NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-2) VS. CAROLINA PANTHERS (1-2) Sunday, September 28, 2025 • Gillette Stadium (64,628) • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will play at home for the second straight week when they host the Carolina Panthers this week at Gillette Stadium. Both teams enter the contest with 1-2 records and a chance to get to the .500 mark. Since 2000, the Patriots have a winning record against every NFL team except Carolina at 3-3, Green Bay at 3-3, San Francisco 3-3, Kansas City 6-6 and Seattle at 2-4.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **FOX** and can be seen locally on **WFXT-TV** Channel 25. **Chris Myers** will handle play-by-play duties with **Mark Schlereth** as the color analyst. **Jennifer Hale** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Eric Mandia** and directed by **Scott Katz**.

LOCAL RADIO: **98.5 The Sports Hub** is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release on page 52. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

PATRIOTS CONVERT FOUR FIRST DOWNS

The Patriots were 4-of-5 on fourth downs vs. Pittsburgh. The only times in team history they converted more was when they went 5-of-6 on fourth down vs. San Francisco (12/16/12) and 5-of-6 on fourth down vs. Buffalo (12/26/21).

HOLDING UNDER 100

The Patriots have held their opponents under 100 yards rushing in each of the first three games of the season after holding Pittsburgh to 64 yards on the ground. The Patriots held Las Vegas to 60 yards and Miami to 61 yards. It is the first time holding the opponent under 100 yards rushing in the first three games since 2019 when the Patriots allowed 32 yards rushing vs Pittsburgh, 42 yards at Miami and 36 yards vs. the New York Jets in the first three games. If the Patriots hold Carolina under 100 yards rushing this week, it will be the second time in team history that they have held their opponent under 100 yards in the first four games of the season. The Patriots accomplished the feat in 1964. The Patriots join Cleveland, Green Bay and Tampa Bay as the only teams in 2025 to hold their first three opponents under 100 yards rushing.

SERIES HISTORY



The New England Patriots and the Carolina Panthers will meet for the ninth time overall and for the first time since the Patriots took a 24-6 victory at Carolina on Nov. 7, 2021. The Panthers will visit Gillette Stadium in the regular season for the first time since taking a 33-30 win on Oct. 1, 2017.

Carolina leads the all-time regular season record 4-3 and is 2-1 overall in games played in Foxboro, including 1-1 at Gillette Stadium

Since 2000, the Patriots have a winning record against every NFL team except Carolina at 3-3, Green Bay at 3-3, San Francisco 3-3, Kansas City 6-6 and Seattle at 2-4.

The Patriots and Panthers met in Super Bowl XXXVIII on Feb. 1, 2004. The Patriots-Panthers Super Bowl is widely believed to be among the most entertaining Super Bowls ever played, as the Panthers took a fourth-quarter lead only to see the Patriots come up with a game-winning field goal to clinch the see-saw battle in the final seconds.

The Patriots held Las Vegas to 60 yards and Miami to 61 yards. It is the first time holding the opponent under 65 yards rushing in the first three games since 2019 when the Patriots allowed 32 yards rushing vs Pittsburgh, 42 yards at Miami and 36 yards vs. the New York Jets in the first three games. If the Patriots hold Carolina under 100 yards rushing this week, it will be the second time in team history that they have held their opponent under 100 yards in the first four games of the season. The Patriots accomplished the feat in 1964. The Patriots join Cleveland, Green Bay and Tampa Bay as the only teams in 2025 to hold their first three opponents under 100 yards rushing.
- The Patriots held Pittsburgh to 64 yards rushing on 26 carries for a 2.5-yard average per carry. It marks the second time in 2025 that the Patriots held their opponent under 3 yards per carry. The Raiders were limited to 56 yards on 24 carries for a 2.3-yard average per carry in the season-opener. If the Patriots hold Carolina under a 3-yard average this week, it will mark the first time holding a team under a 3-yard average in back-to-back games since the 2023 season when they did so in three-straight games, holding the L.A. Chargers to a 1.2-yard average (12/3), the Steelers to a 2.9-yard average (12/7) and Kansas City to 2.2-yard average (12/17).
- A Patriots linebacker has registered an interception in back-to-back weeks with LB Marte Mapu recording an interception at Miami (9/14) and LB Robert Spillane recording an interception last week against Pittsburgh. If a Patriots linebacker registers a pick this week against Carolina, it will be the second time in team history that the Patriots have had a linebacker with an interception in three straight weeks. The Patriots had a linebacker intercept a pass in three straight games in 1980 – Nov. 10 at Houston – LB Mike Hawkins, Nov. 16 vs. the L.A. Rams – LB Steve Nelson and Nov. 23 vs. Baltimore – LB Steve Nelson. The most interceptions by linebackers in a season for the Patriots is 9 in 1980 and in 1968.
- Since 2000, the Patriots have a winning record against every NFL team except Carolina at 3-3, Green Bay at 3-3, San Francisco 3-3, Kansas City 6-6 and Seattle at 2-4. The Patriots can reduce that list from five teams to four teams with a victory this week against the Panthers.

Henry scored on a 5-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter and a 16-yard reception in the fourth quarter for his fifth career 2-TD game. Four of those games were while he was with the Patriots.

Henry finished with 90 receiving yards, the sixth time in his career he has reached at least 90 receiving yards. His career high is 109 yards vs. Seattle (9/15/24).

ROBERT SPILLANE HAS FIRST PICK AS A PATRIOT

LB Robert Spillane picked off a QB Aaron Rodgers pass in the third quarter and returned it 37 yards to the Pittsburgh 11-yard line. It is the longest interception return of his career. His previous long was a 33-yard interception returned for a touchdown at Baltimore (1/1/21) when he played for Pittsburgh. It is the second week in a row the Patriots have had a linebacker intercept a ball as LB Marte Mapu registered an interception at Miami (9/14). It is the seventh interception of Spillane's career.

SPILLANE REGISTERS 15 TOTAL TACKLES

Robert Spillane had his 19th career 10-tackle game after finishing with 15 total tackles. His 15 total tackles are the second-most of his career. He had a career-high 16 total tackles in the last game of the 2024 season vs. the L.A. Chargers (1/5/25) when he played for Las Vegas.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (358), division titles (19), winning percentage (.649), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 31 seasons of ownership, he is credited with transforming one of the league's least successful clubs into one of the most valuable. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. **Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls.** In Kraft's 31 seasons, the Patriots qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the mark. The Patriots have 358 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 358-194 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 65-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 29 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. On the women's side, the Toronto Six (29-5-3) and the Boston Pride (90-29-10) of the PHF hold the two highest winning percentages of all women's professional sports teams.

- The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in NFL history with six.
- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver, Pittsburgh and San Francisco have played in eight.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, tied with Green Bay for the second-most in NFL history to the 38 postseason wins by San Francisco.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, behind San Francisco (19) and Pittsburgh (16).
- The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds, trailing only San Francisco (10) and Denver (8) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. San Francisco is second with 10 byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine-straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 59 postseason games, the fifth-most in NFL history, behind Dallas (67), Pittsburgh (65), Green Bay (64) and San Francisco (62).
- The Patriots are third with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 16 and Dallas' 15 seasons with 12 victories.
- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco (11) and has more 13-win seasons.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970, third all-time, behind Pittsburgh's 41 and Dallas' 36.

