NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (7-2) at CAROLINA PANTHERS (6-3)

Mon., Nov. 18, 2013 ★ Bank of America Stadium (73,504) ★ 8:40 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots return to action after a bye week when they travel to face the Carolina Panthers on Monday Night Football.

The Patriots opened the second half of the 2013 regular season with a victory over Pittsburgh on Nov. 3. Since the 2010 season, the Patriots are now a combined 24-1 in the second half of the regular season. The Patriots were 8-0 in the second half of the regular season in both 2010 and 2011 and were 7-1 last year. Since Bill Belichick became Patriots head coach in 2000, New England is 84-21 in the second half of the season, and has gone 8-0 in the second half four times in Belichick's tenure and 7-1 three times under Belichick.

A victory over Carolina this week would guarantee the Patriots a record of .500 or better for the 13 consecutive year. The Patriots are the only team in the NFL to finish with a record of .500 or better in each of the last 12 years (2001-12). Each of the other 31 NFL teams had at least one losing season between 2001 and 2012.

PATRIOTS GOOD IN NOVEMBER

The New England Patriots own an NFL-best 36-13 (.735) record in the month of November since 2001. During that time, the Patriots have had four undefeated Novembers, including winning all three November games in 2012.

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 20th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (12), conference crowns (6) and Super Bowl championships (3) than any other NFL team. The Patriots have made six Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 19 seasons, the Patriots qualified for the playoffs 14 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

212-GAME SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season tickets are capped and more than 50,000 fans are on a season ticket waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 212 consecutive home games, including playoff and preseason games (dating back to the 1994 season opener).

KRAFT PRODUCES MORE WINS THAN EVERY OTHER PATRIOT OWNER COMBINED

The Patriots have 232 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 232-112 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

ROBERT KRAFT: ESTABLISHING A WINNING TRADITION

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.674) since taking over the team in 1994 is not only the highest of any current NFL owner, it ranks second all-time among owners with at least 10 years of experience, trailing only Lee Joannes, who compiled a .698 winning percentage with the Green Bay Packers from 1930-1947.

QUARTERBACK STABILITY

Over the last 20 years, the Patriots have had 14 quarterbacks on their active roster. Of this group, only four quarterbacks have started a regular season or post-season game for the club, and only two (Tom Brady and Drew Bledsoe) have started on Opening Day, the fewest of any AFC East team in both categories. The only other NFL team to have started fewer quarterbacks over the last 20 years is the Green Bay Packers, with three total starters (Brett Favre, Aaron Rodgers, and Matt Flynn) and two Opening Day starters (Brett Favre and Aaron Rodgers).

PATRIOTS A MODEL OF CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

The Patriots have been a model of consistency at the coaching position under Robert Kraft. With Bill Belichick in his 14th season as head coach, the Patriots have had just three head coaches since 1994, the fewest number by far of any AFC East team.

COVER BOYS

Kraft's success as an owner has brought the Patriots a great increase in national recognition. Prior to Kraft's ownership, the Patriots had been featured on the cover of just four issues of *Sports Illustrated* (1966, 1977, 1981, and 1986). Since 1994, New England has graced the cover a total of 27 times, including 17 that feature Tom Brady alone.



COACHING CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

In a league of constant change at the head coach position, the Patriots have been a model of consistency under Robert Kraft. Since Kraft took ownership of the team in 1994, the Patriots have had just three head coaches – Bill Parcells (1994-1996), Pete Carroll (1996-1999) and current head coach Bill Belichick (2000-present), who is in his 14th season in New England and is the longest-tenured active head coach in the NFL. The only other NFL team with fewer head coaches since 1994 is the Pittsburgh Steelers, who have had two – Bill Cowher (1992-2006) and Mike Tomlin (2007-present).

PATRIOTS VS. PANTHERS

SERIES HISTORY



The Patriots and Panthers will meet for just the fifth time in the regular season and the sixth time overall, including New England's 32-29 victory over Carolina in Super Bowl XXXVIII.

The two teams last met in 2009 when the Patriots beat the Panthers, 20-10 on Dec. 13 at Gillette Stadium. That game was Carolina's first ever regular season game played at Gillette Stadium.

While the Patriots lead the all-time series 3-2, the teams are 2-2 in the four regular season meetings.

The Patriots will be playing at Carolina for just the third time and for the first time since a 27-17 loss on Sept. 18, 2005. The Patriots first trip to Carolina resulted in a 38-6 win on Jan. 6, 2002 in the final game of the 2001 regular season.

The Patriots-Panthers Super Bowl is widely believed to be among the most entertaining Super Bowls ever played, as the Panthers took a fourth-quarter lead only to see the Patriots came up with a game-winning field goal to clinch the see-saw battle in the final seconds.

The series dates back to 1995, when the Panthers claimed a 20-17 win at Foxboro Stadium in their inaugural season. The two teams have also played six times in the preseason, with the Patriots holding a 4-2 lead in those games.

The Patriots snapped a two-game losing streak to improve to 8-5 and maintain a one-game lead in the AFC East with a 20-10 win over the visiting Carolina Panthers. The Patriots win spoiled the Panthers first-ever visit to Gillette Stadium for a regular-season game.

The Patriots lost two fumbles and were intercepted once before a QB Tom Brady 5-yard touchdown pass to TE Benjamin Watson broke a 7-7 tie in the third quarter. The Patriots did not get on the scoreboard until RB Kevin Faulk scored on a 3-yard run with 1:11 to play in the first half. In addition to the early turnovers, the Patriots took their opening drive to the Carolina 40-yard line before turning the ball over on downs following a failed fourth-down attempt.

Carolina took a 7-0 first quarter lead after a Chris Gamble interception gave the Panthers a first down at the New England 48-yard line midway through the first quarter. Two plays later, QB Matt Moore completed a 41-yard touchdown pass to WR Steve Smith. All Carolina's offense could manage after that score was a K John Kasay 36-yard field goal midway through the fourth quarter.

