NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-5) AT NEW YORK JETS (0-8)

Monday, November 9, 2020 • MetLife Stadium • 8:15 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will remain in AFC East Division play for the second straight week when they travel to the New York Jets on Monday Night Football. It will be the first of two straight prime-time games. Following Monday's game against the Jets, the Patriots will return home to face Baltimore on Sunday Night Football on Nov. 15.

This week's game marks the second of three Monday night games for the Patriots in 2020. In addition to the Jets game, the Patriots played at Kansas City Week 4 on a Monday night and they will host Buffalo Week 16 on Monday, Dec. 28. It will be the fourth time the Patriots will have three Monday night games in one season. They also played three Monday night games in 1980, 1997 and 1998.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **ESPN** and can be seen locally on **WCVB-TV Channel 5**. **Steve Levy** will handle play-by-play duties with **Brian Griese** and **Louis Riddick** as the color analysts. **Lisa Salters** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Phil Dean** and directed by **Jimmy Platt**.

NATIONAL RADIO: Monday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on

Westwood One. Ian Eagle will call the game with Ron Jaworski providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 35 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

The New England Patriots own a 92-26 (.780) record in regular-season AFC East games since the beginning of the 2001 season, compiling the best intra-division record of any team in the NFL.

SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and New York Jets will square off this week for the first of two 2020 meetings. The clubs will play on Monday Night Football for the ninth time in team history and for the second consecutive season at MetLife Stadium. Last year the Patriots beat the Jets, 33-0, in a Monday Night Football game from MetLife Stadium on Oct. 21. Overall, the Patriots are 4-4 in Monday Night Football games against the Jets, including 2-2 on the road.

In 2019, New England earned its 20th series sweep over New York. It was also the fourth straight and the 11th under Bill Belichick and their 13th since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994.

New England leads the series, 67-54-1 overall. The Patriots are 31-29 all-time on the road against the Jets, including 7-3 at MetLife Stadium.

The teams have played in the postseason three times – a 1985 Wild Card game, a 2006 Wild Card game and an AFC Divisional game in 2010. New England beat the Jets, 26-14, in 1985 at the Meadowlands en route to Super Bowl XX. In 2006, the Patriots defeated the Jets, 37-16, at Gillette Stadium and the Jets beat the Patriots, 28-21, in a 2010 Divisional Playoff game in Foxborough.

New England is 38-16 against the Jets since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994.

New England's 67 overall victories over the Jets (including two playoff wins) are the second most over any single opponent, trailing only the 74 wins over Buffalo

- And the team does not commit a turnover, New England will win its 70th game since 2008 without committing a turnover. The Patriots enter Week 9 with a 69-9 record in zero turnover games since 2008.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

• The Patriots have been called for an NFL-low 20 total penalties. The fewest penalties the Patriots have ever had in a 16-game season was 57 in 2008. Since 2000, the fewest penalties in a season is 55 by the 2012 Atlanta Falcons. The 2020 Patriots are on pace for 46 total penalties.

- Newton has the most rushing first downs by quarterback in NFL history with 385 and has 25 through Week 8 in 2020. He is second in 2020 among QBs behind the 28 by Arizona's Kyler Murray.





Since purchasing the team in 1994, the Patriots, under Robert Krafts' leadership, have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09)

Mr. Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (326), division titles (19), winning percentage (.692), playoff wins (33), playoff seasons (21).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 26 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring



a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 26 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. Kraft earned his 23rd winning season in 26 years of owning the franchise in 2019.

A WINNING TRADITION

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of Oakland accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

A WINNING TRADITION

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.692) since taking over the team in 1994 is the highest among all owners/ownership groups with at least 200 wins (regular and postseason) with one team. He is one of just four owners with at least 200 wins and a winning percentage over .600.

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 326 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 326-145 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 60-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns, including 17 in the last 19 seasons and 19 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

TEAM - POINTS OF INTEREST

- The Patriots are tied with Pittsburgh for the most Super Bowl wins with six and need one more Super Bowl win for most Super Bowl wins in NFL history.
- The Patriots have played in the most Super Bowls in NFL history with 11 and look to add to that number in 2020.
- The Patriots enter the 2020 season second with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots enter the 2020 season with 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history, and will look to add to that number in 2020. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs for 11 straight seasons (2009-19), the most in NFL history. Dallas and Indianapolis are tied for second with nine consecutive seasons with a playoff berth.
- The Patriots extended their NFL record with 11 straight division titles (2009-19) and look to add to that number in 2020. The Los Angeles Rams are second with seven straight division titles (1973-79).
- The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds and need one more to tie Denver (8) for second behind San Francisco (9) for the most since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since the current playoff format was instituted in 1990. Pitts-burgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. The Patriots are the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 58 postseason games, tied with Green Bay (58) for third all-time and need to play in two more postseason games in 2020 to become the third NFL team to play in 60 postseason games, joining Dallas (63) and Pittsburgh (61).
- The Patriots have achieved 19 straight seasons (2001-19) with a record of .500 or better, second all-time behind the 21 seasons by Dallas (1965-85).