- The Patriots have 583 total victories, the fourth-most wins since their inception in 1960, behind the 608 by Pittsburgh, the 606 by Dallas and the 598 by Green Bay.
- New England (1,062) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021, and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- The Patriots ended a 10-year streak of finishing in the top 10 for fewest points allowed (2012-2021) after finishing 11th in 2022 with 20.4 points allowed. The Patriots and Tampa Bay (1996-2005) are the last two teams to reach 10-straight seasons in the top 10 for fewest points allowed.
- The Patriots finished with a positive turnover ratio for 17-straight seasons (2006-22), the longest streak since the 1970 merger before the streak ended in 2023. Seattle is second with 13-straight seasons with a positive turnover ratio.
- The Patriots finished seventh in total defense in 2023. The Patriots have finished in the top 10 in defense 11 times since 2000.
- The Patriots played in their fifth international game when they faced Jacksonville in London on Oct. 20, 2024. It was their second-straight year with an international game after playing in Frankfurt, Germany in 2023. The Patriots played in London in 2009 and 2012 and in Mexico City in 2017. The five international games are tied for fourth all-time with Las Vegas, behind the 13 by Jacksonville, eight by Buffalo and seven by Miami.
- The Patriots went 19-straight seasons (2001-19) without being swept in a series by a division opponent, the longest such streak since the 1970 NFL merger.
- The Patriots are 110-7 all-time at Gillette Stadium in the regular season when leading at halftime.

Henry is a captain for the third time as a member of the Patriots (2023-25) and for the fourth time overall (2020 when he was with the L.A. Chargers). Spillane is a captain for the third straight season overall after serving as captain with the Raiders in 2023 and 2024. Maye, Jones, Landry III and Schooler are serving as captains for the first time in their careers.

KICKOFF RETURN TD

RB Antonio Gibson returned a fourth quarter kick 90 yards for a touchdown at Miami (9/14), the Patriots first kickoff return for a touchdown since WR Jalen Reagor returned the opening kick 98 yards for a touchdown on Dec. 31, 2023 at Buffalo. It is the 29th kickoff return for a touchdown in team history.

UP TO 30

The Patriots scored over 30 points for the first time since a 38-15 win at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022 with the 33-27 win at Miami (9/14).

GETTING TO THE QUARTERBACK

The Patriots had 4 sacks in the 2025 season-opener vs. Las Vegas (9/7) and followed that performance with 5 sacks against the Dolphins (9/14). The last time the Patriots had at least four sacks in back-to-back games was in 2022 with 9 sacks vs. Indianapolis (11/6) followed by 4 sacks vs. the N.Y. Jets (11/20).

BACK TO BACK RETURNS

In the fourth quarter at Miami (9/14), Dolphins WR Malik Washington returned a punt 74 yards for a touchdown. And during the ensuing kick, RB Antonio Gibson had a 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. It marks the second time in NFL history there was a punt return touchdown immediately followed by a kick return for a touchdown: Sept. 13, 1992 – Atlanta at Washington.

TWO ROOKIES ON THE LEFT

2025 first-round draft pick Will Campbell starts at left tackle and 2025 third-round draft pick Jared Wilson starts at left guard. The last team to open the season with rookies at left tackle and left guard was the 2016 Baltimore Ravens with T Ronnie Stanley (first-round) at left tackle and G Alex Lewis (fourth-round) at left guard.

HEAD COACHING EXPERIENCE

Five of the Patriots 22 assistant coaches have a combined 20 years of head coaching experience at every level.

- **Offensive line coach Doug Marrone** was the head coach for Syracuse University (2009-12). In addition, Marrone was the head coach for the Buffalo Bills for two seasons (2013-14) and spent four total seasons as the head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars (2017-2020).
- **Offensive coordinator Josh McDaniels** first became a head coach for the Denver Broncos (2009-10.) Later in his career, McDaniels coached the Las Vegas Raiders (2022-23).
- **Passing Game Coordinator and Tight Ends Coach Thomas Brown** spent time as the interim head coach of the Chicago Bears last season.
- **Assistant Offensive Line Coach Jason Houghtaling** was the head coach for Wagner (2015-19). Before making the jump to college, Houghtaling served as the head coach at Troy High School in Troy, N.Y. (2010).
- On the defensive side of the ball, **Senior Defensive Assistant Ben McAdoo** served as the head coach of the New York Giants (2016-17).

27 NEW PLAYERS IN 2025

Of the 52 players on the roster, 27 players were not on the 53-man roster for one Patriots game last season, the second-most in the league behind Tennessee (28) and Miami (28).

They join Chicago, Jim Dolley and Abe Gibron; Philadelphia, Jerry Williams and Ed Khayat; and Green Bay, Bart Starr and Forrest Gregg.

The Patriots have two sets of twins on the team with **Kyle Dugger** (Kaelyn) and **Milton Williams** (Mia).

NFL BLOOD

Drake Maye - Mark Maye (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 1988)

Drake Maye's father, Mark Maye, was also a North Carolina quarterback, starting for the Tar Heels in 1986 and 1987. Undrafted in 1988, Maye signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, spending the season as a backup to Vinny Testaverde and Joe Ferguson.

The Patriots finished in the top 10 in fewest points allowed for 10 seasons from 2012 to 2021. The last team to do it in 10-consecutive seasons was Tampa Bay (10 straight from 1996 to 2005).

GETTING DEFENSIVE

Since 2001, the Patriots have recorded 14 seasons of 20.0 points allowed or fewer, tied with Pittsburgh for second to the 16 seasons by Baltimore. The 2023 Patriots finished 15th, allowing 21.5 points per game.

CEREBRAL AND VERSATILE

Vrabel exemplified positional versatility during his Patriots career by starting at both inside and outside linebacker, regularly lining up on offense in short-yardage and goal-line situations and continually making valuable contributions on various special teams units. As a Patriot, he caught eight regular season passes and two more in the playoffs. All 10 of his receptions were for touchdowns, including receptions in back-to-back Super Bowl wins over the Carolina Panthers in Super Bowl XXXVIII and Philadelphia Eagles in Super Bowl XXXIX.

A PROVEN LEADER AND CHAMPION

AS A PLAYER: Vrabel's accomplishments as a player included three Super Bowl wins (2001, 2003 and 2004), one Pro Bowl selection (2007) and an All-Pro honor (2007). Originally drafted in the third round (91st overall) of the 1997 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, he spent the early years of his career mostly playing on special teams and as a reserve linebacker. He signed with the Patriots as an unheralded free agent in 2001 and went on to become one of the key pieces of the dynasty that captured three Super Bowl titles in four years. Vrabel ended his playing career with the Kansas City Chiefs after being a part of a trade that included QB Matt Cassel. He appeared in 206 NFL games and totaled 57 sacks, 722 tackles, 11 interceptions (one returned for a touchdown), 20 forced fumbles and 9 fumble recoveries. A cerebral and versatile athlete, he also saw action as a tight end and totaled 10 touchdown receptions. Additionally, his teams advanced to the playoffs eight times (20 postseason games), with Vrabel recording 8 postseason sacks and two additional postseason touchdown receptions.

AS A COACH: Vrabel has 14 years of coaching experience, including 11 years in the NFL and three seasons at Ohio State. The Tennessee Titans hired him as their head coach in 2018 and he led the Titans to two division titles and three playoff appearances during his six seasons at the helm. In 2019, the Titans upset the Patriots in Foxborough in the Wild Card round, then defeated the No. 1 seed Ravens in Baltimore the following week to advance to the AFC Championship Game, where they lost to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs. In 2021, the Titans claimed the top seed in the AFC with a 12-5 record, earning Vrabel NFL Coach of the Year honors.

