The New England Patriots will be looking for their $16^{\text {th }}$ series sweep over the New York Jets when they travel to New York to face the Jets at MetLife Stadium for the second meeting of the season. The Patriots beat the Jets, 13-10, in a nationallytelevised game played on Sept. 12 in a Thursday Night Football broadcast on the NFL Network. The Patriots have swept the season series in each of the last two years and can match their record with their third straight series sweep. The Patriots swept the series in three straight seasons in 2003, 2004 and 2005.

The Patriots enter this week's game with 12 straight wins over AFC East opponents. It is the longest active streak against division opponents. The Denver Broncos own the second longest streak with seven straight wins against division opponents. After losing at Buffalo 34-31 in 2011, the Patriots won their remaining four AFC East games that year and then finished a perfect 6-0 against AFC East opponent in 2012. The Patriots extended their streak to 12 with wins at Buffalo and vs. the Jets in 2013. The Patriots are tied with Baltimore (2010-12), Green Bay (2010-12) and Indianapolis (2004-06) for the longest winning streak against division opponents since realignment in 2002. The longest streak of consecutive wins against division opponents since the 1970 NFL merger is 15 by Miami (1972-73).

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast to a regional audience by CBS and can be seen in Boston on WBZ-TV. Greg Gumbel will handle play-by-play duties with Dan Dierdorf providing color. The game will be produced by Mark Wolff and directed by Suzanne Smith.
NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by ESPN Radio. Ryan Ruocco and Herm Edwards will call the game. Ian Fitzsimmons will report from the sidelines.
RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster Bob Socci will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak, who will provide color analysis.

Rdbert Kraft News $\boldsymbol{C}$ Nates

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 20th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the
 Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (12), conference crowns (6) and Super Bowl championships (3) than any other NFL team. The Patriots have made six Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 19 seasons, the Patriots qualified for the playoffs 14 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

## 210-GAME SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season tickets are capped and more than 50,000 fans are on a season ticket waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 210 consecutive home games, including playoff and preseason games (dating back to the 1994 season opener).

KRAFT PRODUCES MORE WINS THAN EVERY OTHER PATRIOT OWNER COMBINED
The Patriots have 230 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 230-111 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.674) since taking over the team in 1994 is not only the highest of any current NFL owner, it ranks second all-time among owners with at least 10 years of experience, trailing only Lee Joannes, who compiled a .698 winning percentage with the Green Bay Packers from 19301947.

## QUARTERBACK STABILITY

Over the last 20 years, the Patriots have had 14 quarterbacks on their active roster. Of this group, only four quarterbacks have started a regular season or post-season game for the club, and only two (Tom Brady and Drew Bledsoe) have started on Opening Day, the fewest of any AFC East team in both categories. The only other NFL team to have started fewer quarterbacks over the last 20 years is the Green Bay Packers, with three total starters (Brett Favre, Aaron Rodgers, and Matt Flynn) and two Opening Day starters (Brett Favre and Aaron Rodgers).

## PATRIOTS A MODEL OF CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

The Patriots have been a model of consistency at the coaching position under Robert Kraft. With Bill Belichick in his $14^{\text {th }}$ season as head coach, the Patriots have had just three head coaches since 1994, the fewest number by far of any AFC East team.

## COVER BOYS

Kraft's success as an owner has brought the Patriots a great increase in national recognition. Prior to Kraft's ownership, the Patriots had been featured on the cover of just four issues of Sports Illustrated (1966, 1977, 1981, and 1986). Since 1994, New England has graced the cover a total of 27 times, including 17 that feature Tom Brady alone.


## COACHING CONSISTENCY UNDER KRAFT

In a league of constant change at the head coach position, the Patriots have been a model of consistency under Robert Kraft. Since Kraft took ownership of the team in 1994, the Patriots have had just three head coaches - Bill Parcells (1994-1996), Pete Carroll (1996-1999) and current head coach Bill Belichick (2000-present), who is in his $14^{\text {th }}$ season in New England and is the longest-tenured active head coach in the NFL. The only other NFL team with fewer head coaches since 1994 is the Pittsburgh Steelers, who have had two - Bill Cowher (19922006) and Mike Tomlin (2007-present).

