GAME SUMMARY

NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-2) AT BUFFALO BILLS (3-0)

Sunday, October 4, 2026 • Highmark Stadium (60,108) • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will be on the road for the second straight week when they make their first ever visit to Buffalo's new stadium this Sunday at Highmark Stadium. Buffalo opened their new stadium in the preseason. Since the 1970 merger, the Patriots are 30-34 in their first regular season appearance at a new opposing stadium. New England had won seven straight games in which they were playing in their first regular season game at a new stadium (2014-21), before losses at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minnesota and Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas in 2022. Those seven straight wins were: 30-7 at Minnesota in 2014 (TCF Bank Stadium), 30-6 at Dallas in 2015 (AT&T Stadium), 23-21 at Arizona in 2016 (University of Phoenix Stadium), 30-17 at San Francisco in 2016 (Levi's Stadium), 19-14 at Tampa Bay in 2017 (Raymond James Stadium), 45-0 at the L.A. Chargers in 2020 (SoFi Stadium) and 25-0 at Atlanta in 2021 (Mercedes-Benz Stadium). Buffalo has won their first two regular season games at their new stadium. Last season, the Patriots snapped a four-game losing streak (including the postseason) in games played in Buffalo with a 23-20 win in a Sunday Night Football game on Oct. 5, 2025.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Ian Eagle** will handle play-by-play duties with **Ross Tucker** as the color analyst. **Evan Washburn** will provide analysis from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Ken Mack** and directed by **Suzanne Smith**.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience on **ESPN Radio**. **Steve Levy** will call the game with **Max Starks** providing analysis. **Dan Graziano** will report from the sidelines.

LOCAL RADIO: **98.5 The Sports Hub** is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's stations can be found in this press release on page 59. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

2026 SCHEDULE HIGHLIGHTS

The Patriots 2026 schedule has eight teams that played in the postseason last year (Buffalo, Chicago, Denver, Green Bay, Jacksonville, Los Angeles Chargers, Pittsburgh and Seattle), including five of the seven division champions - Chicago (NFC North), Denver (AFC West), Jacksonville (AFC South), Pittsburgh (AFC North) and Seattle (NFC West). The Patriots are the first team to appear in a Super Bowl and then start the next season with four straight games against teams that made the playoffs (Seattle, Pittsburgh, Jacksonville and Buffalo), according to the Elias Sports Bureau. Overall, the Patriots are the ninth team in the last 40 seasons to begin their schedule with four straight games against teams that made the playoffs in the previous season.

PATRIOTS AND BILLS RIVARLY

The Patriots have recorded 80 wins over the Bills, the most by the Patriots against any one opponent. The Jets are second on that list with 77 wins by the Patriots.

SERIES HISTORY



The New England Patriots and Buffalo Bills will meet for the first of two scheduled meetings in 2026 when the Patriots make their debut this week at Buffalo's new Highmark Stadium that opened this year. The Patriots will host Buffalo on Dec. 6 at Gillette Stadium.

The Patriots and Bills have split the annual series in each of the last three seasons. Last year, the Patriots beat the Bills, 23-20 in a Sunday Night Football game in Buffalo on Oct. 5 and then lost in the rematch, 35-31, at Gillette Stadium on Dec. 14.

This week's game will be the 134th meeting between the two teams. New England holds a 80-52-1 edge in the series and has won 39 of the last 52 regular season games between the clubs, dating back to 2000.

The Patriots are 39-27 -all-time when playing on the road against Buffalo.

The series between the AFC East rivals began in 1960. The Patriots' 80 wins over the Bills are their highest victory total over any opponent, three higher than their next highest win total against the New York Jets (77).

After seven-straight series sweeps and 15-consecutive Patriots wins from 2003-10, Buffalo ended the streak with a 34-31 victory at Ralph Wilson Stadium in the first meeting between the teams in 2011. The 15-game win streak is tied for the longest streak over a single opponent in team history with 15-straight wins over the New York Jets.

The teams have had many memorable matchups over the years, including a span from 1999 to 2001, where four-of-six contests were decided in overtime.

- **2026 first round pick T Caleb Lomu** was utilized as an extra lineman as a tackle-eligible tight end. Late in the third quarter, Lomu played at right tackle in place of T Morgan Moses.
- **WR Efton Chism III** made his first start of the season and the second of his career. His other start was vs. Miami on Jan. 4, 2026.
- **OL Walter Rouse** played in his first game with the Patriots after being inactive for the first two games. He played on the field goal team and then replaced OL Greg Van Roten at right guard when Van Roten left with an injury in the second quarter.
- **RB Corey Kiner** lined up to return kicks for the first time this season. He returned a second quarter kick for 28 yards. His only other kickoff return was a 22-yard return at Houston on Dec. 14, 2025 when he played for Arizona.
- **QB Tommy DeVito** made his debut with New England in the fourth quarter. His first pass attempt with the Patriots was a 20-yard pass to WR Romeo Doubs. He finished 3-of-5 for 30 yards.
- **OL Ben Brown** saw his first snaps of the 2026 season on offense when he entered the game at center in the fourth quarter.
- **2026 fifth-round pick CB Karon Prunty** saw his first snaps on defense in the fourth quarter.
- **Rookie free agent LB Erick Hunter** played on defense for the first time in the fourth quarter.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (375), division titles (20), winning percentage (.654), playoff wins (36) and playoff seasons (23).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 32 seasons of ownership, he is credited with transforming one of the league's least successful clubs into one of the most valuable. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (20), conference crowns (11) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (25) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. **Super Bowl LX was the 11th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than five Super Bowls.** In Kraft's 32 seasons, the Patriots qualified for the playoffs 23 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

