The New England Patriots return to the confines of Gillette Stadium following two consecutive road wins to face the New York Jets in a battle for first place in the AFC East. The Patriots have the NFL's top divisional record since 2001 with a 68-19 (.782) mark. The Patriots are 1-0 in the AFC East in 2015, following a 40-32 win at Buffalo on Sept. 20. Tom Brady owns a 20-5 record against the Jets as a starting quarterback, including a 10-2 record at home.

This week's game will be the first of two games against the Jets. The Patriots will travel to face the Jets at MetLife Stadium on Dec. 27. Last season, the Patriots swept the season series against the Jets for the 16th time in team history.

The Patriots are off to a 5-0 start for the fourth time in team history and for the third time in the Bill Belichick-Tom Brady era. The Patriots will be looking to start the season at 6-0 for the third time in team history. The Patriots started the year at 6-0 in 2004 and in 2007.

The Patriots are 31-25-1 all-time against the Jets at home, including 1-1 at home in the postseason.

The Patriots are 27-28 all-time on the road against the Jets, including 3-2 at MetLife Stadium.

The teams have played in the postseason three times - a 1985 Wild Card game, a 2006 Wild Card game and an AFC Divisional game in 2010. New England beat the Jets, 26-14, in 1985 at the Meadowlands on their way to Super Bowl XX. In 2006, the Patriots defeated the Jets, 37-16, at Gillette Stadium and the Jets defeated the Patriots, 28-21, in the 2010 Divisional playoff game.

New England is 29-15 against the Jets since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994.

New England's 58 overall victories over the Jets [including two playoff wins) are the second most over any single opponent, trailing only Buffalo with 68 alltime wins.

Defensive lineman Chris Jones blocked K Nick Folk's 58-yard field goal attempt on the game's final play to help lead the Patriots to a 27-25 victory over the visiting New York Jets on Thursday Night Football.

Jones redeemed himself from a penalty on a field goal that led to a 30-27 overtime loss at the Jets in 2013. In that season, Folk was wide left on a 56yard attempt in overtime, but Jones was penalized under a new rule against players pushing a teammate into the opponent's formation. Folk then connected from 42 yards, giving the Jets the win.

The Jets out-gained the Patriots on the ground, 218 to 63, and held the ball for 40:54 while limiting the Patriots to just 19:06 time of possession. The Jets also scored on their first five possessions of the game with four field goals and a touchdown.

The Patriots led 17-12 at halftime despite having the ball for just 7:57, while the Jets held it for 22:03.

The Jets got inside the New England 30-yard line on all four of their first half drives, but they managed just four field goals.

The Patriots went three-and-out on two of their four first-half possessions, but made the most of the other two as QB Tom Brady connected with RB Shane Vereen for two touchdowns. On the fourth play of the game, Brady connected with Vereen for a 49-yard touchdown for a 7-0 lead. Folk had field goals on the Jets next three drives to take a 9-7 lead.

Brady, who finished 20-of-37 for 261 yards with three touchdowns, responded with a 10-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 3 -yard touchdown strike to Vereen to recapture the lead at 14-9. The Jets scored on their fourth straight drive of the game with a 27-yard field goal to make it 14-12 with 1:01 left to play int he first half.

A 20-yard pass from Brady to TE Rob Gronkowski helped get in position for a 39-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski for a 17-12 halftime lead.

The Jets took the second half kickoff and marched 80 yards before RB Chris Ivory scored on a 1-yard run to give New York a 19-17 lead. The Patriots recaptured the lead on the next series when Gostkowski connected on a 36yard field goal for a 20-19 lead heading into the final quarter.

Midway through the fourth quarter, Brady finished a 7-play, 46-yard drive with a 19-yard touchdown pass to WR Danny Amendola on third-and-goal for a 27-19 lead with under eight minutes to play. The Jets answered that drive by going 86 yards on 12 plays before QB Geno Smith completed a 10-yard touchdown pass to TE Jeff Cumberland. A failed two-point play made it 27-25 with just over two minutes to play.

Amendola recovered an onside kick attempt by the Jets, but the Patriots offense was held on three plays and was forced to punt. The Jets took over and drove to the New England 40-yard line to get where they attempted a 58-yard game winner that was blocked by Jones.

The New England Patriots improved to a $12-3$ record and in the process earned a first-round bye with a 17-16 victory over the New York Jets at Metlife Stadium. The Patriots became the first team to earn five straight first-round byes.

