## GAME SUMMARY

## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (6-7) AT MIAMI DOLPHINS (8-5) Sunday, December 20, 2020 • Hard Rock Stadium • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will travel to South Florida for their final regular season road game to face the Miami Dolphins for their second meeting of the season. The Patriots beat Miami in the season opener, 21-11, at Gillette Stadium.

Following the Miami game, the Patriots will return to Foxborough to close out the regular season with home games against the Buffalo Bills and New York Jets. It will be the sixth time the Patriots close out a regular season with at least three straight contests against division foes: 1971 (four straight), 1975 (five straight), 1981 (three straight), 1987 (three straight) and 2014 (three straight).

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: : This week's game will be broadcast by CBS and can be seen locally on WBZ Channel 4. Ian Eagle will handle play-by-play duties with Charles Davis as the color analyst. Evan Washburn will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by Mark Wolff and directed by Bob Fishman.

NATIONAL RADIO: Thursday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on Sports USA. Josh Appel will call the with game with Doug Plank providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 35 stations can be found on page 57 this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster Bob Socci will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by Marc Cappello.

## GUNNER POSTING STRONG RETURNS

Gunner Olszewski is leading the NFL with a 20.6-yard punt return average (14 returns for 289 yards). If he continues that pace, it would be the highest return average in New England history. Julian Edelman has the highest average in a season at 15.5 in 2012. Only seven NFL players have a return average of at least 20.0 yards in a single season.

## SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Miami Dolphins will square off for the second of the two scheduled meetings in 2020. The Patriots hosted Miami in the 2020 season-opener and came out on top of a 21-11 decision on Sept. 13. The two teams have split the series in each of the last three seasons. The Patriots will be looking for their 11th series sweep of Miami in team history, their first since the 2016 season and their 7th under head coach Bill Belichick.

The Patriots have had the upper hand at home against Miami, holding a 36-18 record in games played in New England in the regular season, including a 16-3 record at Gillette Stadium. But the Patriots are 16-37 all-time in the regular season at Miami.

The Dolphins and Patriots met for the first time in 1966 and began playing twice a year during the 1967 regular season, except in 1982 during a players' strike.

The two have played three times in the postseason with New England holding a 2-1 advantage.

## WORTH NOTING

Miami assistant DB coach Curt Kuntz worked under Patriots OC Josh McDaniels' father Thom McDaniels at Warren G. Harding High School as an O-Line coach from 2002-06.
Dolphins GM Chris Grier is the son of Bobby Grier, who served as the VP of Player Personnel with the Patriots from 1995-99.
Miami Linebacker Kamu Grugier-Hill was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round of the 2016 draft. He was waived by New England in Sept. 2016 and was awarded to Philadelphia.
Miami Linebacker Calvin Munson was signed to the Patriots practice squad on Sept. 8, 2018, and stayed with the team until Dec. 17, 2019, when Miami signed him to the 53-man roster
Miami CB Jamal Perry (formerly Jomal Wiltz) spent time on the New England practice squad from September 2017 until February 2019, when Miami claimed him.

## IF THE PATRIOTS WIN...

- New England will improve on their NFL-best 93-26 record against division opponents since 2001.
- And a player eclipses 100 yards rushing, the team will improve to $54-3$ since the 2000 regular season when a player rushes for at least 100 yards.
- And the team does not commit a turnover, New England will win its 73rd game since 2008 without committing a turnover. The Patriots enter Week 15 with a 72-10 record in zero turnover games since 2008.


## WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- The New England rushing attack enters this week fifth in the NFL, averaging 147.5 rushing yards per game (1,918 total rushing yards), on pace for 2,361 rushing yards for the season. That would rank fourth in team annals behind the 3,165 rushing yards in 1978, 2,948 in 1976 and 2,605 in 1983.
- The Patriots are averaging 4.49 yards per rushing attempt ( 427 rushes for 1,918 yards). If the team holds that pace, it would mark the fifth-highest average in team history.
- Damien Harris (3) and Sony Michel (1) have combined for four 100-yard rushing performances so far in 2020, the most since 2007 (5).