The game at Pittsburgh (9/18/22) was the 500th game of the Robert Kraft era. Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of Super Bowl wins (6), overall wins (375), division titles (20), winning percentage (.654), playoff wins (36) and playoff seasons (23).

A FAN AT HEART

A devoted Patriots fan since the team's American Football League (AFL) days in the 1960s, Kraft attended games at each of the franchise's early Boston-area venues, including Boston University Field, Fenway Park, Boston College's Alumni Stadium and Harvard Stadium. When the Patriots moved to Schaefer Stadium in 1971, he purchased season tickets for his family. Kraft often credits the memories and experiences shared with his family and fellow Patriots fans during those years as the inspiration behind his pursuit of ownership of the franchise.

A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the mark. Al Davis of the Raiders accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

The Patriots have 375 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 375-198 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 29 times in their 66-year history. Twenty-three of those playoff berths have come in the 32 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 23 division crowns.

Since the 1994 season, the Patriots have won 65.3 percent of their regular season games (338-180), which is the highest winning percentage in men's major American professional sports over that period (among teams with at least five years of existence). Since 1994, there have been 148 franchises that have fielded teams in the five major American sports leagues (NFL, MLB, NBA, NHL and MLS) and completed more than two full seasons of competition. On the women's side, the Toronto Six (29-5-3) and the Boston Pride (90-29-10) of the PHF hold the two highest winning percentages of all women's professional sports teams.

- The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in NFL history with six.
- The Patriots played in their 12th Super Bowl with their appearance in Super Bowl LX last season, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver, Pittsburgh and San Francisco have played in eight.
- The New England Patriots have 40 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with 39 postseason wins.
- The Patriots are tied for second with Pittsburgh in NFL history with 16 Conference Championship Game appearances, behind San Francisco (19).
- The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds, trailing only San Francisco (10) and Denver (9) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. San Francisco is second with 10 byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine-straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 63 postseason games, the fifth-most in NFL history, behind Dallas (67), Pittsburgh (66), Green Bay (65) and San Francisco (64).
- The Patriots are third in the NFL with 14 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 17 and Dallas' 15 seasons with 12 victories.
- New England has won 13 games in a single season eight times in franchise history. Only San Francisco (11) and has more 13-win seasons.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season six times, the most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- The Patriots have 36 winning seasons since 1970, tied with Dallas for second all-time, behind Pittsburgh's 42.
- The Patriots have 600 total victories, the fourth-most wins since their inception in 1960, behind the 618 by Pittsburgh, 613 by Dallas and 606 by Green Bay.
- New England (1,08) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021, and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- The Patriots ended a 10-year streak of finishing in the top 10 for fewest points allowed (2012-2021) after finishing 11th in 2022 with 20.4 points allowed. The Patriots and Tampa Bay (1996-2005) are the last two teams to reach 10-straight seasons in the top 10 for fewest points allowed.
- The Patriots finished with a positive turnover ratio for 17-straight seasons (2006-22), the longest streak since the 1970 merger before the streak ended in 2023. Seattle is second with 13-straight seasons with a positive turnover ratio.

- The Patriots finished eighth in total defense in 2025. The Patriots have finished in the top 10 in defense 12 times since 2000.
- The Patriots played in their fifth international game when they faced Jacksonville in London on Oct. 20, 2024. It was their second-straight year with an international game after playing in Frankfurt, Germany in 2023. The Patriots played in London in 2009 and 2012 and in Mexico City in 2017. The five international games are tied for fourth all-time with Las Vegas, behind the 13 by Jacksonville, eight by Buffalo and seven by Miami. The Patriots will play in Munich, Germany on Nov. 15 against the Detroit Lions.
- The Patriots went 19-straight seasons (2001-19) without being swept in a series by a division opponent, the longest such streak since the 1970 NFL merger.
- The Patriots are 117-8 all-time at Gillette Stadium in the regular season when leading at halftime.
- The 2026 season kicked off with a Super Bowl LX rematch between the Patriots and Seahawks in Seattle on Wednesday, Sept. 9. It was the Patriots first-ever game played on a Wednesday. It was also the first Week 1 Super Bowl rematch since the 2016 season when Denver hosted Carolina in a rematch of Super Bowl 50.