SUPER BOWL DNA

Mike Vrabel is one of seven head coaches that won a Super Bowl for a team and then became the head coach of that team. The others are Jerod Mayo (Patriots), Forrest Gregg (Green Bay), Bart Starr (Green Bay), Art Shell (Oakland), Jeff Saturday (Indianapolis) and Jason Garrett (Dallas). Vrabel is the only one with three Super Bowl wins.

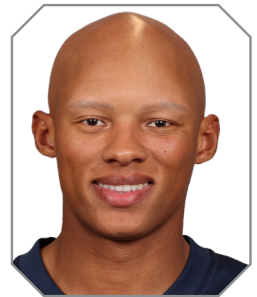

- WR Efton Chism III is developing a work ethic by following his veteran wide receivers. Wide receivers coach Todd Downing recently addressed his thoughts on Chism's work ethic: "It starts well before he ever hits the field," Downing said. "This guy's one of the first guys in. A lot of times he'll pop into my office super early in the morning, as I'm just getting going, and he wants to sit there and just watch me build the PowerPoint for the meeting that day or something. Just to kind of get an extra time or an extra rep, the mental processing for the system. He stays late with Mack (Hollins) and goes through things with Mack, and those two have developed a cool relationship, so that piece of it's cool, and then what he does on the field is he translates that into playing fast and confident. He knows exactly what to do, so then he can go out and execute it."

THE PASSTRONAUT

- QB Joshua Dobbs graduated with a degree in aerospace engineering from Tennessee and has since combined his love for football and space, coining the nickname, "The Passtronaut." Through the NFLPA's virtual externship program, Dobbs spent two years (2020-21) with the NASA Kennedy Space Flight Center. In 2022, Dobbs established The ASTROrdinary Dobbs Foundation, which is dedicated to supporting, encouraging and inspiring all members of the community, particularly the youth, through educational, economical, professional and recreational empowerment.
- "We're promoting my background growing up, which was in STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics), aerospace and aviation," Dobbs said. "So, we love giving back to the community itself, who supported me throughout my career, but also just promoting STEM engagement, giving back to those less fortunate and just being involved. It's very important to me to support those communities and to be able to represent my own foundation. It's really cool. As I said, just having the platform, being able to give back."



THE MEANING BEHIND THE NICKNAME

- DeMario Douglas is more commonly referred to by his nickname, "Pop". Although the nickname is fitting for his quickness on the field, the name actually comes from family ties. Douglas' granddad passed away on his first birthday. The wide receiver was commonly referred to as 'Poppa' from his granddad – a nickname that was quickly shortened to just 'Pop'.

NUMBER CHANGE

- Pop Douglas changed his jersey number from No. 81 to No. 3 in 2024. He wore No. 3 in college at Liberty, as well as in Little League, middle school and high school. He explained its meaning to him: "It's big because I was raised by three strong ladies -- my mom, grandma and great-grandma," he said.

ROOKIE RECEIVING RECORDS

- Douglas finished the 2023 season with 49 receptions for a team-leading 561 yards. He has the most receptions and receiving yards by a Patriots rookie wide receiver since 2000.

- Douglas scored his first-career touchdown on a 35-yard touchdown pass from QB Drake Maye in the fourth quarter vs. Houston (10/13/24).

It was the Patriots' 13th kick return of at least 90 yards and 12th 90-yard kick returned for a touchdown. Gibson had a 41-yard return in the season-opener vs. Las Vegas (9/7). GIBSON HAS CAREER-HIGH 45-YARD RUSH

- RB Antonio Gibson broke free for a career-long 45-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. Seattle on Sept. 15, 2024. His previous best was a 40-yard run vs. Dallas on Oct. 25, 2020, when he played for Washington. In 2023, the Patriots had just one 40-yard run, a 64-yard touchdown run by RB Rhamondre Stevenson vs. Washington on Nov. 5.

GIBSON HAD AN 8.7-YARD AVERAGE

- Gibson finished the game vs. Seattle (9/15/24) with 96 yards rushing on just 11 carries for an 8.7-yard average. It was the highest average of his career in games where he had at least 10 carries. His previous high was a 7.0-yard average when he had 21 carries for 146 yards at the New York Giants on Jan. 9, 2022. It is the highest average for a Patriots player since RB Rhamondre Stevenson had a 9.1-yard average with 19 carries for 172 yards rushing at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2025

- TE Hunter Henry (212) became the fifth Patriots tight end to reach 200 career receptions in the 2025 season-opener vs. Las Vegas and now ranks third in team history. He is fifth in receiving yards with 2,370 and fifth with 19 touchdown receptions. He needs 630 receiving yards to join Rob Gronkowski (7,861), Ben Coates (5,471) and Russ Francis (3,157) as the fourth Patriots tight end to reach 3,000 receiving yards. He had 2 touchdowns vs. Pittsburgh (9/21/25) and is one of five Patriots tight ends with at least 20 touchdowns.
- Henry led the Patriots with 66 receptions in 2024. If he leads the team in receptions in 2025, he will become the second New England tight end to lead the team in receptions in consecutive seasons, joining Ben Coates (1993-95, 1997-98).

NOTES OF INTEREST

- Henry has logged 40-plus receptions in all four seasons with the Patriots, the second-longest streak by a Patriots tight end all-time (Ben Coates, six).
- Henry set career-highs in 2024 with 66 receptions and 674 yards. His previous bests were 60 receptions in 2020 and 652 yards in 2019.

HENRY BECOMES FIFTH TO REACH 200

- Henry caught a 27-yard pass from QB Drake Maye in the first quarter vs. Las Vegas (9/7) for his 200th reception as a member of the Patriots, becoming the fifth New England tight end to reach 200 receptions. He finished the game with 4 receptions for 66 yards.

HENRY SCORES TWO LONGEST TD PASSES OF HIS CAREER

- Henry scored on a 31-yard touchdown pass from QB Bailey Zappe in the third quarter at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022, and had a 37-yard touchdown from Mac Jones at Minnesota in the third quarter on Nov. 24, 2022, the longest touchdown receptions of his career. His previous best was a 30-yard touchdown pass at Jacksonville on Dec. 8, 2019, when he played for the Chargers.

AMONG THE LEADERS

- Since entering the league in 2016, Henry is fifth in receiving touchdowns among all tight ends in the NFL with 42. He also ranks sixth in career receiving yards with 4,692 and seventh in receptions with 408. He joins teammate Austin Hooper on those lists, as Hooper ranks sixth in receptions (415), seventh in receiving yards (4,254) and tied for 11th with 28 touchdowns.

HUNTER HENRY TIED CAREER HIGH

- Henry finished the game with 8 receptions for 90 yards vs. Pittsburgh (9/21/25). The 8 receptions tied his career-high, a mark he has reached three other times in his career – 8 receptions at Jacksonville (10/20/24), vs. Seattle (9/15/24) and vs. Pittsburgh (10/13/19).

HENRY ACCOUNTED FOR SEVEN FIRST DOWNS

- Henry recorded a career-high 7 receptions for a first down against Seattle (9/15/24). His previous career-high was 6 receptions for a first down, which he accomplished three times, the last being at Indianapolis on Dec. 18, 2021.

BAREFOOT DREAMING

- Unless it's gametime, WR Mack Hollins is walking around barefoot. In his early playing years with the Philadelphia Eagles, Hollins met some trainers from Melbourne Muscular Therapy from Australia, whose philosophy is to be barefoot and get back to your original ways of movement. Hollins flew them out, and although he was hesitant at first, they convinced him that doing all of his training barefoot can help with durability. In the last few years, Hollins has completely abandoned shoes and now walks barefoot all the time, unless it is under 35 degrees.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2025

- T Vederian Lowe scored his first career touchdown on a 4-yard reception from QB Drake Maye vs. the Los Angeles Rams on Nov. 17, 2024. If he has a touchdown reception in 2025, he will be the first Patriots offensive lineman with more than one reception and touchdown reception in his career.

