## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (10-3) at MIAMI DOLPHINS (7-6)

Sunday, Dec. 15, 2013 * Sun Life Stadium $(75,192)$ * 1:00 p.m. ET
The New England Patriots improved to $10-3$ with their third straight come-frombehind victory last Sunday against the Cleveland Browns. The Patriots rallied for a 27-26 victory after the Browns took a 26-14 fourth-quarter lead with 2:39 remaining. After the Browns extended the lead to 26-14, the Patriots scored two touchdowns in a 30 -second span (sandwiched around an onside kick recovery) to take a 27-26 lead on Julian Edelman's 2-yard scoring grab with 1:01 remaining and Danny Amendola's 1 -yard scoring catch with 31 seconds left in the game.

The Patriots can clinch their fifth straight AFC East Title and qualify for the playoffs for the $21^{\text {st }}$ time in its 54 year history with a win this week against the Miami Dolphins. It would also be the $15^{\text {th }}$ playoff berth in the 20 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths that the team earned in its first 34 years of existence.

The Patriots own the NFL's best December record since 2001 with a 47-6 (.887) record, Bill Belichick has the best December record among NFL head coaches in NFL history at 49-8 (.860) and Tom Brady has the best winning percentage for any quarterback since the 1970 NFL merger with a 43-6 record for a .878 winning percentage.

## Robert Kraft News $\boldsymbol{Z}$ Nates

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 20th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the
 Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (12), conference crowns (6) and Super Bowl championships (3) than any other NFL team. The Patriots have made six Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 19 seasons, the Patriots qualified for the playoffs 14 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season tickets are capped and more than 50,000 fans are on a season ticket waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 214 consecutive home games, including playoff and preseason games (dating back to the 1994 season opener).

## QUARTERBACK STABILITY

Over the last 20 years, the Patriots have had 14 quarterbacks on their active roster. Of this group, only four quarterbacks have started a regular season or post-season game for the club, and only two (Tom Brady and Drew Bledsoe) have started on Opening Day, the fewest of any AFC East team in both categories. The only other NFL team to have started fewer quarterbacks over the last 20 years is the Green Bay Packers, with three total starters (Brett Favre, Aaron Rodgers, and Matt Flynn) and two Opening Day starters (Brett Favre and Aaron Rodgers).

## PATRIOTS A MODEL OF CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

## COACHING CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

In a league of constant change at the head coaching position, the Patriots have been a model of consistency under Robert Kraft. Since Kraft took ownership of the team in 1994, the Patriots have had just three head coaches - Bill Parcells (19941996), Pete Carroll (1996-1999) and current head coach Bill Belichick (2000-present), who is in his $14^{\text {th }}$ season in New England and is the longest-tenured active head coach in the NFL. The only other NFL teams with fewer head coaches since 1994 is the Pittsburgh Steelers, who have had two - Bill Cowher (1992-2006) and Mike Tomlin (2007-present).

## Kraft's success as an owner has brought the Patriots a great

 increase in national recognition. Prior to Kraft's ownership, the Patriots had been featured on the cover of just four issues of Sports Illustrated (1966, 1977, 1981, and 1986). Since 1994, New England has graced the cover a total of 27 times, including 17 that feature Tom Brady alone.

## PATRIDTS VS. DDLPHINS



The New England Patriots and Miami Dolphins will square off for the $97^{\text {th }}$ time, including three playoff games, in their $48^{\text {th }}$ year as division foes and for the second of two meetings of the 2013 season. The Patriots extended their streak to seven straight wins over Miami after a 27-17 victory at Gillette Stadium in the first meeting on Oct. 27, 2013. The Patriots have won three straight at Miami.

The Dolphins and Patriots met for the first time in 1966 and began playing twice a year during the regular season in 1967, except in 1982 during the strike year.

The Patriots swept the series in the last three seasons (2010-2012) and will be looking for a fourth straight sweep and their $10^{\text {th }}$ series sweep overall this week.

The Patriots have swept the season series for three straight seasons two times (1986-88) and (2010-12) but have never swept the series for four straight seasons.

The Patriots have won nine of the last 10 games against Miami.

The Patriots have had the upper hand at home against Miami, as they hold a 30-17 record in games played in New England in the regular-season, including a 10-2 record at Gillette Stadium. But the Patriots are only 15-33 all-time in Miami, including two postseason games.

The two have played three times in the postseason with New England holding a 2-1 advantage.


