NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (0-1) at NEW ORLEANS SAINTS (0-1) Saturday Aug. 22, 2015 • Mercedes-Benz Superdome (73,000) • 7:30 p.m. ET

The 2015 season marks the fourth straight year the Patriots will hold joint practice sessions when they travel to The Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., to conduct joint practice sessions with the New Orleans Saints on Aug. 19 and Aug. 20, prior to traveling to New Orleans to play the Saints in a Week 2 preseason game on Sat., Aug. 22.

For the last three seasons, the Patriots held joint sessions with two different teams. In 2014, the Patriots conducted joint sessions at Washington and at home against Philadelphia.

In 2013, the Patriots traveled to Philadelphia for joint practice sessions and then hosted Tampa Bay in joint sessions. In 2012, the Patriots held joint practice sessions with New Orleans prior to the first preseason game of the year and then traveled to the Buccaneers' headquarters for two joint practices prior to their preseason game that year.

PATRIOTS 2014 SEASON WAS ONE FOR THE AGES

The Super Bowl XLIX win was the fourth Super Bowl win since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a total that is the most in the league over that span. The eighth Super Bowl appearance in 2014 tied Dallas and Pittsburgh for the most Super Bowl berths. Additionally it was the seventh Super Bowl under the Kraft ownership, setting a new NFL record for most conference championships

The 28-24 Super Bowl victory over the Seattle Seahawks was the fourth Super Bowl title in franchise history. The Patriots joined Pittsburgh [6], Dallas [5] San Francisco (5), Green Bay (4) and the New York Giants (4) as the only teams with at least four Super Bowl wins



SERIES HISTORY





Patriots Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft's first game as owner of the team was a 1994 preseason game at Foxboro Stadium against the Saints. The Patriots won that game, 24-6.

The two teams will meet this week in New Orleans in the 11th preseason meeting and for the first time since Aug. 9, 2012 when the Patriots beat the Saints, 7-6, in a preseason game at Gillette Stadium.

The last four times the two teams met in the preseason the games have been played on the Patriots' home field. The last time the Patriots traveled to New Orleans for a preseason game was on Aug. 16, 1986 when the Patriots prevailed in a 38-34 decision.

The Patriots and Saints have played 13 times in the regular season with the Patriots leading the all-time series, 9-4. The two teams last played in the regular season in 2013 with the Patriots taking a 30-27 win on Oct. 13 at Gillette Stadium.

Tom Brady threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to rookie WR Kenbrell Thompkins with five seconds left to play to lift the Patriots to a come-from-behind 30-27 victory to hand the visiting New Orleans Saints their first loss of the year.

The touchdown pass capped an 8-play, 70-yard drive that started at their own 30-yard line with 1:13 seconds left to play. The victory marked the 38th time that Brady has led his team to victory following a fourth-quarter deficit or tie.

Brady completed five-of-seven passes for 70 yards to lead New England to the win. On the drive, Brady completed three quick passes in a row (to three different receivers) to put the Patriots in position to win, firing off a 23-yard completion to Julian Edelman, a 15-yard completion to Austin Collie and a 6-yard pass to Aaron Dobson to set New England up at the New Orleans 26-yard line with 35 seconds left. Following two incompletions, Brady completed a 9-yard pass on fourth down to Collie, and then following a clock-stopping spike, Brady tossed the game-winning 17-yard touchdown to Thompkins with 5 seconds remaining.

The Patriots had squandered a 17-7 halftime lead after New Orleans scored a field goal and a touchdown on their first two drives of the second half to tie the game. K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a career-long 54-yard field goal in the third quarter and added a 23-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to put New England in front, 23-17. But the Saints took a 24-23 lead with 3:29 to play when QB Drew Brees threw a 34-yard touchdown pass to WR Kenny Stills.

On the ensuing drive, the Patriots tried to convert a fourth-and-six situation from their own 24-yard line with 2:50 to play, but were stopped, leading to a New Orleans field goal for a 27-23 lead. Brady was intercepted on the first play following the Saints touchdown, allowing New Orleans to get the ball back with 2:16 to play.

The Patriots defense had a key three-and-out on that series to set the New England offense up for the game-winning drive. S Steve Gregory stopped New Orleans RB Khiry Robinson for a 2-yard gain on first down and the Patriots then took their final timeout. Gregory and DL Joe Vellano stopped RB Pierre Thomas for a 1-yard gain on second down, leading into the two-minute warning. DL Chandler Jones then sacked Brees on third down, setting up a New Orleans punt that gave the Patriots the ball back with 1:13 remaining and setting up the game-winning drive.