- The Patriots are the first team to appear in a Super Bowl and then start the next season with four straight games against teams that made the playoffs, according to Elias. Overall, the Patriots are the ninth team in the last 40 seasons to begin their schedule with four straight games against teams that made the playoffs in the previous season.

PATRIOTS *WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2026*

THE 600 CLUB

The Patriots 20-3 win over Pittsburgh on Sept. 20, 2026 at Gillette Stadium was their 600th win, first among all original AFL teams and 12th overall in NFL history.

THREE SETS OF TWINS

The Patriots have three players on the team that have twin siblings. DT Milton Williams (Mia) and LB Namdi Obiazor (Nneka) have twin sisters. Obiazor's sister played college basketball at Youngstown State and Grand Canyon. TE Cameron Latu has a twin brother, Nate, who played defensive end at Snow College and Oklahoma State and also had a brief stint with New Orleans.

LUCKY NUMBER...14

The Patriots won the AFC East with a 14-3 record in 2025. The Patriots will be looking for their first back-to-back division titles since winning 11 straight division titles (2009-19).

If the Patriots reach 14 wins in 2026, it will be the second time in team history that the team has won 14 games in back-to-back seasons. The Patriots won 14 games in 2003 and 2004.

ELITE ON BOTH SIDES OF THE BALL

The Patriots offense finished third in the NFL in 2025. The last time the Patriots finished in the top 10 in offense in back-to-back seasons was during a four-year stretch from 2015 through the 2018 seasons.

The Patriots defense finished eighth in the NFL in 2025. The last time the Patriots defense finished in the top 10 in back-to-back seasons was during a three-year stretch from 2021 through the 2023 season.

In 2025, the Patriots offense finished third and the defense finished eighth in the NFL. The Patriots have had back-to-back seasons with both the offense and the defense finishing in the top 10 three times in team history. If the Patriots finish in the top 10 in both offense and defense in 2026, it will be the fourth time that has occurred (2015-16, 2007-08 and 1978-80).

The 2025 Patriots offense generated 6,449 total yards, the fourth highest in team history. If the 2026 Patriots produce at least 6,000 yards, it will be the first time with back-to-back seasons with at least 6,000 yards since three straight seasons from 2016 through 2018. The Patriots also had a three-year stretch from 2011 through 2013.

RETURN ON INVESTMENT

The 2025 Patriots had 3 total kick returns in 2025 with 2 punts returned for a touchdown and 1 kickoff returned for a touchdown. The last NFL team to return at least 3 total kicks in back-to-back years was Minnesota in 2016 (2 punt returns and 1 kickoff return) and 2015 (1 punt return and 2 kickoff returns).

Henry is a captain for the fourth time as a member of the Patriots (2023-26) and for the fifth time overall (2020 when he was with the L.A. Chargers). Maye is a captain for the second straight year. Moses is a third time captain after being a captain in 2020 with Washington and in 2023 with Baltimore. Byard is a captain for the eighth straight year after first being named a captain in 2019 with Tennessee. Spillane is a captain for the fourth straight season overall after serving as captain with the Raiders in 2023 and 2024 and now his first two seasons with New England. Jones is in his second season as a captain.

11 ROOKIES ON OPENING DAY ROSTER

Of the 24 new players on the opening day 53-man roster, 11 of those players were rookies, including eight 2026 draft picks and three rookie free agents – TE Tanner Arkin, CB Channing Canada and LB Erick Hunter.

Since 2000, the Patriots have had 10 or more rookies on their opening day roster eight other times (2000, 2009, 2010, 2013, 2015, 2023, 2024 and 2025).

PATRIOTS BREAK AARON RODGERS STREAK WITHOUT AN INT

Rookie LB Gabe Jacas intercepted an Aaron Rodgers pass in the fourth quarter to end his streak of 310 pass attempts without an interception in the victory over Pittsburgh on Sept. 20. Rodgers' streak included the final seven games of the 2025 season and the first game of the 2026 season. It was his first interception since Nov. 9, 2025 at the L.A. Chargers in the fourth quarter. It was Jacas' first ever interception, dating back to high school.

PATRIOTS TIE FOR BEST TURNAROUND

The Patriots finished with a 14-3 in record in 2025, a 10-game difference from the 4-13 finish in 2024. The 10-game improvement tied the 1999 Indianapolis Colts and the 2008 Miami Dolphins for the best turnaround in NFL history. The 1998 Colts were 3-13 and improved to 13-3 in 1999, and the 2007 Dolphins were 1-15 in 2007 and improved to 11-5 in 2008.

The Patriots improved to a 14-3 record in 2025. It is the team's sixth season with 14 or more wins.

VRABEL EARNS FIRST 14-WIN SEASON AS HEAD COACH

Vrabel led the Patriots to a 14-3 record in 2025 and joins George Seifert (1989 with San Francisco) and Jim Caldwell (2009 with Indianapolis) as the only coaches to win 14 games in their first season coaching a team.