- Jake Bailey is first in the NFL with 46.1 net yards per punt. If that holds, Bailey would set a new Patriots single-season record. Zoltan Mesko currently holds the record after averaging 41.5 net yards per punt in 2011 (minimum 40 punts).
- Bailey's gross punting average is 48.8 yards per punt, fourth in the NFL in 2020. If it holds it would be the highest in team history. Zoltan Mesko set the team record by averaging 46.5 yards per punt in 2011.
- Bailey's punting in 2020 has allowed just 46 return yards so far in 2020 , the fewest yards allowed by any team. The Patriots record for fewest punt return yards allowed in a season is 75 in 2007.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Entering this week's game, Patriots K Nick Folk has successfully converted 21 consecutive field goal attempts, now the second-longest streak of his career, behind the 23 consecutive field goals made in 2013 when Folk played for the New York Jets. Overall, Folk now has seven streaks of 10 or more consecutive field goal conversions in his career. After missing his first two field goal attempts of the 2020 season, Folk has not missed since, successfully connecting on 21 straight attempts.
- Folk enters this week 21-of-23 on field goal attempts in 2020, good for a 91.3 percent conversion rate. Stephen Gostkowski holds the single season club record when he converted 35 -of-37 field goals in 2014, good for a 94.6 conversion rate.

Jackson has recorded seven interceptions and recovered two fumbles for nine takeaways in 2020, becoming the third Patriot with at least nine takeaways in a single season since 1990. CB Asante Samuel (10 interceptions) has the team mark for most takeaways in a single season under Bill Belichick as Patriots head coach.
- Jackson's seven interceptions rank second in the NFL this season behind the nine interceptions by Miami's Xavien Howard.

- Cam Newton has scored 11 rushing touchdowns in 2020, tied for third in the NFL overall. With one more rushing touchdown, he will tie former Patriots QB Steve Grogan for the Patriots team record for most rushing TDs in a season by a QB. He set the NFL record for rushing touchdowns by a QB in a single season with 14 in 2011.
- Newton is the only QB in NFL history with three double-digit rushing touchdown seasons.
- Newton has four multi-rush TD games so far this season, most by a QB in a single season in NFL history.
- Steve Grogan set a Patriots QB record in 1978 with 81 rushing attempts for 539 yards. Newton currently has 113 carries for 451 yards and is on pace for 139 rushing attempts for 555 yards.

## A RARE OCCURRENCE

The Patriots played against the L.A. Chargers on Sunday, Dec 6, at SoFi Stadium and played the Rams on Dec. 10 at SoFi Stadium on Thursday Night Football. The Patriots are the first team to play consecutive road games in the same stadium in the span of five days since the 1932 Portsmouth Spartans played the Staten Island Stapletons at Thompson Stadium on Oct 16 and Oct. 20. It is the first time that the Patriots played back-toback games in the same state since 2008 when the Patriots played at San Francisco followed by a game the following week at San Diego.

## FIRST-HALF SCORING STREAK IN TACT

The Patriots have now gone 83 straight games (regular season and postseason) without being shutout in the first half, the longest streak in NFL history. The second-longest streak also belongs to New England with an 82-game streak (Dec. 17, 2006 to Oct. 30, 2011).

## PICKING OFF THEIR OPPONENTS

The Patriots defense has recorded 15 interceptions in 2020, second in the NFL to the 16 by Pittsburgh. The 2019 Patriots defense led the NFL with 25 interceptions.

## BRYANT HAULS IN FIRST CAREER PICK

Undrafted rookie DB Myles Bryant registered his first NFL interception when he picked off Rams QB Jared Goff at the Los Angeles 32-yard line in the second quarter.

## FOLK EXTENDS STREAK

K Nick Folk extended his streak to 21 consecutive field goals made with his 29-yard field goal in the second quarter. Folk missed his first two kicks of the season but has been perfect since, turning in the second-longest streak of his career. He made 23 straight field goals in 2013 while with the New York Jets. Folk is now 21-of-23 on field goal attempts in 2020 for a 91.3 field goal percentage. Folk's best season was in 2008 with Dallas when he was 20-of-22 for a 90.9 field goal percentage.

## BAILEY GOES LONG

Jake Bailey had a career-long 71-yard punt in the fourth quarter. His previous best was 65 yards, which he accomplished three times, most recently at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. He also had a $65-y a r d$ punt vs. Dallas on Nov. 24, 2019 and at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019. Bailey's 71-yard punt is the first 70-yard punt for the Patriots since Chris Hanson had a 70-yard punt vs. Kansas City on Sept. 7, 2008. It is the longest punt for the Patriots since 2001, when Lee Johnson registered a 76-yard punt at Cincinnati on Sept. 9, 2001.