LOWE SCORES ON A 4-YARD TOUCHDOWN PASS

- Lowe reported as an eligible receiver and caught a 4-yard touchdown pass from QB Drake Maye in the fourth quarter vs. the L.A. Rams on Nov. 17, 2024. Lowe is the fourth Patriots offensive lineman to catch a touchdown pass and first since T Nate Solder caught a 16-yard touchdown pass from QB Tom Brady in the third quarter of the 2014 AFC Championship game vs. Indianapolis on Jan. 18, 2015. T Tom Ashworth caught a 1-yard touchdown pass from QB Tom Brady in the first quarter on Dec. 17, 2005, vs. Tampa Bay. C Pete Brock caught a 6-yard touchdown pass from QB Steve Grogan in the fourth quarter at the New York Jets on Nov. 21, 1976. It was the 10th time that a Patriots offensive lineman caught a pass in a game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2025

- QB Drake Maye is in 12th place in team history with 3,061 passing yards and needs 860 passing yards to move into the team's Top 10.
- Maye has team-best 68.0 career completion percentage.
- As a rookie in 2024, Maye finished with 54 rushing attempts for 421 yards and a 7.80-yard average, the sixth-highest in NFL history for a quarterback with at least 50 rushing attempts. Maye will look to add to his rushing average in his second NFL season. Former Philadelphia QB Randall Cunningham set the NFL record for a quarterback with a 7.84-yard rushing average in his first two NFL seasons (1985-86 – 95 rushing attempts for 745 yards).

MAYE HAS LONGEST PASS OF HIS CAREER

- Maye completed a 55-yard pass to RB Rhamondre Stevenson in the third quarter at Miami (9/14), the longest pass completion of his career. His previous long was a 40-yard touchdown pass to WR Kayshon Boutte vs. Houston on Oct. 13, 2024.

THIRD GAME WITH 80% COMPLETION PERCENTAGE

- Maye had his third NFL game with an 80% completion percentage after completing 19-of-23 pass attempts for an 82.6 pass completion percentage at Miami (9/14). He was 19-of-23 for 202 yards for an 82.6% completion percentage at Arizona on Dec. 15, 2024, and was 80 percent vs. Indianapolis on Dec. 1, 2024, when he finished 24-of-30 for 238 yards.

TOP OF THE ORDER

- The Patriots used the third pick in the 2024 draft for the first time in team history and used the pick to select **QB Drake Maye** from North Carolina. It marked the fifth time since 1970 that the team drafted a quarterback in the first round - **Jim Plunkett** from Stanford (1st overall in 1971), **Tony Eason** from Illinois (15th overall in 1983), **Drew Bledsoe** from Washington State (1st overall in 1993), **Mac Jones** from Alabama (15th overall in 2021) and **Drake Maye** from North Carolina (3rd overall). Maye was the first Patriot drafted in the top 10 since 2008 when the team selected former head coach and former LB Jerod Mayo with the 10th pick overall out of Tennessee.

PRO BOWL

- Maye was added to the Pro Bowl roster to cap his rookie season. Maye is the sixth Patriots player to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie, joining Mike Haynes (1976), John Stephens (1988), Curtis Martin (1995), Devin McCourty (2010) and Mac Jones (2021).

THE MAYE WAY

- Maye, the youngest of four boys, hails from a family of athletes. His father, Mark, also played quarterback at the University of North Carolina from 1983-1988. His brother, Luke, played basketball at North Carolina (2015-19), winning a national title in 2017 with the Tar Heels. Luke now plays overseas in Japan. His brother, Cole, won a baseball national championship in 2017 with the University of Florida as a pitcher. His brother, Beau, also played basketball at the University of North Carolina. Despite the rich tradition of family athleticism, Drake Maye, measuring at 6'4, is the shortest of the four brothers (Luke at 6'8; Cole at 6'7; Beau at 6'8).

THIRD-LONGEST FIRST TD PASS BY A ROOKIE

- Maye's 40-yard touchdown pass to WR Kayshon Boutte on his first-career touchdown pass vs. Houston (10/13/24) is the third-longest for a rookie Patriots quarterback on his first-career touchdown pass. Fellow rookie QB Joe Milton had a 48-yard touchdown pass to Boutte vs. Buffalo on Jan. 5, the longest since QB Drew Bledsoe's first-career touchdown pass resulted in a 54-yard touchdown to TE Ben Coates on Sept. 5, 1993, vs. Buffalo.

FOURTH PATRIOTS ROOKIE QB TO THROW 3 TDS IN A GAME

- Maye became the fourth Patriots rookie quarterback to throw at least 3 touchdown passes in a single game vs. Houston (10/13/24), joining Drew Bledsoe, Jim Plunkett and Mac Jones.

14TH ROOKIE TO THROW FOR AT LEAST 3 TDS IN 1ST START

- Maye became the 14th rookie quarterback in NFL history to throw for at least 3 touchdowns in his first-career start vs. Houston (10/13/24), joining M.C. Reynolds (3), Jacky Lee (3), Dan Marino (3), Kevin Sweeney (3), Ed Rubbert (3), Todd Marinovich (3), Tony Banks (3), John Stofa (4), Josh Freeman (3), Matt McGloin (3), Marcus Mariota (4), Trevor Lawrence (3) and Will Levis (4) as the only rookie quarterbacks to accomplish the feat in their first-career start.

FIRST TO THROW AT LEAST 3 TDS AND LEAD HIS TEAM IN RUSHING IN FIRST START SINCE AT LEAST 1950

- Maye threw 3 touchdowns and led his team in rushing with 38 yards vs. Houston (10/13/24). He is the first quarterback to lead his team in rushing and throw for at least 3 touchdown passes in his first career start since at least 1950.

MAYE FINISHED WITH 95 YARDS RUSHING

- Maye finished the game at Tennessee (11/3/24) with 95 yards rushing. It is the fourth time in team history a New England quarterback reached at least 90 yards rushing in a game and the first time since Steve Grogan had 103 yards rushing vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 18, 1976. Maye's 95 yards are the third-most in team history. Maye had 8 rushing attempts for 95 yards for a 11.9-yard average.

BEST TWO-GAME RUSHING TOTAL BY A PAT QB

- Maye followed a 46-yard rushing performance vs. the New York Jets (10/27) with a 95-yard rushing performance at Tennessee (11/3) for 141 total yards. It is the best two-game rushing total by a Patriots quarterback, besting the 132 rushing yards by QB Steve Grogan in 1976 with 103 rushing yards vs. the New York Jets (10/18) followed by 29 yards rushing at Buffalo (10/24).

MAYE RUNS LONG

- Maye had a 41-yard run in the first quarter vs. Indianapolis on Dec. 1. The run is tied for the third-longest run by a Patriots quarterback and it is the fifth time a Patriots quarterback had a 40-yard run in a game. It is the longest run by a Patriots quarterback since QB Cam Newton had a 49-yard run vs. the New York Jets on Jan. 3, 2021.

MAYE-KING HISTORY

- Since 1950, Drake Maye and Dan Marino are the only quarterbacks with at least 500 passing yards and at least 5 touchdown passes in their first two starts. Maye threw for 243 yards and 3 touchdowns in his first career start vs. Houston (10/13) and 276 yards and 2 touchdowns last week at Jacksonville (10/20).