## PATRIOTS-DOLPHINS QUICK HITS

- Since Bill Belichick became Patriots head coach in 2000, New England is 18-9 (.667) against the Miami Dolphins.
- Since 2000, the Patriots are 64-22 (.744) against AFC East opponents. The Patriots are 18-9 against the Dolphins over that span and are 19-9 against the New York Jets and 24-3 against the Buffalo Bills in that time. The Patriots were 3-1 against Indianapolis from 2000 through 2001 when they were in the AFC East.
- The Patriots have not been swept in their season series with a divisional opponent since 2000, when they lost both games to Miami and also to the New York Jets.
- Tom Brady owns a $17-6$ record when playing against Miami. While he is 11-1 against Miami in home games, including wins in the last seven games, Brady is just 6-5 in games played in Miami.
- Brady's only home loss to Miami was on Jan. 1, 2006 in the final game of the 2005 season when the Patriots had already locked up the AFC East Title and Brady played in the first quarter before being relieved by backup Matt Cassel.


## PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady is scheduled to start at quarterback against Miami for the $24^{\text {th }}$ time and has compiled a 17-6 record in his previous 23 starts against the Dolphins. Brady is $58-13$ in his career as a starter in the regular-season against AFC East opponents, with six of the 13 losses coming to the Dolphins. One of those losses was in the final game of the 2005 season when Brady was pulled after the first quarter.

Tom Brady threw two touchdown passed in the final 61 seconds of the game to rally the Patriots to a 27-26 come-from-behind win over the Cleveland Browns, as the Patriots improved to a 10-3 record.

The Patriots trailed 6-0 at halftime. It was the fifth time in six games that they were behind at intermission. The Patriots deficit grew to 19-3 when WR Josh Gordon scored on an 80-yard catch and run with 1:25 left in the third quarter.

RB Shane Vereen's 6-yard touchdown run and a subsequent 2-point conversion cut the lead to $19-14$ with six seconds left in the third quarter. New England fell behind 26-14 when QB Jason Campbell threw his third touchdown pass on a 4-yarder to TE Jordan Cameron with 2:39 left to play.

The Patriots responded on the next series when Brady followed a 23-yard pass to WR Julian Edelman with a 19yard pass to Edelman to get into Cleveland territory. A combination of short passes from Brady to RB Shane Vereen and Edelman helped get in position for a 2 -yard touchdown pass to Edelman to make it 26-21 with 1:01 left to play.

The Patriots then executed a successful onsides kick that was recovered by CB Kyle Arrington at the Cleveland 40-yard line. After a 10-yard pass from Brady to WR Danny Amendola, Cleveland CB Leon McFadden was called for pass interference on a pass into the end zone to give the Patriots a first down at the 1-yard line with 35 seconds to play. On the next play, Brady connected with Amendola on 1-yard pass to give the Patriots a 27-26 lead.

After a failed two-point play, Cleveland took the ensuing kick and moved to the 40 -yard line where K Billy Cundiff missed on a 58-yard field goal try with one second to play.

Brady finished the game with 418 yards passing but completed just 7-of-19 pass attempts for 95 yards in the first half. He was 25 -of- 33 for 323 yards with two touchdowns in a big second half.

Vereen finished with 12 receptions for 153 receptions, setting single-game franchise records for most receptions and most receiving yards by a running back. Vereen's 153 receiving yards topped the 53-year old franchise running back record of 124 receiving yards, achieved by Dick Christy against the Oakland Raiders on Nov. 4, 1960.

The Patriots had only one of their first six first half drives reach Cleveland territory, but that drive stalled at the Cleveland 37-yard line. Cleveland took a 3-0 lead after taking the opening kickoff into New England territory, resulting in a 43-yard field goal. Later in the first quarter, Brady was intercepted by Cleveland at the 44-yard line, leading to a second Browns field goal early in the second quarter.

Campbell, who finished with 391 passing yards and three touchdowns, had a 40-yard touchdown pass to TE Gary Barnidge in the third quarter and his 80-yarder to Gordon to take a 19-3 lead.

The Patriots scored on their final five drives to secure the win.

Bill Belichick has coached the Patriots to 11 straight seasons with 10 or more wins, adding to his NFL record streak. In 2011, Belichick became the first coach in NFL history with nine straight seasons with at least 10 victories. The win over Cleveland extended his record to 11 straight seasons of 10 wins. George Seifert has the second most consecutive 10win seasons with eight from 1989-1996 for San Francisco.

## YARDS BY A RUNNING BACK

Shane Vereen had 12 receptions for 153 yards, setting single-game franchise records for most receptions and most receiving yards by a running back. ## PATRIOTS RECOVER FIRST ONSIDES KICK

 SINCE JAN. 1, 1995The Patriots' Kyle Arrington recovered an onside kick with 1:01 left in the game, marking the first time the Patriots recovered an onside kick since Jan. 1, 1995. In that game, a wild-card playoff game at Cleveland, Corwin Brown recovered a Matt Bahr onside kick with 1:28 left in the game and New England trailing the Bill Belichick-led Browns 20-13. Unlike in the 2013 Browns game, however, in that game the Patriots did not convert their post-onside kick opportunity and lost the playoff game, 20-13.