The victory over the Jets was the 250th win under Robert Kraft, in just 368 total games, tying Chicago's George Halas for the fastest an owner has reached 250 victories.

Additionally, Bill Belichick earned his 230th career win to pass Curly Lambeau for sole possession of fourth-place for most wins by an NFL coach.

Down 13-10 late in the third quarter, LB Jamie Collins intercepted a QB Geno Smith pass to give the Patriots a first down at the New York Jets 38-yard line. That turnover helped lead to RB Jonas Gray's go-ahead touchdown on a 1-yard run early in the fourth quarter to give New England a 17-13 advantage. The Jets answered with a 12-play, 59-yard drive that ended in a 37-yard field goal by K Nick Folk to close to within 17-16 with 7:53 left to play.

The Jets had a chance to take the lead with 5:21 left, but Folk's 52-yard field goal attempt was short after being tipped by DL Vince Wilfork. The Jets were in scoring position after CB Marcus Williams intercepted a QB Tom Brady pass that tipped off the hands of WR Brandon LaFell. The pick gave the Jets a first down at the New England 31-yard line. The Jets moved to the 24 -yard line before LB Dont'a Hightower sacked Smith for a 10-yard loss on a third-down play to force the long field goal attempt. The Patriots took over and converted two third downs to help run out the clock and secure the victory.

After a scoreless first quarter, New England got on the board first when WR Danny Amendola returned a punt 39 yards to the Jets 36-yard line. Brady moved the Patriots to the 3 -yard line before connecting with TE Rob Gronkowski on a touchdown and a 7-0 lead.

The Jets answered by driving to the New England 20-yard line where Smith completed a touchdown pass to TE Jeff Cumberland to tie the game. After stopping the Patriots on three straight plays, the Jets drove to the New England 8-yard line with 52 seconds to play and kicked a 26-yard field goal to take a 10-7 halftime lead.

The Jets extended their lead on their first possession of the second half when Folk kicked a 23-yard field goal for a 13-7 advantage. The Patriots drove to the 6-yard line on the ensuing drive, but were forced to settle for a 24 -yard field goal to make it 13-10 heading into the final quarter.

The Jets had three drives inside the New England 20-yard line, but were forced to settle for field goals on all three drives. New England was 2-for-4 in the red zone.

## PATRIOTS 34, INDIANAPOLIS 27



In a rematch of the 2014 AFC Championship Game, the New England Patriots won again, defeating the Indianapolis Colts, 34-27, at Lucas Oil Stadium, to improve to a 5-0 start for the fourth time in team history and for the first time since 2007

Tom Brady led the Patriots to the victory, passing for 312 yards with three touchdowns, including two in the second half. RB LeGarrette Blount finished with 93 yards rushing on 16 attempts, including a 38 -yard touchdown run. Blount also scored on an 11-yard touchdown pass, the first touchdown reception of his career. WR Danny Amendola also had a productive day, leading the team with seven receptions for 105 yards.

The Patriots overcame a 21-20 halftime deficit by taking the second half kick and marching 80 yards in a seven-play drive that culminated with a $25-$ yard touchdown pass from Brady to TE Rob Gronkowski to give the Patriots a 27-21 lead.

The Patriots also took advantage of a bizarre play by Indianapolis at the end of the third quarter. The Colts failed on a fake punt attempt from their own 37-yard line. With most of the Colts' players lined up near the right sideline, WR Griff Whalen snapped the ball to S Colt Anderson. He was immediately tackled for a 1-yard loss by RB Brandon Bolden and CB Logan Ryan, allowing the Patriots to take over at the Indianapolis 35-yard line. Six plays later, Brady connected with Blount on an 11-yard touchdown pass for a 34-21 lead early in the fourth quarter.

The Colts made it close when QB Andrew Luck fired an 18-yard touchdown pass to Whalen with 1:19 to go. LB Jamie Collins jumped over the Indianapolis line and blocked the extra point. Then, Gronkowski recovered the onside kick attempt, and the Patriots were able to run out the clock to secure the win.

Indianapolis scored on its first possession of the game when QB Andrew Luck threw a 5 -yard touchdown pass WR Donte Moncrief on a fourth-down play. The Patriots answered with a 10-play, 80-yard drive that was capped with a 12-yard touchdown pass from Brady to WR Julian Edelman.

