NFL's most prolific, and helped protect the blind side of future Hall of Fame quarterback Tom Brady.

QUOTABLE: "He's really interested in the full process of football - from training, to playing, to recovery - everything involved with the game. That's why he's a true pro."

- HEAD COACH **PAT SHURMUR**

T NATE SOLDER



RB JONATHAN STEWART



Originally a first-round (13th pick overall) draft choice by the Carolina Panthers in 2008, veteran running back **Jonathan Stewart** was signed as a free agent by the Giants on March 14, 2018. Stewart has played in 131 regular-season games with 64 starts, also starting in 6 of his 7 postseason game appearances. Stewart is Carolina's career rushing leader with 7,318 yards and 1,699 carries. His 51 rushing touchdowns rank 2nd in team history behind quarterback Cam Newton's 54, and his 58 total scores are 2nd to wide receiver Steve Smith's 75. Entering his 11th year in the NFL and a 2015 Pro Bowler, Stewart adds experience and leadership to a young group of Giants running backs.

QUOTABLE: "Jonathan Stewart is a great running back and has been doing it for a long time. I ask him a lot of questions and get to see what he's seeing, and come in and try it the next play."

- RUNNING BACK **SAQUON BARKLEY**



2018 DRAFT CLASS

RB SAQUON BARKLEY



With the No. 2 pick in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Giants selected Penn State running back **Saquon Barkley**. Barkley finished his collegiate career with 671 rushing attempts for 3,843 yards (5.7-yard avg.) and 43 touchdowns, averaging 101.1 yards per game on the ground. Barkley finished his career as Penn State's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns (43) and total touchdowns (53), and capped his career as the school's career all-purpose yards leader (5,538). Barkley became the only player in school history and just the 4th in the Big Ten to gain 3,000 rushing and 1,000 receiving yards in a career.

QUOTABLE: "He's very smart; he gets it in a lot of ways and I think that's a great place to start. He's super talented, and the third part that's stuck out to me is that he embraces work. The mind is always looking for a way out and he doesn't."

- HEAD COACH **PAT SHURMUR**

With the No. 34 pick in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Giants selected standout guard **Will Hernandez** from the University of Texas-El Paso. A four-year starter, Hernandez was named to the AP All-America 2nd team in both 2016 and 2017, becoming the first UTEP player to receive back-to-back AP All-America honors. Hernandez was the first UTEP offensive lineman since 2009 to be named to the All-Conference USA first team, as well as the first ever selected to first-team all-conference in consecutive seasons. In Hernandez's 4 seasons, the Miners allowed 1.47 sacks per game, including one or no sacks in 27 games, and zero sacks in 12 contests.

LB LORENZO CARTER



With the No. 66 pick in the 2018 NFL Draft, the New York Giants selected outside linebacker **Lorenzo Carter** from Georgia. Carter played in 54 games with 26 starts at Georgia, totaling 165 tackles (82 solo), 14.0 sacks, 20.5 tackles for losses, 7 forced fumbles, 6 fumble recoveries (including 1 he returned for a touchdown), and 54 quarterback pressures. His 14.0 sacks tied him with Mo Lewis (1987-90) for 15th place in school history. In his senior campaign, Carter was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week after posting 7 tackles, 1.0 sack, 2 forced fumbles and 2 fumble recoveries at Notre Dame.

With the 69th pick in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Giants selected defensive tackle **B.J. Hill** from North Carolina State. At his time at NC State, Hill played in 51 games with 44 starts, totaling 187 tackles (80 solo), 26.5 tackles for losses, 9.0 sacks, 2 forced fumbles, 2 fumble recoveries, 11 quarterback pressures, and 10 pass breakups. He started all 13 games during his senior year, and earned the team's Bo Rein Award for vital contribution in an unsung role.

QUOTABLE: "B.J. Hill is the counterpart to Will Hernandez on the other side of the line. He's tough, gritty and we're excited to have him."

With the 108th pick in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Giants selected quarterback **Kyle Lauletta** from the University of Richmond. Lauletta's career average of 8.8 yards per attempt led all FCS players, and his 758 pass completions rank 8th in Colonial Athletic Association history.

He finished his career with 103 tackles (51 solo), 23 tackles for losses, and 5.5 sacks.

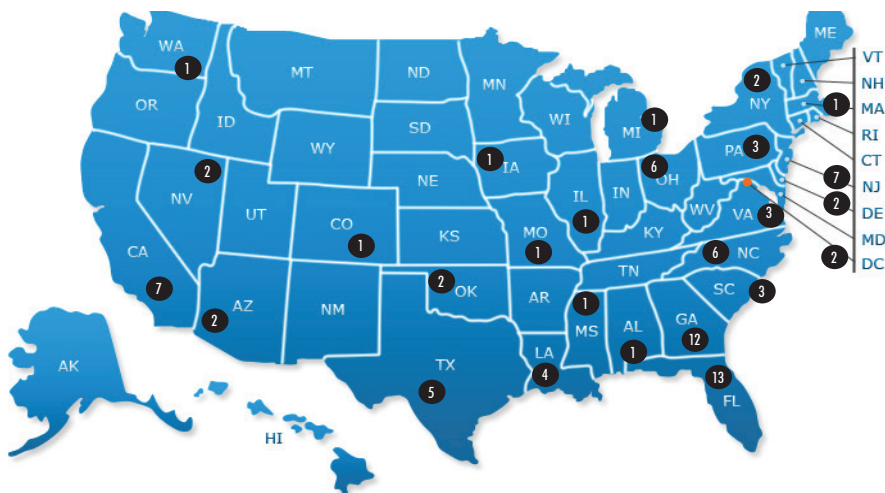

PAT SHURMUR

NFL Record: 10-23 (Overall)

NFL Head Coach: 3rd Year



Pat Shurmur was named the 18th head coach in Giants history on January 22, 2018.

A 20-year NFL coaching veteran, Shurmur joined the Giants after a two-year stint with the Minnesota Vikings, including the last 27 games as Offensive Coordinator. In 2017, he was named the NFL Assistant Coach of the Year by the Pro Football Writers Association.

Shurmur has been a part of teams that have qualified for nine postseason berths, won seven division titles, and advanced to one Super Bowl (he was on the Eagles' staff when they played in Super Bowl XXXIX vs. New England to cap the 2004 season).

In 2017, the Vikings were one of four teams with an NFL-best 13-3 record and won the NFC North Championship.

Prior to his arrival in Minnesota, Shurmur spent three seasons as the Offensive Coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles, his second stint with the club. In his first season in Philly, the Eagles set franchise records in points (442), total net yards (6,676), touchdowns (53), passing yards (4,406) and fewest turnovers (19) en route to an NFC East title.

Before joining the Eagles, Shurmur was the Browns' Head Coach from 2011-2012, the first head coaching opportunity of his career. Shurmur took over in Cleveland after two seasons as the Offensive Coordinator of the St. Louis Rams (2009-2010). The first overall selection in the 2010 NFL Draft, quarterback Sam Bradford was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year after setting league rookie records for completions (354) and attempts (590), while his 3,512 passing yards were the second-most by a rookie in history at the time.

Shurmur's NFL coaching career began in Philadelphia, where he was an Eagles assistant for 10 seasons under Andy Reid (1999-2008). He served as the team's quarterbacks coach from 2002-2008 and helped develop Donovan McNabb into a three-time Pro Bowler during his tenure.

In his first three seasons in Philadelphia (1999-2001), Shurmur was the Eagles' tight ends coach, and helped develop Chad Lewis, who was selected to three Pro Bowls.



BILL BELICHIK

NFL Record: 250-118 (Overall)

NFL Head Coach: 24th Year



Bill Belichick completed his 43rd season as an NFL coach in 2017 and is in his 19th season as head coach of the New England Patriots. Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win five Super Bowl titles. In 2017, Belichick won a division title for the ninth consecutive season and won and eighth conference championship as a head coach, extending his NFL record in both categories. Belichick won 13 regular season games for an NFL-record seventh time and secured his 15th AFC East Division title as Patriots head coach, the most in NFL history.

Belichick enters 2018 with the most wins among active head coaches and is currently third all-time with 278 total victories as a head coach. Belichick's winning percentage of .683 ranks first in NFL history among coaches with 150 or more wins.

Belichick, who was hired by Patriots Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft on Jan. 27, 2000, is in his 19th season with the Patriots. In 18 seasons, Belichick has so far delivered five Super Bowl championships, eight conference titles, 15 division crowns and 27 playoff victories, while posting an overall record of 241-84. Belichick directed the Patriots to victories in Super Bowls XXXVI (2001), XXXVIII (2003), XXXIX (2004), XLIX (2014) and LI (2016), and in 2007 he became the only NFL head coach to guide his team to a 16-0 regular season.