## PATRIOTS RECOVER FIRST KICK IN A WIN FOR THE SECOND TIME IN TEAM HISTORY

Prior to the Browns game, the only other time the Patriots recovered an onside kick in a victory was on Sept. 27, 1964, when Jim Lee Hunt recovered a Gino Cappelletti onside kick near the end of the first half. Cappelletti missed an ensuing field goal attempt with the Patriots holding a 13-10 secondquarter lead in a game they eventually won 26-10.

BRADY IS THE FIRST TO BREAK 300 YARDS AGAINST THE BROWNS IN 2013
Tom Brady's 418 -yard performance is the first time a passer has broken the 300 -yard passing mark against Cleveland in 2013. The Browns entered the game with the $4^{\text {th }}$ ranked defense.

## BRADY STRONG IN THE SECOND HALF

Tom Brady has thrown for over 200 yards in the second half in the last three games now after throwing for 323 yards in the second half against Cleveland. It is the first time in his career that he has had three straight games with at least 200 yards in the second half. Brady put up 263 yards after halftime against both the Broncos and the Texans in the previous two games. Brady was 25 -of- 33 for 323 yards and two touchdowns in the second half against the Browns. In his last three games, Brady is 67 -for-89 (75\%) for 849 yards, 6 TDs and 0 interceptions for a 127.5 rating in the second half.

## PATRIOTS HAVE THREE BIG RECEPTIONS FROM RUNNING BACKS

- FB James Develin had a career-best 31-yard reception in the second quarter.
- RB LeGarrette Blount had his first reception as a member of the Patriots that resulted in a 32-yard gain in the third quarter to set up a field goal.
- RB Shane Vereen had a 50 -yard reception in the third quarter. The catch was the longest by a Patriots running back this season and was the second longest of Vereen's career, trailing only his 83 -yard touchdown catch at the New York Jets on Thanksgiving 2012.

Tom Brady's 2-point conversion pass to WR Julian Edelman was the team's first successful 2-point play since converting two in the 2011 season when Danny Woodhead had a 2point rushing play on Jan. 1, 2012 vs. Buffalo and 2-point rush on Sept. 18, 2011 vs. San Diego. The Brady to Edelman play was the first successful 2-point pass play since WR Randy Moss caught a 2-point play on Nov. 8, 2009 vs. Miami.


## BRADY'S THIRD-STRAIGHT GAME WITH 300

 YARDS PASSINGTom Brady had his third straight game with 300 or more passing yards, after having thrown for 344 yards against Denver on Nov. 24 and having totaled 371 yards at Houston on Dec. 1. Brady's personal record for most 300-yard games is five straight in 2009. Brady has thrown for 300 or more yards four times in the last five games, also having totaled 432 yards against Pittsburgh on Nov. 3. In the last five games, the only time Brady did not have 300 or more yards was at Carolina on Nov. 18, when he had 296 yards.

Tom Brady had a pair of touchdown passes against Cleveland to raise his 2013 total to 21 touchdowns. Brady has thrown 20 or more touchdown passes 11 times in his career.

## GOSTKOWSKI HAS 22 STRAIGHT FOURTH

 QUARTER FIELD GOALSStephen Gostkowski has made 22 consecutive fourth-quarter field goals, including a 50 -yarder in the fourth quarter against the Browns.

## GOSTKOWSKI REACHES 200 FIELD GOALS

Stephen Gostkowski's 50 -yard field goal in the fourth quarter was his 200th field goal for the Patriots, joining Adam Vinatieri (262) as the only players in Patriots history with 200 or more field goals.

GOSTKOWSKI REACHES 30 FIELD GOALS FOR THE SECOND TIME
Gostkowski added two field goals to increase his 2013 total to 30 field goals. It is the second time in his career that he has reached at least 30 field goals in a season. He set a franchise record with 36 field goals in 2008. He is the second Patriots player to reach 30 field goals in two seasons. Adam Vinatieri had 31 field goals in 1998 and 2004.