The Patriots added a field goal early in the second quarter, but Brady was intercepted by Indianapolis S Mike Adams, who returned the pick 14 yards for a touchdown to give the Colts a 14-10 lead.

Indianapolis tried a surprise onside kick, but it was recovered by New England at the 25 -yard line to help the team get in position for a 38 -yard touchdown run by Blount to make it 17-14. Luck led the Colts on an 80-yard drive that ended in a touchdown to give the Colts a 21-17 lead. The Patriots kicked a field goal before the end of the half to close the gap to 21-20 at the break.


## FOURTH 5-0 START IN TEAM HISTORY

The New England Patriots improved to 5-0 for the fourth time in team history and for the first time since 2007. New England is now 5-0 for the third time in the Bill Belichick-Tom Brady era. The Patriots also started 5-0 in 1974, 2004 and 2007

## TEAM NOTES



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 22nd season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft

announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles [14], conference crowns [7] and Super Bowl championships (4) than any other NFL team. Super Bowl XLIX was the seventh Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 21 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 16 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

Over the last 15 years, the Patriots have been blessed with 29 playoff games, six trips to the Super Bowl and four Lombardi trophies, but in the earlier days of the franchise, postseason opportunities were hard to come by. This year, the Patriots celebrate the 30th anniversary of the team that started it all, the 1985 New England Patriots. Not only were they the first Patriots team to play in a Super Bowl, but they made it there by winning three playoff games on the road against some of the league's toughest opponents. First up on the Patriots' list was their division rivals, the New York Jets. On Dec. 28, 1985, the Patriots and Jets met for the first time in the postseason to battle it out at Giants Stadium. Patriots quarterback Tony Eason led New England down the field to score the game's first points on a 33-yard Tony Franklin field goal. The Jets got on the board early in the second quarter when quarterback Ken O'Brien found Johnny Hector in the end zone for an 11 -yard touchdown. Then the momentum shifted. The Patriots went on a tear, scoring 20 unanswered points between the second and third quarters and had their way with the Jets offense, forcing four turnovers and five sacks. At the end of the third quarter, the Jets regrouped and put another seven points on the board, but it was too late. A second Franklin field goal, and the Jets' playoff hopes were crushed. It was the Patriots who would be traveling to face the Raiders on their second stop en route to Super Bowl XX.

## SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. $\star$ On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15 yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

* Bill Belichick [238] moved past Curly Lambeau [229] for fourth place all-time on the NFL wins list. Tom Landry is in third place with 270 total wins.

$\star$ Belichick has led the Patriots to 14 consecutive winning records [200114], tied with Curly Lambeau (1934-47) for second all-time, behind 20 by Tom Landry (1966-85).


## TOM BRADY

*Tom Brady $[4,109$ ) reached 4,000 yards in 2014 for his seventh 4,000yard passing season. He joined Peyton Manning [14] and Drew Bress [9] as the only players with at least seven 4,000-yard seasons.
$\star$ Brady has 165 regular season wins with the Patriots, the most wins by a quarterback with one team. Brett Favre is second with 160 wins with Green Bay.
$\star$ Brady [212] is one of nine NFL quarterbacks with 200 career starts. His 155 wins in his first 200 starts are the most in NFL history. Peyton Manning is second with 136 wins in his first 200 starts.

## JULIAN EDELMAN

$\star$ Edelman led the team with 92 receptions, which was eighth in the NFL in 2014. He is tied for 6th in 2015 with 40 receptions.
$\star$ Edelman returned a second-quarter punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. Denver Nov. 2, 2014 and now has a franchise-best four punt returns for a touchdown.

## ROB NINKOVICH

$\star$ Rob Ninkovich has 13 fumble recoveries since 2010, the most of any player in the NFL over that time. J.J. Watt is second with 11.
$\star$ Ninkovich recorded his eighth sack of the season vs. Miami (12/14) and has had at least eight sacks in three consecutive seasons, becoming the first Patriots player to have at least eight sacks in three consecutive seasons since Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett achieved the feat from 1985-97 [1985, 16 1/2, 1986, 9 1/2 and $1987121 / 2$ ].

## STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

$\star$ Stephen Gostkowski led the NFL with 156 points. It was the third straight season that he has led the NFL in scoring [2012, 2013 and 2014). He also led the NFL in scoring in 2008. He joins Don Hutson [5] and Gino Cappelletti [5] as the only NFL players to lead the NFL in scoring in at least four seasons. $\star$ Gostkowski made 94.6 percent of his field goals in 2014 [35-of-37), setting a new team record for field goal percentage in a single season. The previous best was 93.9 by Adam Vinatieri (31-of-33) in 2004.

The Associated Press named Bill Belichick the NFL's Coach of the Year in 2010, the third time that Belichick earned the honor. He was also named Coach of the Year following the 2003 and 2007 seasons, joining Don Shula [4-time winner] and Chuck Knox as the only three-time winners.

## EELICHICK ADDED TO HIS RECORD IN 2014

Bill Belichick has coached the Patriots to 12 straight seasons with 10 or more wins after reaching his 10th win of the 2014 season at San Diego [12/7/14], adding to his NFL record streak. In 2011, Belichick became the first coach in NFL history with nine straight seasons with at least 10 victories. George Seifert has the second most consecutive 10-win seasons with eight from 1989-1996 for San Francisco.

On April 20, 2011, just days before Texas Christian offensive line prospect Marcus Cannon was to enter the NFL Draft, he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a treatable form of cancer found in lymph tissue. A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round [138th overall] of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. The Patriots placed Cannon on the Reserve/Non Football Injury list to start the 2011 season while he received treatment and recovered. Cannon was activated to the 53 -man roster later that year and is now in his fifth season with the team. Cannon made a full recovery and was named the Patriots 2011 Ed Block Courage Award winner - an annual award presented to select players in the National Football League who are voted by their teammates as role models of inspiration, sportsmanship and courage.

He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told The Boston Herald. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

SLATER'S EMERCENCE WAS SPECIAL
Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

ELECTED TEAM LEADER
Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to four straight Pro Bowls [2011-14] for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the fifth straight season in 2015.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

## SLATER ON BILL BELICHICK

"Guys have really bought into what we're trying to do here and believing in the goals that we've set to accomplish. We try not to acknowledge all the noise and hype surrounding ballgames. We prepare ourselves to have success by the way we work day-in and day-out on the field and in the meeting room, but it definitely starts with our leadership on this team.'

JAMIE COLLINS' JOURNEY


The road to the NFL has been anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Meadville, Miss., Collins lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters, who was in her mid 20s.

Collins turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times. "It means a lot. It's my living," Collins told The Boston Herald. "It kept me on track." Collins' resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30 miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend. "What l've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the Herald. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and can still find a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and did a pretty good job as a rookie."

Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another

linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

JONES ACHIEVES TRIFECTA
DL Chandler Jones blocked a second-quarter Minnesota (9/14/14) 48yard field goal attempt, recovered the loose ball and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown. It was the fifth blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in Patriots history and the first returned for a touchdown since S Patrick Chung blocked a field goal attempt that was returned 35 yards for a touchdown by DB Kyle Arrington at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010. It is the second field goal block by Jones. He blocked a 39-yard attempt vs. Miami on Oct. 27, 2013. It was Jones' second career touchdown. He recovered an errant shotgun snap squibbed into the end zone at Baltimore on Dec. 22, 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK
Chandler Jones was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Patriots' 30-7 victory at Minnesota on Sept. 14, 2014. It was the first time in Jones' career that he has received an AFC Player of the Week honor. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November last season and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month in September 2012.

Jones blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown to give New England a 24-7 halftime lead at Minnesota (9/14). He also finished the game with eight total tackles and his fifth career two-sack game.

The last time the Patriots earned an AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor was Week 10 of the 2011 season when Andre Carter tied a team record with four sacks at N.Y. Jets $(11 / 13 / 11)$.

JONES SNAPS A SELFIE
When training camp practice ends at Gillette Stadium, the first wave of players quickly head into the locker room to shower and recover from the tough workout, but Chandler Jones is almost never among them. He is autographing footballs, snapping selfies and chatting with as many fans as he can before he makes his way into the building to rest his body and escape the heat. The Super Bowl Champion defensive end enjoys engaging his fans because he remembers a time when he was the one cheering from a distance.
"I feel like it was just yesterday when I was one of those fans," Jones said to ESPN's Mike Reis. "I didn't have access to an NFL team, but I was the guy that was on Twitter that was like, 'Oh my God, he tweeted me' or 'He shouted me out.' I was that person. So for me to have an opportunity to do that to people, I try to do that whenever I can. You see fans out there, they're sitting in the rain, they're sitting in the heat, sweating, they're drenched, and they're just yelling your name the whole practice. The least I can do is go over there and say hi and take some selfies and sign a few things. I love it. It's great."