## PATRIDTS AT JETS



The Patriots and Jets will meet for the 110th time, including three postseason games, since the series between the AFC East rivals began in 1960.

This week's game will be the second meeting between the two teams in 2013. The Patriots defeated the Jets, 13-10, in a nationally-televised game played on NFL Network's Thursday Night Football on Sept. 12 at Gillette Stadium.

The Patriots will be looking for their sixth straight victory over the Jets and a series sweep for the third straight year and $16^{\text {th }}$ time overall.

Last season, the Patriots swept the annual series after a 2926 overtime win at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 21 and a 49-19 win at MetLife Stadium on Thanksgiving night on Nov. 22.

The Patriots lead the series, 56-52-1 overall.
The Patriots are 25-27 all-time in the regular season on the road against the Jets and 1-0 against the Jets in the postseason on the road. The Patriots are 2-1 against the Jets at MetLife Stadium.

The teams have played in the postseason three times, a 1985 Wild Card game, a 2006 Wild Card game and an AFC Divisional game in 2010. New England beat the Jets, 26-14, in 1985 at the Meadowlands on their way to Super Bowl XX. In 2006, the Patriots defeated the Jets, 37-16, at Gillette Stadium. The Jets defeated the Patriots, 28-21, in the 2010 playoff game.

New England is 27-14 against the Jets since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994.

New England's 56 overall victories over the Jets (including two playoff wins) are the second most over any single opponent, trailing only Buffalo with 65 all-time wins.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR THIS WEEK AGAINST THE

 JETSTOM BRADY

- Tom Brady (342) needs one touchdown against the Jets to move out of a tie with Fran Tarkenton (342) and move into sole possession of fourth place on the NFL's all-time touchdown list. Dan Marino is in third place with 420 touchdowns.


## JULIAN EDELMAN

- Julian Edelman to maintain his punt return average of 12.7 (90-1,139) and remain one of seven NFL players with a punt return average of 12.0 or above.
- Edelman needs one more punt return for a touchdown to set the team mark with his fourth punt returned for a touchdown. He is tied with Irving Fryar and Troy Brown with three returns for a touchdown.
STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI
- Stephen Gostkowski has seven field goals of 40 or more yards in 2013, including a 53 yard field goal and a career long 54 -yard field goal. He needs five more field goals of 40 or more yards to set the Patriots record for most 40 -yard field goal in a single season. Adam Vinatieri had 11 field goals of 40 or more yards in 2004 and 1998 and Gostkowski had 11 such field goals in 2012.


## ROB NINKOVICH

- Rob Ninkovich has the most fumble recoveries of any NFL player over the last four years (2010-13) with 10 and can add on to that total with a fumble recovery against the Jets.


## STEVAN RIDLEY

- Stevan Ridley has a career average of 4.44 yards (4441,974 ) and needs six carries against the Jets to meet the team qualification of 450 attempts to have the highest rushing average in team history.


## KENBRELL THOMPKINS

- Kenbrell Thompkins has 21 receptions for 318 yards and four touchdowns on the season. The most touchdowns in a rookie season by a free agent wide receiver in the common draft era (since 1967) is six by Stephone Paige in 1983 with Kansas City. Thompkins needs two more touchdowns to match that total.


## TEAM

Tom Brady threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to rookie WR Kenbrell Thompkins with five seconds left to play to lift the Patriots to a come-from-behind 30-27 victory to hand the visiting New Orleans Saints their first loss of the year.

The touchdown pass capped an 8-play, 70 -yard drive that started at their own 30 -yard line with $1: 13$ seconds left to play. The victory marked the 38th time that Brady has led his team to victory following a fourth-quarter deficit or tie.

Brady completed five-of-seven passes for 70 yards to lead New England to the win. On the drive, Brady completed three quick passes in a row (to three different receivers) to put the Patriots in position to win, firing off a 23 -yard completion to Julian Edelman, a 15 -yard completion to Austin Collie and a 6 -yard pass to Aaron Dobson to set New England up at the New Orleans 26 -yard line with 35 seconds left. Following two incompletions, Brady completed a 9 -yard pass on fourth down to Collie, and then following a clockstopping spike, Brady tossed the game-winning 17-yard touchdown to Thompkins with 5 seconds remaining.