PATRIOTS SCORE TWO TOUCHDOWNS IN FINAL 1:01 TO WIN
The Patriots rallied for a 27-26 victory after the Browns took a 26-14 fourth-quarter lead following Jordan Cameron's 4yard touchdown reception with 2:39 remaining. Cleveland had previously held a 19-3 lead until Shane Vereen's 6-yard touchdown run and a subsequent 2-point conversion cut the lead to 19-14 with six seconds left in the third quarter. After the Browns extended the lead to $26-14$, the Patriots scored two touchdowns in a 30 -second span (sandwiched around an onside kick recovery) to take a 27-26 lead on Julian Edelman's 2-yard scoring grab with 1:01 remaining and Danny Amendola's 1 -yard scoring catch with 31 seconds left in the game.
TOM BRADY LEADS FIFTH COMEBACK OF 2013; TYING FOR MOST IN HIS CAREER
Tom Brady engineered his 41st career game-winning performance to lead the Patriots to a victory following a fourth-quarter deficit or tie. Brady has achieved the feat five times this season, and has turned the trick in three consecutive weeks. Brady's five such performances in 2013 tie the most in a regular season in his career, joining the 2003 season. Brady had four regular-season game-winning performances in 2007 and 2005.

## BRADY HAS FINAL MINUTE, GAME WINNING TOUCHDOWN PASS

Tom Brady threw a 1 -yard scoring pass to Danny Amendola with 31 seconds left in the game to give the Patriots a 27-26 lead. It is the sixth time in Brady's career that he has thrown a game-winning touchdown pass in the final minute of the game to turn a Patriots deficit into a Patriots win. Brady also achieved the feat earlier this year in New England's 30-27 win over New Orleans on Oct. 13, when he threw a touchdown pass to Kenbrell Thompkins with five seconds left. This season marks the first time in Brady's career that he has achieved the feat twice in one season.

## PATRIOTS NOTES OF INTEREST

BILL BELICHICK

- Bill Belichick (215) moved past Hall of Famer Chuck Noll (209) into fifth place all-time on the NFL wins list with the Patriots 3027 win against New Orleans. Curly Lambeau is in fourth place with 229 career wins.
-Belichick (18) needs one more postseason victory to tie Don Shula (19) for second place in postseason wins. Tom Landry (20) is in first place.
-Belichick has five conference titles and needs one more to match Don Shula, who led his teams to six Super Bowls.
- Belichick has led the Patriots to 13 consecutive winning records (2001-13), third all-time behind 20 by Tom Landry (1966-85) followed by 14 by Curly Lambeau (1934-47).


## TOM BRADY

-Tom Brady has 58 career 300 -yard games and ranks fifth alltime for most 300 -yard games and third among active players.

- Brady (34) reached 30 touchdown passes in 2012 for the third straight season and became just the fifth player in NFL history with at least 30 touchdown passes in four seasons overall.
- Brady $(4,827)$ reached 4,000 passing yards in 2012. He is just the fifth player in NFL history to reach 4,000 yards in five or more seasons: Peyton Manning (13), Drew Brees (8), Dan Marino (6) and Brett Favre (6).
- Brady is the only quarterback in NFL history to have thrown for at least one touchdown pass in each game for three consecutive seasons (2010-12).
- Brady had 401 completions in 2012 for the second straight season and joined Drew Brees (5), Peyton Manning (2) and Matthew Stafford (2) as the only NFL quarterbacks with at least two 400 completion seasons.


## ROB GRONKOWSKI

-Rob Gronkowski (10 touchdowns in 2010 and 18 in 2011) became the first tight end in NFL history with three straight 10plus touchdown seasons after reaching 11 for the season in 2012. Gronkowski and Antonio Gates (13 in 2004 and 10 in 2005) are the only tight ends to have back-to-back 10-plus touchdown seasons.

- Gronkowski joins Randy Moss (2007, 2008 and 2009) and Corey Dillon $(2004,2005,2006)$ as the only Patriots with three straight 10 -plus touchdown seasons and three 10 -plus seasons overall.
- Gronkowski reached 40 touchdowns in just 47 games. He became the fastest to 40 touchdowns. Antonio Gates previously held the record after reaching 40 touchdowns in 71 games.


## ROB NINKOVICH

- Rob Ninkovich has 11 fumble recoveries over the last four seasons (2010-13), the most of any player in the NFL over that time. Vince Wilfork is second with seven.

## STEVAN RIDLEY

-Stevan Ridley rushed for 1,263 yards in 2012 and will be looking to become the third Patriots player with back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons, joining Jim Nance (1966-67) and Curtis Martin (1995-97).
-Ridley scored 12 touchdowns in 2012 and will look to become the fourth running back in team history with back-to-back 10plus touchdowns in a season, joining Corey Dillon (2004, 2005, 2006), BenJarvus Green-Ellis (2010, 2011) and Curtis Martin (1995, 1996).