 SEASONTICKET HOLDER before buying the team in 1994Since purchasing the team in 1994, the Patriots, under Robert Krafts' leadership, have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins - 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09)

Mr. Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (330), division titles (19), winning percentage (.692), playoff wins (33), playoff seasons (21).


Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 26 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.), logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the
 franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 26 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. Kraft earned his 23 rd winning season in 26 years of owning the franchise in 2019.

## A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of Oakland/Los Angeles accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games ( 30 seasons).

## A WINNING TRADITION II

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.692) since taking over the team in 1994 is the highest among all owners/ownership groups with at least 200 wins (regular and postseason) with one team. He is one of just four owners with at least 200 wins and a winning percentage over . 600 .

## KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 330 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 330-147 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-$276-9$ in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

## CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 60-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns, including 17 in the last 19 seasons and 19 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

Since Kraft took ownership of the team in 1994, the Patriots have had just three head coaches - Bill Parcells (1994-96), Pete Carroll (1997-99) and current head coach Bill Belichick (2000-present). The only team with fewer head coaches since 1994 is the Pittsburgh Steelers, who have had two: Bill Cowher (1992-2006) and Mike Tomlin (2007-present).

## TEAM - PONNTS OF NTEREST

- The Patriots are tied with Pittsburgh for the most Super Bowl wins with six.
- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The Patriots qualified for the playoffs for 11 straight seasons (2009-19), the longest streak in NFL history. Dallas and Indianapolis are tied for second with nine consecutive seasons with a playoff berth.
- The Patriots won an NFL record 11 straight division titles (2009-19). The Los Angeles Rams are second with seven straight division titles (1973-79).
- The New England Patriots earned seven No. 1 seeds, behind Denver (8) and San Francisco (9) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since the current playoff format was instituted in 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (201018).
- The Patriots have played in 58 postseason games, tied with Green Bay for third all-time. They need to play in two more postseason games to become the third NFL team to play in 60 postseason games, joining Dallas (63) and Pittsburgh (61).


## TEAM - POINTS OF INTEREST (CONT)

- The Patriots have achieved 19 straight seasons (2001-19) with a record of .500 or better, second all-time behind the 21 seasons by Dallas (1965-85).
- The Patriots have posted a winning record for 19 straight seasons (2001-19), the most since the 1970 merger and the second-most alltime, behind Dallas with 20 straight winning seasons (1966-85).
- The Patriots won at least 10 regular season games an NFL-best 17 consecutive seasons (2003-19). San Francisco is second with 16 (1983-98) is second.
- The Patriots have 34 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind the 37 winning seasons by Pittsburgh.
- New England has 27 undefeated months since 2000 , the most in the NFL over that span. Indianapolis is second with 17 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots finished the 2019 season with 420 points and have now reached 400 or more points in 13 straight seasons (2007-19) to extend their NFL record. The San Diego Chargers previously held the record by scoring at least 400 points in eight straight seasons from 2004-11. The New Orleans Saints have the second-longest active streak, scoring 400 points for their ninth straight season in 2019.
- The Patriots have tallied seven safeties since 2015 , second to the eight by Indianapolis over the last six season. The Los Angeles Rams and Seattle Seahawks are third with six safeties since 2015.

## THE PATRIOTS OFFENSE HAS ECLIPSED 200 YARDS RUSHING IN A SINGLE GAME 16 TIMES UNDER BILL BELICHICK



- The Patriots rushed for 217 yards in Week 1 vs. Miami and for 250 yards in Week 3 vs. Las Vegas. The Patriots have also rushed for 200 yards twice in a single season under Belichick in 2004, '08, '10, '12, '14 and ' 18 but never three times in a single year.

Jakobi Meyers became the third wide receiver to throw a touchdown pass under head coach Bill Belichick in the regular season with a 24yard touchdown pass vs. Baltimore (11/15/20). David Patten threw a 60 -yard TD pass at Indianapolis (10/21/01) and Julian Edelman threw a 15-yard TD pass to WR Phillip Dorsett at Philadelphia (11/17/19).