The New Orleans offense twice failed to pick up a first down that would have put the game away in the final three minutes. Excluding a field goal attempt and a punt, the Saints ran six plays from the 2:46 mark of the fourth quarter on, and those snaps produced just one single yard.

The Patriots built a 17-7 halftime lead after scoring a field goal on their first drive of the game and then two RB Stevan Ridley touchdown runs in the second quarter

The Patriots defense held Saints TE Jimmy Graham without a reception. Graham entered the game averaging 118.6 yards per game.

PATRIOTS IN NEW ORLEANS

★ The Patriots have played in three Super Bowls in New Orleans at the Louisiana Superdome, the home of the Saints. The 1985 Patriots qualified for the first Super Bowl in team history, but lost to the Chicago Bears, 46-10. In 1996, the Patriots reached their second Super Bowl in the Crescent City and fell to the Green Bay Packers, 35-21, in Super Bowl XXXI. New England returned to the Big Easy for Super Bowl XXXVI and defeated the St. Louis Rams, 20-17, to claim the first NFL title in team history.

The New England Patriots dropped a 22-11 decision to the Green Bay Packers in the preseason opener at Gillette Stadium. QB Tom Brady started the game and played seven snaps in the first two offensive series before being relieved by QB Jimmy Garoppolo, who played the rest of the game. Garoppolo finished 20-of-30 for 159 yards with no touchdowns and one interception.

The Patriots began the game on defense and despite a Green Bay drive that covered 73 yards, managed to stop the Packers on a fourth-down play from the 2-yard line. Later in the first quarter, Green Bay faced a fourth-and-three situation from the New England 43-yard line and attempted a successful fourth-down play when QB Aaron Rodgers completed a 15-yard pass to TE Andrew Quarless. Green Bay continued to the seven-yard line before settling for a field goal and a 3-0 first quarter lead.

On the ensuing drive, RB Jonas Gray broke free for a 55-yard touchdown and then converted the two-point play to give the Patriots an 8-3 lead early in the second quarter. Gray's longest run of his career in the regular season was a 20-yard run at Indianapolis on Nov. 16, 2014.

Green Bay recaptured the lead when backup QB Scott Tolzien threw a 26-yard touchdown pass to WR Jeff Janis on a fourth-and-one play from the New England 26-yard line to make it 9-8 after the two-point play failed.

The Patriots took the lead at half after the defense stopped the Packers on a fourth-down play at the 49-yard line with 53 seconds to play. The offense then moved to the 38-yard line where K Stephen Gostowski drilled a 56-yard field goal as time expired. Gostkowski's longest regular season field goal was a 54-yarder vs. New Orleans on Oct. 13, 2013.

The second half did not get off to a good start for New England. The Patriots took the second half kickoff, but four plays later Garoppolo was intercepted after attempting a throw to WR Josh Boyce at the Green Bay 43-yard line by CB LaDarius Gunter, who returned the pick 28 yards to the New England 29-yard line. On the ensuing play, Green Bay RB Alonzo Harris ran 25 yards for a touchdown to extend the Packers lead to 15-11.

In the fourth quarter, the Patriots drove to the Green Bay 42-yard line, where they attempted to convert a fourth-and-four situation with a Garoppolo scramble up the middle. The play was stopped one-yard short of the first down marker. Green Bay took over and drove 61 yards on eight plays with two third down conversions before rookie QB Brett Hundley completed a 10-yard touchdown pass to RB John Crickett to make it 21-11, with under eight minutes to play.

TOM BRADY MADE THE START

Tom Brady started the game and played the first two offensive series (seven offensive snaps). Brady finished 1-for-4 for 10 yards.

GAROPPOLO ENTERS ON THIRD SERIES

Jimmy Garoppolo entered the game on the third offensive series and played the rest of the game. He finished 20-of-30 for 159 yards with no touchdowns and one interception.

GRAY DOUBLE PLAY

Jonas Gray scored on a 55-yard run in the second quarter and then converted the two-point play. Gray's longest run from scrimmage in the regular season was a 20-yard run at Indianapolis on Nov. 16, 2014. The longest run from scrimmage for the Patriots in 2014 was a 43-yard run by RB Stevan Ridley vs. Cincinnati on Oct. 5, 2014. The last time the Patriots had a run of 50 yards or more was in 2009 when Sammy Morris had a 55-yard run vs. Jacksonville on Dec. 27, 2009.