- Maye had his second-straight game completing 80% of his passes after finishing 19-of-23 for 202 yards for an 82.6% completion percentage at Arizona (12/15/24). In Week 13 vs. Indianapolis (12/1/24), he finished 24-of-30 for 238 yards for an 80% completion percentage. The only other Patriots quarterback to ever have back-to-back games with an 80 percent completion percentage was QB Mac Jones in 2021 (11/14) at Cleveland with an 82.6 completion percentage and at Atlanta (11/18) with an 84.6 completion percentage.

MAYE RUSHES FOR SIXTH-HIGHEST MARK

- Maye finished the season with 54 rushing attempts for 421 yards for a 7.8-yard average, the sixth-highest in a season by a quarterback with at least 50 rushing attempts.

MAYE TWO 20-YARD RUNS IN ONE GAME

- Maye had two 20-yard runs at Tennessee on Nov. 34, 2024 with a 27-yard run in the third quarter and a 21-yard run in the first quarter. That is the only game in this century in which a New England quarterback had multiple 20-yard runs in one game.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2025

- RB Rhamondre Stevenson recorded his first 1,000-yard rushing season with a career-high 1,040 rushing yards in 2022. He can become the third New England player to reach at least two 1,000-yard rushing seasons, joining Curtis Martin (3) and Jim Nance (2).
- Stevenson led the team in receptions in 2022 with 69 receptions. He can join Tony Collins (1985 and 1987) as the only New England running backs to lead the team in receptions in two seasons.
- Stevenson is in ninth place in team history with 3,153 rushing yards and needs 455 yards to move past Kevin Faulk (3,607) into fifth place on the New England all-time rushing yards list.

NOTES OF INTEREST

- Stevenson (3,153) is in 9th place in team history and needs 28 yards to move past Corey Dillon (3,180) into eighth place.
- Stevenson is the first player in franchise history with 700-plus scrimmage yards in each of his first four seasons: 729 in 2021, 1,461 in 2022 and 857 in 2023 and 969 (801 rush, 168 rec.) in 2024. Curtis Martin, John Stephens and Tony Collins are the Patriots that had 700+ scrimmage yards in each of their first three NFL seasons.

CAREER-LONG RECEPTION

- Stevenson caught a 55-yard reception from QB Drake Maye in the third quarter at Miami (9/14/25), the longest reception of his career. His previous best was a 41-yard reception from QB Mac Jones on Nov. 7, 2021 at Carolina. It is the longest reception by a Patriots running back since RB James White had a 59-yard reception vs. Cleveland on Nov. 27, 2019.

CAREER-HIGH IN RECEIVING YARDS

- Stevenson set a career-high in receiving yards with 88 yards at Miami (9/14/25). His previous high was 76 yards receiving at Minnesota on Nov. 24, 2022.

STEVENSON REACHES 1,000 YARDS RUSHING

- Stevenson finished the 2022 season with 1,040 rushing yards, his first career 1,000-yard season and the 17th 1,000-yard season in New England history.

PATRIOTS OFFENSIVE NOTES

DEDICATION TO HIS GOALS

- While in high school, Stevenson started gaining attention for the impressive stats he posted as a junior. Unfortunately, due to his grades, Stevenson was academically ineligible to receive a football scholarship despite being recruited. Following his senior year of high school, Stevenson took a year off from football and worked part-time jobs at Walmart and Jimmy John's. But after a year away, he decided to follow a group of his friends and enroll in Cerritos Community College. During his time at Cerritos, he shared a two-bedroom apartment with up to six other guys at times and rode his bicycle 20 minutes to and from practice every day. After putting up monster stats in his second season at Cerritos, he committed to Oklahoma. Oklahoma led him to the 2021 NFL Draft where in the fourth round on the third day the Patriots selected Stevenson. In addition, he worked on his academics and made the Dean's List while at Oklahoma.

STEVENSON HAD CAREER LONG RUN

- Stevenson had a career-long 64-yard touchdown run in the second quarter vs. Washington on Nov. 5, 2023. His previous long was a 49-yard run vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022, and his previous longest touchdown run was a 34-yard touchdown run at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022. It is the longest touchdown run for a Patriots player since RB Damien Harris had a 64-yard touchdown run at Buffalo on Dec. 6, 2022. It is tied with Harris for the longest touchdown run by a Patriot player in the regular seasons since a 70-yard run by Curtis Martin on Sept. 21, 1997 vs. Chicago.

STEVENSON HAS FIFTH CAREER 100-YARD GAME

- Stevenson had his fifth 100-yard game in the 2024 season-opener with 120 yards in the win vs. Cincinnati on Sept. 8. He had a career-high 172 yards rushing at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022. It was his second 100-yard game of the year and fourth overall. He has two 100-yard games of 160 or more yards. In addition to the 172, he had 161 yards rushing vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022. He has two of the teams 14 games with at least 160 yards rushing. Only Curtis Martin and Jim Nance with three have more.

STEVENSON HAS THIRD GAME WITH 9.0 AVERAGE

- Stevenson finished with nine carries for 87 yards for a 9.7-yard average vs. Washington on Nov. 5, 2023, the highest average of his career and the third time he had at least a 9.0-yard average. He had a 9.1-yard average at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022 and a 9.0-yard average at Buffalo on Jan. 8, 2023.



CITY OF ANGELS TO TITLE TOWN

- As part of the Patriots' rookie development program, Head Coach Mike Vrabel brought the 2025 rookie class to a Red Sox game and to the Celtics' practice facility. WR Kyle Williams, a Los Angeles native, quickly recognized the passion for sports in his new city of Boston and uses it as motivation: "It's huge," Williams said. "You see Patriots everywhere. You see Celtics everywhere. Just seeing the love this town has for sports, it makes you want to give back and compete harder."





JOURNEY TO THE NFL

- As a high school sophomore, football wasn't on Christian Barmore's radar. Barmore played basketball in high school until his junior year, when the football coach at Delaware Valley Charter High School convinced him to give football a chance. Moving to Neumann Goretti High School as a senior after his previous high school closed, Barmore became a highly-recruited prospect in just his second season of organized football, committing to the University of Alabama. Additionally, Barmore has faced plenty of adversity in his life, including the process of overcoming blood clots to return to the field in 2024. PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAMER RICHARD SEYMOUR SEES GREATNESS AHEAD FOR CHRISTIAN BARMORE

- For a defensive lineman, if Patriots and Pro Football Hall of Famer Richard Seymour is in your corner, there are few better compliments or endorsements.
- "I think he has a ton of ability, natural ability, and he plays hard," Seymour told the Boston Herald. "I think he's going to be a problem for (opposing teams) for a long time to come. Hopefully he stays healthy and continues on the path he's on. I think he has a really bright future."

SECOND-MOST QUARTERBACK PRESSURES

- Barmore posted the second-most quarterback pressures for a first-year defensive tackle since 2006, according to Pro Football Focus. His 48 pressures in 2021 were two more than Aaron Donald had during his rookie season.

FIRST CAREER 3-SACK GAME

- Barmore finished with his first career 3-sack game, all in the third quarter, at Denver on Dec. 24, 2023. He had two 8-yard sacks and one 9-yard sack of Denver QB Russell Wilson. He increased his 2023 total to 8½ sacks. He is the first Patriots player with a 3-sack game since LB Joshua Uche had a 3-sack game at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. The last defensive lineman with a 3-sack game for New England was Deatrich Wise Jr. on Sept. 25, 2022 vs. Baltimore.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2025

- S Kyle Dugger scored 3 touchdowns in 2022 with 2 interceptions returned for touchdowns and a fumble returned for a touchdown. He needs one more defensive touchdown to tie Willie McGinest and Tedy Bruschi for the second-most defensive touchdowns in team history with 4, behind the 6 by Ty Law.