The Patriots tied the game at 7-7 with just over a minute to play in the first half on a 3-yard touchdown run by Faulk. That drive was aided by a 30-yard pass interference call against Carolina.

New England appeared to regain its composure from a tough first half with a 7-play, 74-yard drive on their first drive in the third quarter, but the drive ended when RB Sammy Morris fumbled at the Carolina 14-yard line. After stopping the Panthers on the ensuing drive, Brady led the Patriots on a 13-play, 96-yard drive that ended with his 5-yard touchdown pass to Watson for a 14-7 lead.

K Stephen Gostkowski added a field goals of 48 and 47 yards to help the Patriots improve to a 8-5 record.

WR Wes Welker had another outstanding day with 10 receptions for 105 yards, his fifth 100-yard game of the season.

PATRIOTS ON MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

The New England Patriots are 22-22 all-time on Monday Night Football, including 15-5 under head coach Bill Belichick and 7-1 at home. The Patriots were 1-0 in 2012 on Monday Night Football, following a 42-14 win vs. Houston on Dec.10. The Patriots are 11-8 in home Monday Night Football games and 6-1 on Monday Night at Gillette Stadium. Their only loss during that time frame was 40-21 defeat vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 7, 2005.

BRADY ON MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

QB Tom Brady owns a 13-4 record when playing on Monday Night Football. His best statistical performance on Monday Night Football was in the 2011 season-opener when he completed 32-of-48 pass attempts for 517 yards and four touchdowns, including a 99-yard touchdown pass to Wes Welker in the win at Miami (9/12).

Brady has thrown three or more touchdowns in a Monday Night game nine times, including four four-touchdown performances. He has thrown four touchdowns in three of his last four Monday Night games. He had four in a 42-14 win on Dec. 10, 2012 in the Patriot only Monday Night Football game last season.

- Tom Brady (3,992) needs eight completions to become the sixth NFL player to ever reach 4,000 completions.

JULIAN EDELMAN

- Julian Edelman needs one more punt return for a touchdown to set the team mark with his fourth punt returned for a touchdown. He is tied with Irving Fryar and Troy Brown with three returns for a touchdown.

STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

- Stephen Gostkowski has nine field goals of 40 or more yards in 2013. He needs three more field goals of 40 or more yards to set the Patriots record for most 40-yard field goals in a single season. Adam Vinatieri had 11 field goals of 40 or more yards in 2004 and 1998 and Gostkowski had 11 such field goals in 2012.
- Gostkowski needs to convert one field goal to extend his streak to 18 consecutive field goals. The team record is 23 by Adam Vinatieri in 2004
- Gostkowski has scored in 100 consecutive games and needs to score in the next game to tie Adam Vinatieri and John Smith for the team all-time record with 101 consecutive games scored.

ROB GRONKOWSKI

- Rob Gronkowski has 39 touchdown receptions from Tom Brady and needs one touchdown reception from Brady to break a tie with Randy Moss for the most touchdown receptions from Brady.

STEVAN RIDLEY

- Stevan Ridley to score a rushing touchdown in his fifth straight game. In 2012, Ridley had a streak of six straight games with at least one rushing touchdown, which is tied for the second longest streak in team history.
- Ridley has 13 20-yard runs and needs one more to have the most for the Patriots since 2000. He is currently tied at 13 with Antowain Smith and Corey Dillon.

BRANDON SPIKES

- Brandon Spikes leads the team with 84 total tackles and needs 16 tackles to secure his second straight 100-tackle season. He had a career-high of 128 total tackles in 2012.

TEAM

- The Patriots can earn their eighth win of the 2013 season and guarantee to finish the season with a record of .500 or better for the 13th consecutive season.

The New England Patriots used one of their best offensive performances in team history to help beat the Pittsburgh Steelers, 55-31. The 55 points and the 610 total yards by the Patriots are the most ever against the Steelers in their 81-year history. Pittsburgh gave up 54 points in a 1985 loss at San Diego and 559 yards in 1988 at Cincinnati.

Tom Brady threw for a season-high of 432 yards with four touchdowns. Brady had 252 yards passing at halftime, more yards than he had in five of the first eight games of the season.

Brady completed 23 of 33 passes against a defense that let receivers run for several long receptions, including a 57-yarder to WR Danny Amendola that set up a K Stephen Gostkowski field goal. Brady threw scoring passes of 34 yards to Amendola, a 19-yarder to TE Rob Gronkowski, and 17 and 81 yards to WR Aaron Dobson.

Gronkowski (143), Dobson (130) and Amendola (122) all went over 100 yards, marking the first time in team history that the team had three 100-yard receivers in the same game. RB Stevan Ridley added 115 yards with two touchdowns.

The Patriots jumped out to a 17-3 lead and took a 24-10 lead into halftime after scoring on their final four offensive drives of the first half.

Pittsburgh closed the New England lead to 17-10 after a 27-yard touchdown pass from QB Ben Roethlisberger to WR Antonio Brown with two minutes to play in the first half. The Patriots got the ball back with 1:50 left to play and went 77 yards on nine plays before a 1-yard scoring run by Ridley to take the 24-10 lead into the break.

Pittsburgh turned the ball over in two of its first three possessions of the game with a fumble on a sack by DE Rob Ninkovich that was recovered by the Patriots to stop a Pittsburgh drive into New England territory. Later in the first quarter, Roethlisberger was intercepted by S Devin McCourty at the Pittsburgh 34-yard line. Brady threw his 34-yard touchdown pass to Amendola on the next play.

Pittsburgh scored on two Roethlisberger touchdown passes on their first two drives of the second half to tie the game at 24-24.

The Patriots responded on the ensuing drive with an 11-play, 60-yard drive that ended in a 32-yard field goal to recapture the lead at 27-24 heading into the final quarter.

New England scored on four straight fourth quarter possessions for a 28-point fourth quarter, the second most fourth quarter points in team history.