TEAM LEADER #1

Gray finished the game with 74 yards on seven rushing attempts, including his 55-yard touchdown run.

TEAM LEADER #2

LB Jonathan Freeny, who joined the Patriots as a free agent on March 11, 2015 after four seasons in Miami, led the team with nine tackles against Green Bay.

TEAM LEADER #3

Rookie free agent WR Chris Harper led the team with seven receptions for 48 yards. Harper was signed by the Patriots as a rookie free agent out of California.

GOSTKOWSKI DRILLS A 56-YARD FIELD GOAL

Stephen Gostkowski connected on a 56-yard field goal at the end of the first half. His longest field goal in the regular season was a 54-yard field goal vs. New Orleans on Oct. 13, 2013. Gostkowski's 56-yard field goal is one-yard shy of the team record. The longest field goal in team history was a 57-yarder by Adam Vinatieri at Chicago on Nov. 10, 2002.

The Patriots will try to match Pittsburgh as the only other NFL team with back-to-back Super Bowl wins two separate times.

- *Stephen Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in each of the last three seasons (2012-14). He can become just the third NFL player to lead the NFL in scoring in at least four consecutive seasons, joining Don Hutson (1940-44) and Gino Cappelletti (1963-66).
- *If Stephen Gostkowski leads the NFL in scoring in 2015, he will join Don Hutson (5) and Gino Cappelletti (5) as the only NFL players to lead the NFL in scoring in five seasons. Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008, 2012, 2013 and 2014.

News & Notes

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 22nd season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft



announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles [14], conference crowns [7] and Super Bowl championships [4] than any other NFL team. Super Bowl XLIX was the seventh Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 21 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 16 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

The Patriots had a historic scoring output over a three-game span in October and November 2014. New England tied a team record by scoring 40 or more points in three consecutive games from Oct. 26 to Nov. 16. The Patriots also scored 40 or more in three straight games in 2007. The Patriots have scored 40 or more points 60 times in team history, including 33 times since Bill Belichick became head coach in 2000, and 17 times since 2010.

GROUND CONTROL

The Patriots rushed for 200 yards in a game two times in 2014 with 220 yards in the win vs. Cincinnati on Oct. 5 and 246 yards in the win at Indianapolis on Nov. 16. The Patriots are 65-7 all-time when rushing for 200 yards or more and are 12-0 under Bill Belichick when rushing for 200 yards or more.

SEASON-HIGH OUTPUT

The Patriots scored a season-high 51 points vs. Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014. It is the seventh time the Patriots have scored at least 50 points in the last eight seasons (2007-14). In that span, no other team has more than three games with 50 points.

HALF-CENTURY CLUB

The Patriots scored 51 points against Chicago (10/26/14), marking the 13th time in franchise history that they have broken the 50-point barrier. New England has topped 50 points eight times since 2007. The Patriots' franchise record for most points in a game is 59, achieved twice - on Nov. 18, 2012 against Indianapolis (59-24) and on Oct. 16, 2009 vs. Tennessee (59-0).

PILING UP THE RECEIVING YARDS

Rob Gronkowski and Brandon LaFell each broke the 100-yard receiving mark in the win vs. Chicago (10/26/14). It was the 34th time in team history that the feat has occurred. The last time the Patriots had two 100-yard receivers in a game was on Dec. 15, 2013, at Miami, when Julian Edelman (139) and Danny Amendola (131) each broke the 100-yard mark.

PATS TAME LIONS TOP-RANKED DEFENSE

The Patriots scored 34 points against a Detroit (11/23/14) defense which entered the game allowing an NFL-low 15.6 points per game. Prior to the Patriots-Lions game, the highest point total allowed by the Lions was 24 points to the Carolina Panthers on Sept. 14. Entering the game, Detroit also allowed an NFL-low 290.3 yards per game, and New England totaled 439 yards in the victory.

THIRD QUARTER SCORING RECORD

The Patriots scored 24 points in the third quarter vs. Miami (12/14/14), marking the highest scoring total in team history in the third quarter. The previous high was a 22-point third quarter vs. the Dallas Texans on Nov. 18, 1960.