TEAM RECORD 9.8-YD RUSHING AVG.

The Patriots rushed for 246 yards on 25 carries for a 9.8-yard average vs. Buffalo (12/14/25), the team's highest rushing average in a game in team history. The previous record was a 7.9-yard average when they rushed 19 times for 151 yards on Oct. 6, 2024, vs. Miami.

SEASON HIGH 246 YARDS RUSHING

The Patriots finished the game with a season-high 246 yards rushing vs. Buffalo (12/14/25). The previous high was 177 yards vs. Cleveland on Oct. 26. It is the first time the Patriots rushed for 200 yards in a game since gaining 200 yards rushing vs. Indianapolis (12/1/24). The 246 yards rushing was the most since they rushed for 250 yards vs. Las Vegas (9/27/20).

TIE TEAM RECORD WITH 4 RUSH TDS

The Patriots tied a team record with 4 total rushing touchdowns vs. Buffalo (12/14/25) and then accomplished the feat for a second time vs. Miami (01/04/26). It is the 12th and 13th time they have scored 4 rushing touchdowns in a game.

PATRIOTS WON 10TH STRAIGHT GAME

The Patriots won 10 straight games in 2025, their sixth 10-game winning streak overall in regular season games.

10 STRAIGHT & 23 SCORED, 23-OR-LESS ALLOWED

With the 33-15 win vs. the New York Giants (12/1/25), New England became the first team in NFL history to win 10 consecutive games with at least 23 points scored and 23-or-less points allowed in each game. The 1961 Houston Oilers are second with nine straight such games.

PATRIOTS FINISH WITH 8-0 ROAD RECORD

The Patriots had a perfect 8-0 road record in 2025. They are the only team that did not lose on the road in 2025. The Patriots finished undefeated on the road two other times in team history with 8-0 records in 2007 and 2016. The Patriots joined San Francisco (1984, 1989 and 1990) as the only NFL teams to go undefeated on the road in three seasons since 1970. (listed below):

RECORD 50-YD REC. TD & 50-YD. RUSH TD

The Patriots recorded a 50-yard passing touchdown (72-yard pass from Drake Maye to Kyle Williams) and a 50-yard rushing touchdown (TreVeyon Henderson 55 and 69-yard runs) in the same game at Tampa Bay (11/9/25) for the first time since Sept. 21, 1997, when Curtis Martin rushed for a 70-yard touchdown and WR Troy Brown caught a 52-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Bledsoe vs. Chicago.

100-YARD RUSHER & 100-YARD RECEIVER

The Patriots finished with a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver at Tampa Bay (11/9/25) after RB TreVeyon Henderson gained 147 yards rushing and WR Mack Hollins finished with 106 yards receiving. It is the 33rd time in team history that has happened and the first time since Oct. 9, 2022, vs. Detroit when RB Rhamondre Stevenson had 161 rushing yards and WR Jakobi Meyers had 111 receiving yards.

TWO AND TWO OF 50

In the Patriots victory at Tampa Bay (11/9/25), the team had two 50-yard passes and two 50-yard touchdown runs. QB Drake Maye had a 72-yard touchdown pass to WR Kyle Williams and a 54-yard completion to WR Mack Hollins. RB TreVeyon Henderson had a 55-yard touchdown run and a 69-yard touchdown run. The Patriots and the Dolphins (in their 2023 blowout against the Broncos) are the only teams with multiple 50-yard rushes and catches in the same game this century.

16TH WINNING STREAK OF AT LEAST 6

With the 10-game winning streak in 2025, the Patriots lead the NFL with 16 winning streaks of at least six games since 2001.

THREE-GAME ROAD TRIP, THREE WINS

The Patriots completed a three-game road trip with their fourth straight win with the 31-13 victory at Tennessee last season. The Patriots won the first two road games with a 23-20 win at Buffalo and a 25-19 win at New Orleans, and the victory over Tennessee marked the Patriots' third time winning all three games when playing three straight on the road in a single season. In 1961, the Patriots won their final three games on the road and then in 1985, the Patriots won three straight postseason games played on the road en route to their first Super Bowl appearance. The Patriots have had 24 previous instances of three or more consecutive games on the road in a single season, including the postseason. The Patriots join the Rams (2018), Steelers (2020), Commanders (2020), Cowboys (2021) and Vikings (2024) as teams that have won all three games of a three-game road trip in the last ten years.

PATRIOTS LIMITED RUNNING BACKS

The Patriots are the first team in NFL history since at least 1950 to hold a running back under 50 yards in the first nine games of an NFL season. The Patriots streak ended after nine games in 2025 when RB Sean Tucker gained 53 yards at Tampa Bay (11/9), one shy of the NFL record of 10 set by the 2020 Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

BACK TO BACK RETURNS

In the fourth quarter at Miami (9/14/25), Dolphins WR Malik Washington returned a punt 74 yards for a touchdown. And during the ensuing kick, RB Antonio Gibson had a 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. It marks the second time in NFL history there was a punt return touchdown immediately followed by a kick return for a touchdown: Sept. 13, 1992 – Atlanta at Washington.