Despite an NFL system designed to ensure parity, Belichick's program has produced a remarkable run of sustained on-field success. From 2000-16, the Patriots won 74.0 percent of their regular-season games (201-71), among the highest winning percentages of any major American professional sports team over that span. Belichick has led the Patriots to a winning record in each of the last 16 seasons.

Belichick's 28 career playoff wins are the most all-time among head coaches, while New England's 14 playoff victories from 2000-09 are tied for the most in any decade in NFL history. He has compiled a career playoff record of 28-11, with his .718 playoff winning percentage placing him third in NFL history. Since the beginning of the 2003 season, New England is 42-6 (.875) in regular-season games following a loss, dropping back-to-back regular-season contests just six times over that span.

Beckham reached 300 receptions in only 45 games, making him the quickest player in NFL history to reach achieve the feat, breaking Anquan Boldin's record of 47 games.

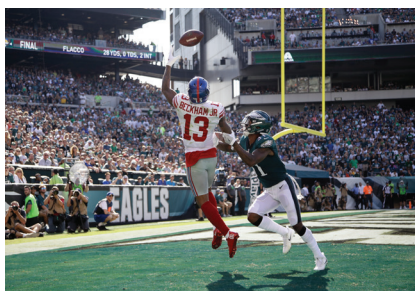

Giants Notebook

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. - Trivial fact of the day: Zak DeOssie will play in his 48th career preseason game Friday night when the Giants face the Jets in the annual MetLife Bowl. Trivial fact two: that will be one less than Eli Manning, who has played in more preseason games than any active player in a Giants uniform.

Although the two longest-tenured Giants and close friends play vastly different positions, they have much in common. Both are longtime team captains (Manning each of the last 11 seasons, DeOssie each of the last seven). They are secure in their positions; Manning is preparing for his 15th season as the starting quarterback; DeOssie has no training camp competition as he settles into his 12th season as the team's long snapper.

About those preseason games. Though they have no relevance to the regular season and leaving the field in good health is the primary goal, Manning has always been convincing when speaking about why he considers them important — getting in sync with his receivers, seeing defenses that differ from those he faces in practice, and this year, working in a new offense and getting a feel for Pat Shurmur's playcalling.

DeOssie has none of those concerns, but even with all of his experience, he doesn't discount the significance of August games.

"I think over time you learn, as a specialist, to love the preseason games," he said this week. "You might come into camp feeling very good and getting into a groove and then reality sets in. Then you've got to deal with ups and downs of being a specialist, and nobody's perfect. You want to be able to work through all the kinks before we go live week one, and that's how I view it. A lot of people ask me how it feels to play all through the fourth quarter and I prefer it; it gets my mind right. You can never replicate game-winning kicks and last-minute situations, which I think are paramount to getting your mind right for the season."

That business-like attitude is one reason DeOssie quickly endeared himself to new coach Pat Shurmur.

"He's got a lot of experience," Shurmur said. "He is very, very, very accomplished as a long snapper, he's got a great way about him and has a great feel for things. He's seen a lot and so he's doing a lot of things in terms of leadership."

DeOssie, 33, has played in 172 regular-season games, plus 12 postseason contests, but he has the same emotions prior to a preseason game as he does when the games count in the standings.

"Absolutely," he said. "My job is binary, good or bad. It's a volatile job, always has been since day one, since 2007, so all those feelings are still there. You learn to embrace those feelings when they come your way."

DeOssie was involved in big plays in each of the Giants' first two preseason games. In the opener vs. Cleveland, he recovered a fumble by returner C.J. Board at the Browns' 14-yard line. Three plays later, Jalen Simmons scored the Giants' only touchdown of the game on a five-yard run.

"I'd like to save that for the regular season, but you've got to capitalize on whatever opportunities come your way," DeOssie said. "Preseason is what it is, but you learn to love it over time the longer you're in it as a specialist. You think it's necessary."

In the victory last week in Detroit, DeOssie was the snapper when Aldrick Rosas kicked a 55-yard field goal.

"It feels great," DeOssie said. "We live and die with every kick, every punt, every snap. Getting any sort of big situations under our belt is just a confidence booster going into the season."

In his dozen Giants seasons, DeOssie has worked with numerous partners, including punter/holders Jeff Feagles, Matt Dodge, Steve Weatherford and Brad Wing, plus kickers Lawrence Tynes, John Carney, Josh Brown, Robbie Gould and Rosas.

"It's just been a wild experience," DeOssie said.

This year, he is breaking in a new punter and holder in Riley Dixon, who arrived in the offseason via a trade with Denver.

"The adjustment period takes place in the spring, and we had that opportunity to get to know each other," DeOssie said. "I've been blessed with some great holders over the years, guys who are athletes who have great hand-eye coordination. Riley, not only is he an exceptional punter but a great holder, too, so that makes me sleep well at night."

The fact that the Giants are confident enough in his talent and work ethic is another reason for DeOssie to feel secure.

"I'm just grateful for the opportunity to be here," he said. "Whether or not they bring somebody in is above my pay grade, and I don't waste any time on that. Any opportunity to compete, be put in tough situations and to come out on top, that's the whole point why we do this."

Even in a preseason game.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Odell Beckham, Jr., who has practiced but not played in a game, and Saquon Barkley, who played in one game but is not currently practicing, continue to be the subject of numerous inquiries from reporters as the Giants prepare for their third preseason game.

And coach Pat Shurmur continues to be guarded in his responses regarding two of his key offensive players.

The Giants return to action Friday night in the annual MetLife Bowl against the Jets. Might Beckham, who in practices shows no signs that he had surgery last October to repair a broken ankle, make his 2018 debut?

"We'll see," Shurmur said today. "...You knew I was going to give you a real short answer on that one."

Is Beckham physically ready to play in a game?

"He's doing really well in practice here, so we'll see where he's at," said Shurmur, who then repeated for perhaps the 10th time in training camp his mindset about the three-time Pro Bowl receiver. "Again, coming back from injury, so we'll try to be smart with him."

Barkley, whose 39-yard run on the first play was a highlight of the preseason opener vs. Cleveland on Aug. 9, has not practiced since mildly straining his hamstring catching a long pass in practice eight days ago. He did not play last week in Detroit.

Questioned how Barkley is, Shurmur said, "Coming back. As we all know, he tweaked his hamstring, and he's training really well and doing more and more each day. We like the path he's on. ... We'll see how it plays out."

Is the coach being more conservative with one of his star players in the preseason than he would be in the regular season?

"Conservative?" Shurmur said. "I don't know about conservative. I think we would want to always try to be smart. I'm not really fond of the word 'conservative'. I just think we want to be smart."

One player with a keen interest in the well-being of Beckham and Barkley is quarterback Eli Manning.

"Not concerned with Odell, just because we got years of experience, and you get a lot of reps in practice, which is important and nice," Manning said. "We've had game experience together. Now Saquon, that's different, just because he's a rookie and missing some valuable time. I know he's getting mental reps. It's different than practice reps, it's different than game reps. Hopefully, he can get back soon."

Beckham's 313 regular-season receptions on throws from Manning ties him with Hakeem Nicks as the most prolific catcher of Manning passes. In practice, the fifth-year pro is running, cutting and jumping as he always has. Despite their productive history and the receiver's return to good health, Manning and Beckham are putting in extra time to get back in sync, both during and, quite noticeably, after practice, when they often work by themselves.

"(We) just work on some things — work on a route that maybe we missed, or a new route maybe we missed in practice," Manning said. "Or maybe I work the other side of the field, because of the coverage, we didn't get the work there. Just because we missed some time in the spring, just try to make sure you get those routes, kind of get that throw so when you get a game, it's not the first time you're throwing it. Just get an extra rep on a few things."

Because he hasn't been practicing, Barkley's recent work with Manning has been more mental than physical. The rookie back has lived up to his reputation as an inveterate asker of questions on the field and in meetings.

"I think it's a good way to stay engaged," Manning said. "It obviously shows that he's watching practice, he's listening to the game plan and so he wants to understand what his route would be on this concept or on this check and this and that. So it shows he is engaged, he is listening. He has good questions, so it's clear in his mind and that's a great thing to have. I encourage all those rookies, 'Ask questions, if you don't know, ask. That's what we're here for. Don't go out there not knowing what your assignment is, ask us and go do it right and play fast. We always want you to do that.'"

Certainly makes sense. Now we just have to wait for Barkley to play again to put into action what he's learned.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The impact Victor Cruz had on the Giants' organization was demonstrated soon after the sensational receiver announced his retirement today when Pat Shurmur — a coach Cruz never played for — opened his daily news conference with a tribute to a player he knew only as an opponent.

"What a great Giant," Shurmur said. "I remember playing against him when I was in Philly, and we were certainly well aware of the impact he could have on a ball game. I had a chance to meet him and be around him, and he certainly doesn't need an invite from me, but much like all the ex-Giants, I look forward to seeing him at practice any time he wants to be here. So, congratulations to him."