## DEFENSE

- The Patriots defense has scored two touchdowns through 13 games in 2020. DB Devin McCourty returned an interception 43 yards for a score in Week 2 at Seattle and DL Deatrich Wise Jr. recovered a stripsack fumble in the end zone for his first career TD in the Week 3 win vs. Las Vegas.
- The Patriots have scored 11 non-offensive touchdowns since the start of the 2019 season, most in the NFL during that span. ## A SHUTDOWN SHUTOUT

The Patriots earned their 29th shutout in franchise history and 12th under Bill Belichick with the 45-0 victory over the L.A. Chargers on Dec.6, 2020. New England now has three 30-plus point road shutout wins over the last two seasons: a 43-0 win at Miami (9/15/19), a 33-0 win at N.Y. Jets (10/21/19) and the 45-0 victory over the Chargers in Week 13.

## A SPECIAL NIGHT FOR SCORING

The Patriots scored two touchdowns on special teams at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6. WR Gunner Olszewski scored on a 70-yard punt returned and DB Cody Davis blocked a field goal that was returned 44 yards for a touchdown by DB Devin McCourty. It marked the third game under Bill Belichick and fifth time since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger that the Patriots have scored twice on special teams. Both special teams scores occurred in the second quarter, the second time in team history that has occurred. New England also score multiple special teams touchdowns in a single quarter at Baltimore on Nov. 23, 1980.

On Oct. 4, 2010, at Miami, WR Brandon Tate returned a kickoff 103 yards for a score and CB Kyle Arrington returned a blocked field goal 35 yards for a touchdown.

## A RAR= OCCURRENCE

In the Week 13 win over the L.A. Chargers (12/6), the Patriots became the sixth team in NFL history with both a punt returned for a touchdown and a blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in the same game. It was the first such occasion since Baltimore in Week 12 of the 2015 season.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more regular season games (123) and more games overall (136) during a 10-year stretch (2002-11) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 46 consecutive years as an NFL coach are first in NFL history, passing the 45 by Dick LeBeau. The only other NFL coach with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons
 is Tom Moore with 41.

## 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In Week 1 vs. Miami, Edelman (620) joined Wes Welker (672) to become the second Patriot to reach 600 career receptions. Edelman now needs 53 more receptions to move past Welker.

Set a single-game career high with 179 yards receiving on eight receptions at Seattle Week 2. His previous career-high was 151 receiving yards on eight receptions at Miami (1/1//17).

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2020

- Edelman is in fourth place on the Patriots career receiving yards list with 6,822 receiving yards. He needs 638 yards to move past Wes Welker $(7,459$ ) into third place in team history, behind the 7,861 yards by Rob Gronkowski and 10,352 by Stanley Morgan.
- Edelman entered 2020 in ninth place on the Patriots all-time list with 36 receiving touchdowns and can move past Wes Welker (37), Irving Fryar (38), Jim Colclough (39).
- Edelman entered the 2020 season with 1,986 punt return yards in the regular season, third in team history to the 2,625 by Troy Brown and 2,055 by Irving Fryar. Edelman needs 14 punt return yards to become the third Patriots player with 2,000 punt return yards.
- Edelman sits second in NFL history with 118 postseason receptions, behind Jerry Rice's 151 catches in the playoffs.

Edelman had a 47-yard rush vs. Indianapolis (11/18/12). It is the longest run by a Patriots receiver, topping Troy Brown's 35-yard run vs. Tampa Bay (09/03/00) and Terry Glenn's 35-yarder vs. Kansas City (12/04/00).

## FROM STANDOUT OB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where, as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the team's leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's sin-gle-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.
"He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL - covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender - he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is," said Bill Belichick.

## FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it is athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the Boston Herald. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

Edelman ranks second all-time in NFL postseason history with 118 receptions. ## LOCAL LINEAGE

Nick Folk's mother is a direct descendant of William Bradford, a founder, settler and longtime governor of the Plymouth Colony settlement. Bradford was also a passenger on the Mayflower's original voyage to America.

## FOLK HERO

Folk kicked his second game-winning field goal as time expired, connecting on a 50-yard field goal against Arizona (11/29) to give the Patriots a 20-17 win. He had a 51-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at the New York Jets on Nov. 9 to give the Patriots a 30-27 victory. He is the first NFL kicker with two game-winning field goals as time expired in a single season. Overall, he has three-game-winning field goals as time expired. He also kicked a 53-yard field game-winning field goal as time expired at Buffalo on Oct. 8, 2007, when he was a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys.