THIRD TEAM'S A CHARM
Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just 11 days. After selecting him in the sixth round with the 198th overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on Aug. 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 1, but lasted only 10 days, as the Buccaneers released him on Sept., 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on Sept. 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones finished his rookie season with six sacks.

Jones' sudden success may have come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-two time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the The Boston Herald, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

## DOUELE TROUELE DE DEVIN McCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998 2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries [13] over the last five seasons [20102014] than any other NFL player. J.J. Watt is second during that time with 11 opponent fumble recoveries.


CAREER DAY IN BUFFALO
Ninkovich finished with a three-sack game for the first time in his career in the win at Buffalo $[10 / 12 / 14]$, He has had two two-sack performances - vs. Miami ( $1 / 2 / 11$ ) and at Carolina [ $11 / 18 / 13$ ).

WHERE DID HE COME FROM?
Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

CRAZY EICHTS
Ninkovich raised his 2014 total to a team-high of 8.0 sacks in 2014 . Ninkovich has had at least 8.0 sacks in three consecutive seasons ( 8.0 in 2012, 8.0 in 2013 and 8.0 in 2014], becoming the first Patriots player to have at least 8.0 sacks in three consecutive seasons since Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett achieved the feat from 1985-87 [1985, 16 1/2, 1986, $91 / 2$ and 1987, 12 1/2].

NINKOVICH ScoRED AS A TE IN COLLECE
Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Buffalo QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from former New York Giants and Indianapolis QB Curtis Painter.


CLASSMATES REUNITE IN NEW ENCLAND
Defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to working together. Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told The Boston Globe. "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

RYAN RETURNS...TO SCHOOL
When Logan Ryan decided to leave Rutgers and enter the NFL Draft after his redshirt junior season in 2012, he made a promise to his parents that after his rookie year, he would return to school and earn his degree.

Ryan kept his promise and graduated in the spring of 2014 with a degree in labor relations and a minor in psychology.
"I committed to Rutgers, not only as a football player, but as a student, so I was going to make sure I finished that end too," Ryan told NJ.com.
"It's a big accomplishment in my life. I held my word to my parents and stuck with it and I'm fortunate. It took a lot of work, but I was able to go back and finish and walk in graduation."

FIRST NFL SACK RESULTS IN TURNOVER
Ryan forced a fumble on his first NFL sack vs. Miami (10/27/13), a week after returning his first career interception for a touchdown. Ryan strip-sacked Ryan Tannehill, forcing a fumble recovered by Rob Ninkovich that led in to a touchdown. The play marked the second time in as many weeks that a Ryan turnover led to Patriots points.


SHEARD ON MCCINEST
Jabaal Sheard may be a new face in the Patriots locker room, but he's certainly familiar with Patriots legend, Willie McGinest. Sheard, who is typically soft-spoken around the microphones, was very excited to express his admiration for McGinest following the veteran linebacker's induction to the Patriots Hall of Fame on August 5.
"That's a guy that I watch film on still to this day," Sheard said to the Boston Globe. "How he used to rush, how he'd attack, how he was relentless. It's amazing to be out here with him. The heart he had, that dog. He would get after the quarterback, get after the run. He was so into the team, whatever they asked him to do, he would do it."

It makes sense that Sheard would feel a connection to McGinest, given the players' similarities. Before coming to New England as a defensive lineman, Sheard played outside linebacker for Cleveland in Mike Pettine's hybrid 3-4 system. By adding Sheard to his roster, Bill Belichick brings flexibility and, hopefully some of that McGinest magic, back to the Patriots front seven.

## A COMEEACK FOR THE ACES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 3431, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle [ $9 / 16 / 84$ ]. The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 [12/21/96]. The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).


PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS
The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times in their 55 -year history. Sixteen of those playoff berths have come in the 21 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 17 division crowns, including 12 in the last 14 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). Since the 1994 season, the Patriots have won 68.6 percent of their regular season games (234-107), compiling the highest winning percentage in major American professional sports over that period. Since 1994, there have been 145 franchises that have fielded teams in the five major American sports leagues (NFL, MLB, NBA, NHL and MLS).