Cruz, who will become an NFL analyst for ESPN, played in only 70 regular-season games. But his 303 receptions place him 11th on the franchise list. He burst onto the scene with a three-touchdown performance in the 2010 preseason game vs. the Jets. In Cruz's first regular season in 2011, he set a franchise record with 1,586 yards on 82 receptions, one of them a short toss from Eli Manning that he turned into the only 99-yard play in the 94-year history of the Giants. He caught a touchdown pass in the Super Bowl XLVI victory against New England.

The following year, Cruz caught 86 passes, including a career-high 10 for touchdowns.

"Victor had a terrific career and a great Giant, and a guy who kind of exploded onto the scene in this preseason game versus the Jets ... in 2010," Manning said. "He kind of got injured, missed that whole year. 2011 is when he came on and really just had a great feel for the offense, for his routes in that slot, and he was tough to cover. Running down the field, breaking in, we gave him a lot of options. He mastered some of those concepts and gave him a great opportunity to get open and make big plays for us. Tremendous player, and a great guy. He was in the locker room a few weeks ago. I got to talk with him and hang out with him. Obviously, I wish him all the best going forward. I think he's gone to the dark side and has gone into the media (laughter). I wish him all the best going over there."

Manning's list of Cruz highlights coincides with those of most Giants fans.

"Obviously, the Jets game 2011, second to last game of the season, a 99-yarder just on a little option route," Manning

said. "Catch it 10 yards and make the corner miss, and then outrun the safeties for a huge play at the time — leading to us making the playoffs in the first place. Obviously, the touchdown in the Super Bowl over the middle. There's too many, a lot to choose from, a bunch of huge plays."

*Count Mark Herzlich among those who believe he was incorrectly penalized for "lowering the head to initiate contact" in the preseason game in Detroit last week. Herzlich was flagged for hitting Theo Riddick, but replays indicated the running back made the first contact. A new NFL rule outlaws such hits.

"That's not the intent of the rule," Herzlich said. "I'm not necessarily going to do things differently from that standpoint, but we do have to be careful to know what the intent of the rule is and what plays you can't do, so there's no real... You never want to be hitting with your head down anyways in any situation. It's good when it comes to players' safety."

*After Shurmur spoke about Cruz, he was asked about the importance of having former players involved with the current team.

"I think what's important is they understand what it means to be a Giant from a player's perspective, and they understand what it takes to win Super Bowls," Shurmur said. "I talk to everybody, not just players. I called some former (Giants) coaches as well, because I think it's important to hear their perspective, and I'm always looking for perspective. Maybe there's something that they say that might help me message the team, or maybe they'll tell me something that was really special to them as they were building a champion, and so I think it's important to embrace the great players from the past."

*The Giants return to action Friday night as the visiting team in their annual preseason game vs. the Jets, known as the MetLife Bowl. This is the 50th consecutive summer in which the teams will meet since the series began in 1969. The Giants won the 2017 meeting, 32-31, their second consecutive one-point victory against the Jets. They trail in the annual preseason series, 25-23-1, with the tie coming in 1972.

Manning (13, he missed the 2005 game with an elbow sprain) and Zak DeOssie (11) have played in the most Giants-Jets preseason games among current Giants. Their thoughts on the importance of the game:

Manning: "I look at it as the third preseason game and

a chance for us to go out there and play for an extended period, against a good defense and a good team. You want to go out there and execute well and feel good about where you are."

DeOssie: "That third preseason game, it's true what they say: guys are going a little bit harder, you get some more real season looks. It's definitely meaningful. Everyone wants to touch that coveted Snoopy trophy, bowl trophy, whatever it may be. It's familiar, we only play them once every four years (in the regular season), but we're familiar playing them this third game, it's the big game for pre-season."

*This is Shurmur's first MetLife Bowl.

"I've heard a little bit (about the "rivalry"), but I'm also a guy who thinks you can root for the Yankees and then root for the Mets," he said. "But you know, I'm a little off center. We're going to go out and compete with the Jets and try to do what we can to get our team right, and do what we can to try to win the game. That runs parallel, and I've heard there's a little bit of a rivalry here, so we'll deal with it. I've got a lot of respect for Todd Bowles and, certainly, we've already talked about one of their players, so we don't need to go into that anymore. I've got a lot of respect for what they are as an organization and I think we're both going to play this game with the same thing in mind — get our team better, find out what our team is all about."

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Patrick Omahah joined his fourth NFL team when he signed with the Giants as a free agent on March 16. As he did at each of his previous stops — Tampa Bay, Chicago and Jacksonville — the versatile guard quickly assimilated with his fellow linemen to form an organized group.

More than any other unit on a football team, unity and communication are vital on an offensive line. Omahah suggested today it's possible to come together quickly because of the personality traits of linemen.

"In my experience, most offensive linemen are pretty much the same guy as far as just how we behave, how we interact," Omahah said. "It's real smooth when it comes to fostering those relationships because of that inherit knowledge of one another even before we get a chance to really know each other. I think it's been a great experience getting to know these guys and go through this training camp process with them."

The Giants' new-look offensive line is developing into a tough, dependable unit. Which is fortunate, because coach Pat Shurmur, who is in his 20th consecutive season as an NFL offensive coach, understands the importance of both the O-line to the team's fortunes and for the linemen to mesh off the field so they can play as a singular detachment on it. Toward that end, he has all the players in each position group in close proximity in the locker room. Unlike in the past, all of the linemen are now situated at one end.

"It's that big oval shape in the locker room, I think you should sit with your position groups," Shurmur said. "We're going to go as far as that line will block for us. I think it's important that they're together in everything that they do. Even if they're sitting next to one another, they may talk about something that happened in practice or in a meeting that they wouldn't shout across the locker room about, so I think it's smart to sit with your position groups."

The new-look line has Nate Solder and Ereck Flowers at tackle, Omahah and Will Hernandez at guard, and Jon Halapio at center. Solder, Omahah and Hernandez, the rookie second-round draft choice, are newcomers to the Giants, and Flowers and Halapio are playing different positions than they did in 2017.

Because he has played for more teams than any of the other linemen, Omahah is the resident expert at discern-

ing what must be done to foster a sense of camaraderie among the linemen.

"Changing teams - if it's somebody in my particular situation who's done it more than once, I want to say it's something that does become easier," he said. "You know what to expect, outside of learning new plays - getting accustomed to new situations, new teammates, new locker rooms. In that regard, this has probably been the easiest move."

Omahah has done all he can to help the players who aren't accustomed to such change, including Flowers — who is entering his fourth NFL season, all with the Giants - and Hernandez, who spent the previous four years at Texas-El Paso.

"Pat's an amazing guy, amazing person, great teammate," Hernandez said. "The very first day that I met him, he showed me a lot of love and right away we clicked. Just funny story about him: the first time I ever saw him in person, I went up and was going to introduce myself and he asked me what my name was and just as I was about to answer, he says, 'You know what, your name's Max. You look like a Max.' And I'm like, 'Alright.' Ever since then, I'm Max."

"Eventually it caught on, and now I'm Max (to the other linemen). It just shows his personality, how cool he is and right away we clicked and it just translated from there to the rest of the guys. He's really brought us all together."

Flowers still carefully parses his words, but he clearly admires Omahah, who plays next to him on the right side.

"Pat is great," Flowers said. "Our lockers are next to each other and we are with each other all day, so it's good."

Players on the other side of the ball have also noticed how unified the line is.

"I see the cohesiveness amongst them — and that's on the field and off," defensive end Olivier Vernon said. "Those guys are always together. That's what you expect from the offensive line group. Those guys are all like brothers. They go everywhere with each other. That translates well on the field when it comes down to it. I think their attitude is one of the things that I've noticed, especially going against them in practice and since OTAs. They got depth in that group, too, as well. They have a lot of guys that are working. They're working, they're building that chemistry. That's one thing you like to see in the offensive line group."

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. - The Giants made a pair of roster moves today, adding running back Jhurrell Pressley and linebacker Warren Long. To create space for them, they waived/injured linebacker Thurston Armbrister, who had been sidelined with a hamstring injury, and waived safety Mike Basile.

Pressley 5-10 and 205 pounds, has not played in a regular-season game. He entered the NFL as a rookie free agent with the Minnesota Vikings in 2016, when Shurmur was on the coaching staff. Pressley was waived at the end of training camp and signed with Green Bay. He was on the Atlanta Falcons' practice squad from Oct. 25, 2016 to the end of the season.

In 2017, Pressley did brief stints on the practice squads of the Falcons and Jacksonville Jaguars. He had seven carries for 11 yards in the preseason for Atlanta.

"I was with him before, good runner, fast, tough guy," Shurmur said. "We brought him in, he's got some familiarity with what we do offensively, and we'll get him in the mix."