The Patriots had squandered a 17-7 halftime lead after New Orleans scored a field goal and a touchdown on their first two drives of the second half to tie the game. K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a career-long 54-yard field goal in the third quarter and added a 23 -yard field goal in the fourth quarter to put New England in front, 23-17. But the Saints took a 24-23 lead with 3:29 to play when QB Drew Brees threw a 34 -yard touchdown pass to WR Kenny Stills.

On the ensuing drive, the Patriots tried to convert a fourth-and-six situation from their own 24-yard line with 2:50 to play but were stopped, leading to a New Orleans field goal for a 27-23 lead. Brady was intercepted on the first play following the Saints touchdown, allowing New Orleans to get the ball back with 2:16 to play.

The Patriots defense had a key three-and-out on that series set the New England offense up for the game-winning drive. S Steve Gregory stopped New Orleans's RB Khiry Robinson for a 2 -yard gain on first down and the Patriots then took their final timeout. Gregory and DL Joe Vellano stopped RB Pierre Thomas for a 1 -yard gain on second down, leading into the two-minute warning. DL Chandler Jones then sacked Brees on third down, setting up a New Orleans punt that gave the Patriots the ball back with 1:13 remaining and setting up the game-winning drive.

The New Orleans offense twice failed to pick up a first down that would have put the game away in the final three minutes. Excluding a field goal attempt and a punt, the Saints ran six plays from the 2:46 mark of the fourth quarter on, and those snaps produced just one single yard.

The Patriots built a 17-7 halftime lead after scoring a field goal on their first drive of the game and then two RB Stevan Ridley touchdown runs in the second quarter.

The Patriots defense held Saints TE Jimmy Graham without a reception. Graham entered the game averaging 118.6 yards per game.

Following two incompletions, Brady completed a 9 -yard pass on fourth down to Collie, and then following a clock-stopping spike, Brady tossed the game-winning 17yard touchdown to Thompkins with 5 seconds remaining.

## PATRIOTS DEFENSE HOLDS JIMMY GRAHAM

## WITHOUT A RECEPTION

New England's defense held New Orleans TE Jimmy Graham without a catch. Graham entered the game averaging 188.6 yards per game. Patriots defensive backs made plays on passes from Drew Brees that were intended for Graham. Aqib Talib broke up a pass intended for Graham on second down in the first quarter, forcing a third-and-nine that the Saints did not convert as New England forced New Orleans into a three-and-out on its first possession of the game. Talib broke up another pass intended for Graham on third-and-ten in the second quarter, forcing the Saints' second punt of the game. Kyle Arrington broke up a Brees pass intended for Jimmy Graham on second-and-10 in the second quarter, and later intercepted a pass intended for Graham in the fourth quarter.
THOMPKINS SNARES GAME-WINNING SCORE Kembrell Thompkins had three catches for 45 yards, including the game-winning 17-yard touchdown reception with five seconds left. The touchdown was Thompkins' team-high fourth scoring catch of the season.

## LAST GAME: PATRIDTS VS. SAINTS

GOSTKOWSKI KICKS A CAREER-LONG 54-YARD FIELD GOAL
K Stephen Gostkowski connected on a career-long 54-yard field goal in the third quarter. His previous best was a 53yard field goal, which he did three times - vs. Tampa Bay (9-22-13), vs. Arizona (9-16-12) and at Denver (10-11-09). Gostkowski was three-for-three on field goals against New Orleans, and has now hit 11 straight field goals dating back to Week Two.

## GOSTKOWSKI HAS MOST 50-YARD FIELD GOALS IN TEAM HISTORY

Gostkowski connected on a career-long 54-yard field goal in the third quarter and is now 9 -of- 12 from 50 yards or more as a member of the Patriots. The nine 50 -yard field goals are the most in team history.

## PATRIOTS FORCE A TURNOVER FOR THE $33^{\text {R }}$ STRAIGHT GAME

The Patriots have now forced a turnover in 33 straight games dating back to 2011 after Kyle Arrington intercepted a Drew Brees pass in the fourth quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the New Orleans 20-yard line.
BRADY TIES FRAN TARKENTON FOR FOURTH PLACE ON NFL TD LIST
Tom Brady threw his 342nd career touchdown pass in the final minute of the game to tie Fran Tarkenton for fourth on the NFL's all-time touchdown pass list. Dan Marino is third with 420 touchdowns.