PATRIOTS STRONG IN SEASON'S SECOND HALF

The Patriots opened the second half of the 2013 regular season with a victory over Pittsburgh. Since the 2010 season, the Patriots are now a combined 24-1 in the second half of the regular season. In both 2010 and 2011, the Patriots were 8-0 in the second half of the regular season and last year New England was 7-1. Since Bill Belichick became Patriots head coach in 2000, New England is 83-21 in the second half of the season, and has gone 8-0 in the second half four times in Belichick's tenure and has had a 7-1 second half three times under Belichick.

BRADY TIES NFL RECORD BY LEADING THE PATRIOTS TO SIXTH 50-POINT GAME

The 55-31 win over Pittsburgh game marked the sixth time that New England scored at least 50 points in a game started by Brady, tying Len Dawson for the most 50-point games by a starting QB in NFL history.

BRADY SETS NFL MARK FOR MOST GAMES WITH 4-PLUS TDS AND NO INTERCEPTIONS

Tom Brady had four touchdowns and no interceptions, marking the 15th time in his career that he has had four or more touchdowns without an interception. Brady passed Drew Brees (14) for the most such games in NFL history. Brady has now had 19 games with at least four touchdown passes, a total that ranks fifth in NFL history.

BRADY GOES LONG

Brady had two passes of 50 or more yards in a single game for the eighth time in his career with a 57-yard pass to WR Danny Amendola in the second quarter and an 81-yard touchdown pass to WR Aaron Dobson in the fourth quarter.

BRADY CONNECTS WITH AARON DOBSON ON AN 81-YARD TOUCHDOWN PASS

Brady connected with Aaron Dobson on an 81-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter. It is tied for the fifth longest pass in Brady's career and is the sixth touchdown pass of 80 or more yards in his career.

BRADY'S 432 YARDS ARE THIRD HIGHEST SINGLE-GAME TOTAL OF HIS CAREER

Brady finished with 432 passing yards, marking the third highest single-game total of his 186-game career. The only times that Brady threw for more yards in a game than he did against Pittsburgh were on Sept. 12, 2011, when he had 517 passing yards at Miami and on Dec. 16, 2012, when Brady had 443 passing yards against San Francisco.

PATRIOTS' 610 TOTAL NET YARDS RANKS THIRD IN TEAM HISTORY

The Patriots totaled 610 net yards against Pittsburgh, marking the third highest single-game net yardage total in the franchise's 853-game history. The only times the Patriots have gained more net yards in a game were when they had a team-record 622 total net yards at Miami on Sept. 12, 2011, and when they had 619 total net yards against Tennessee on Oct. 18, 2009.

PATRIOTS' 55 POINTS TIES FIFTH HIGHEST SINGLE GAME TOTAL

The Patriots' 55 points tied the fifth-highest single-game total in team history. New England also had a 55-point output in a 55-21 win over the New York Jets on Oct. 29, 1978. The Patriots team record for most points scored in a game is 59, achieved on Oct. 18, 2009 against Tennessee and on Nov. 18, 2012 against Indianapolis.

PATRIOTS FORCE A TURNOVER FOR THE 36TH STRAIGHT GAME

The Patriots have now forced a turnover in 36 straight games dating back to 2011 after Rob Ninkovich's strip sack that was recovered by DL Joe Vellano in the first quarter. It is the longest active streak in the NFL. The NFL record for most consecutive games with a turnover since the merger in 1970 is 71 by Philadelphia from 1985-1990. The last time the Patriots did not register at least one turnover was on Oct. 9, 2011 vs. the New York Jets.



LAST GAME: PATRIOTS VS. STEELERS

300-YARD PASSER, THREE 100-YARD RECEIVERS AND A 100-YARD RUSHING PERFORMANCE

The Patriots had a 300-yard passer (Tom Brady - 432), a 100-yard rusher (Stevan Ridley - 115) and three 100-yard receivers (Rob Gronkowski - 143, Aaron Dobson - 130 and Danny Amendola - 122). It is the first time that the Patriots have had a 300-yard passer, at least two 100-yard receivers and a 100-yard rusher in the same game since last season at Buffalo on Sept. 30, 2012 when Ridley (106) and Brandon Bolden (137) went over 100 yards rushing, Rob Gronkowski (104) and Wes Welker (129) had 100 yards receiving and Tom Brady passed for 340 yards.

PATRIOTS FINISH WITH THREE RECEIVERS OVER 100 YARDS FOR THE FIRST TIME IN TEAM HISTORY

The Patriots had three players finish with 100 yards receiving in a single game for the first time in team history when Rob Gronkowski finished with 143 yards, Aaron Dobson with 130 yards and Danny Amendola with 122 yards. It is the 18th time since the merger that a team has had three players finish with 100 yards receiving in the same game.

PATRIOTS ARE THIRD TEAM IN NFL HISTORY WITH THREE PLAYERS WITH 120-PLUS RECEIVING YARDS AND ONE OR MORE TOUCHDOWNS IN THE SAME GAME

The Patriots had three receivers with 120 or more receiving yards and a touchdown, as Rob Gronkowski (9-143-1), Aaron Dobson (5-130-2) and Danny Amendola (4-122-1). It is the third time in NFL history that a team has had three receivers top the 120 yard mark and score a touchdown in a game. The Dallas Cowboys achieved the feat earlier this season in their 51-48 loss to the Denver Broncos on Oct. 6, 2013. In that game, the Cowboys' Terrence Williams (4-151-1), Dez Bryant (6-141-2) and Jason Witten (7-121-1) all had 120 or more yards and a touchdown. The only other time in NFL history that a team had such an accomplishment was the Houston Oilers on Nov. 19, 1961 against the New York Titans. In that game, the Oilers' Bill Groman (5-152-3), Charley Hennigan (8-123-1) and Billy Cannon (7-122-3) had 120 or more yards to go along with a touchdown as the Oilers beat New York 49-13.