- The Patriots have posted a winning record for 19 straight seasons (2001-19), the most since the 1970 merger and the second-most alltime, behind Dallas with 20 straight winning seasons (1966-85).
- The Patriots have won at least 10 regular-season games for 17 consecutive seasons (2003-19), one more than the 16 by San Francisco (1983-98) for the most consecutive seasons with at least 10 victories and look to add to that number in 2020.
- The Patriots (2010-19) have an NFL record 10 consecutive seasons with at least 11 wins. Indianapolis is second all-time with seven (2003-09).
- The Patriots are second with 13 12-win seasons since 1970 to the 14 12-win seasons by the San Francisco 49ers.
- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14win seasons.
- New England has 27 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Indianapolis is second with 17 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots have 34 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind the 36 winning seasons by Pittsburgh.
- The Patriots finished the 2019 season with 420 points and have now reached 400 or more points in 13 straight seasons (2007-19) to extend their NFL record. The San Diego Chargers previously held the record by scoring at least 400 points in eight straight seasons from 2004-11.
 The New Orleans Saints have the second-longest active streak, scoring 400 points for their ninth straight season in 2019.
- The Patriots have tallied seven safeties since 2015, tied with Indianapolis for the most during that time. The Los Angeles Rams are second with six safeties during that time.

THE PATRIOTS OFFENSE HAS ECLIPSED

200 YARDS RUSHING IN A SINGLE GAME 16 TIMES

UNDER BILL BELICHICK



- The Patriots rushed for 217 yards in Week 1 vs. Miami and for 250 yards in Week 3 vs. Las Vegas. The Patriots have also rushed for 200 yards twice in a single season under Belichick in 2004, 08, 10, 12, 14 and 18 but never three times in a single year.
- The Patriots 6.6 yards per carry average vs. Las Vegas in Week 3 was their highest since 7.06 vs. Green Bay on Dec. 19, 2010. It marked the 11th time under Bill Belichick that the Patriots have averaged at least six yards per carry in a single game.



PENALTY-FREE FOOTBALL

The Patriots have committed an NFL-low 20 penalties through seven games this season and set a team record by not committing an offensive foul through the first three games of the year. The Patriots ended a streak of 226 straight offensive plays without a penalty at Kansas City (10/5).

FEWEST PENALTIES IN A 16-GAME SEASON



Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more regular-season games (123) and more games overall (136) during a 10-year stretch (2002-11) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 46 consecutive years as an NFL coach are first in NFL history, passing the 45 by Dick LeBeau. The only other NFL coach with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons is Tom Moore with 41.



WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2020

- Bill Belichick has an NFL-best six Super Bowl championships as a head coach and joins George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only NFL coaches with six championships since the league began postseason play in 1933.
- Belichick is third all-time with 275 career regular-season wins, behind Don Shula (328) and George Halas (318).
- Belichick has 306 victories (regular season and playoffs combined), third all-time behind Don Shula (347) and George Halas (324).

- In Week 1 vs. Miami, Edelman (620) joined Wes Welker (672) to become the second Patriot to reach 600 career receptions. Edelman now needs 53 receptions to move past Welker.
- Set a single-game career high with 179 yards receiving on eight receptions at Seattle Week 2. His previous career-high was 151

receiving yards on eight receptions with a touchdown at Miami (/1//17).

WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2020

- Edelman is in fourth place on the Patriots career receiving yards list with 6,822 receiving yards. He needs 638 yards to move past Wes Welker (7,459) into third place in team history, behind the 7,861 yards by Rob Gronkowski and 10,352 by Stanley Morgan.
- Edelman enters 2020 in ninth place on the Patriots all-time list with 36 receiving touchdowns and can move past Wes Welker (37), Irving Fryar (38), Jim Colclough (39) in 2020.
- Edelman enters the 2020 season with 1,986 punt return yards in the regular season, third in team history to the 2,625 by Troy Brown and 2,055 by Irving Fryar. Edelman needs 14 punt return yards to become the third Patriots player with 2,000 punt return yards.
- Edelman enters 2020 second in NFL history with 118 postseason receptions, second behind Jerry Rice (151).
- Edelman is one of 15 NFL players with at least 1,000 career postseason receiving yards and his 1,442 postseason receiving yards are second all-time, behind the 2,245 playoff receiving yards by Jerry Rice.
- Edelman has accrued six postseason 100-yard receiving games, the most in New England history and tied with Michael Irvin for second all-time, behind the eight 100-yard receiving games by Jerry Rice.

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the team's leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the *Boston Herald*. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

Edelman was named Super Bowl MVP after finishing with 10 receptions for 141 yards in Super Bowl LIII vs. the L.A. Rams. He became the seventh wide receiver to win Super Bowl MVP honors and the second Patriots wide receiver to win the award. Deion Branch was named MVP in Super Bowl XXXIX.

INCHING CLOSER TO THE TOP

Edelman ranks second all-time in NFL postseason history with 118 receptions. He also ranks second all-time in postseason receiving yards and is one of 15 players with at least 1,000 career postseason receiving yards. He is the Patriots all-time playoff leader with 118 receptions and 1,442 receiving yards.



ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Slater was named to eight Pro Bowls (2011-17, 19) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 10th straight season in 2020.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."



SLATER SCORES FIRST CAREER TOUCHDOWN

During a 2007 loss to Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.





- McCourty (28) needs two interceptions in 2020 to join Ty Law (36), Raymond Clayborn (36) as the third Patriot to reach 30 interceptions.

PICK LEADER

Devin McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2019, his third career season with five-plus interceptions. That mark tied Marcus Peters and Earl Thomas for most seasons with 5-plus interception seasons since 2010. Additionally, McCourty's 28 regular-season interceptions since he entered the league in 2010 are tied for the fifth-most in the NFL over that span.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.

Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 19th straight year in 2019. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are also the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

- Rob Gronkowski caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular-season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