## BRADY MOVES PAST VINNY TESTAVERDE FOR $8^{\text {TH }}$ PLACE ON NFL PASSING LIST <br> Brady $(46,286)$ moved past Vinny Testaverde $(46,233)$ for eighth place on the NFL's all-time passing list. Fran Tarkenton is in seventh place with 47,003 passing yards.

 EDELMAN SURPASSES SINGLE-SEASONCAREER BESTS CAREER BESTS
Julian Edelman had five catches for 57 yards, raising his season totals to 41 receptions for 411 yards. The 41 catches and 411 receiving yards represent single-season career highs for Edelman, topping his previous career bests of 37 catches for 359 yards as a rookie in 2009.

## COLLIE SEES FIRST ACTION WITH THE

 PATRIOTS; CONTRIBUTES ON WINNING DRIVE Newly acquired WR Austin Collie played in his first game with the Patriots and finished with two catches for 24 yards. Both of Collie's catches came in the final minute of the game on the Patriots' game-winning drive, snaring a 15 -yard reception to bring the Patriots to the Saints' 32 -yard line and then a 9 -yard reception on fourth-and-four to set the Patriots up on the 17-yard line and set the stage for the game-winning touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Kembrell Thompkins following a clock-stopping spike.
## TE MICHAEL HOOMANAWANUI SETS SINGLE

 GAME HIGHMichael Hoomanawanui had a career high 57 receiving yards on four catches, besting his previous mark of 46 receiving yards, achieved twice, most recently on Dec. 23, 2012 at Jacksonville. Hoomanawanui's longest catch was for a 19yard gain on third-and-18 in the second quarter. That reception was Hoomanawanui's longest of the 2013 season.

RB STEVAN RIDLEY RUSHES FOR TWO TOUCHDOWNS
Stevan Ridley scored two rushing touchdowns with a 1-yard run in the first quarter and a 4 -yard run in the second quarter. It is the third time in his career that he has rushed for two touchdowns in a single game. He had two at Buffalo (9/30/12) and vs. Miami (12/30/12). Last season, Ridley finished tied for third in the NFL with 12 rushing touchdowns. The 12 rushing touchdowns are tied with Corey Dillon (2005 and 2004), Antowain Smith (2001) and Steve Grogan (1976) for fifth all-time in team history.

## PATRIOTS DEFENSE FORCED KEY THREE-ANDOUT

The Patriots defense had a key three-and-out in the fourth quarter to set the New England offense up for the gamewinning drive against New Orleans. After a Saints interception set New Orleans up at its own 30 -yard line with 2:16 left and a 27-23 lead, Steve Gregory stopped New Orleans's Khiry Robinson for a 2 -yard gain on first down and the Patriots then took their final timeout. Gregory and Joe Vellano stopped Pierre Thomas for a 1 -yard gain on second down, leading into the two-minute warning. Chandler Jones then sacked Drew Brees on third down, setting up a New Orleans punt that gave the Patriots the ball back with 1:13 remaining and setting up the game-winning drive.

## PATRIOTS ARE 5-1 OR BETTER FOR THE NINTH TIME IN TEAM HISTORY

The Patriots have won five of their first six games of the 2013 season, marking the ninth time in team history that New England has won at least five of its first six games. In addition to this year, New England was also 5-1 in 2011, 2010, 2006, 1997, 1980, and 1974, and was 6-0 in 2007 and 2004. The Patriots have made the playoffs in each of the last six seasons in which they have started 5-1 or better.

## DENNARD HAS A PAIR OF PASS BREAKUPS

Alfonzo Dennard provided tight coverage on Robert Meachem along the sidelines on third-and-10 in the third quarter, forcing a Saints punt on the next play. Dennard also broke up a Drew Brees pass intended for Marcus Colston on third-and-seven in the fourth quarter, holding the Saints to a field goal that resulted in a 27-23 New Orleans lead and kept the Patriots in the game.
ARRINGTON INTERCEPTION SETS UP POINTS Kyle Arrington intercepted a Drew Brees pass intended for Jimmy Graham in the fourth quarter, giving the Patriots possession at the Saints' 20 -yard line and setting up a Stephen Gostkowski field goal that gave the Patriots a 23-17 lead. The interception was Arrington's eighth since the beginning of the 2011 season, the most by a Patriot over that span (McCourty, 7).