Pressley played 50 games at the University of New Mexico from 2012-15, when he rushed for 2,275 yards on 394 carries (6.9-yard avg.) and scored 35 touchdowns. He also caught 18 passes for 202 yards and one score.

The Giants currently have two running backs not practicing in Saquon Barkley (hamstring) and Jalen Simmons (concussion).

Long, 5-11 and 212 pounds, joined the Seattle Seahawks on May 4 as an undrafted rookie from Northwestern. He was waived on Aug. 11. Long had two solo tackles in Seattle's preseason opener vs. Indianapolis.

Long was a running back his first three seasons (2013-15) at Northwestern. He was injured on his first carry in 2016, and missed the rest of the season. The following offseason, he became a linebacker. Playing primarily as a backup and special teamer, Long had 21 tackles (14 solo), three tackles for losses and 1.0 sack.

Armbrister signed with the Giants on Jan. 9. He last played in 2016, for Detroit.

Basile a rookie from Monmouth University, was signed by the Giants on Aug. 8.

Can Saquon Barkley convince his Jets fan dad to be a Giants fan for a night?

EAST RUTHERFORD — Alibay Barkley has no plans to change his NFL loyalties, at least not yet, and maybe never.

The father of New York Giants running back Saquon Barkley has worn his devotion on his sleeve for years now — well, on his left forearm where, etched into his skin, is a tattooed logo of his lifelong favorite team: the New York Jets.

"Let Saquon win a Super Bowl with the Giants and then I'll think about putting a '26' and the trophy right here," Alibay Barkley told The Record and NorthJersey.com back in late April, flashing a smile while pointing to his right forearm. "He's got work to do. Until then, it's Jets and that's that."

It was, in fact, the Jets and that's that for Saquon Barkley for much of his childhood, as he adopted his dad's favorite team. That ended, of course, when the 21-year-old prized rookie was selected by the Giants with the No. 2 overall pick in the NFL Draft, one spot ahead of the Jets.

When Saquon stands on one sideline in Giants' white and blue and the Jets on the opposite for their annual pre-season showdown at MetLife Stadium come Friday night, the event itself will represent yet another significant moment in his fledgling pro career.

Even if Saquon can be completely certain that Dad won't be showing up wearing the jersey of his favorite player: Jets legend and Garfield native Wayne Chrebet.

After returning to practice on a limited basis Wednesday, Saquon isn't sure if he'll be playing against the Jets - it's unlikely as he continues to rehab his tweaked hamstring - but the challenge is one he embraces: convince Alibay to root for him and the Giants.

"I think my dad - I don't think, I know - and I hope he sees this, that he switches sides a little bit. I think he's going to come with his son and wear a Barkley jersey, I hope," Saquon said with a laugh. "If he didn't, I'd be a little upset. [But] I can't truly be upset about that. Obviously I don't know what I'm doing [in Friday's game and if he is playing], but just to be out there and be at MetLife, seeing my family and being across the field and seeing the Jets, and growing up [as a Jets fan], it's all kind of coming full circle. This puts you back and think of the past, all the

hard work and determination, when I said when I was a little kid [that] I wanted to be in this position, that's all coming together."

Saquon Barkley was back on the practice field Wednesday, participating in individual drills as the Giants continue to target the Sept. 9 regular season opener against the Jacksonville Jaguars in his comeback. Giants coach Pat Shurmur isn't saying whether Barkley will play again in the preseason, but the Jets' game would appear to be out of the question, leaving next Thursday's preseason finale against the New England Patriots as the last chance.

At that point, putting Barkley into the lineup for the sake of a handful of snaps in a game that doesn't count is not something that seems necessary.

"Personally, the way I feel, my body feels, I'll be honest, I feel good, feel pretty good. I've been moving pretty well," said Barkley, who also took part in 7-on-7 and team offense installation periods Wednesday. None of those reps were taken at full speed, however. "But that's what the trainers get paid for. They tell me stories all the time and I talk to other guys, even guys like [Odell Beckham Jr.] that hurt their hamstring before. It's when you feel 100 percent and that's when you give it that push, boom, and it happens again as a setback. I don't want any setbacks at all, so that's why I've been trying to be a team player there. Just listen and follow the instructions and I know they have a great game plan set out for me, and when it's time for me and when they feel I'm ready, that's when I'll be ready."

Friday's MetLife Bowl will represent the first time Barkley and Jets quarterback Sam Darnold will be on the field together since the 2017 Rose Bowl, one of the more memorable games in college football history.

Barkley ran for 194 yards and two touchdowns, only to have his Penn State team be outdone by Darnold's five touchdown passes, including a remarkable fourth quarter comeback.

Barkley is going to be compared to what Darnold might one day become; and even if he plays well, the expectations are through the roof. His success will also be linked to that of Eli Manning, whether that's fair or not, with the suggestion that the Giants passed on a first-round quarterback for Barkley serving as a compelling backdrop for the foreseeable future - even if he chooses not to see things that way.

"That's kind of really something that doesn't cross my mind," Barkley said. "We play two different positions. I

see what you're saying, but I don't really look too deep in that. I only can focus and control what I can control. I'm just thankful that the Giants picked me and I'm here and I'm a New York Giant. I'm playing for the best franchise in the league and I'm going to continue to take advantage of the opportunity every single day and continue to work every single day. I got to know him a little bit during the draft process and I wasn't a big Sam Darnold fan after they beat us in the Rose Bowl game my sophomore year, but that's just a competitive thing. We joke around about that all the time."

Barkley will cross paths with Darnold this week the way he did with his childhood idol last Friday night: Pro Football Hall of Famer and Detroit Lions running back Barry Sanders. The two met for the first time during pregame festivities prior to the Giants' 30-17 preseason victory.

"I was warming up, running around a little bit in pregame and I kept saying to our strength guys, 'Wow, I just met and took a picture with Barry Sanders,'" Barkley recalled Wednesday. "I don't think he truly knows how much he meant to me growing up, him and Jim Brown. Those two influenced me, even though I didn't get to watch them play, but being able to follow them, watching Barry Sanders highlights, the way he carried himself, I can only dream to have the kind of impact Barry Sanders had on this game and for his franchise. I kinda froze up in the moment when I met him, and I had all these things I could have asked. I was disappointed when I hurt my hamstring that I wasn't going to get to play in front of Barry, but hopefully I'll have a few more opportunities."

Re-living the football depths Giants new starter fought through

Jon Halapio can remember a time not so long ago when he was playing for the Boston Brawlers and had to bring his own equipment to games and practice. It was 2014.

"It was two levels below semi-pro football," Halapio told The Post on Wednesday. "It was a struggle. We had to bring our own tape, our own gloves and everything. High schools are better equipped than what we had. You really had to do a lot of self-talk to keep going to practice every day because it was hard."

That was just one speed bump in Halapio's journey from a sixth-round draft pick by the Patriots in 2014 to the Giants' starting center Friday night against the Jets and presumably for the start of the 2018 regular season.

There's a game and season to prepare for, which is why Halapio doesn't spend much time dwelling on being cut four different times by three different NFL teams. Or having to switch from guard to center after the Giants selected Will Hernandez with a second-round pick in April. He's a member of the Giants' starting offense now, calling signals along the line and snapping the ball to Eli Manning. It's a long way from playing for the Boston Brawlers.

"It's interesting to be in this role right now," Halapio said. "It was a little unsettling at first because any time you're moved from your natural position, you're out of your comfort zone. But day-in and day-out I kept getting more comfortable. Now we're all comfortable with each other."

Halapio, 26, wouldn't give up on his dream to play in the NFL despite the adversity he faced. Here's the short version: He was drafted as an offensive guard in 2014, but cut by the Patriots before the start of the season. He signed with the Brawlers of the Fall Experimental Football League.

"I wanted to put something good on film and show teams I'm still active and I could still play," Halapio said.

The Broncos saw enough to sign him in 2015, but he was waived during the summer mini camps. After a brief stint with the Cardinals, who released him that September, he signed with Brooklyn Bolts back in the FXFL, but stayed for only one game.

"It was even a bigger struggle than the year before," Hala-

pio said of playing with the Bolts. "You had to pay for your own tickets and pay for your own food. Compared to the paycheck I was getting, it wasn't worth risking injury."

He returned to New England in 2016 before being released again, but caught on with the Giants, where he spent 2016 and most of the 2017 season on the practice squad. He eventually made his first NFL start in Week 12 at right guard. When Hernandez was drafted, the Giants moved Halapio to center, where he has outplayed incumbent Brett Jones.

Giants coach Pat Shurmur, a former offensive lineman, said he likes what he sees in Halapio.

"Jon is very smart. He blinks fast," Shurmur said. "He makes good decisions in terms of getting us going in the right direction."