## PATRIOTS 2013 TEAM CAPTAINS

The Patriots team captains were elected by their teammates. Quarterback Tom Brady and G Logan Mankins are the offensive captains. Defensive lineman Vince Wilfork and LB Jerod Mayo are the defensive captains. Wide receiver Matthew Slater is the special teams captain. Brady has been chosen as a captain for the $12^{\text {th }}$ straight season. Wilfork is a captain for the sixth straight season, while Mayo is in his fifth season serving as a captain. Mankins, and Slater are captains for a third time.

## PATRIOTS FINISH WITH THREE RECEIVERS OVER 100 YARDS FOR THE FIRST TIME IN TEAM HISTORY VS. PITTSBURGH

The Patriots had three players finish with 100 yards receiving in a single game for the first time in team history when Rob Gronkowski finished with 143 yards, Aaron Dobson with 130 yards and Danny Amendola with 122 yards vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3, 2013. It is the $18^{\text {th }}$ time since the merger that a team has had three players finish with 100 yards receiving in the same game.

## PATRIOTS ARE THIRD TEAM IN NFL HISTORY WITH THREE PLAYERS WITH 120-PLUS RECEIVING YARDS AND ONE OR MORE TOUCHDOWNS IN THE SAME GAME

The Patriots had three receivers with 120 or more receiving yards and a touchdown, as Rob Gronkowski (9-143-1), Aaron Dobson (5-130-2) and Danny Amendola (4-122-1) did so vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 13, 2013. It is the third time in NFL history that a team has had three receivers top the 120 yard mark and score a touchdown in a game. The Dallas Cowboys achieved the feat earlier this season in their 51-48 loss to the Denver Broncos on Oct. 6, 2013. In that game, the Cowboys' Terrence Williams (4-151-1), Dez Bryant (6-141-2) and Jason Witten (7-121-1) all had 120 or more yards and a touchdown. The only other time in NFL history that a team had such an accomplishment was the Houston Oilers on Nov. 19, 1961 against the New York Titans. In that game, the Oilers' Bill Groman (5-152-3), Charley Hennigan (8-123-1) and Billy Cannon (7-122-3) had 120 or more yards to go along with a touchdown as the Oilers beat New York 49-13.

## PATRIOTS 55 POINTS AND 610 TOTAL YARDS ARE THE MOST EVER AGAINST PITISBURGH

The 55 points and the 610 total yards by the Patriots vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3, 2013 are the most ever against the Steelers in their 81-year history. Pittsburgh gave up 54 points in a 1985 loss at San Diego and 559 yards in 1988 at Cincinnati.

The Patriots played a penalty free game against Cincinnati on Oct. 6 and at Houston on Dec. 1. It is the fourth and fifth time in team history that the team did not commit a penalty in a game and the first time that the Patriots have done so twice in the same season.

## PATRIOTS COMPLETE BIGGEST COMEBACK IN

 TEAM HISTORYThe Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos 34-31 in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history. The Patriots trailed the Broncos $24-0$ at halftime. New England's previous best comeback win was from 23 points down on Sept. 16, 1984, when the Patriots came back from a 23-0 deficit to win $38-23$ vs. Seattle on Sept. 16, 1984. The Patriots came from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 2322, on Dec, 21, 1996. The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently on Jan. 1, 2012 against Buffalo.

## TOM BRADY IS HOT WHEN IT IS COLD

Tom Brady is now 26-5 as a starting QB when the game-time temperature is 32 degrees or lower, throwing 53 touchdowns and just 22 interceptions. The patriots had two games in 2013 with temperatures 30 degrees or colder. It was 22 degrees at kickoff in the win vs. Denver on Nov. 24 and 30 degrees in the win vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8.

## COLDEST REGULAR SEASON HOME GAME IN GILLETTE STADIUM HISTORY

The temperature at kickoff was 22 degrees, making the Broncos game on Nov. 24, 2013 the coldest regular season home game in Gillette Stadium history. It is the coldest Patriots home game since Dec. 26, 1993 vs. Indianapolis at Foxboro Stadium when the temperature was 19 degrees. The Patriots won that game $38-0$. The coldest game ever at Gillette Stadium was the 2003 AFC Divisional Playoff game vs. Tennessee, when the Patriots beat the Titans 17-14 in temperature of 4 degrees with a wind chill of -10 .

## COLDEST NOVEMBER GAME IN TEAM HISTORY

The game against Denver on Nov. 24, 2013 was the coldest November game in team history at 22 degrees. The previous coldest was Nov. 22, 1987 vs. Indianapolis in 26 degrees in Sullivan Stadium. The Patriots won that game, 24-0.

## PATRIOTS HOLD BRONCOS PASS OFFENSE TO 132 YARDS

The Patriots held the Broncos' pass offense to 132 net yards, despite Denver coming into the game averaging an NFL-best 350.4 passing yards per game on Nov. 24, 2013. New England's passing attack totaled 324 net yards, ahead of its average of 237.1 net passing yards heading into the game.