3X COACH OF THE YEAR



IVY LEAGUE JOURNEY

An lyy League defensive lineman standout at Brown, James Develin graduated in 2010 with a degree in chemical engineering and began lining up interviews with companies he felt might be best suited for the technical skills. However, Develin wanted to give football one last shot, and play in the NFL.

"Football is something that is not around your entire life," Develin told *The Boston Globe.* "I knew if I didn't give it my best shot to play football as a career, that I'd always regret it." Develin made the most of his opportunity by switching positions to fullback. Following stints in the Arena Football League and the now defunct United Football League, Develin caught on with the Cincinnati Bengals practice squad and eventually worked his way to the Patriots 53-man roster full-time in 2013.

WR Julian Edelman set a franchise record with his fourth career punt returned for a touch-down when he returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

EDELMAN TAKES HIS FATHER'S ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told *The Boston Herald.* "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."



Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."





ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to four straight Pro Bowls (2011-14) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the fourth straight season in 2014.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER ON BILL BELICHICK

"Guys have really bought into what we're trying to do here and believing in the goals that we've set to accomplish. We try not to acknowledge all the noise and hype surrounding ballgames. We prepare ourselves to have success by the way we work day-in and day-out on the field and in the meeting room, but it definitely starts with our leadership on this team."



FIRST NFL TD

WR Brian Tyms scored his first NFL touchdown on a 43-yard reception from Tom Brady in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14). He entered the game with two career receptions for 12 yards in seven games. In total for 2014, Tyms had all five receptions for 82 yards, all coming against the Bills.



NATE SOLDER MAKES A GOOD CHOICE

It only took a day for Nate Solder to decide to change from his lifelong position of tight end to tackle after playing his freshman year at Colorado as a tight end. "My coaches came to me and said, 'You'd be an all right tight end, but you'd be an even better tackle," he told the *Boston Globe*. "I've always wanted to be great, so that's why I moved to tackle."

He added over 30 pounds after his redshirt freshman season and was named the team's starting left tackle. He played in 2,540 of 2,542 offensive plays over the next three seasons at Colorado and became an immediate contributor on the Patriots offensive line at right tackle as a rookie before moving to left tackle.



RYAN WENDELL LEADS THE NFL IN PLAY SNAPS IN 2012


Ryan Wendell played a league-high 1,249 snaps in 2012 and it helped earn him a spot on the *USA Today* All-Joe team. Said Wendell: "I think first it says a lot about the organization, our training staff and our strength training coaches, that they do everything they can all season and all off-season and during the spring to keep us healthy throughout the whole season. I think it says more about them than it does about me individually."







JAMIE COLLINS' JOURNEY



The road to the NFL has been anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Meadville, Miss., Collins lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters, who was in her mid 20s.

Collins turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times. "It means a lot. It's my living," Collins told *The Boston Herald*. "It kept me on track." Collins' resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30

miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend. "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the *Herald*. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and can still find a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and did a pretty good job as a rookie."

LB Jamie Collins intercepted a Kyle Orton pass in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14), marking his first regular-season interception. He had his second of the year at the Jets on Dec. 21, 2014. His first career pick came in the 2013 AFC Divisional Playoff vs. Indianapolis (1/11/14).

LB Jamie Collins registered his first NFL two-sack game with a 9-yard sack in the first quarter and a 9-yard sack in the second quarter against San Diego (12/7/14). It was the fourth time in 2014 that a Patriots player had a multiple sack game. LB Dont'a Hightower had two sacks at Minnesota (9/14), DE Chandler Jones had two sacks at Minnesota (9/14) and DL Rob Ninkovich had three sacks at Buffalo (10/12).

TEAM LEADER

Collins had a standout second season in 2014. He led the team in total tackles (109), forced fumbles (4) and fumble recoveries (2), and tied for the team lead in interceptions (2).



WEARING BRUSCHI'S JERSEY #54

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of his rookie year in 2012. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons.

Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another



linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

MULTIPLE SACKS FOR JONES

Jones finished with his fifth career two-sack game at Minnesota (09/14/14). He had three two-sack games in 2013.