He also said he likes the fact Halapio has worked hard to get where he is.

"I'm fine with guys that have got some scars and some adversity and they push through it," Shurmur said. "Guys that push through adversity, they develop a mindset to handle adversity when it comes down the road."

When Halapio does reflect on his journey, he calls it a learning experience that has prepared him for this opportunity.

"Obviously it was hard," he said. "You're trying your best to find a home and stick somewhere. It gets frustrating. But I look back at it now and it's all been a learning experience. It hurts when you get released from one team to another. But you quickly heal that wound and do your best and try to get on another team and do your best. That's what I'm trying to do right now."

Giants offensive linemen are closer than ever

Rookie guard Will Hernandez was shocked.

He wasn't with the Giants last year, so he had no way of knowing what the layout of the locker room was like, particularly for the offensive linemen. He didn't realize, apparently, that the players at the position that requires the most cohesiveness, the most togetherness, were scattered about the room. There was one clump of lockers together in the corner, another in the middle of the football-shaped room and a few stragglers in other areas.

"Really?" he asked when told about the former configuration.

Really.

It may not have been designed to do so, but the distance between the players certainly led to what felt like a chasm between them on and off the field.

That's no longer the case. One of the first things Pat Shurmur did when he became the Giants' coach was to reorganize the locker assignments and put all of the position groups together. He not only wanted to change the culture in the locker room, he wanted to change the geography. That included, perhaps most importantly, the offensive linemen, who now sit together in the same area (at a nose of the football-shaped room).

"Hey, we're going to go as far as that line will block for us," Shurmur said. "And I think it's important that they're together in everything they do. Even if they're sitting next to one another, they may talk about something that happened at practice or in a meeting that they wouldn't shout across a locker room. I think it's just smart to sit with your position group."

It seems to be working.

"I don't get enough of these guys," Hernandez said. "There's so much off-the-field chemistry and it's translating over to the field to our game. That was a very good move and I'm very happy he did that."

Those who were in the locker room last year have noticed the change and its impact.

"I was kind of right at the equator where I had all offense on one side of me and all defense on the other side," veteran guard John Greco said of his real estate

when he joined the team early in the regular season. "Now I'm where all the other offensive linemen are . . . It is nice this year to be directly across from each other and it's bringing us together as a group. It's been nice."

Jon Halapio, who was on the team last year, declined to say whether the spreading out of the line contributed to the disappointing play in 2017.

"I don't know because I wasn't in the row with the guys," he said. "I just know what I am now. Right now I'm with the guys and the chemistry is pretty good."

Of course, where the offensive linemen get dressed and hang out won't matter much unless they play well. That's really what all the tweaks and changes are about. They've shown some flashes of progress in the preseason, but also some steps backward.

That's to be expected. The five projected starters all are either new to the team or playing a new position this season. But Shurmur, who was the offensive coordinator in Minnesota last year when the Vikings rebuilt their offensive line and went to the NFC Championship Game behind it, said having so much turnover is not an excuse.

"They should be in a position where they block well, run and pass. That's what we're looking for," he said of his expectations at this point. "We're not the only offensive line with changes. We probably have more than some places, but we went through this a year ago in Minnesota and it can be done."

They understand that, too. While Shurmur publicly stated his theory about going only as far as the line blocks this season, it's a rather obvious observation.

"We are all aware of the job that's expected of us, and we're all ready to step up to the plate and take on that challenge," guard Patrick Omameh said. "It's just a matter of us continuing to build and improve and be where we want to be when the season hits."

Hernandez said Shurmur has even used that phrasing about the importance of the offensive line in front of the entire team. "We believe it and we're ready to take that on and lead the way," Hernandez said. "Our mentality is that we have to get this done now. There's no one or two years to get it going or to finally find a chemistry. We have to do this now. The team needs us now."

At least in the new locker room, they'll know where to find them.

Of course, all this talk about how well the offensive line-men get along will be just empty words if the unit doesn't play well. It's difficult for any team to win without an above-average line. The Giants became painfully aware of that in 2017, which is why Dave Gettleman made improving the front one of his first projects when he became general manager.

"They should be in a position where they block well, run and pass, that's what we are looking for," Shurmur said. "We're not the only offensive line with changes, we probably have more than some places. We went through this a year ago in Minnesota, it can be done. We have got players that are playing hard, and they're playing together. We'll just expect that they are going to do a good job blocking."

Omameh is confident that's exactly what his group will deliver.

"I feel there's no competitor who would rather put that responsibility on anybody else's shoulders," he said. "It's a level of responsibility I'm always willing to take. I believe I speak for everyone else in our room, saying that it ain't no problem."

"We got a great group of guys. They really did a hell of a job putting together this collection of men and players. At the beginning, we were a bunch of guys thrown together and then by the end, we become one unit and that's what we're becoming. We just keep on putting in our work, keep on chopping the wood and we're going to get the results we want."

Going to the Dearborn Heights home of Giants coach Pat Shurmur

DEARBORN HEIGHTS, Mich. — Pat Shurmur's childhood home at 26275 Sheahan Drive sits on a quintessentially blue-collar American street, with basketball hoops in almost every driveway and all of the schools, football fields and baseball diamonds just a quick bike ride down memory lane away.

"I am really proud of where I came from," Shurmur, 53, the Giants' head coach, said Thursday morning at the Detroit Lions facility as he looked at Daily News photos of "a time gone by."

"I grew up with a loving family," he added, "a family that encouraged us to compete and chase your dreams. This is a great area to grow up in. I really loved living here."

After a tour of Shurmur's old Dearborn Heights neighborhood and of his former schools and hangouts, it's clear the Detroit area will never leave Pat Shurmur the man, even if he is now in New Jersey coaching the Giants, whom he brought here last week for three practices and a game with the Lions. The split-level home is just a few miles due West of downtown Detroit, and the winding Detroit River that separates the city from nearby Windsor, Canada.

Those who knew Shurmur at Dearborn Divine Child Elementary School and High School universally describe him as tough, honest, smart and a hard-working young man, a product of his own resolve and of those who raised him — mother Barbara Shurmur and late father Joe "Doc" Shurmur.

And they feel those qualities make him such a well-respected NFL coach.

"Since I've known him," says Divine Child head football coach John Filiatraut, class of 1987 to Shurmur's '83, "when you talk with him, he has this way of making you feel like you're the only person there. He's not thinking about anything else. That's got to play with his (Giants) staff and with his players.

"When a guy is completely honest with you, what else can you ask?" Filiatraut continues during an informal conversation with the Daily News Wednesday afternoon. "And there's not an ounce of conceit in Pat Shurmur.

You're getting him. It's always been that way, since I was a little kid."

Shurmur earned this respect. Divine Child's 1983 yearbook — Volume 22 of *The Clarion*, to be exact, available at Dearborn's Henry Ford Centennial Library — recounts Shurmur co-captaining the Falcons' 1982 football team as a senior to the state championship game, where they lost by only three points.

Divine Child, which now sports an immaculate complex of its own, did not have its own football field back when Shurmur was a student. So the Falcons played at nearby Crestwood High, home of the Panthers, in a classic Friday Night Lights type of setting that still stands.

"We'd go to our high school, dress, then get on the bus and drive over," Shurmur says with a smile.

Shurmur's 1983 baseball team also won both the school's first-ever Catholic League Championship and first regional crown. Shurmur, a lefty pitcher and first baseman, calls baseball "my best sport."

Shurmur honed his baseball skills at nearby Levagood Park. "But when he played there," Shurmur's high school football coach Wes Wishart says with a chuckle, "there were no fences." He played basketball as a freshman and wrestled as a sophomore, too.

Shurmur was revered, though, for his prowess on the gridiron, which carried him to a decorated career at Michigan State, the final three years as the Spartans' hard-nosed center.

"When we were kids, if you opened up the dictionary to the definition of a football player, that was Pat," says Arnie Muscat, a teammate of Shurmur's from fifth grade on. "He had tremendous desire, and it rubbed off on all of his teammates.

"He hated to lose," Muscat added. "He didn't like to lose. He expected to win, and he expected his teammates to drive to that type of success. He didn't like to get outworked and didn't like to lose, and you can see it in how he coaches.

"He did it the right way, though. He was one of the most intense football players I've ever played with, but he is also a very good friend and always made sure you were taken care of on the field. He would help you out. That's the type of person he is: first-class and desire."

Filiatraut, who played at Wisconsin, said Shurmur was so dominant in high school as both a linebacker and offensive lineman that the only other local product with more pedigree was probably running back Tyrone Wheatley, of Inkster, Mich., who played for both the Giants and Raiders in the NFL (1995-2004).

"Pat was a beast — a beast," Filiatraut says. "As a linebacker, he was like a 15-to-20-tackle-a-game guy. He was a great football player. Tough as nails, and such a nice guy."