## FOLK DIGS THE LONG BALL

Folk's 50-yard game-winning field goal vs. Arizona (11/29) was the second-longest game-winning field goal with no time left in Patriots history, behind the 51 -yarder he hit at N.Y. Jets (11/9). The previous long was 48 yards by Adam Vinatieri in Super Bowl XXXVI vs. the St. Louis Rams.

## BETTER THAN AVERAGE

Damien Harris is averaging 5.04-yards per carry (137 rushing attempts for 691 yards) in 2020. Four Patriots have finished with at least a 5.0-yard average (minimum 100 attempts) in a single season. ## POSITIONAL SWITCH AND A CHANCE MEETING

Jakobi Meyers and Cam Newton are teammates now, but the wide receiver and former quarterback looked up to Newton and had a chance meeting with him when he was in high school. "When I was younger in high school, I made [Newton's] 7-on-7 team - his all-star team - and we traveled to Florida to play in a league," Meyers said. "We ended up losing, but it was still a great experience. It was a good experience to meet Cam when I was very young. A lot of guys where I come from look up to him, so that was definitely a once-in-a lifetime opportunity for me."

## A SPECIAL BIRTHDAY PERFORMANCE

WR Jakobi Meyers set career highs on his 24th birthday (11/09/20) with 12 receptions for 169 yards in a win over the New York Jets. His previous career highs were six receptions in Week 8 at Buffalo and 74 yards receiving vs. Dallas on Nov. 24, 2019. The 12 receptions were the most by a Patriot since Julian Edelman caught 13 passes at Miami on Dec. 15, 2013.

## 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Became the 48th QB in NFL history to reach 30,000 career passing yards vs. San Francisco (10/25) and is the only player in NFL history with 30,000 passing yards and 5,000 career rushing yards.
- Joined Michael Vick as the second QB in NFL history to reach 5,000 career rushing yards vs. Denver (10/18).
- Newton has scored double-digit rushing touchdowns for the third time in his career, becoming the only NFL quarterback to accomplish the feat in three separate seasons. He had an NFL record of 14 in 2011, 10 in 2015 and now 11 in 2020.

WR Gunner Olszewski scored his first NFL touchdown on a 70-yard punt return at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. It was the first punt return for a touchdown for New England since WR Julian Edelman returned a punt 84 yards vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014. Olszewski's return came on the heels of an 82-yard punt return for a touchdown that was called back due to a penalty in the previous game.

He is the first player in Patriots history with two punt returns of at least 60 yards in a single game and the first NFL player to do so since Indianapolis RB Nyheim Hines had 84 and 71-yard punt return touchdowns vs. Carolina on Dec. 22, 2019. ## ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Slater was named to eight Pro Bowls (2011-17, '19) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 10th straight season in 2020

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."


## SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eightman rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-andshort, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

## SLATER SCORES FIRST CAREER TOUCHDOWN

During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.

## OL JOE THUNEY

## SUPER BOWL RECORD SETTER

Joe Thuney became the first player in NFL history to start in the Super Bowl in each of his first three seasons in the NFL.

## SNAPS FOR THUNEY

He was the projected starting center at North Carolina State as a sophomore, but started at right tackle and right guard to start the year before eventually settling in at left tackle for the rest of that season


Thuney has taken advantage of an NFLPA program that assists its players in earning college degrees. After earning his degree in accounting while also studying international studies at N.C.. State, Thuney recently earned his MBA through Indiana University's Kelley School of Business.

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.

Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 19992001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

## IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

## BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

## ALLTIME PLAYOFF RESULTS

The Patriots have compiled a 37-21 record in their 58 playoff games and their .638 playoff winning percentage is the best in NFL history among teams that have played at least 15 postseason games.

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 60-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns - 19 since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994 and 17 in the last 19 seasons.

## PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 27 times in the team's 60 -year history. The Patriots have earned 21 of those playoff berths in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has
 qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, '85, '94 and '98). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 19th straight year in 2019. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are also the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers ( 16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 23 of the 26 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014, turning a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. - Rob Gronkowski caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive
- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.


## COMABACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, $38-23$, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12)