HEAD COACHING EXPERIENCE

Four of the Patriots assistant coaches have a combined 18 years of head coaching experience at every level.

- **Offensive line coach Doug Marrone** was the head coach for Syracuse University (2009-12). In addition, Marrone was the head coach for the Buffalo Bills for two seasons (2013-14) and spent four total seasons as the head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars (2017-2020).
- **Offensive coordinator Josh McDaniels** first became a head coach for the Denver Broncos (2009-10.) Later in his career, McDaniels coached the Las Vegas Raiders (2022-23).
- **Passing Game Coordinator and Tight Ends Coach Thomas Brown** spent time as the interim head coach of the Chicago Bears last season.
- **Assistant Offensive Line Coach Jason Houghtaling** was the head coach for Wagner (2015-19). Before making the jump to college, Houghtaling served as the head coach at Troy High School in Troy, N.Y. (2010).

TALE OF THE TWOS

The Patriots are one of four teams since 1970 that have had back-to-back head coaches that played for the team and then served as a head coach with Mike Vrabel following Jerod Mayo. They join Chicago, Jim Dolley and Abe Gbron; Philadelphia, Jerry Williams and Ed Khayat; and Green Bay, Bart Starr and Forrest Gregg.

A DRAFTED P, K AND LS ON THE ROSTER

The Patriots were the only team in 2025 with a player they drafted at punter, kicker and long snapper on their current roster. **P Bryce Baringer** was drafted in the sixth-round of the 2023 NFL Draft, **K Andy Borregales** was drafted in the sixth-round of the 2025 NFL Draft, while **LS Julian Ashby** was drafted in the seventh-round of the 2025 NFL Draft. This century, the Patriots have had three seasons in which they played a kicker, punter and long snapper who were all drafted by New England:

NFL BLOOD

The 2025 New England Patriots have many familial ties in the NFL. Out of the 53 players currently on the roster, 10 have had family members who have spent time in the NFL. Below is a list of each of them:

Drake Maye - Mark Maye (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 1988)

Drake Maye's father, Mark Maye, was also a North Carolina quarterback, starting for the Tar Heels in 1986 and 1987. Undrafted in 1988, Maye signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, spending the season as a backup to Vinny Testaverde and Joe Ferguson.

Andy Borregales - José Borregales (Tampa Bay Buccaneers 2021-22)

Andy Borregales' brother, José, went undrafted in 2021 and signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Ben Brown - Allen Brown (Green Bay 1965-67)

Ben Brown's paternal grandfather won two Super Bowls with the Green Bay Packers as a tight end.

Christian Gonzalez - David Blough (Cleveland Browns 2019*, Detroit Lions 2019-21, Minnesota Vikings 2022*, Arizona Cardinals 2022, Detroit Lions 2023*)

David Blough, who is Gonzalez's brother-in-law, spent time in the NFL as a quarterback with four NFL teams across five seasons. He is now the offensive coordinator in Washington.

Christian Elliss - Luther Elliss (Detroit Lions 1995-2003, Denver Broncos 2004), Kaden Elliss (New Orleans Saints 2019-22, 26, Atlanta Falcons 2023-25, New Orleans 2026), Noah Elliss (Philadelphia Eagles 2022-24*), Jonah Elliss (Denver Broncos 2024-Present)

Christian Elliss' father, Luther, was a first-round pick for the Detroit Lions in 1995, spending 10 seasons in the NFL. His older brother, Kaden, is a linebacker who emerged as a starter for the Atlanta Falcons in 2023. One of his younger brothers, Noah, went undrafted in 2022 and signed with the Philadelphia Eagles. His youngest brother, Jonah, is a linebacker who was selected in the third round of the 2024 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos.

Robert Spillane - Johnny Lattner (Pittsburgh Steelers 1954)

Robert Spillane's grandfather, Johnny Lattner, is one of the all-time college greats. He was selected in the first round of the 1954 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, making the Pro Bowl as a punt returner in his rookie season before joining the United States Air Force.

Mike Vrabel was named NFL Coach of the Year for the second time in 2025. He first received the award in 2021 as head coach of the Tennessee Titans. A PROVEN LEADER AND CHAMPION

AS A PLAYER: Vrabel's accomplishments as a player included three Super Bowl wins (2001, 2003 and 2004), one Pro Bowl selection (2007) and an All-Pro honor (2007). Originally drafted in the third round (91st overall) of the 1997 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, he spent the early years of his career mostly playing on special teams and as a reserve linebacker. He signed with the Patriots as an unheralded free agent in 2001 and went on to become one of the key pieces of the dynasty that captured three Super Bowl titles in four years. Vrabel ended his playing career with the Kansas City Chiefs after being a part of a trade that included QB Matt Cassel. He appeared in 206 NFL games and totaled 57 sacks, 722 tackles, 11 interceptions (one returned for a touchdown), 20 forced fumbles and 9 fumble recoveries. A cerebral and versatile athlete, he also saw action as a tight end and totaled 10 touchdown receptions. Additionally, his teams advanced to the playoffs eight times (20 postseason games), with Vrabel recording 8 postseason sacks and two additional postseason touchdown receptions.