JONES ACHIEVES TRIFECTA

DL Chandler Jones blocked a second-quarter Minnesota [9/14/14] 48-yard field goal attempt, recovered the loose ball and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown. It was the fifth blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in Patriots history and the first returned for a touchdown since S Patrick Chung blocked a field goal attempt that was returned 35 yards for a touchdown by DB Kyle Arrington at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010. It is the second field goal block by Jones. He blocked a 39-yard attempt vs. Miami on Oct. 27, 2013. It was Jones' second career touchdown. He recovered an errant shotgun snap squibbed into the end zone at Baltimore on Dec. 22, 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Chandler Jones was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Patriots' 30-7 victory at Minnesota on Sept. 14, 2014. It was the first time in Jones' career that he has received an AFC Player of the Week honor. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November last season and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month in September 2012.

Jones blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt and returned it 58 yards for a touchdown to give New England a 24-7 halftime lead at Minnesota (9/14). He also finished the game with eight total tackles and his fifth career two-sack game.

The last time the Patriots earned an AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor was Week 10 of the 2011 season when Andre Carter tied a team record with four sacks at N.Y. Jets [11/13/11].



THIRD TEAM'S A CHARM

Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just 11 days. After selecting him in the sixth round with the 198th overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on Aug. 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 1, but lasted only 10 days, as the Buccaneers released him on Sept., 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on Sept. 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones finished his rookie season with six sacks.

Jones' sudden success may have come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-two time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the *The Boston Herald*, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

JONES SAVES THE DAY; EARNS AFC HONORS

Chris Jones blocked a 58-yard field goal attempt by the Jets on the final play of the game to preserve New England's 27-25 win (10/16/14). It was the first blocked field goal for the Patriots since Chandler Jones blocked a 48-yard try by Minnesota's Blair Walsh earlier this season. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance in the victory.







DOUBLE TROUBLE: DB DEVIN McCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joins Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

McCOURTY REGISTERS CAREER LONG

DB Devin McCourty returned a first quarter interception 60 yards to the Minnesota [09/14/14] 1-yard line to set up a Patriots touchdown. It is the longest interception return of his career. He had a 50-yard return as a rookie in 2010 at Detroit [11/25] on Thanksgiving Day.



A NOSE FOR THE FOOTBALL

Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries [13] over the last five seasons [2010-2014] than any other NFL player. J.J. Watt is second during that time with 11 opponent fumble recoveries.



CAREER DAY IN BUFFALO

Ninkovich finished with a three-sack game for the first time in his career in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14), to add to two two-sack performances vs. Miami (1/2/11) and at Carolina (11/18/13).

WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

CRAZY EIGHTS

Ninkovich raised his 2014 total to a team-high of 8.0 sacks in 2014. Ninkovich has had at least 8.0 sacks in three consecutive seasons (8.0 in 2012, 8.0 in 2013 and 8.0 in 2014), becoming the first Patriots player to have at least 8.0 sacks in three consecutive seasons since Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett achieved the feat from 1985-87 (1985, 16 1/2, 1986, 9 1/2 and 1987, 12 1/2).

NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Buffalo QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from former New York Giants and Indianapolis QB Curtis Painter.





DB LOGAN RYAN AND DB DURON HARMON

CLASSMATES REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to working together. Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told *The Boston Globe.* "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

RYAN'S FIRST PICK FOR SIX

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown N.Y. Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. The last Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was Kyle Arrington in 2010. The last rookie Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was James Sanders in 2005:

RYAN RETURNS... TO SCHOOL

When Logan Ryan decided to leave Rutgers and enter the NFL Draft after his redshirt junior season in 2012, he made a promise to his parents that after his rookie year, he would return to school and earn his degree.

Ryan kept his promise and graduated in the spring of 2014 with a degree in labor relations and a minor in psychology.

"I committed to Rutgers, not only as a football player, but as a student, so I was going to make sure I finished that end too," Ryan told NJ.com.

"It's a big accomplishment in my life. I held my word to my parents and stuck with it and I'm fortunate. It took a lot of work, but I was able to go back and finish and walk in graduation."

FIRST NFL SACK RESULTS IN TURNOVER

Ryan forced a fumble on his first NFL sack vs. Miami (10/27/13), a week after returning his first career interception for a touchdown. Ryan strip-sacked Ryan Tannehill, forcing a fumble recovered by Rob Ninkovich that led in to a touchdown. The play marked the second time in as many weeks that a Ryan turnover led to Patriots points.






FRANCHISE SCORING LEADER

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).







PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times in their 55-year history. Sixteen of those playoff berths have come in the 21 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 17 division crowns, including 12 in the last 14 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions [1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998]. The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.