He is the first player in team history with two punt returns of 40 or more yards in the same game. Troy Brown came close in 2000 when he had returns of 39 and 66 against Tampa Bay.

## EDELMAN'S 47-YARD RUN IS THE LONGEST RUN BY A PATS WIDE RECEIVER

Edelman had a 47-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. Indianapolis (11/18/12). It was the longest run from scrimmage for the Patriots in 2012, topping Steven Ridley's 41 -yard run against St. Louis in London on Oct. 28. It is the longest run ever by a Patriots receiver, topping Troy Brown's 35 -yard run vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000. It was the longest run by a Patriots player since Sammy Morris had a 55 -yard run on Dec. 27, 2009 vs. Jacksonville.

## EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed $56 \%$ of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL - covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender - he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

## EDELMAN TAKES HIS FATHER'S ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011. This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the Seventh Round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman, who has already passed his career highs in receiving yards and receptions this season, remains focused on the lessons his father (Frank Edelman) taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the Boston Herald. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

## GRONKOWSKI SECOND PATRIOTS TIGHT END TO REACH 1,000 YARDS

Gronkowski became the second tight end in New England Patriots history to go over 1,000 receiving yards in 2011. He broke TE Ben Coates ( 1,174 yards in 1994) franchise record en route to his NFL tight end receiving record of 1,327 yards.

## GRONKOWSKI BECOMES FIRST PATRIOTS TIGHT END TO RECORD A RUSHING TOUCHDOWN

Gronkowski scored a 2-yard touchdown on a lateral from Tom Brady in the third quarter vs. Indianapolis (12/4/11), becoming the first tight end in Patriots history to score a rushing touchdown. Gronkowski is the first NFL tight end to score a rushing touchdown since Tennessee's Bo Scaife had a 31-yard scoring run against Baltimore on Nov. 12, 2006. Bill Belichick recently acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

## OL WILL SVITEK <br> WILL SVITEK TAKES A HIKE TO REMEMBER

Will Svitek was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia. When he was 2, his parents took him and his three brothers out of the communist country. They left in secret with no money and only the clothes on their backs. Saying they were on a day hike, they walked 14 hours through the mountains and ended up in Austria. The family spent eight months in a refugee camp until being legalized to come to the United States. "My parents were hard-working immigrants who came here to achieve the American Dream and help their sons reach their full potential," said Svitek. "I think they instilled it in me to do everything well. I am a competitive person on the field and in the classroom and I don't think you can just turn that switch off."

## WR KENBRELL THOMPKINS

## JUDGE KEEPS AUTOGRAPHED PICTURE OF KENBRELL THOMPKINS ON HIS DESK

Florida judge Dennis Murphy will never forget Kenbrell Thompkins. This is especially true now, as Murphy keeps an autographed picture of Thompkins on his desk from the rookie's playing days at El Camino Community College. The picture was a gift from Thompkins, who has Murphy to thank for granting him special probation conditions after a drug charge in 2007 that allowed Thompkins to leave his crime-riddled neighborhood in Miami, Fla. and attend El Camino. "I'm a firm believer in giving youth a chance to try and turn it around," Murphy told The Boston Globe. After being arrested seven times between the ages of 15 and 18, Thompkins excelled at El Camino and went on to play at the University of Cincinnati en route to fulfilling his NFL dream. Thompkins earned his degree from Cincinnati in criminal justice.

## RB SHANE VEREEN

RB SHANE VEREEN SETS TEAM RECORD FOR RECEPTIONS AND RECEIVING YARDS BY A RUNNING BACK
Shane Vereen had 12 receptions for 153 yards vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013, setting single-game franchise records for most receptions and most receiving yards by a running back. Vereen's 153 receiving yards topped the 53 -year-old franchise running back record of 124 receiving yards, achieved by Dick Christy against the Oakland Raiders on Nov. 4, 1960. Vereen's 12 receptions topped the previous Patriots running back record of 11 receptions, achieved three times, most recently by Kevin Faulk on Nov. 3, 2000 against Tampa Bay.

RYAN WENDELL LEADS THE NFL IN PLAY SNAPS IN 2012
Ryan Wendell played a league-high 1,249 snaps in 2012 and it helped earn him a spot on the USA Today All-Joe team in 2012. Said Wendell: "I think first it says a lot about the organization, our training staff and our strength training coaches, that they do everything they can all season and all off-season and during the spring to keep us healthy throughout the whole season. I think it says more about them then it does about me individually.