DANNY AMENDOLA REGISTERS FIRST PATRIOTS TOUCHDOWN: BECOMES 50TH DIFFERENT PLAYER TO CATCH A TOUCHDOWN PASS FROM TOM BRADY

Danny Amendola caught his first touchdown as a member of the Patriots on a 34-yard reception from Tom Brady in the first quarter. Amendola is the 50th different player to catch a touchdown pass from Tom Brady.

AMENDOLA CONNECTS WITH BRADY FOR A 57-YARD GAIN; LONGEST RECEPTION OF HIS CAREER

Amendola and Tom Brady connected for a 57-yard reception in the second quarter. It is the longest reception of Amendola's career. His previous best was a 56-yard reception vs. Washington on Sept. 16, 2012, when he was with St. Louis.

AMENDOLA REGISTERS SECOND 100 YARD GAME AS A PATRIOT

Amendola finished with four receptions for 122 yards. It is his second 100-yard game with the Patriots. He had 10 receptions for 104 yards at Buffalo on Sept. 8 in the 2013 season opener. It is the fourth 100-yard receiving game of his career.

SACK ATTACK CONTINUES

The Patriots had at least five sacks for the second straight game, marking the first time since 2007 that they have had back-to-back games with at least five sacks. The last time New England had at least five sacks in back-to-back games was in 2007, when they followed up a 5-sack performance against the New York Jets (12/16/07) with a 7-sack performance against Miami (12/23/07). The Patriots' five sacks marked their third straight game with at least four sacks. New England had four sacks at the New York Jets on Oct. 20 and had six sacks last week against Miami. Sunday's game marked the fifth time this year the Patriots have had at least four sacks.

BRADY PASSES WARREN MOON FOR SIXTH PLACE ON NFL COMPLETION LIST; PASSES FRAN TARKENTON FOR SEVENTH ON PASSING LIST

Tom Brady (3,992) moved past Warren Moon (3,988) into sixth place all-time on the NFL completions list. John Elway is in fifth place with 4,123 completions. Brady (47,062 career yards) moved past Fran Tarkenton (47,003) for seventh place on the NFL's all-time passing yards list.

STEVAN RIDLEY SCORED A TOUCHDOWN IN HIS FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME

Stevan Ridley scored a rushing touchdown in his fourth straight game. He had a 1-yard touchdown run in the second quarter and a 5-yard scoring run in the fourth quarter. In 2012, Ridley had a streak of six straight games with at least one rushing touchdown, which is tied for the second longest streak in team history. Ridley now has six touchdown runs in 2013.

RIDLEY HAS HIS SECOND TWO-TOUCHDOWN GAME OF 2013 AND FOURTH OF CAREER

Ridley scored on a 1-yard run in the second quarter and a 5-yard run in the fourth quarter. It is the fourth time in his career that he has rushed for two touchdowns in a single game and the second time he has done so in 2013. He scored two touchdowns in the win vs. New Orleans on Oct. 13.

RIDLEY GOES OVER 100 YARDS FOR THE FIRST TIME IN 2013: FIFTH TIME IN HIS CAREER

Ridley had his fifth career 100-yard game and the first of the 2013 season, finishing the game with 115 rushing yards on 26 carries (4.4 avg.).

ROB NINKOVICH GETS FIRST STRIP SACK OF THE SEASON

Rob Ninkovich forced a fumble on a 6-yard sack of QB Ben Roethlisberger that was recovered by DL Joe Vellano at the New England 42-yard line to end Pittsburgh's first drive. It was Ninkovich's first strip sack of the season. He had four strip sacks in 2012.

GRONKOWSKI TIES RANDY MOSS WITH 39 TOUCHDOWN PASSES FROM TOM BRADY

Gronkowski caught his 39th touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the second quarter on a 19-yard pass, tying him with Randy Moss for the most touchdown receptions received from Tom Brady. His 39 career touchdowns with the Patriots are tied for the fifth most in team history.

GRONKOWSKI ADDS TO HIS RECORD WITH 11TH 100-YARD GAME

Gronkowski totaled a season-high 143 receiving yards, registering his 11th career 100-yard game and his second of the season. Gronkowski had eight receptions for 114 yards at the New York Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. Gronkowski leads all Patriots tight ends with 11 100-yard games. Ben Coates is second with 9 100-yard games.

GRONKOWSKI HAS THIRD 100-YARD FIRST HALF

Gronkowski finished the first half with 119 yards on seven receptions. It is the most yards he has ever had in a half and the third time he has ever had 100 yards in a half. His previous best was 118 yards in the first half at Washington on Dec. 11, 2011. He also had 106 yards in the first half vs. St. Louis on Oct. 28, 2012 in a game played in London.

GRONKOWSKI SETS CAREER HIGH IN RECEPTIONS

Gronkowski finished the game with nine receptions, setting a new single-game career high. His previous best was eight receptions in a game, a feat he accomplished five times.

CHANDLER JONES HAS THIRD TWO-SACK GAME OF 2013

Chandler Jones had a pair of sacks and registered his third two-sack game of the 2013 season. Jones also had two sacks vs. New York Jets on Sept. 12 and at the New York Jets on Oct. 20. He now has 8.5 sacks for the year.

EDELMAN RETURNS A THIRD QUARTER PUNT 43 YARDS

WR Julian Edelman returned a third quarter punt 43 yards. It is his 10th punt return for 30- or more yards, third in team history behind Troy Brown (14), Irving Fryar (13) and Mike Haynes (13).

BRADY RECORDS 55TH CAREER 300-YARD GAME

Brady had his 55th NFL game with 300 or more yards passing and his second of the 2013 season. Brady also had 316 yards passing at Atlanta on Sept. 29. His 300-yard game total ranks third among active NFL quarterbacks, behind NFL-leader Peyton Manning (79) and Drew Brees (73). The Patriots are 45-10 when Brady throws for 300 or more yards.