AS A COACH: Vrabel has 16 years of coaching experience, including 13 years in the NFL and three seasons at Ohio State. The Tennessee Titans hired him as their head coach in 2018, and he led the Titans to two division titles and three playoff appearances during his six seasons at the helm. In 2019, the Titans upset the Patriots in Foxborough in the Wild Card round, then defeated the No. 1 seed Ravens in Baltimore the following week to advance to the AFC Championship Game, where they lost to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs. In 2021, the Titans claimed the top seed in the AFC with a 12-5 record, earning Vrabel NFL Coach of the Year honors.

In Vrabel's first season as head coach of the Patriots in 2025, he led New England to an AFC East Division title and an AFC Championship title en route to the franchise's NFL-record 12th Super Bowl appearance. The 2025 Patriots went 9-0 on the road, becoming the first team in NFL history to play at least nine games on the road and win them all. Vrabel earned his second NFL Coach of the Year honor after taking a team from a 4-13 record in 2024 to a 14-3 record in 2025, becoming just the sixth team to reach a Super Bowl after winning less than five games the year prior.

Douglas' granddad passed away on his first birthday. The wide receiver was commonly referred to as 'Poppa' from his granddad – a nickname that was quickly shortened to just 'Pop'.

NUMBER CHANGE

- Pop Douglas changed his jersey number from No. 81 to No. 3 in 2024. He wore No. 3 in college at Liberty, as well as in Little League, middle school and high school. He explained its meaning to him: "It's big because I was raised by three strong ladies -- my mom, grandma and great-grandma," he said.

- During his introductory press conference with the Patriots, Gilliam said he is good friends with Develin through his work with the NFLPA and the fullback fraternity. Develin is now enjoying retirement and works as a player manager for the players' association to stay around the game.
- "I'm good friends with James now. We've talked a lot. He's had nothing but great things to say about New England. Obviously, growing up watching the whole era of the Patriots being the greatest team ever, Josh McDaniels knows how to use a fullback. I'm excited to see what he does with me," Gilliam told reporters.

HENDERSON SETS PATRIOTS ROOKIE RECORD

- Henderson's 5.1-yard average in 2025 is the highest average for any Patriots rookie running back since 1970. The previous best was a 4.6-yard average by RB Rhamondre Stevenson in 2021. Henderson finished the season with 911 yards rushing.

FIRST PATRIOTS PLAYER WITH FOUR 50-YARD TDS

- Henderson scored on a 55-yard touchdown run in the third quarter and a 69-yard run in the fourth quarter at Tampa Bay (11/9/25) and became the first Patriots player to have two 50-yard touchdown runs in the same game. He needs 35 receptions to become the third New England tight end to reach 300 receptions and 4 touchdowns to join Gronkowski (79) and Coates (50) as the only Patriots tight ends with 30 touchdowns.
- Henry has logged at least 40 receptions in all five seasons with the Patriots (60 receptions in 2025), the second-longest streak by a Patriots tight end all-time to Ben Coates, who had 40 or more receptions in six straight seasons. BAREFOOT DREAMING

- Unless it's gametime, WR Mack Hollins is walking around barefoot. In his early playing years with the Philadelphia Eagles, Hollins met some trainers from Melbourne Muscular Therapy from Australia, whose philosophy is to be barefoot and get back to your original ways of movement. Hollins flew them out, and although he was hesitant at first, they convinced him that doing all of his training barefoot can help with durability. In the last few years, Hollins has completely abandoned shoes and now walks barefoot all the time, unless it is under 35 degrees.



FAMILY PRIDE

- Caleb Lomu's grandfather, Manu Lomu, was of Tongan heritage, a culture and a name Lomu carries with deep pride. That pride has been reflected throughout his career, from being a finalist for the Polynesian College Football Player of the Year to competing in the Polynesian Bowl. His success continues a historic trend, as he became one of five Polynesian players selected in the first round of the 2026 NFL Draft — the highest number ever recorded.
- Lomu's grandfather passed away when his father was just 14, but his dream lived on. As Lomu puts it: *"His biggest dream was for someone to represent the last name. Every time I put on that jersey, I know he's above watching. My dad gets emotional seeing 'Lomu' on the back — he always says how happy it would make him. I do it for him, for everyone with the Lomu last name, for my wife, my future family, and the family I have now. It's the biggest thing for me — doing it not just for myself, but for everyone who carries that name."*



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2026

- QB Drake Maye is in eighth place in team history with 7,255 passing yards and needs 2,745 passing yards in 2026 to become the sixth Patriots player to reach 10,000 passing yards.
- Maye has a team-best 69.2 career completion percentage.