Shurmur will confirm at least one of these assertions: He hates to lose. Always has, always will.

"I think growing up, part of that is who you are," Shurmur said Wednesday. "But I was encouraged to be that way at a young age. And I did develop a real distaste for losing, and I think that drove me. It's always driven me through my life."

If anything is more important than winning to Shurmur, though, it is his family. And so on Wednesday it was special to have family, including his mother and brother Joe, attend practice and share a moment after with Pat, just 18 minutes from the home where he was raised.

Pat is the oldest of four siblings, along with sister Shelly and brothers Joe and Rob. His mother, Barbara, though she no longer lives on Sheahan Drive, is just a half-hour west in Canton, Mich.

"It's been a long time (since my mom attended a practice of mine), but she showed up today, which was nice," Shurmur said Wednesday. "She only lives a couple miles away. She lives out in Canton now, and my brother's here. My sister lives in Chicago, so she won't be here for practice, but my brother's here and my mom, so it was good to see them."

Pat had coached an NFL preseason game here once before as a head coach, in 2011 with the Browns. This time, he spent nearly a whole week back where it all started, preparing both himself and his new Giants team for their journey ahead.

And he brought the same work ethic home with him.

Early Wednesday evening, at the Giants' team hotel in Troy about 40 minutes north, Giants players paraded through the lobby dressed nicely, showered after another taxing practice and film sessions, and ready to relax for a nice dinner out.

As the last few players filed out, steadily out of a side hallway walked Shurmur, still wearing the same royal blue Gi-

ants sweatshirt he'd had on that day on the practice field, still driving forward, still looking for an edge to win.

He was raised, it is evident on these blue-collar streets of Dearborn Heights, never to accept anything less.

Compliments to the chef: CB Leonard Johnson was about to go to culinary school before Giants called

EAST RUTHERFORD -- Leonard Johnson thought his NFL career might be cooked.

Johnson is used to bouncing around after playing for four teams in the last four seasons, but he started to wonder if he had reached the finish line when his phone didn't ring this offseason.

But enrolling in culinary school and turning a lifelong passion into a career as a chef will have to wait. Johnson signed with the suddenly injury-prone Giants last week.

"I don't want to just sit around," Johnson said. "I had never been in a situation where I hadn't been able to be involved in OTAs or the start of a training camp. I was like, 'Is this it?' I was preparing myself for the next move and also for a call. I got the call and I'm ready to go."

With rookie Sam Beal out for the season, William Gay and Curtis Riley both battling injuries and shifting from cornerback to free safety, and Donte Deayon already sidelined for a week, the Giants are short on cornerbacks, especially those with a track record of playing in the slot.

"We liked the way he moved around," coach Pat Shurmur said. "We liked how he played a year ago."

The Giants' wide receiver position is shaping up to be one of the more talented position groups on the roster, and most difficult spots to win a job when cutdown day rolls around. Odell Beckham Jr., and Sterling Shepard are assured the two starting jobs on the outside, but there is plenty of competition towards the bottom of the depth chart brewing between the likes of Russell Shepard, Raymond, Sharp, Lewis, and camp darling Etta-Tawo for what could wind up being at most three roster spots.

Johnson emerged as the winner of a tryout for Giants coaches and scouts that featured two of his former teammates with the Buccaneers, Alterraun Verner and Sterling Moore. He and Verner were neighbors when playing in Tampa Bay.

"This is kind of my story," Johnson said. "I may be the guy who plays 10 years and plays on one-year deals.

But you know what? The opportunity presents itself, and I've always made the most of every opportunity, so I'm just blessed to have another shot."

Johnson totaled 52 tackles and seven passes defended last season with the Bills, where he started seven of 15 games played. He previously spent time with the Panthers -- where he was under Giants general manager Dave Gettleman -- and Patriots ... and in Thailand?

Yes, Thailand. Every summer, if time allows.

"I'm in love with Thai cuisine and I'm in love with the Thai culture," he said. "What I do is I go to a different country or a different city and I learn how to cook their main dish and then I take the spices and herbs and incorporate them into my own favorite dishes. It's a cool deal."

When he is done appearing on tape for NFL Network, Johnson's end goal is to have his own show on the Food Network. He was on The Players' Tribune cooking with quarterback Cam Newton.

Proximity to New York City might just be the perfect training ground.

"I like to go to little mom-and-pop shops or to really really nice restaurants," Johnson said, "and I'll just talk to the owner or the head chef and tell them who I am and my interest in cooking and see if I can get in and chaperone or just follow behind the chef."

With five sisters and parents who worked late near their home in Clearwater, Fla., Johnson's interest in cooking dates to around age 6.

"My friends used to call me over to fry bacon or scramble some eggs," Johnson said. "They would get in trouble because their parents would come home and the food would be cooked. I would watch at home and say, 'How do I make this?' Then I would go over and try to cook it.

"Some of the food was absolutely horrible, but it was leading up to this."

In other words, some of Johnson's childhood dishes weren't worth a nickel. And that just so happens to be the name of the position for the slot cornerback in football.

It's a different job than playing on the outside, as starters Eli Apple and Janoris Jenkins will do.

"It complements my playing style," Johnson said. "I'm close to the linebackers. I'm hands on with the front seven. And then it allows me to play a little corner and a little safety, a little linebacker, all in one. It's a real position. They told me to just come in and be you and that would be a big help."

Young Giants embrace pitfalls, profits of life on social media

He has to.

He does not always want to and, perhaps sometime in the future, he will pull away from it. For now, though, Sterling Shepard admits his existence, both professional and personal, is intertwined with social media.

He insists he is aware of the pitfalls and understands how winning a game with the Giants versus losing a game affects the entire dynamic. He is also 24 years old and a smartphone in his hand might as well be an appendage he was born with.

"Every time you get on social media, it's like having a press conference, kinda," Shepard told The Post during a break from the grind of training camp. "You don't want to do anything that can hurt the team or distract the team. But at the same time, it's also another business of its own."

"This day and age, there's a lot of money in social media and it's something that you have to have. I think a lot of the older players, they don't really realize that, that there's a lot of money in social media and you have to take advantage of it."

There is no one on the Giants' roster older than Eli Manning, and the 37-year old quarterback is a staunch social-media evader. He does not use it, acknowledge it or, if you listen to one of his much younger wide receivers, come close to understanding it.

"He doesn't do social media, at all," Shepard said. "He doesn't even like anybody putting him on social media. He doesn't even know how it works half the time. He asks me all the time, 'So what do you do with a tweet, you tweet it out?' He's always asking questions on how it works. He has no idea. He's clueless. He doesn't have any of it on his phone, nowhere. Pretty private guy. Family man."

Shepard also considers himself a family man, recently married to Chanel Iman, a fashion model best known for her work as a Victoria's Secret Angel. Chanel and Sterling are expecting their first child, a girl, within weeks. The courtship, the marriage, the wedding, the pregnancy, the baby shower were all captured and shared on social media.

"I think it's all based on what you want to reveal and let out to the public," Shepard said. "People have their different reasons why they do certain things on social media. Me, I'm kinda open, especially my marriage. Don't really mind it. That's part of [his wife's] job, she has to be active, that's huge in her world."

When their daughter is born, Shepard is not sure how he will feel about all this. He said Brandon Marshall, the veteran receiver with the Giants last season, refrained from putting his kids on social media and advised caution in that area.

"That's something to think about," Shepard said. "Your kid is a different thing. We'll see."

The new coaching regime, directed by Pat Shurmur, has not instituted any restrictions, other than using common sense.

"I wouldn't say it was a warning, it was more of a PSA," said Zak DeOssie, the 33-year old long-snapper who has more than 10,000 followers on Twitter but rarely posts. "You got to understand, no matter where you are and what you're doing, whatever posts you put out there, you're representing not just your own personal brand, but the New York Giants, and I think that should take precedent before anyone throws anything out there."

"I understand, everyone wants to market their brand or whatever, but when push comes to shove, there has to be a cost-benefit analysis before every post. It's not rocket science, it's pretty simple."

It is not always so simple. Many a professional athlete has run smack into controversy spawned solely by a social-media post or comment. Recently, major league baseball players have been castigated when insensitive tweets, thumbed and posted as teenagers, surfaced years later.

"I just personally steer away from it because I don't see the benefit, myself," Shurmur told The Post. "But what I do encourage our players, when they hit send it's there forever. So be very, very aware — it's here to stay."

"That goes back to, we as coaches used to be trained to avoid it all, don't say anything, try to keep it all a secret. Now, everything's out there. I think it's very important that they really, really are conscious of once I hit send, is that something my mother would want to see? Is it something I'd be proud of when I have children and they

see it? They got to be really conscious about how they represent themselves.”