## CB KYLE ARRINGTON

## WHAT IS IN A NUMBER

When Arrington was first making the transition from Hofstra to the NFL in 2008, he was assigned jersey No. 42. At that point in his career, he was cut by both the Eagles and Buccaneers.

When Arrington first arrived in New England as a practice squad player in 2009, he initially donned No. 27. But when No. 24 became available, a result of Jonathan Wilhite leaving in free agency after the 2010 season, Arrington pounced on it.

The reason is that it reflects how he's flipped his NFL fortunes -- from a No. 42 struggling to hang on to a No. 24 who has carved out a role on a winning team.
Arrington moved from 24 to 25 in an agreement with Adrian Wilson this past season to accommodate the veteran's desire to keep the same jersey he has worn during his 12-year NFL career.

## LB JAMIE COLLINS

## JAMIE COLLINS' JOURNEY

The road to the NFL has been anything but easy for rookie linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Meadville, Miss., Collins lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters, who was in her mid 20s. Collins turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times. "It means a lot. It's my living," Collins told the Boston Herald. "It kept me on track." Collins' resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30 miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend. "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the Herald. "Anybody that's gone through the thing that he's gone through and still find a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and done a pretty good job as a rookie."

## S STEVE GREGORY

## STEVE GREGORY WAS ABOUT TO ENTER THE

POLICE ACADEMY WHEN SAN DIEGO CALLED
Steve Gregory's father and stepmother are New York City police officers and both were on duty during the events of September 11, 2001. Following his college career at Syracuse, Gregory took the test to enter the police academy. He found out he passed the test on the same day that the San Diego Chargers called him to offer him a rookie free agent contract.

## GREGORY SETS CAREER HIGH WITH HIS THIRD INTERCEPTION OF THE SEASON IN 2012

Steve Gregory set a single-season career-high when he intercepted Miami QB Ryan Tannehill in the first quarter for his third on the season in the season-finale on Dec. 30, 2012. The pick helped set up a 9 -yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Wes Welker. Gregory's previous single-season high was two interceptions in 2010 when he played for San Diego.

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey \#45 but was switched to jersey \#54 prior to the start of the regular season. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore \#54 for 13 seasons. Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

## DE CHANDLER JONES

2012 FIRST ROUND PICK CHANDLER JONES FOLLOWS IN BROTHERS' FOOTSTEPS
Chandler Jones has two brothers, Arthur, a fifth-round NFL Draft selection by the Baltimore Ravens in 2010, who was a Syracuse defensive tackle, and Jon "Bones" Jones, a UFC fighter and the reigning Lightweight Champion.

## JONES IS PILING UP SACKS

Jones has three two-sack games in 2013 with two vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3 and two in both 2013 meetings against the New York Jets. He now has $101 / 2$ sacks on the year. The Patriots have now had a player finish with 10 or more sacks in a season 15 times in team history.

## JONES IS FIRST PATRIOT TO START HIS CAREER WITH TWO 6-PLUS SACK SEASONS SINCE CHRIS SLADE

Jones has $101 / 2$ sacks in 2013 and had 6.0 sacks as a rookie in 2012. He is the first Patriots player with 5 -plus sacks in each of his first two NFL seasons since Chris Slade in 1993 (9.0) and 1994 (9.5).

JONES HAS FORCED THREE FUMBLES ON SACKS Jones had three forced fumbles in 2012. Jones forced a fumble on a sack at Tennessee (9/9/12), vs. Arizona (9/16/12) and at Seattle (10/14/12).

## JONES NAMED AFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH FOR NOVEMBER

Jones was been named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November by the National Football League. It is the first time in his career that he has received the honor. Jones registered 16 total tackles and four sacks in the team's three November games to push his season total to $101 / 2$ sacks. The Patriots have now had a player finish with 10 or more sacks in a season 15 times. Jones has $161 / 2$ sacks ( 6 in 2012 and $101 / 2$ in 2013) in his first two NFL seasons, which ranks third in team history for most sacks in a player's first two seasons. Garin Veris had 21 and Chris Slade had $181 / 2$. Jones is the first Patriots player to earn an AFC Defensive Player of the Month honor since S Eugene Wilson was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for September in 2004.

## DT CHRIS JONES

## THIRD TEAM IS A CHARM FOR CHRIS JONES

Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the rookie defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just 11 days. After selecting him in the $6^{\text {TH }}$ round with the $198^{\text {th }}$ overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on Aug. 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 1 but lasted only ten days, as the Buccaneers released him on September 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on September 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones has 5.0 so far. Jones' sudden success may come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-two time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the Boston Herald, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

## DB DEVIN MCCOURTY

DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVIN MCCOURTY
After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the $12^{\text {th }}$ set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of three active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

Devin McCourty had his second career two-interception game in the win at Buffalo on Sept. 30, 2012. He had his first interception of the 2012 season when he picked off a Ryan Fitzpatrick pass at the Buffalo 42 -yard line in the first quarter. He picked off his second pass in the fourth quarter. It is McCourty's second career two-interception game. He had his first two-interception game at Detroit on Nov. 25, 2010. The Patriots are 9-0 when McCourty has at least one interception in a game.