- In 2025, Maye led the NFL and set a team record with a 72.0 completion percentage. If Maye completes at least 70 percent of his passes in 2026, he will be only the third NFL player with multiple seasons of at least a 70.0 completion percentage, joining Joe Burrow (2021 and 2024) and Drew Brees (2009, 2011, 2016-20). Additionally, Maye would be the second NFL player with a completion percentage of 70.0 or better in back-to-back years, joining Brees (2016-20).
- If Maye leads the NFL in completion percentage for a second straight season, he will be the first Patriots player to accomplish the feat and become the sixth NFL player since 1970 to do so.

- Maye passed for 4,394 yards in 2025. If he reaches 4,000 passing yards in 2026, he will join Drew Bledsoe (two) and Tom Brady (11) as the only Patriots quarterbacks with more than one 4,000-yard season. Brady is the only Patriots quarterback that has accomplished the feat in consecutive seasons (2011-15 and 2017-19).
- In 2025, Maye threw 31 touchdowns to join Tom Brady (seven) and Babe Parilli (one) as the only Patriots to have a 30-touchdown season. If Maye throws for 30 touchdowns in 2026, he will join Brady as the only Patriots players with 30 touchdowns in consecutive seasons. Brady threw for 30 touchdowns in consecutive seasons from 2010-12 and again from 2014-15.
- Maye was named to his second Pro Bowl in 2025 and became just the fourth quarterback in NFL history to begin his career with consecutive Pro Bowl invitations, joining Andrew Luck (three straight), Russell Wilson (four straight) and Dan Marino (five straight). He also joins Patriots Hall of Famers Mike Haynes (five straight) and Curtis Martin (two straight) as the only players in franchise history to open their Patriots careers with at least two Pro Bowl selections.

- Maye moved into the Top-10 on the New England all-time passing list and now ranks 8th with 7,255 yards.
- Maye has a team-best 69.2 career completion percentage.
- As a rookie in 2024, Maye finished with 54 rushing attempts for 421 yards and a 7.80-yard average, the sixth-highest in NFL history for a quarterback with at least 50 rushing attempts.
- Maye had a 75-plus completion percentage and threw at least 2 touchdown passes in three consecutive games in 2025. Only Tom Brady has had a longer streak in a single season in NFL history. Brady accomplished the feat during a four-game streak in 2007.

- Maye finished 2025 with 13 games with a passer rating of 100.0 or more. That ties Patrick Mahomes, who had 13 games in a single season (2018) with Kansas City. His 13 games in a single season with a passer rating of at least 100.0 is a new franchise record, eclipsing Tom Brady's record of 12, set in 2010 and repeated in 2011. Aaron Rogers owns the NFL record with 14 games in 2020.

MAYE FINISHED 2025 SEASON WITH A 113.5 PASSER RATING

- Maye finished the 2025 season with a 113.5 passer rating. Tom Brady is the only other Patriots quarterback to finish a season with a passer rating over 100.0. He accomplished the feat six times during his career with the Patriots. Maye's 113.5 mark in 2025 is second only to the 117.2 passer rating by Brady in 2007.

MAYE SET CAREER HIGH WITH 5 TOUCHDOWN PASSES

- Maye set a career-high with his 5 touchdown passes at the N.Y. Jets (12/28/25). He has thrown 3 touchdown passes in a game three times, including two games in 2025. He had 3 touchdown passes at New Orleans (10/12) and vs. Cleveland (10/26 in 2025). Maye is the first New England player to throw 5 touchdown passes since QB Tom Brady had 5 vs. Houston on Sept. 24, 2017.

A TD TO FIVE DIFFERENT RECEIVERS

- Maye set a team record at the N.Y. Jets (12/28/25) by throwing touchdown passes to five different receivers – TE Hunter Henry, RB Rhamondre Stevenson, WR Efton Chism III, WR Stefon Diggs and TE Austin Hooper. There have been 17 occasions in which the Patriots had four touchdown receivers, with the most recent occurrence coming on January 3rd, 2021, vs. the N.Y. Jets.

MAYE IS THE FIRST

- Maye is the first player in NFL history to have at least 250 passing yards, 5 passing touchdowns and a 90% completion percentage in a single game (at the N.Y. Jets on Dec. 28, 2025). Maye is also the first player in NFL history to have multiple games of 200-plus passing yards and at least 2 passing touchdowns with at least a 90% completion percentage in a single season. His other game was against Tennessee on Oct. 19, 2025.

MAYE HAS THIRD BEST PASSER RATING

- Maye finished with a 157.0 passer rating at the N.Y. Jets (12/28/25). The only better passer rating in team history was by Tom Brady when he had a perfect passer rating of 158.3 in 2010 at Detroit and in 2007 at Miami.

MAYE SETS CAREER HIGH IN PASSING YARDS

- Maye threw for a career-high 380 yards at Baltimore (12/21/25) on Sunday Night Football for his first 300-yard game. His previous best was 294 yards at Cincinnati (11/23/25).