Manning is on one end of the spectrum, Odell Beckham Jr. is on the other. Beckham is the king of Giants social media, with 11.2 million followers on Instagram and 3.69 million on Twitter. Shepard also is more active on Instagram (514,000 followers) than he is on Twitter (94,700 followers) and realizes the same, seemingly innocuous message — the team is working hard to get better — is received quite differently after a loss than it is after a victory.

Still, he says he feels an obligation to pull back the curtain and let his followers in.

“You have to be active,” Shepard said. “You have a following and they want to know kinda the behind-the-scenes stuff, whether good or bad, that’s what you got to do.”

Most Giants players are on some sort of social media, at least occasionally.

Saquon Barkley is a rookie, but not an ordinary rookie in terms of social-media presence. Befitting his burgeoning fame, he has 208,000 Twitter followers and nearly 1 million (974,000) followers on Instagram; on both platforms he steers clear of controversy. Eli Apple enjoys sharing his thoughts on the NBA with his 84,500 Twitter followers and Damon “Snacks” Harrison’s 58,500 Twitter followers know all about what motivates him (he was undrafted and at times feels underappreciated) and his desire to “hunt” the opponent on game days.

Even the largely reticent Ereck Flowers is a social-media participant, although he is not exactly burning through his data. The most recent tweet to his 12,800 followers was in July 2016.

Shepard figures there’s money in social media by building his brand. He is in the third year of the four-year, \$5.9 million contract signed as a rookie second-round draft pick. He will be looking for a lucrative second NFL deal. If he gets it, perhaps he will navigate away from social media, he says. Perhaps.

“Do away with all of it, that would be nice,” Shepard said. “I wish I didn’t have to do it. Eli has a whole bunch of money, so he’s not really worried about the money part of that. For guys like me, it’s good for me. You think sometimes, ‘If I didn’t have social media, I wouldn’t see some of the nasty comments after a loss or

whatever.’ That’s just the way it goes. You kinda have to have tough skin.”

Beckham headed into training camp alerting his Instagram followers he was stepping off the platform for a while, writing, “For now my focus is to ball and get better everyday!” Not much later this summer, Beckham is expected to sign a mega-deal that could approach \$100 million. Once he secures it, maybe he backs off on social media entirely.

“I don’t know, he might,” Shepard said, before smiling and thinking otherwise. “There still might be a whole bunch of money for him on that.”

Donuts and dinners: Inside the bonding of Eli Manning's new protectors

It is not an absolute, of course, but Patrick Omameh does believe it to be a truism:

"I think the beauty of offensive-line guys, we're all, typically, every level I've played at, we're all just generally pretty good guys," Omameh told The Post.

Signed and stationed at right guard, Omameh is part of a totally rebuilt Giants offensive line, where it looks as if every one of the five starting spots will be manned this season by a newcomer or a player in a new position from the wreckage that was the 2017 season.

Nate Solder, 29, is the big man, the big-ticket free agent from the Patriots, imported to hold down left tackle. Rookie Will Hernandez, 22, taken in the second-round of the draft, is the left guard, with images of Chris Snee dancing in the heads of the Giants.

Jon Halapio, 26, a natural guard who began last season on the practice squad, for now has overtaken Brett Jones at center. Omameh, 28, undrafted, has started 45 NFL games for the Buccaneers, Bears and Jaguars, arriving as the under-the-radar free agent. Ereck Flowers, 24, is the holdover starter, the No. 9 pick in the 2015 draft, moved from left to right tackle in a last-ditch effort to salvage his foundering Giants career.

Already, this new unit is talking about togetherness and chemistry, attributes last year's group failed to achieve. Justin Pugh (Cardinals) and Weston Richburg (49ers) got nice money elsewhere; the Giants had no interest in retaining either of their former high draft picks. John Jerry, a starting guard for the Giants the past four years, is trying to make the team as a reserve. Bobby Hart, the starting right tackle in 2017, was the first player general manager Dave Gettleman jettisoned after he was hired; Hart is currently with the Bengals.

The new group is entrusted with keeping Eli Manning upright, allowing him to play with all those toys (Odell Beckham Jr., Saquon Barkley, Sterling Shepard and Evan Engram) at his disposal. The new group insists it will get the job done as it blends together. This is usu-

ally the conversation in July and August, with the real proving ground coming once September hits.

"I just feel the urgency," Halapio said. "I feel the excitement and I feel the bond we have, not only the first five, but the whole room. I feel we're so close-knit this year, we literally do everything together, whether its going into the players lounge together, eating together, in the spring we went to eat dinners every week. It's important for everybody to be on the same page, to hang out, get along, because ultimately we work together.

"Last year we weren't all on the same page. Now we're here and learning from our past, just trying to move forward with the guys we have, which are great guys, great leaders. Nate's been awesome, Pat's been awesome."

As the only rookie, Hernandez has yet to undergo much welcome-to-the-NFL indoctrination. The "worst thing I've had to do," he said, is to bring donuts to the morning offensive line meeting. He got up early and purchased two dozen donuts for the 16 players in the room, which does not sound like enough of a spread to put out.

"They didn't complain," Hernandez said.

The Giants made Solder the highest-paid (four years, \$62 million) offensive lineman in the league before the Titans recently beat that deal (five years, \$80 million) for Taylor Lewan. The 6-foot-8 Solder is a huge man, even by offensive lineman standards, and he towers over most of the group. After seven seasons in New England playing for Bill Belichick, Solder brought much of the Patriots Way approach to his new team. He speaks mostly in generalities and will not delve deeply at all when asked about any of his new teammates, who describe him as "solid." He prefers his leadership contributions to take place and remain out of the spotlight.

"I don't think there's any one player that makes that much of an impact," Solder said. "It's all about the team, so whatever's best for the team, we all work together. It's all about locking arms and fighting for each other, caring for each other and working the best you can together." Halapio says Solder "has been awesome for how he leads in his own way. It's not a rah-rah speech kind of guy. He's an extremely hard worker, he's a great teacher. He's helping Will out tremendously, I hear him talking all the time to Will, 'This is what I want on this set, this is what I want on this double block.' "

Omaeh, Halapio said, brings "the juice" every day. "The energy," Halapio said. "I can feel the energy from Pat."

Omaeh grinned when he heard that.

"Every now and then it's good to have someone in there to give the guys a kick," he said.

Hernandez is "a very physical guy, extremely hard worker, he cares about his job, he cares about being here," Halapio said. "It's exciting to see a young player have that."

As for Flowers, well, thus far in training camp he has not yet made himself available to the media. Halapio was his teammate last season and says he notices a different guy, somewhat.

"He's in a new position, I think it's a refreshing feeling for him," Halapio said. "There's a lot of things Ereck wants to prove to people. What I see from him, from last year, how much he's opened up, he feels comfortable with everybody in the room, which is really cool to see him change as a person."

Omaeh and Flowers will work the right side of the line together.

"I didn't know too much about Ereck going in and even when I got here, I wanted my feel for him to be based on my personal interaction with him," Omaeh said. "I've seen nothing but a good guy that wants to win games and be a football player that can get the job done."

"When he first came out this spring maybe he was a little quieter, but who isn't when meeting somebody for the first time? I'd say he's as open as anybody else in the O-line room."

After Barkley, Hernandez is the most hyped newcomer to the team, with his easy smile of the field and a nasty streak on it.

"That's the cool thing about these guys, I feel like I've known these guys for a long time now," Hernandez said. "Just the way we got close in such a short time is pretty cool and it's pretty amazing, honestly."

It all sounds good right now. Sounds great, actually. The camp battles with the defensive line have been spirited.

vars defensive front is frothing at the mouth to get a piece of Manning before he can hand the ball to Barkley or pass it to Beckham.

"We got all these special players — if we can't get the play started, if we can't get the play finished, we can't score points if we can't block our guys," Halapio said. "Eli feels confident in us, which is a good thing. We got to put it together once the games come in. Nobody's tackling Eli now. We got to do it in games, when they got the green light to go."

Dave Gettleman showing Giants what toughness really is

You have to be lucky to have a chance to beat cancer. You have to have the best doctors, and maybe most of all you have to have a Giant spirit.

Dave Gettleman is bald now, with more chemotherapy ahead of him, but he sure ought to be an inspiration, not only to his beloved football franchise that hired him back at age 66, but to anyone and everyone.

He isn't the first to get the terrifying news that lymphoma has threatened his body and his life. He isn't the first to receive the heartwarming news that his cancer was in remission.

It doesn't mean Dave Gettleman is not a Profile in Courage. Because he is.

Cancer has not stripped him of his sense of humor, could not change him as a man, will never take away his love for his job and love for the New York Football Giants.

"Chemo ain't fun now, and there've been a couple of days where — oof — it rocks your world," Gettleman said. "It's not fun. Fifty percent of the men in the United States will have cancer. I'm blessed. I feel good, I feel energetic."