## PATRIOTS WICKED GOOD IN OCTOBER

The Patriots improved to $36-8$ in the month of October since the 2003 season. The Patriots are 21-1 (.955) at home during that time in October. The only home loss since 2003 was a 41-17 victory by the visiting San Diego Chargers on Oct. 2, 2005.

## BRADY IS GOOD AGAINST THE NFC

Tom Brady improved his record to $38-9$ record against the NFC overall as starter and 19-5 at home.

## BILL BELICHICK

- Bill Belichick (210) moved past Hall of Famer Chuck Noll (209) into fifth place all-time on the NFL wins list with the Patriots 3027 win against New Orleans. Curly Lambeau is in fourth place with 229 career wins.
-Belichick (18) needs one more postseason victory to tie Don Shula (19) for second place in postseason wins. Tom Landry (20) is in first place.
-Belichick has five conference titles and needs one more to match Don Shula, who led his teams to six Super Bowls.
-Belichick has led the Patriots to 12 consecutive winning records (2001-12). He is tied with Curly Lambeau (12-1921-32) for third all-time. The NFL record is 20 by Tom Landry (1966-85) followed by 14 by Curly Lambeau (1934-47).


## TOM BRADY

- Tom Brady has 54 career 300 -yard games and ranks fifth alltime for most 300-yard games and third among active players.
- Brady (34) reached 30 touchdown passes in 2012 for the third straight season and became just the fifth player in NFL history with at least 30 touchdown passes in four seasons overall.
- Brady $(4,827)$ reached 4,000 passing yards in 2012. He is just the fifth player in NFL history to reach 4,000 yards in five or more seasons: Peyton Manning (12), Drew Brees (7), Dan Marino (6) and Brett Favre (6).
- Brady is the only quarterback in NFL history to have thrown for at least one touchdown pass in each game for three consecutive seasons (2010-12).
- Brady had 401 completions in 2012 for the second straight season and joined Drew Brees (5), Peyton Manning (2) and Matthew Stafford (2) as the only NFL quarterbacks with at least two 400 completion seasons.


## ROB GRONKOWSKI

-Rob Gronkowski (10 touchdowns in 2010 and 18 in 2011) became the first tight end in NFL history with three straight 10plus touchdown seasons after reaching 11 for the season in 2012. Gronkowski and Antonio Gates (13 in 2004 and 10 in 2005) are the only tight ends to have back-to-back 10-plus touchdown seasons.

- Gronkowski joins Randy Moss (2007, 2008 and 2009) and Corey Dillon $(2004,2005,2006)$ as the only Patriots with three straight 10 -plus touchdown seasons and three 10 -plus seasons overall.
-Gronkowski has 38 receiving touchdowns and 39 touchdowns overall (38 receiving and 1 rushing) since 2010. The 38 receiving touchdowns are the most in the NFL in that time span, and the 39 overall touchdowns are third, behind Arian Foster (49) and Adrian Peterson (45).
- Gronkowski has 38 touchdowns in just 43 games. He can become the fastest to 40 touchdowns. Antonio Gates currently holds the record after reaching 40 touchdowns in 71 games.


## JEROD MAYO

- Jerod Mayo has registered 100 or more tackles in five straight seasons and needs one more 100 -tackle season to tie Fred Marion (6) for the all-time lead in team history. He has 66 total tackles through six games in 2013 and is on pace to finish with 176 total tackles.


## ROB NINKOVICH

- Rob Ninkovich has 10 fumble recoveries over the last four seasons (2010-13), the most of any player in the NFL over that time. Vince Wilfork is second with seven.


## STEVAN RIDLEY

-Stevan Ridley rushed for 1,263 yards in 2012 and will be looking to become the third Patriots player with back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons, joining Jim Nance (1966-67) and Curtis Martin (1995-97).

- Ridley scored 12 touchdowns in 2012 and will look to become the fourth running back in team history with back-to-back 10plus touchdowns in a season, joining Corey Dillon (2004, 2005,

2006), BenJarvus Green-Ellis (2010, 2011) and Curtis Martin (1995, 1996).