DUGGER PLAYS ROLE IN FOUR OF THE 7 DEFENSIVE TDS

- Dugger played a major role in four of the NFL-best 7 defensive touchdowns in 2022. In addition to his pick-6 against Miami, he returned an interception 16 yards for a touchdown at Las Vegas, returned a fumble 59 yards for a touchdown vs. Detroit and forced a fumble that LB Raekwon McMillan returned 23 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter at Arizona (12/12).

DUGGER EARNS HIS DEGREE

- Dugger helped put Lenoir-Rhyne University on the map, becoming the highest-drafted athlete in the Division II football program's history.
- Three years after being selected in the second round of the 2020 NFL Draft, a diligent Dugger worked hard to finish his degree, earning a Bachelor's degree in psychology in 2023.

DUGGER SCORES ON A 59-YARD FUMBLE RETURN

- Dugger recovered a fumble vs. Detroit (10/9/22) that was forced on a 13-yard sack by LB Matthew Judon, and returned the ball 59 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. It is the fifth-longest fumble return in team history. It was Dugger's first career touchdown.

LOVE BEYOND BLOOD

- LB Christian Elliss has six adopted siblings. For the NFL's My Cause My Cleats initiative, Elliss represented "An Act of Love," the agency that his siblings were adopted through. Elliss has two kids of his own with one on the way, and he and his wife look forward to adopting a child one day as well.

RUNS IN THE FAMILY

- Elliss has two brothers that also play linebacker in the NFL: Jonah (Denver Broncos) and Kaden (Atlanta Falcons). Another one of his brothers, Noah, played for the Philadelphia Eagles. His father, Luther, was a first-round draft pick by the Detroit Lions in 1995. As a defensive lineman, he was a two-time Pro Bowler in nine seasons with Detroit and Denver. He is currently the defensive tackles coach at the University of Utah where Christian's younger brother, Elijah, plays defensive end.

ELLISS HAS CAREER-HIGH IN TACKLES

- Elliss set a single-game career high vs. Buffalo on Jan. 5, 2025, with a team-leading 13 total tackles. His previous high was 9 tackles at the Jacksonville Jaguars on Oct. 20, 2024, and vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 27, 2024. Elliss' tackle total was the highest of the 2024 season for any Patriots player. LB Ja'Whaun Bentley had 12 total tackles at Cincinnati on Sept. 8, 2024.



DR. GIBBY

- LB Jack Gibbens revealed the nickname given to him by Mike Vrabel when the two were together at Tennessee. According to Gibbens, Vrabel has called him "Dr. Gibby" ever since his rookie season. This nickname came about as a result of Gibbens answering questions correctly while the coach was quizzing the team: "I had to tell him I didn't study medicine...He had to tell me it was a joke," Gibbens said.



GONZALEZ EARNS 2ND TEAM ALL-PRO HONORS

- CB Christian Gonzalez earned second-team Associated Press All-Pro Honors for his 2024 season.

ROOKIE OF THE MONTH

- Gonzalez was named the Defensive Rookie of the Month for September by the National Football League, becoming the fifth Patriots player to win a rookie of the month honor and the third defensive player to earn the award. Gonzalez joins QB Mac Jones (November of 2021), DE Chandler Jones (September of 2012), LB Jerod Mayo (October of 2008) and WR Deion Branch (September of 2002).

GONZO'S JOURNEY

- Before his collegiate success, even the prospect of going to college seemed out of reach for Gonzalez. He didn't want his family to have to pay his college tuition, and as a sophomore, he was a backup quarterback on his high school's junior varsity team that went 1-9. He almost gave up the sport, but after his family's encouragement and transferring schools, Gonzalez's new coaches switched him to defense, and he quickly attracted the attention of colleges around the nation.
- To understand the athleticism of Christian Gonzalez, look no further than his family. His father, Hector, played basketball at UTEP and professionally overseas. Gonzalez's two older sisters were both on the Colombian National Team for track & field and were college All-Americans. His eldest sister competed in the 2020 Olympics, and his younger sister is a rising star in soccer.

PATRIOTS SCORE ON DEFENSE FOR FIRST TIME IN 2024

- The Patriots scored on defense for the first time in 2024 at Miami (11/24/24) when CB Christian Gonzalez returned a RB Jaylen Wright fumble 63 yards for a touchdown that was forced by S Marte Mapu. It was the Patriots first fumble returned for a touchdown since LB Raekwon McMillan returned a fumble for a 23-yard touchdown at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. It was Gonzalez's first NFL touchdown. The fumble return is tied for the third-longest in team history.

FRANCHISE RECORD IN DEBUT

- LB Harold Landry III was credited with 2½ sacks, his seventh multiple sack game, vs. Las Vegas (9/7) in the season-opener. It is the most sacks by a New England player in his debut. It is second to his career-high 3 sacks at Miami on Dec. 11, 2023, with Tennessee. His last multi-sack game was vs. the N.Y. Jets on Sept. 15, 2024, when he had 2 sacks.

LANDRY III RECORDS MOST SACKS IN FIRST TWO GAMES

- Landry III finished with 1 sack in New England's win at Miami (9/14). He now has 3½ sacks on the season, the most by any Patriots player in their first two games with the team. He previously had 2½ sacks vs. Las Vegas on Sept. 7, 2025. The previous record was set by DL Chris Slade in 1993, with 3 sacks in his first two games with the team.



A REUNION WITH MEANING

- LB Robert Spillane was originally signed by Tennessee as a rookie free agent out of Western Michigan, the first year Mike Vrabel was head coach of the Titans. In 2025, he reunited with the coach that took a chance on him and made his dream a reality, this time in New England. The day Spillane signed with the team in Tennessee, it was Mother's Day. On the day Spillane signed his contract in New England, it was his mother's birthday.
- "I got hired in 2018 on Mother's Day, and I got to call my mom in tears saying, 'I'm going to be a professional football player,' Spillane said. '[May 13] is her birthday, so I'm signing the contract on her birthday. She's a very important special woman in my life, and I just want to make her proud.'"

UNDRAFTED TO TOP OF THE LEAGUE

- Spillane has recorded over 100 tackles in each of his last two seasons with the Las Vegas Raiders: 158 in 2024 and 148 in 2023. His 158 tackles in 2024 set a Raiders single-season record and ranked third in the NFL. In 2023, Spillane became the only Raiders player to record 100-plus tackles, 3.0-plus sacks and 3-plus interceptions in a single season since 1987. Since the beginning of the 2022 season, Spillane has tallied 404 tackles, the second-most in the NFL among undrafted defenders, behind only Chicago LB T.J. Edwards (445).

THE WHY BEHIND THE NUMBER

- Spillane is the grandson of RB Johnny Lattner, the 1953 Heisman Trophy winner. Lattner secured the award in his senior season at Notre Dame, after he rushed for 651 yards (4.9-yard average) and 9 touchdowns, in addition to catching 14 passes for 204 yards. He had 2 touchdowns off of just 10 kickoff returns and saw some action on defense, recording 4 interceptions in the Irish's 9-0-1 campaign. Notre Dame finished second in the AP Poll in 1953 behind Maryland. Lattner played one season in the NFL with Pittsburgh after he was selected seventh overall in the 1954 NFL Draft. Spillane wears No. 14 to honor Lattner, who wore No. 14 at Notre Dame.