His immune system is weakened, so he could not hug his coaches or players, and he was reduced to watching practice from just outside the fieldhouse because the sun is an enemy.

"Eight million yards away," Gettleman said. "I can't get to the locker room, which is frustrating. I gotta eat upstairs at my desk, which is frustrating."

"But I told 'em, I looked at 'em, I said, 'Guys, I'm sorry, you're stuck with me.' "

They are lucky they are stuck with a man like this, a man who cares, as desperate as Eli Manning to return to a Super Bowl, a man with the courage of his convictions, who is not afraid to make cutthroat decisions in a cutthroat league.

"Listen, everything happens for a reason," Gettleman said. "The Lord has a plan. And for some reason, I wasn't supposed to get to Cape Cod this summer. ...

Better days are ahead."

I asked Gettleman what his emotions were when he got the word from Dr. Andre Goy at Hackensack University Medical Center that his cancer was in remission.

"You know what was really weird is I couldn't quite understand it," he said. "When he told me I was in complete remission, it was kinda weird. But he very quickly followed up: 'You ain't done.' "

I asked him in what way was it weird?

"Just all of a sudden you go from within a five-week period, I'm told I've got an aggressive lymphoma. In five weeks, he said, 'OK, everything's gonna be OK.' That's a quick turnaround."

When he addressed his team on Wednesday, he bemoaned the fact that he could not hug them, doctor's orders. He can't fly, so he won't make the scrimmages in Detroit in the middle of August.

"Here you are sitting on a plane, sucking recirculated air and everybody's cooties," Gettleman said. "Then you go in a hotel, sucking recirculated air and cooties."

But he is as confident as Odell Beckham Jr. on a football field that he will be back fulfilling his full time duties as GM of the New York Giants.

"It'll happen," Gettleman said. "It'll happen."

He was able to get a little fresh air outside the fieldhouse, but it didn't leave him close enough to his team.

"I was in Peru," Gettleman said jokingly, "watching a practice in Hackensack."

He will return to chemo next week and engage in negotiations with the Beckham camp.

"I'm well enough to stand here in front of you, I'm well enough to do that," Gettleman said.

He does not look at life differently now.

"None of us, laying on our death bed, are gonna say, 'We wish we worked more ... gosh, I wish I emptied that email inbox.' None of us are gonna do that, OK?"

"I've been going to this place for the last seven years of

my life, OK? Really and truly, I firmly believe, it's faith, family and football. Our legacy is our children. That's our legacy. I sound like an old man ... but I'm not.

"If anything, it's just confirmed where I've been getting to for the last seven years if that makes sense. Life is precious. I don't care what it is. You just can't not appreciate how important people are, how really we're in the people business...at the end of the day it's not about how much money you make. It really isn't."

For Gettleman, 67 now, it's about his wife, Joanne, and three children — Aaron, Sam and Aaron Jane. And, of course, his Giants.

Overhead on a wall of the fieldhouse are the 2007 and 2011 Super Bowl champion banners. Gettleman was the pro personnel director for those teams before heading to Carolina, where he learned what it feels like to lose a Super Bowl. It doesn't make him any less of a champion.

The Kick-Ass GM has kicked cancer's ass. He would be embarrassed if someone called him a Miracle Man. But perhaps he is. As he stepped off the podium, he was only able to give me a fist bump, no handshakes, doctor's orders. Then he limped over to where a cart was waiting for him. Cancer picked on the wrong guy.

Conference Call

Q: After looking at the tape of the run game, how much of it was a matter of what the Jets were doing with bringing the safeties up into the box and how much of it was the line calls? What did you see in the breakdown of the running game?

A: Early on, especially through the first half when we were in bigger personnel groupings, they had extra people near the line of scrimmage, which makes it more difficult; but nonetheless, we need to do a better job in all areas, whether it's getting on the right people. There weren't really missed assignments, so to speak, but we've just got to get off the double teams a little quicker and then just hit it up in there and give the runner a little bit more room to get his feet going.

Q: Can you carry a primary returner who doesn't necessarily contribute in another aspect of the game, or does your returner have to be contributing at wide receiver or running back or one of those positions?

A: Yeah, we could carry a returner certainly that if he's dynamic enough where he can change the game by being a returner. Certainly all returners fit into some personnel or position group. I was in Minnesota with Marcus Sherels, he was a returner and he was a corner but really didn't play corner all that much. It may have changed this year, but at least when I was there that's what he did.

Q: How is Evan Engram doing today? Any sort of update on him at all?

A: No, he's in the protocol. We'll just see where he's at. I really don't want to add anything to that, but nothing's really changed from last night. We're moving him through the protocol.

Q: How about (Rhett Ellison)?

A: Migraines, I guess it was. He's fine. He's better today.

Q: Why was the play action so successful yesterday?

A: First off, I got to it a little quick early in the game because they were playing the run, and the good news is, some of our play actions were a bit believable and that allowed us to get down the field a little bit with a little extra protection, and then hit on some of our deep balls. There's some games when it's more effective than others. They were making a very strong effort to stop the run, so the next phase of it is try to take advantage of that a little bit.

Q: Were you surprised by what you saw from (Jhurrell Pressley) last night? I know he's been with you before in Minnesota, but considering he walked in, no OTA's, only a few practices, for him to do what he was able to do last night, did that kind of surprise you?

A: No, I know what his skillset is and I thought (running backs coach) Craig Johnson did a great job of getting him up to speed. He was probably able to connect the dots a little faster than some because we had some history together, but really it was just based on the amount of work he and Craig did, getting themselves ready to go, and then (offensive coordinator) Mike (Shula) certainly directing me toward the plays that he was comfortable running. Then I think when you're a running back, you get the ball, (and) you sort of do what you do. He had a couple of nice, long runs there that really helped us end the game the right way.

Q: When you were studying Eli Manning when you got the job and reviewing (him), were you especially conscious of looking to see if a 37-year old quarterback could move the way you want a quarterback to move, and how much do you think Eli's legs will play a factor in what you want to do?

A: I believe that every quarterback needs to use his legs to some degree. I think if you do enough other things well on offense, and I do believe that you have to move the launch point for the throws which sometimes means the play action game or moving the pocket, so I believe in that and I do believe that any quarterback can do it to some degree. Eli moves around well enough where he can execute some of that stuff.

Q: We didn't really get to ask you last night about Davis Webb. I know he didn't play as much this game as last game, but what did you think of his performance?

A: I thought it was solid. Even when you have some good plays, most quarterbacks will come back and there's a handful of things you want to do over for whatever reason. I think that's fair to be said for his performance.



Q: Where do you stand on the free safety position at this point and what did you think of the guys that were in there yesterday?

A: I thought the guys that played in there yesterday did a good job. I thought that Curtis Riley did a nice job at the free safety spot and William Gay got in there at the end, Double A (Andrew Adams) was in there playing, so we got to see them play quite a bit and show what they can do. Obviously, I thought Landon was pretty solid. We were able to see more and help us decide as we go here who that free safety is going to be.

Q: How close are you to figuring that out at this point?

A: I would say we're getting close. I wouldn't say we're unsettled there, I would say we're getting close.

Q: Do you expect Darian Thompson back this week?

A: We are hopeful. It's hard to say. I think it's pretty well documented that he has a hamstring (injury). This thing on him, it's really lingering, so we'll just have to see when we start practicing again tomorrow.

Q: Do you have thoughts on Jonathan Stewart after watching the film?

A: He's a veteran player and he's played really well for a lot of seasons. There's always a reason why things don't go well. If you just look at the raw production, and say "oh my goodness", but we just have to take it for what it is. I know he can play football and play at a high level, and we are just counting on that.

Q: On the plans for this week — it's a short work week, it's also the last opportunity for guys who might be on the border regarding a roster spot. How do you approach this week as a coach, as a teacher? Do you kind of amp up your teaching at this point to help these guys more, or how does that work in your role?

A: Here's the deal. There will probably be some guys that won't play in this game, and it goes without saying. What's important is we're still in training camp, so what we're going to do is, the guys that we know are going to play in the game, and I'm not going to talk about who they are or who won't play, but the guys that are going to play in this game, we're going to use a portion of practice to get them ready to play the Patriots. It's important that some of the guys that might not be playing in this game, it's like training camp, so the padded practices are important and the work that we do is important, especially the Giants-on-Giants phase of things. It kind of runs parallel, so we will structure the practice sessions to reflect that.

Q: What did you think of (Aldrick Rosas') game last night in the first half with those four field goals?

A: It was terrific. When you make your field goals when we're stalling out like that and you get points on the board, it's huge. I think sometimes we forget if you miss those kicks, then they're presented with immediate good field position going the other way, so I was very pleased with that. His kickoffs were good and solid; he's a big, strong guy. I think both of our specialists Riley Dixon and then Aldrick, they look like football players to me. They're big strong guys and I thought they executed kicking and punting very well.