## MCCOURTY HAS A 104-YARD KICKOFF RETURN FOR A TOUCHDOWN; SECOND LONGEST IN TEAM HISTORY

Devin McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the first quarter vs. the Jets $(10 / 21 / 12)$, the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at the New York Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. McCourty was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries (11) over the last four seasons (2010-2013) than any other NFL player. Chicago's Brian Urlacher (retired) and Vince Wilfrok are second during that time with seven opponent fumble recoveries.


## NINKOVICH: WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

## NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2 -yard touchdown pass from Dallas QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from New York Giants QB Curtis Painter.

## DB LOGAN RYAN AND DB DURON HARMON

## RUTGERS CLASSMATES LOGAN RYAN AND DURON HARMON REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Rookie defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to learning a new system together. Four years ago, Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft. Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did four years ago at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told the Boston Globe. "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

## RYAN RETURNS FIRST PICK FOR A TOUCHDOWN

 Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter at the New York Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. The last Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was Kyle Arrington in 2010 against the Green Bay Packers, when he took back a Matt Flynn pass 36 yards for a touchdown. RYAN'S FIRST NFL SACK RESULTS IN A FORCED FUMBLE
Ryan forced a fumble on his first NFL sack vs. Miami on Oct. 27, a week after returning his first career interception for a touchdown. Ryan strip-sacked Ryan Tannehill, forcing a fumble on a 10 -yard sack that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich to give the Patriots possession at the Dolphins' 13 -yard line in the third quarter. The play set up a 3 -play, 13 -yard drive that ended in Brandon Bolden's 2 -yard touchdown run that tied the game at 17 in the third quarter. The play marked the second time in as many weeks that a Ryan turnover has led to Patriots points. Last week against the New York Jets, Ryan scored on a 79 -yard interception return for a touchdown.

Logan Ryan intercepted Peyton Manning at the Broncos' 30 -yard line in the fourth quarter with the Patriots trailing 24-21. The play set up Julian Edelman's 14 -yard scoring catch that gave the Patriots a 28-24 lead.

## SPIKES IS A THROWBACK

Spikes, who patterns his style of play after Hall of Fame linebacker Dick Butkus, shared his feelings on modeling his game after oldschool linebackers. "My thing is, when I'm done with this game, I want the older guys when they watch to say, 'He's playing the position the right way.' It's just a point of respect from me to them." Spikes' passion and energy are apparent when he plays the
 game. Said former Patriots safety Rodney Harrison in a recent interview with the Boston Herald: "You can see how much he loves it, how he enjoys being physical. He's an intimidator. He's got that fight in him. He's going to hit you and you're going to feel it."

Spikes had 10 or more tackles in six games and finished with a career-high 128 tackles in 2012. He has five 10-tackle games in 2013 and has a team-leading 122 total tackles through 13 games. He is on pace to finish with 150 tackles

## SPIKES SETS CAREER HIGH WITH 22 TACKLES

Spikes set a career-high with 22 total tackles at Cincinnati on Oct. 6, 2013. His previous best was 16 tackles at the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. It is the highest tackle total for a Patriots player since Jerod Mayo had 23 total tackles vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 13, 2008.
Spikes has five games so far in 2013 with 10 or more tackles - 10 vs. Tampa Bay, 22 at Cincinnati, 17 at New York Jets, 12 vs. Miami and 14 vs. Denver.

## PATRIOTS HAVE CLINCHED PLAYOFF SPOTS IN 14 OF KRAFT'S 19 YEARS OF OWNERSHIP

New England has qualified for the playoffs 20 times in its 53 -year history. The Patriots have earned 14 of those playoff berths in the 19 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 12 AFC East crowns under Kraft's leadership. New England has won 15 division crowns overall (14 AFC East Crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS

The Patriots have won more than half of their games for 13 straight years after reaching nine wins in the win at Houston on Dec. 1, 2013. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 13 straight seasons since NFL free agency began in 1993.
The Patriots are the third team to win more than half of their games in 13 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-1998) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-1985).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 17 of the 20 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

The Team df the Decade

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that 17 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s. Below is a look at the accomplishments of the Patriots during the first decade of the new millennium that earned the Patriots the "Team of the Decade" moniker.