EYES CLOSED, OPEN MIND

- During his introductory press conference as a Patriots player, Spillane mentioned that he does a lot of "eyes-closed training." Later on, he explained exactly what "eyes-closed training" meant and how it helps him in football. Spillane explained that he developed a style of training where he scouts out an area, whether that be a mountain trail or in a forest, walks it, returns to walk it with his eyes shut, then returns again to walk it backward with his eyes shut. When asked how this training came about, Spillane told the Athletic, "I didn't really learn it from anybody, so it's from the ground up, self-taught," Spillane said. "It's basically just a confidence drill. As a middle linebacker, you want to know where you are on the field at all times — within the positioning of the field, understanding the schematics, where the other players are around you. So, you close your eyes and take away the most basic thing you use to understand that. You've really got to rely on your instincts and your trust."



FIRST 2-SACK GAME AS A PATRIOT

- DT Milton Williams finished with 2 sacks at Miami (9/14), including a 9-yard sack on fourth down with 53 seconds to play to seal the New England win. It is his second career 2-sack game. He also had 2 sacks at the L.A. Rams as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles (11/24/24).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2025

- P Bryce Baringer can become the first Patriots player with at least 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in three straight seasons. Baringer set a Patriots record with 38 punts inside the 20-yard line as a rookie in 2023 and then followed with 31 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2024. Baringer and Jake Bailey (36 in 2019 and 31 in 2020) are the only Patriots punters with back-to-back seasons with at least 30 punts inside the 20-yard line. If Baringer reaches 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2025, he will be the first punter since Cameron Johnston (2021-23 with Houston) to accomplish the feat.
- Baringer has a team record 48.2-yard punting average and will attempt to keep that pace.

30 AND 30

- Baringer led the NFL and set a team record in 2023 with 38 punts inside the 20-yard line. Baringer became the second Patriots punter with back-to-back seasons with at least 30 punts inside the 20-yard line after finishing with 31 in 2024. Jake Bailey had 36 in 2019 and 31 in 2020.

FROM WALK-ON TO ALL-AMERICAN

- Baringer had an unconventional path to the NFL. He began his collegiate career by earning a walk-on spot at Illinois in 2018 as a true freshman, but due to being buried on the depth chart and the cost of out-of-state tuition, he transferred home to Michigan State as a regular student. Outside of a four-game stint on the Michigan State team due to injuries on the roster, Baringer did not have a walk-on spot available to him in 2019. After a year serving as the team's photographer to maintain access to the facilities to train, Baringer attended an open tryout with a new coaching staff at the Spartans and made the team, establishing himself as the Spartans top punter in 2020 and going on to have record-breaking seasons in 2021 and 2022. In 2022, he was named the Big 10 Punter of the Year and a consensus All-American by all five major associations.

BARINGER SETS TEAM MARK

- Baringer had at least one 50-yard punt in all 17 games in 2023 to set the team record for the longest single season streak in team history (at any point of the season). Zoltan Mesko had a 12-game streak in 2011. Baringer extended his record to 27 games with a 50-yard punt after connecting on a 50-yard punt in the first 10 games of 2024 before the streak ended in the game vs. the LA Rams (11/17/24).

RECORD BREAKING

- Baringer connected on a 79-yard punt in the second quarter vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 12, 2023 in Frankfurt, Germany, the fifth-longest punt in team history.

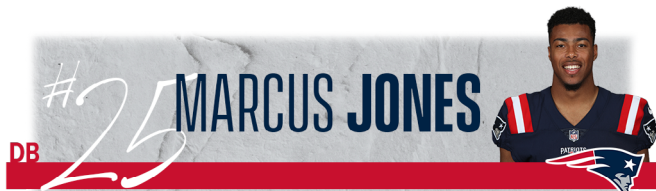
- Baringer has seven games in his career when he has had at least two 60-yard punts in the same game after a 71-yard and a 65-yard punt at Miami on Sept. 14, 2025. He is the only Patriots punter to ever have more than two games with at least two 60-yard punts in a game.

- Baringer finished the 2024 season with a 49.8-yard punting average, the highest in team history for a single season. Jake Bailey previously held the team record with a 48.7-yard average in 2020. Baringer finished fourth in the NFL in 2024.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2025

- CB Marcus Jones scored on a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022. If he scores on offense in 2025, he will join LB Mike Vrabel (8 touchdown receptions) as the only defensive player with more than 1 touchdown on offense in team history. Vrabel also has the most offensive touchdowns by an NFL defensive player with 10 in the regular season.

- Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20, 2022. If he returns a kickoff for a touchdown in 2025, he will become the first New England player to return a punt and a kickoff for a touchdown and the first NFL player to do so in a season since WR KaVontae Turpin of Dallas in 2024.
- If Jones returns a punt for a touchdown in 2025, he will join Julian Edelman (4), Troy Brown (3), Irving Fryar (3) and Mike Haynes (2) as the only Patriots players with more than one punt returned for a touchdown.
- Jones handled kickoff and punt return duties as a rookie in 2022. He will look to become the first Patriots player to ever return a kickoff for a touchdown and punt for a touchdown in the same season and the first NFL player to accomplish the feat since 2024 when WR KaVontae Turpin did so for Dallas.
- Jones scored on offense, defense and special teams in 2022. He is the only player to score in all three phases in a single season since 1970. He is one of ten players to score on offense, defense and special teams during their NFL career.

- Jones had a 62-yard punt return in the third quarter vs. the N.Y. Jets (10/27/24). It was his second career punt return of over 60 yards. He had a career-best 84-yard punt return for a touchdown vs. the Jets on Nov. 20, 2022. If he registers a punt return of at least 60 yards in 2025, he will join Troy Brown with three career punt returns of over 60 yards, behind only the four by WR Julian Edelman (since 1980).
- Jones finished second in the NFL in 2024 with a 14.8-yard punt return average (26 returns for 386 yards). He enters the 2025 season with the highest punt return average in team history with a 13.3 punt return yard average.

JONES NAMED FIRST-TEAM ALL-PRO

- Jones, who won the 2021 Paul Hornung Award as the nation's most versatile player after returning two punts and two kickoff returns for a touchdown in college in 2021, finished second in the NFL with a 12.5-yard punt return average, second in total return yards with 1,007 and seventh in kickoff return average with a 23.9 average. He was named to the Associated Press All-Pro First Team as a punt returner, the first Patriots rookie to be named All-Pro First Team.

JONES SCORES ON OFFENSE, DEFENSE AND SPECIAL TEAMS

- Jones returned a third quarter interception 69 yards for a touchdown vs. Cincinnati on Dec. 24, 2022. He scored on a punt return for a touchdown, a touchdown reception and an interception returned for a touchdown to become the fourth player in NFL history to do so in a season, joining Frank Bacon (1920), Bill Dudley (1947) and Tommy Harmon (1947). Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20 and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1 in addition to the pick-6 against the Bengals. The only other player in the Super Bowl era to score a 40-plus yard touchdown in each of those ways in their entire career is Deion Sanders.

FIRST DB TO CATCH A TD ON OFFENSE SINCE 2000

- Jones, who made his first career start on defense vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022, also lined up on offense and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones on his first play from scrimmage in the first quarter. Jones became the first defensive back to record a touchdown reception on offense since 2000 when S Marcus Coleman of the New York Jets caught a 45-yard touchdown pass from QB Vinny Testaverde against Buffalo on Sept. 17, 2000. Jones caught 15 passes for 137 yards with one receiving touchdown during his college career. He scored on a 47-yard touchdown pass vs. Navy on Sept. 25, 2021. Jones joins LB Mike Vrabel (six 1-yard touchdowns and four 2-yard touchdowns from Tom Brady), LB Elandon Roberts (38-yard touchdown pass from Brady vs. Miami on Dec. 29, 2019) and LB/DE John Tanner (2-yard as the only pass from QB Jim Plunkett on Nov. 24, 1974 at Baltimore) as the only New England defensive players to catch touchdowns.