## TEAM

-The Patriots have forced at least one turnover in 33 straight games, the longest current streak in the NFL. The NFL record for most consecutive games with at least one turnover since the merger in 1970 is 71 by Philadelphia from 1985-1990. The last time the Patriots did not register at least one turnover was on Oct. 9, 2011 vs. the New York Jets.

## PATRIOTS 2013 TEAM CAPTAINS

The Patriots team captains were elected by their teammates. Quarterback Tom Brady and G Logan Mankins are the offensive captains. Defensive lineman Vince Wilfork and LB Jerod Mayo are the defensive captains. Wide receiver Matthew Slater is the special teams captain. Brady has been chosen as a captain for the $12^{\text {th }}$ straight season. Wilfork is a captain for the sixth straight season, while Mayo is in his fifth season serving as a captain. Mankins, and Slater are captains for a third time.

## BRADY TIED NFL RECORD WITH THREE STRAIGHT GAMES WITH 30 COMPLETIONS IN 2011

Brady tied an NFL record with three straight games with 30 completions after completing 32 at Miami ( $9 / 12 / 11$ ), 31 vs. San Diego (9/18/11) and 30 at Buffalo (9/25). He shares the record with Drew Brees (2011), Steve Young (1995), Rich Gannon (2002), Kurt Warner (2008) and Peyton Manning (2010). The most 30 completion games Brady has had in a season is five in 2007.

## BRADY'S 65 PASS ATTEMPTS AGAINST SF ARE A CAREER-HIGH

Tom Brady's 65 passing attempts vs. San Francisco (12/16/12) are a career high, topping his 58 pass attempts at Seattle on Oct. 14, 2012. Brady's 65 attempts are the most in franchise history in a non-overtime game and are the second most in team history in any game, trailing only Drew Bledsoe's 70 attempts in an overtime win vs. Minnesota on Nov. 13, 1994. Brady's 65 pass attempts are the seventh most in NFL history and the most since Brian Griese had 67 for Tampa Bay at Chicago on Sept. 21, 2008 in overtime. It is the most in a non-overtime NFL game since Dec. 24, 2000 when the Jets Vinny Testaverde attempted 69 passes at Baltimore.

EDELMAN IS FIRST PATRIOTS PLAYER WITH TWO PUNT RETURNS OF 40 YARDS IN THE SAME GAME Edelman had a 68 -yard punt that he returned for a touchdown and a 49 -yard return vs. Indianapolis (11/18/12). He is the first player in team history with two punt returns of 40 or more yards in the same game. Troy Brown came close in 2000 when he had returns of 39 and 66 against Tampa Bay.

## EDELMAN'S 47-YARD RUN IS THE LONGEST RUN BY A PATS WIDE RECEIVER

Edelman had a 47-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. Indianapolis $(11 / 18 / 12)$. It was the longest run from scrimmage for the Patriots in 2012, topping Steven Ridley's 41-yard run against St. Louis in London on Oct. 28. It is the longest run ever by a Patriots receiver, topping Troy Brown's 35 -yard run vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000. It was the longest run by a Patriots player since Sammy Morris had a $55-$ yard run on Dec. 27, 2009 vs. Jacksonville.

## EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed $56 \%$ of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL - covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender - he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

GRONKOWSKI SETS NFL RECORD FOR RECEIVING YARDS BY A TIGHT END
Rob Gronkowski finished the 2011 season with 1,327 receiving yards, surpassing San Diego's Kellen Winslow's 1980 record of 1,290 receiving yards for most receiving yards in a season by a tight end. GRONKOWSKI SECOND PATRIOTS TIGHT END TO REACH 1,000 YARDS
Gronkowski became the second tight end in New England Patriots history to go over 1,000 receiving yards in 2011. He broke TE Ben Coates ( 1,174 yards in 1994) franchise record en route to his NFL tight end receiving record of 1,327 yards.