GAME TIES FRANCHISE RECORD FOR COMBINED POINTS

The 86 combined points by the Patriots and Steelers in New England's 55-31 win tied the Patriots franchise record for most combined points in a game. The other time New England had 86 combined points in a game was on Oct. 16, 1964, when the Boston Patriots and Oakland Raiders played to a 43-43 tie at Fenway Park.

PATRIOTS SCORE 28 POINTS IN THE FOURTH QUARTER

The Patriots scored 28 points in the fourth quarter. It is the second highest fourth quarter point total in team history. The Patriots had a 31-point fourth quarter at Buffalo on Sept. 30, 2012.

PATRIOTS 55 POINTS AND 610 TOTAL YARDS ARE THE MOST EVER AGAINST PITTSBURGH

The 55 points and the 610 total yards by the Patriots are the most ever against the Steelers in their 81-year history. Pittsburgh gave up 54 points in a 1985 loss at San Diego and 559 yards in 1988 at Cincinnati.

JULIAN EDELMAN LIKES RETURNING PUNTS IN NOVEMBER

Julian Edelman returned a punt for 43 yards against the Steelers in the third quarter, the fifth-longest return of his career. Edelman has excelled returning punts in the month of November throughout his career, as six of his ten longest career returns have come during this month. In twelve career games in November, Edelman has 388 punt return yards on 22 attempts for a 17.6-yard average, the highest of any other month in which he had more than 10 returns. Edelman has also scored two of his three career punt return touchdowns in November, scoring on a 72-yard return against Kansas City on Nov. 21, 2011 and a 68-yard return against Indianapolis on Nov. 18, 2012.

BILL BELCHICK

- Bill Belichick (212) moved past Hall of Famer Chuck Noll (209) into fifth place all-time on the NFL wins list with the Patriots 30-27 win against New Orleans. Curly Lambeau is in fourth place with 229 career wins.
- Belichick (18) needs one more postseason victory to tie Don Shula (19) for second place in postseason wins. Tom Landry (20) is in first place.
- Belichick has five conference titles and needs one more to match Don Shula, who led his teams to six Super Bowls.
- Belichick has led the Patriots to 12 consecutive winning records (2001-12). He is tied with Curly Lambeau (12 – 1921-32) for third all-time. The NFL record is 20 by Tom Landry (1966-85) followed by 14 by Curly Lambeau (1934-47).

TOM BRADY

- Tom Brady has 55 career 300-yard games and ranks fifth all-time for most 300-yard games and third among active players.
- Brady (34) reached 30 touchdown passes in 2012 for the third straight season and became just the fifth player in NFL history with at least 30 touchdown passes in four seasons overall.
- Brady (4,827) reached 4,000 passing yards in 2012. He is just the fifth player in NFL history to reach 4,000 yards in five or more seasons: Peyton Manning (12), Drew Brees (7), Dan Marino (6) and Brett Favre (6).
- Brady is the only quarterback in NFL history to have thrown for at least one touchdown pass in each game for three consecutive seasons (2010-12).
- Brady had 401 completions in 2012 for the second straight season and joined Drew Brees (5), Peyton Manning (2) and Matthew Stafford (2) as the only NFL quarterbacks with at least two 400 completion seasons.

ROB GRONKOWSKI

- Rob Gronkowski (10 touchdowns in 2010 and 18 in 2011) became the first tight end in NFL history with three straight 10-plus touchdown seasons after reaching 11 for the season in 2012. Gronkowski and Antonio Gates (13 in 2004 and 10 in 2005) are the only tight ends to have back-to-back 10-plus touchdown seasons.
- Gronkowski joins Randy Moss (2007, 2008 and 2009) and Corey Dillon (2004, 2005, 2006) as the only Patriots with three straight 10-plus touchdown seasons and three 10-plus seasons overall.
- Gronkowski has 39 receiving touchdowns and 40 touchdowns overall (39 receiving and 1 rushing) since 2010. The 39 receiving touchdowns are the second most in the NFL in that time span, behind Calvin Johnson (42).
- Gronkowski has 39 touchdowns in just 46 games. He can become the fastest to 40 touchdowns. Antonio Gates currently holds the record after reaching 40 touchdowns in 71 games.

ROB NINKOVICH

- Rob Ninkovich has 11 fumble recoveries over the last four seasons (2010-13), the most of any player in the NFL over that time. Vince Wilfork is second with seven.

STEVAN RIDLEY

- Stevan Ridley rushed for 1,263 yards in 2012 and will be looking to become the third Patriots player with back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons, joining Jim Nance (1966-67) and Curtis Martin (1995-97).
- Ridley scored 12 touchdowns in 2012 and will look to become the fourth running back in team history with back-to-back 10-plus touchdowns in a season, joining Corey Dillon (2004, 2005, 2006), BenJarvus Green-Ellis (2010, 2011) and Curtis Martin (1995, 1996).

TEAM

- The Patriots have forced at least one turnover in 36 straight games, the longest current streak in the NFL. The NFL record for most consecutive games with at least one turnover since the merger in 1970 is 71 by Philadelphia from 1985-1990. The last time the Patriots did not register at least one turnover was on Oct. 9, 2011 vs. the New York Jets.

PATRIOTS 2013 TEAM CAPTAINS

The Patriots team captains were elected by their teammates. Quarterback Tom Brady and G Logan Mankins are the offensive captains. Defensive lineman Vince Wilfork and LB Jerod Mayo are the defensive captains. Wide receiver Matthew Slater is the special teams captain. Brady has been chosen as a captain for the 12th straight season. Wilfork is a captain for the sixth straight season, while Mayo is in his fifth season serving as a captain. Mankins, and Slater are captains for a third time.

Following the season-ending injuries to Wilfork and Mayo, DB Devin McCourty and DL Rob Ninkovich were named defensive captains. McCourty previously served as a captain in 2011 and 2012. Ninkovich is a first-time captain.

PATRIOTS HAVE BEST NFL RECORD SINCE 2003

The Patriots record of 133-36 (.787) since 2003 is the best in the NFL. Over that period, only four NFL teams have posted a winning percentage of .600 or better.