FIRST PAT TO CATCH A TD ON FIRST RECEPTION SINCE 2019

- Jones was the first Patriots player to catch a touchdown on his first reception since LB Elandon Roberts caught a 38-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter vs Miami on Dec. 29, 2019. Jones's 48-yard touchdown on his first offensive play is the longest by a Patriots player on his first play since WR Stephen Starring caught a 73-yard touchdown pass from Steve Grogan on his first offensive play vs. Baltimore on Sept. 4, 1983.

JONES RETURNS PUNT 84 YARDS FOR A TOUCHDOWN

- Jones returned a fourth quarter punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20, 2022 with five seconds to play. It is tied with Julian Edelman (84-yard touchdown return vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014) for the fifth-longest punt return in team history. Jones was the first player with a punt return for a touchdown in 2022. Jones' punt return for a touchdown is the first for the Patriots since Gunner Olszewski's 70-yard return at the LA Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020.

LAST MINUTE GAME WINNER

- Jones is the sixth player in the NFL to record a game-winning punt-return for a touchdown in the final two minutes of regulation or in overtime since 1970, joining Patrick Peterson (Nov. 6, 2011), DeSean Jackson (Dec. 19, 2010), Brian Westbrook (Oct. 19, 2003), Tamarick Vanover (Oct 9, 1995) and Walter Stanley (Nov. 27, 1986).
- Jones' punt return for a touchdown with five seconds remaining vs. the New York Jets (11/20) marked the second-latest game-winning punt return for a touchdown in regulation since 1970, trailing only DeSean Jackson (no time remaining on Dec. 19, 2010) who returned a punt 65 yards for a touchdown in Philadelphia's win at the New York Giants.

JONES' 84-YARD PUNT RETURN IS SECOND LONGEST GO-AHEAD TD IN 4TH QUARTER IN TEAM HISTORY

- Jones' 84-yard punt return for a touchdown is the second longest go-ahead 4th quarter touchdown in team history. The only longer return was the 91-yard missed field goal return for a touchdown by Ron Burton at Denver on Nov. 11, 1962.

WEEK 11 AFC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- Jones was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week by the National Football League for his performance in the Patriots 10-3 victory over the New York Jets in Week 11.

JONES JOINS DEION SANDERS AS TRIPLE-THREAT

- Jones registered his first career interception in the third quarter at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. He had a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo (12/1/22) and returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets (11/20/22). The only other NFL player with a receiving touchdown, a punt or kick returned for a touchdown and an interception in the same season is Deion Sanders in 1992



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2025

- S Brenden Schooler has led the Patriots in special teams tackles in each of his first three seasons with 14 in 2022, 13 in 2023 and 9 in 2024. He will look to become the first Patriots player in team history to lead the team in special teams tackles in each of his first four NFL seasons since 2000. Since 2000, Larry Izzo (five straight from 2001-05) and Matthew Slater (five straight from 2011-2015) were the only players to lead the Patriots in special teams tackles for at least three straight seasons regardless of their experience level before Schooler's current three-season streak.
- Across the NFL, there have been four players this century to lead the same team in special teams tackles in each of their first four NFL seasons:
 - Nick Bellore: 2011-14 - N.Y. Jets
 - Johnson Bademosi: 2012-15 - Cleveland
 - Justin Bethel: 2012-16 - Arizona (first five seasons)
 - Tyler Matakevich: 2016-19 - Pittsburgh
- Across the NFL, there have been five players this century to lead any team in special teams tackles in each of their first four NFL seasons:
 - Brendon Ayanbadejo: 2003-04 - Miami; 2005-07 - Chicago (first five seasons)
 - Nick Bellore: 2011-14 - N.Y. Jets; 2015 - San Francisco (first five seasons)
 - Johnson Bademosi: 2012-15 - Cleveland
 - Justin Bethel: 2012-16 - Arizona (first five seasons)
 - Tyler Matakevich: 2016-19 - Pittsburgh; 2020-21 - Buffalo (first five seasons)
- Schooler blocked a field goal in 2023 and a punt in 2024. If he records a blocked kick in 2025, he will join Chad Eaton (3 blocked field goals) for second in team history with 3 blocked kicks, behind the 6 blocked kicks by Richard Seymour (6 blocked field goals).
- Schooler would also join DL Chad Eaton (2 blocked field goals in 2000), DL Richard Seymour (2 blocked field goals in 2002), S Patrick Chung (1 blocked field goal and 1 blocked punt in 2010) and LB Shea McClellin (1 blocked extra point and 1 blocked field goal) as the only Patriots players with 2 blocked kicks in a season.



PATRIOTS SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

PRO BOWL HONORS

- Schooler was named to the Pro Bowl on special teams in 2024 after leading the team with 9 special teams tackles. He was also named Associated Press All-Pro First Team, PFWA All-NFL and as an NFLPA Players All-Pro. Schooler led the Patriots in special teams tackles in each of his first two seasons with 14 in 2022 and 13 in 2023. Schooler had a career-high with 3 solo special teams tackles in the 2024 season-opener at Cincinnati on Sept. 24. It was the most special teams tackles in a game since S Cody Davis had 4 solo special teams tackles vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021.

SCHOOLER ROOKIE SPECIAL TEAMS ACE

- Schooler recovered his second fumble of the 2022 season on the punt return team when he recovered a muffed punt return by WR Chester Rogers in the fourth quarter at Cleveland (10/16/22). Schooler also recovered a muffed punt at Pittsburgh (9/18/22). Schooler had a team-leading 14 special teams tackles in 2022, including 11 solo special teams tackles.

SCHOOLER RECORDS 1ST CAREER BLOCKED FIELD GOAL

- Schooler blocked a 49-yard field goal attempt in the third quarter vs. Miami on Sept. 17, 2023 for his first career field goal block. It was the Patriots first blocked field goal attempt since DB Cody Davis blocked a 58-yard attempt at the LA Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020 that was returned 44 yards for a touchdown by S Devin McCourty. In 2022, the Patriots had one blocked kick when DB Jonathan Jones blocked a punt vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 6, 2022. Schooler blocked at punt vs. Miami in the second quarter on Oct. 6, 2024.

TIED FOR SECOND WITH 13 SPECIAL TEAMS TACKLES IN 2023

- Schooler reached double-digit special teams tackles in 2023 with 13 for the second straight season. As a rookie in 2022, he had a team-leading 14 special teams tackles. He is the first NFL player to begin his career with two straight 10-plus special teams tackle seasons since LB Grant Stuard with 11 special teams tackles in 2021 when he played with Tampa Bay and 11 special teams tackles in 2022 when he played for Indianapolis. Schooler finished tied for second in the NFL with 13 special teams tackles in 2023 and was named All-Pro as a core special teams player by the NFLPA.

SCHOOLER SEES ACTION AT SAFETY; RECORDS FIRST-CAREER SACK

- Schooler saw action at safety in the second quarter at Chicago on Nov. 14, 2024. Last season, he played in his first and only defensive snaps of his career on a Hail Mary attempt on the final plays vs. Buffalo (10/22/23) and at Denver (12/24/23). Schooler had his first-career sack in the third quarter on a 9-yard sack of QB Caleb Williams on a third-down play. He added his second sack of the year on a 7-yard sack of QB Tua Tagovailoa at Miami on Nov. 24, 2024 in the fourth quarter.