## GRONKOWSKI BECOMES FIRST PATRIOTS TIGHT END TO RECORD A RUSHING TOUCHDOWN

Gronkowski scored a 2-yard touchdown on a lateral from Tom Brady in the third quarter vs. Indianapolis (12/4/11), becoming the first tight end in Patriots history to score a rushing touchdown. Gronkowski is the first NFL tight end to score a rushing touchdown since Tennessee's Bo Scaife had a 31 -yard scoring run against Baltimore on Nov. 12, 2006. After being arrested seven times between the ages of 15 and 18, Thompkins excelled at El Camino and went on to play at the University of Cincinnati en route to fulfilling his NFL dream. Thompkins earned his degree from Cincinnati in criminal justice.

## WILL SVITEK TAKES A HIKE TO REMEMBER

Will Svitek was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia. When he was 2, his parents took him and his three brothers out of the communist country. They left in secret with no money and only the clothes on their backs. Saying they were on a day hike, they walked 14 hours through the mountains and ended up in Austria. The family spent eight months in a refugee camp until being legalized to come to the United States. "My parents were hard-working immigrants who came here to achieve the American Dream and help their sons reach their full potential," said Svitek. "I think they instilled it in me to do everything well. I am a competitive person on the field and in the classroom and I don't think you can just turn that switch off."

## SEBASTIAN VOLLMER MAKES HIS MARK

A native of Kaarst, Germany, Vollmer did not begin playing football until the age of 14 when he started playing for the Dusseldorf club team. Vollmer helped lead his German prep school team to two national football championships. His early football success landed him an appearance in the 2004 Global Junior Championships in San Diego, which led him to a scholarship at Houston. He spoke very little English when he signed with Houston, but he became fluent in the language as he developed from a 250 -pound tight end into a 315 -pound lineman who started his final 25 games at tackle for the Cougars. He was not invited to the NFL combine, but Vollmer's collegiate career created interest from the Patriots, who drafted him in the second round of the 2009 draft. Nicknamed "Seabass" during his playing days at Houston, it is a nickname that has carried over to the NFL.

## C RYAN WENDELL

## RYAN WENDELL LEADS THE NFL IN PLAY SNAPS IN 2012

Ryan Wendell played a league-high 1,249 snaps in 2012 and it helped earn him a spot on the USA Today All-Joe team in 2012. Said Wendell: "I think first it says a lot about the organization, our training staff and our strength training coaches, that they do everything they can all season and all off-season and during the spring to keep us healthy throughout the whole season. I think it says more about them then it does about me individually."


## CB KYLE ARRINGTON

## WHAT IS IN A NUMBER

When Arrington was first making the transition from Hofstra to the NFL in 2008, he was assigned jersey No. 42. At that point in his career, he was cut by both the Eagles and Buccaneers.

When Arrington first arrived in New England as a practice squad player in 2009, he initially donned No. 27. But when No. 24 became available, a result of Jonathan Wilhite leaving in free agency after the 2010 season, Arrington pounced on it.

The reason is that it reflects how he's flipped his NFL fortunes -- from a No. 42 struggling to hang on to a No. 24 who has carved out a role on a winning team.
Arrington moved from 24 to 25 in an agreement with Adrian Wilson this past season to accommodate the veteran's desire to keep the same jersey he has worn during his 12-year NFL career.

He found out he passed the test on the same day that the San Diego Chargers called him to offer him a rookie free agent contract.

## GREGORY SETS CAREER HIGH WITH HIS THIRD INTERCEPTION OF THE SEASON IN 2012

Steve Gregory set a single-season career-high when he intercepted Miami QB Ryan Tannehill in the first quarter for his third on the season in the season-finale on Dec. 30, 2012. The pick helped set up a 9 -yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Wes Welker. Gregory's previous single-season high was two interceptions in 2010 when he played for San Diego.

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey \#45 but was switched to jersey \#54 prior to the start of the regular season. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore \#54 for 13 seasons. Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

## 2012 FIRST ROUND PICK CHANDLER JONES FOLLOWS IN BROTHERS' FOOTSTEPS

Chandler Jones has two brothers, Arthur, a fifth-round NFL Draft selection by the Baltimore Ravens in 2010, who was a Syracuse defensive tackle, and Jon "Bones" Jones, a UFC fighter and the reigning Lightweight Champion.