BRADY SET NFL RECORD FOR LONGEST HOME WINNING STREAK

Tom Brady set an NFL record for most consecutive home wins as a starting quarterback with his 26th straight win in a regular-season home start following the 45-3 win against the Jets (12/06/10) and extended his streak to 31 before it ended with a 24-20 loss against the New York Giants (11/6/11).

BRADY'S 65 PASS ATTEMPTS AGAINST SF ARE A CAREER-HIGH

Tom Brady's 65 passing attempts vs. San Francisco (12/16/12) are a career high, topping his 58 pass attempts at Seattle on Oct. 14, 2012. Brady's 65 attempts are the most in franchise history in a non-overtime game and are the second most in team history in any game, trailing only Drew Bledsoe's 70 attempts in an overtime win vs. Minnesota on Nov. 13, 1994. Brady's 65 pass attempts are the seventh most in NFL history and the most since Brian Griese had 67 for Tampa Bay at Chicago on Sept. 21, 2008 in overtime. It is the most in a non-overtime NFL game since Dec. 24, 2000 when the Jets Vinny Testaverde attempted 69 passes at Baltimore.

DAN CONNOLLY HAS THE LONGEST KICKOFF RETURN EVER BY AN OFFENSIVE LINEMAN

Dan Connolly was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week after he returned a kickoff 71 yards to the 4-yard line in the second quarter of the Patriots win vs. Green Bay on Dec. 19, 2010. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, it is the longest kickoff return by an offensive lineman in NFL history. The run by Connolly topped the 48-yard touchdown return by Atlanta's Mal Snyder in 1969. Previously, the longest kickoff return for a Patriots offensive lineman was a 27-yard return by G Stephen Neal on Nov. 30, 2008 vs. Pittsburgh. Connolly's previous best was a 16-yard return vs. Miami on Nov. 8, 2009.

JULIAN EDELMAN SET FRANCHISE RECORD WITH A 94-YARD PUNT RETURN FOR A TOUCHDOWN

EDELMAN IS FIRST PATRIOTS PLAYER WITH TWO PUNT RETURNS OF 40 YARDS IN THE SAME GAME

Edelman had a 68-yard punt that he returned for a touchdown and a 49-yard return vs. Indianapolis (11/18/12). He is the first player in team history with two punt returns of 40 or more yards in the same game. Troy Brown came close in 2000 when he had returns of 39 and 66 against Tampa Bay.

EDELMAN'S 47-YARD RUN IS THE LONGEST RUN BY A PATS WIDE RECEIVER

Edelman had a 47-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. Indianapolis (11/18/12). It was the longest run from scrimmage for the Patriots in 2012, topping Steven Ridley's 41-yard run against St. Louis in London on Oct. 28. It is the longest run ever by a Patriots receiver, topping Troy Brown's 35-yard run vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000. It was the longest run by a Patriots player since Sammy Morris had a 55-yard run on Dec. 27, 2009 vs. Jacksonville.

EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56% of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

New Orleans' Jimmy Graham also broke Winslow's old record, but finished with 1,310 receiving yards, 17 shy of Gronkowski's new record.

GRONKOWSKI SECOND PATRIOTS TIGHT END TO REACH 1,000 YARDS

Gronkowski became the second tight end in New England Patriots history to go over 1,000 receiving yards in 2011. He broke TE Ben Coates (1,174 yards in 1994) franchise record en route to his NFL tight end receiving record of 1,327 yards.

GRONKOWSKI BECOMES FIRST PATRIOTS TIGHT END TO RECORD A RUSHING TOUCHDOWN

Gronkowski scored a 2-yard touchdown on a lateral from Tom Brady in the third quarter vs. Indianapolis (12/4/11), becoming the first tight end in Patriots history to score a rushing touchdown. Gronkowski is the first NFL tight end to score a rushing touchdown since Tennessee's Bo Scaife had a 31-yard scoring run against Baltimore on Nov. 12, 2006. He is the first tight end since the 1970 merger to have two receiving touchdowns and a rushing touchdown in the same game.

LED AFC IN SCORING IN 2011; FIRST TIME THAT A TE HAS LED A CONFERENCE IN SCORING

Gronkowski led the AFC in scoring among non-kickers with 108 points in 2011 and finished second in the NFL to Philadelphia's LeSean McCoy, who had 120 points. It is the first time in NFL history that a tight end has led his conference in scoring and the first time a tight end has led the NFL in touchdown receptions (17).

RIDLEY REACHES 12 TDS IN 2012

STEVAN RIDLEY HAD FOUR 100-YARD RUSHING DAYS IN 2012

Stevan Ridley had his first career 100-yard day in the 2012 season opener at Tennessee (9/9) with 125 yards rushing on 21 carries for a 6.0-yard average. He finished with 106 yards rushing on 22 carries for a 4.8-yard average at Buffalo (9/30), a career-high 151 rushing yards vs. Denver (10/7) and then gained 127 yards on 15 carries for an 8.5-yard average at St. Louis (10/28).

Ridley had his fifth career 100-yard day and his first of the 2013 season after gaining 115 yards on 26 attempts vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 3, 2013.

RIDLEY GOES LONG

It only took a day for Nate Solder to decide to change from his lifelong position of tight end to tackle after playing his freshman year at Colorado as a tight end. "My coaches came to me and said, 'You'd be an all right tight end, but you'd be an even better tackle,'" he told the *Boston Globe*. "I've always wanted to be great, so that's why I moved to tackle." He added over 30 pounds after his redshirt freshman season and was named the team's starting left tackle. He played in 2,540 of 2,542 offensive plays over the next three seasons at Colorado and became an immediate contributor on the Patriots offensive line at right tackle as a rookie before moving to left tackle.

"Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

Florida judge Dennis Murphy will never forget Kenbrell Thompkins. This is especially true now, as Murphy keeps an autographed picture of Thompkins on his desk from the rookie's playing days at El Camino Community College. The picture was a gift from Thompkins, who has Murphy to thank for granting him special probation conditions after a drug charge in 2007 that allowed Thompkins to leave his crime-riddled neighborhood in Miami, Fla. and attend El Camino. "I'm a firm believer in giving youth a chance to try and turn it around," Murphy told *The Boston Globe*. After being arrested seven times between the ages of 15 and 18, Thompkins excelled at El Camino and went on to play at the University of Cincinnati en route to fulfilling his NFL dream. Thompkins earned his degree from Cincinnati in criminal justice.



OL WILL SVITEK

WILL SVITEK TAKES A HIKE TO REMEMBER

Will Svitek was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia. When he was 2, his parents took him and his three brothers out of the communist country. They left in secret with no money and only the clothes on their backs. Saying they were on a day hike, they walked 14 hours through the mountains and ended up in Austria. The family spent eight months in a refugee camp until being legalized to come to the United States. "My parents were hard-working immigrants who came here to achieve the American Dream and help their sons reach their full potential," said Svitek. "I think they instilled it in me to do everything well. I am a competitive person on the field and in the classroom and I don't think you can just turn that switch off."

SEBASTIAN VOLLMER MAKES HIS MARK

A native of Kaarst, Germany, Vollmer did not begin playing football until the age of 14 when he started playing for the Dusseldorf club team. Vollmer helped lead his German prep school team to two national football championships. His early football success landed him an appearance in the 2004 Global Junior Championships in San Diego, which led him to a scholarship at Houston. He spoke very little English when he signed with Houston, but he became fluent in the language as he developed from a 250-pound tight end into a 315-pound lineman who started his final 25 games at tackle for the Cougars. He was not invited to the NFL combine, but Vollmer's collegiate career created interest from the Patriots, who drafted him in the second round of the 2009 draft. Nicknamed "Seabass" during his playing days at Houston, it is a nickname that has carried over to the NFL.

RYAN WENDELL LEADS THE NFL IN PLAY SNAPS IN 2012

Ryan Wendell played a league-high 1,249 snaps in 2012 and it helped earn him a spot on the USA Today All-Joe team in 2012. Said Wendell: "I think first it says a lot about the organization, our training staff and our strength training coaches, that they do everything they can all season and all off-season and during the spring to keep us healthy throughout the whole season. I think it says more about them then it does about me individually."

WHAT IS IN A NUMBER

When Arrington was first making the transition from Hofstra to the NFL in 2008, he was assigned jersey No. 42. At that point in his career, he was cut by both the Eagles and Buccaneers.

When Arrington first arrived in New England as a practice squad player in 2009, he initially donned No. 27. But when No. 24 became available, a result of Jonathan Wilhite leaving in free agency after the 2010 season, Arrington pounced on it.

The reason is that it reflects how he's flipped his NFL fortunes -- from a No. 42 struggling to hang on to a No. 24 who has carved out a role on a winning team.

Arrington moved from 24 to 25 in an agreement with Adrian Wilson this past season to accommodate the veteran's desire to keep the same jersey he has worn during his 12-year NFL career.

STEVE GREGORY WAS ABOUT TO ENTER THE POLICE ACADEMY WHEN SAN DIEGO CALLED

Steve Gregory's father and stepmother are New York City police officers and both were on duty during the events of September 11, 2001. Following his college career at Syracuse, Gregory took the test to enter the police academy. He found out he passed the test on the same day that the San Diego Chargers called him to offer him a rookie free agent contract.

GREGORY SETS CAREER HIGH WITH HIS THIRD INTERCEPTION OF THE SEASON IN 2012

Steve Gregory set a single-season career-high when he intercepted Miami QB Ryan Tannehill in the first quarter for his third on the season in the season-finale on Dec. 30, 2012. The pick helped set up a 9-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Wes Welker. Gregory's previous single-season high was two interceptions in 2010 when he played for San Diego.

DONT'A HIGHTOWER WEARS TEDY BRUSCHI'S JERSEY #54

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of the regular season. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons. Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

THIRD TEAM IS A CHARM FOR CHRIS JONES

Chris Jones had an early introduction to failure in the NFL. Taken behind 37 other defensive linemen in the 2013 NFL Draft, the rookie defensive tackle was cut by two teams over a span of just eleven days. After selecting him in the 6TH with the 198th overall pick, the Houston Texans cut Jones on August 31. Jones signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on September 1 but lasted only ten days, as the Buccaneers released him on September 10. Rather than be deterred by these early disappointments, however, Jones maintained a positive outlook when he signed with the Patriots on September 11, and it has paid off in a big way. Thrust into a starting role after key injuries to the defensive line, Jones has 4.5 sacks in just five games to lead all NFL rookies. Jones' sudden success may come as a surprise to some, but not to Dave Clawson, Jones' college coach at Bowling Green. Jones was part of Clawson's first recruiting class and blossomed into an All-American and two-time captain for the Falcons. "It's hard to talk about Chris without getting a little bit emotional," Clawson told the *Boston Herald*, "because he was that special of a player and person in our program."

DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVIN MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of three active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

Devin McCourty picked off Colin Kaepernick in the end zone in the third quarter vs. San Francisco (12/16/12). It was his third pick in the end zone in 2012. McCourty picked off Matt Schaub vs. Houston on Dec. 10, 2012 in the first quarter. McCourty picked off Ryan Fitzpatrick in the end zone in the fourth quarter vs. Buffalo on Nov. 11, 2012. It is the fourth time in 2012 that the Patriots have intercepted a pass in the end zone. Rookie Tavon Wilson had an interception in the end zone at Tennessee on Sept. 9 in the second quarter.

NINKOVICH LEADS NFL OVER LAST FOUR SEASONS WITH 11 FUMBLE RECOVERIES

Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries (11) over the last four seasons (2010-2013) than any other NFL player. Chicago's Brian Urlacher (retired) and Vince Wilfork are second during that time with seven opponent fumble recoveries.



NINKOVICH: WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Dallas QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from New York Giants QB Curtis Painter.

RUTGERS CLASSMATES LOGAN RYAN AND DURON HARMON REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Rookie defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to learning a new system together. Four years ago, Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft. Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did four years ago at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told the *Boston Globe*. "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

RYAN RETURNS FIRST PICK FOR A TOUCHDOWN

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter at the New York Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. The last Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was Kyle Arrington in 2010 against the Green Bay Packers, when he took back a Matt Flynn pass 36 yards for a touchdown. The last rookie Patriots player to return their first career interception for a touchdown was James Sanders in 2005:

RYAN'S FIRST NFL SACK RESULTS IN A FORCED FUMBLE

Ryan forced a fumble on his first NFL sack vs. Miami on Oct. 27, a week after returning his first career interception for a touchdown. Ryan strip-sacked Ryan Tannehill, forcing a fumble on a 10-yard sack that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich to give the Patriots possession at the Dolphins' 13-yard line in the third quarter. The play set up a 3-play, 13-yard drive that ended in Brandon Bolden's 2-yard touchdown run that tied the game at 17 in the third quarter. The play marked the second time in as many weeks that a Ryan turnover has led to Patriots points. Last week against the New York Jets, Ryan scored on a 79-yard interception return for a touchdown.

SPIKES IS A THROWBACK

Spikes, who patterns his style of play after Hall of Fame linebacker Dick Butkus, shared his feelings on modeling his game after old-school linebackers. "My thing is, when I'm done with this game, I want the older guys when they watch to say, 'He's playing the position the right way.' It's just a point of respect from me to them." Spikes' passion and energy are apparent when he plays the game. Said former Patriots safety Rodney Harrison in a recent interview with the *Boston Herald*: "You can see how much he loves it, how he enjoys being physical. He's an intimidator. He's got that fight in him. He's going to hit you and you're going to feel it."



SPIKES WENT OVER 100 TACKLES IN 2012; ON PACE TO FINISH WITH OVER 100 AGAIN IN 2013

Spikes had 10 or more tackles in six games and finished with a career-high 128 tackles in 2012. With Jerod Mayo at 184 tackles and Spikes at 128, it is the fifth time in the Bill Belichick era that two players have finished with 100 or more tackles. Spikes has a team-leading 84 total tackles and is on pace to finish 149 total tackles and has had four 10-plus tackles in 2013.

SPIKES SETS CAREER HIGH WITH 22 TACKLES

Spikes set a career-high with 22 total tackles at Cincinnati on Oct. 6, 2013. His previous best was 16 tackles at the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. It is the highest tackle total for a Patriots player since Jerod Mayo had 23 total tackles vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 13, 2008.

Spikes has four games so far in 2013 with 10 or more tackles – 10 vs. Tampa Bay, 22 at Cincinnati, 17 at New York Jets and 12 vs. Miami.

AQIB TALIB HAS A NOSE FOR THE BALL

Aqib Talib has been one of the most prolific cornerbacks in the NFL at intercepting opposing quarterbacks and returning those interceptions for touchdowns during his NFL career. New England has qualified for the playoffs 20 times in its 53-year history. The Patriots have earned 14 of those playoff berths in the 19 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 12 AFC East crowns under Kraft's leadership. New England has won 15 division crowns overall (14 AFC East Crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

SUPER COMBINATION

WR Danny Amendola (FA-STL, '13)

Amendola scored his first touchdown in a Patriots uniform when he hauled in a 34-yard pass from Tom Brady in the first quarter of the team's Week 9 win over the Steelers ... Also caught a 57-yard pass from Brady in the second quarter, the longest reception of his career ... Finished with 4 catches for 122 yards, the second-highest total of his career behind a 160-yard effort on Sept. 12, 2012 as a member of the St. Louis Rams ... Two of Amendola's four career 100-yard games have come with New England ... Caught 10 passes for 104 yards in his Patriots debut against Buffalo in Week 1.

The Patriots scored 50 or more points with Brady at the helm for the sixth time in his career, tying him with Len Dawson for the most 50-point games by a QB in NFL history ... Threw an 81-yard touchdown pass to WR Aaron Dobson in the fourth quarter, the fifth-longest pass in his 14-year career ... His four touchdown passes gave him 347 on his career, passing Saints QB Drew Brees for fourth on the NFL's all-time list at the time ... Led the Patriots on a 12-play, 49-yard drive late in the fourth quarter against Buffalo in Week 1 to set up Stephen Gostkowski's game-winning field goal ... Brady is 3-1 in four career games against the Panthers, which includes a 354-yard, 3-touchdown performance in the Patriots 32-29 win in Super Bowl XXXVIII.

Ridley had his first 100-yard rushing performance of the season and fifth of his career against the Steelers in Week 9 with 115 yards on 26 carries ... Also rushed for a 1-yard touchdown in the second quarter and a 5-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter to give him six touchdowns in his last four games ... Has now scored at least one touchdown in his last four games. His career high for consecutive games with a score is a six-game streak in 2012, second longest in team history ... It was his second two-touchdown game of the season and fourth of his career ... His first two-score effort of the season came against the Saints in Week 6, when he ran for 96 yards and two touchdowns in the team's 30-27 win ... 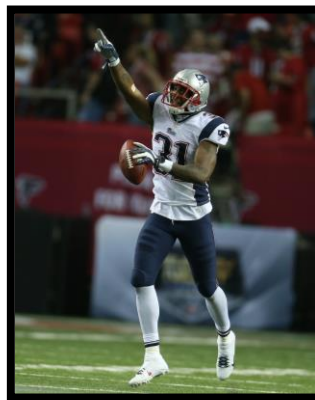
LB Dont'a Hightower (D1b, '12)

THE TEAM OF THE DECADE

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that 17 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s. Below is a look at the accomplishments of the Patriots during the first decade of the new millennium that earned the Patriots the "Team of the Decade" moniker.