## JONES HAS SECOND TWO-SACK GAME

DE Chandler Jones tied his career high with his second two sack game of his career in the win vs. the New York Jets on Sept. 12, 2013. He had his first two-sack game at Seattle on Oct. 14, 2012. Jones sacked Jets QB Geno Smith twice in the second quarter. First, he dropped Smith for an 11-yard loss on third-and-5 in the second quarter, forcing a Jets punt on the next play. On the Jets' next drive, Jones sacked Smith again, this time for a 5 -yard loss.

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. It is the fourth time in 2012 that the Patriots have intercepted a pass in the end zone. Rookie Tavon Wilson had an interception in the end zone at Tennessee on Sept. 9 in the second quarter.

## DE ROB NINKOVICH

NINKOVICH LEADS NFL OVER LAST FOUR SEASONS WITH 10 FUMBLE RECOVERIES Ninkovich has more opponent fumble recoveries (10) over the last four seasons (2010-2013) than any other NFL player. Chicago's Brian Urlacher and Vince Wilfrok are second during that time with seven opponent fumble recoveries.


## NINKOVICH: WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

## NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2 -yard touchdown pass from Dallas QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from New York Giants QB Curtis Painter.

#### Abstract

SPIKES IS A THROWBACK Spikes, who patterns his style of play after Hall of Fame linebacker Dick Butkus, shared his feelings on modeling his game after oldschool linebackers. "My thing is, when I'm done with this game, I want the older guys when they watch to say, 'He's playing the position the right way.' It's just a point of respect from me to them." Spikes' passion and energy are apparent when he plays the  game. Said former Patriots safety Rodney Harrison in a recent interview with the Boston Herald: "You can see how much he loves it, how he enjoys being physical. He's an intimidator. He's got that fight in him. He's going to hit you and you're going to feel it."

\section*{SPIKES WENT OVER 100 TACKLES IN 2012; ON} PACE TO FINISH WITH OVER 100 AGAIN IN 2013 Spikes had 10 or more tackles in six games and finished with a career-high 128 tackles in 2012. With Jerod Mayo at 184 tackles and Spikes at 128, it is the fifth time in the Bill Belichick era that two players have finished with 100 or more tackles. Mayo is on pace to finish with 176 tackles in 2013, and Spikes has 49 total


 tackles and is on pace to finish 131 total tackles.
## SPIKES SETS CAREER HIGH WITH 22 TACKLES

Spikes set a career-high with 22 total tackles at Cincinnati on Oct. 6, 2013. His previous best was 16 tackles at the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. It is the highest tackle total for a Patriots player since Jerod Mayo had 23 total tackles vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 13, 2008.

New England has qualified for the playoffs 20 times in its 53 -year history. The Patriots have earned 14 of those playoff berths in the 19 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 12 AFC East crowns under Kraft's leadership. It marks the $38^{\text {th }}$ time that Brady has led his team to victory following a fourthquarter victory or tie and the second time he has done so this season. Brady led the Patriots on a 12-play, 49-yard drive late in the fourth quarter against Buffalo in Week 1 to set up Stephen Gostkowski's game-winning field goal ... It was Brady's $54^{\text {th }}$ career 300 -yard passing game, good for fifth all-time among NFL QBs ... Brady is $18-5$ in 23 career games against the Jets and has won his last six games against New York. He has a 110.6 quarterback rating in those six games with 14 touchdowns and just one interception.

## RB Stevan Ridley (D3a, '11)

Ridley rushed for a season-high 96 yards and two touchdowns in Sunday's win over the Saints. It is the third time in his career that he has rushed for two touchdowns in a single game, the other two times coming on 9/30/12 against Buffalo and 12/30/12 against Miami ... Ridley's 96 yards rushing against the Saints was his highest single-game total since he rushed for 97 yards in a 10/22/12 win over the Jets ... The Team df the Decade

When Robert Kraft purchased the New England Patriots in 1994, few would have thought that 17 years later the franchise would be the undisputed team of the decade in the first decade of the new millennium. Kraft brought a winning vision to the organization and dedicated his resources to building a consistent winner. On Jan. 27, 2000, Kraft hired Bill Belichick to coach the team, and three months later the team drafted then-unheralded quarterback Tom Brady, putting the final pieces in place for the Patriots to become the most successful NFL team of the 2000s. Below is a look at the accomplishments of the Patriots during the first decade of the new millennium that earned the Patriots the "Team of the Decade" moniker.