MAYE THROWS LONGEST PASS OF HIS CAREER

- Maye completed a career-best 72-yard touchdown pass to WR Kyle Williams in the first quarter at Tampa Bay (11/9/25). His previous best was a 58-yard reception to WR DeMario Douglas in the second quarter vs. Atlanta (11/2/25). His longest touchdown pass prior to the one to Williams was a 53-yard touchdown pass to Douglas at New Orleans (10/12/25).

MAYE HAS FIRST GAME WITH TWO 50-YARD PASSES

- Maye had a 72-yard pass to WR Kyle Williams in the second quarter and a 54-yard pass to WR Mack Hollins in the fourth quarter at Tampa Bay (11/9/25). MAYE HAS 11TH GAME WITH AT LEAST 2 TOUCHDOWNS

- Maye had his 11th game in 2025 with at least 2 touchdown passes after throwing 5 total touchdown passes at the N.Y. Jets (12/28/25). The Patriots record for the most games with at least 2 touchdown passes in a single season is 14 by Tom Brady in 2007 and 2011.

THE MAYE WAY

- Maye, the youngest of four boys, hails from a family of athletes. His father, Mark, also played quarterback at the University of North Carolina from 1983-1988. His brother, Luke, played basketball at North Carolina (2015-19), winning a national title in 2017 with the Tar Heels. Luke now plays overseas in Japan. His brother, Cole, won a baseball national championship in 2017 with the University of Florida as a pitcher. His brother, Beau, also played basketball at the University of North Carolina. Despite the rich tradition of family athleticism, Drake Maye, measuring at 6'4, is the shortest of the four brothers (Luke at 6'8; Cole at 6'7; Beau at 6'8).

- Maye finished the game at Tennessee (11/3/24) with 95 yards rushing. It is the fourth time in team history a New England quarterback reached at least 90 yards rushing in a game and the first time since Steve Grogan had 103 yards rushing vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 18, 1976. Maye's 95 yards are the third-most in team history. Maye had 8 rushing attempts for 95 yards for a 11.9-yard average.

- Maye followed a 46-yard rushing performance vs. the New York Jets (10/27/24) with a 95-yard rushing performance at Tennessee (11/3/24) for 141 total yards. It is the best two-game rushing total by a Patriots quarterback, besting the 132 rushing yards by QB Steve Grogan in 1976 with 103 rushing yards vs. the New York Jets (10/18) followed by 29 yards rushing at Buffalo (10/24).

MAYE-KING HISTORY

- Since 1950, Drake Maye and Dan Marino are the only quarterbacks with at least 500 passing yards and at least 5 touchdown passes in their first two starts. Maye threw for 243 yards and 3 touchdowns in his first career start vs. Houston (10/13/24) and 276 yards and 2 touchdowns last week at Jacksonville (10/20/24).

FIFTH TIME A PATRIOTS QB HAS A 40-YARD RUN IN A GAME

- Maye had a 41-yard run in the first quarter vs. Indianapolis on Dec. 1, 2024. The run is tied for the third-longest run by a Patriots quarterback and it is the fifth time a Patriots quarterback had a 40-yard run in a game. - Drake Maye and 2026 seventh-round draft pick QB Behren Morton share a family history that goes back to 1988. In 1988, Drake's dad Mark and Behren's dad James were teammates in training camp in 1988 with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Mark was a quarterback that came from North Carolina, while James was a fullback that came from West Texas A&M. James coached Behren in high school, but unlike what you think you would expect from a Texas high school. Behren said there were only 25 people on his high school team. Behren was the quarterback and also an edge rusher.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2026

- RB Rhamondre Stevenson recorded his first 1,000-yard rushing season with a career-high 1,040 rushing yards in 2022. He can become the third New England player to reach at least two 1,000-yard rushing seasons, joining Curtis Martin (three) and Jim Nance (two).
- Stevenson is in fifth place in team history with 3,785 rushing yards and needs 215 yards to join Sam Cunningham (5,453), Jim Nance (5,323) and Tony Collins (4,647) as the only Patriots players to reach 4,000 rushing yards.
- Stevenson is in fifth place on the Patriots all-time rushing list with 3,785 yards and needs 15 rushing yards to move past Curtis Martin (3,799) into fourth place on the team's all-time rushing list.
- Stevenson enters the 2026 season in ninth place with 28 rushing touchdowns and needs two in 2026 to join Jim Nance (45), Sam Cunningham (43), Corey Dillon (37), Steve Grogan (35), LeGarrette Blount (34), Tony Collins (32) and Curtis Martin (32) as the only Patriots players with 30 rushing touchdowns.
- Stevenson has 195 career receptions, the fifth-most among all New England running backs. He needs 5 receptions in 2026 to join Kevin Faulk (431), James White (381), Tony Collins (261) and Sam Cunningham (210) as the only New England running backs with 200 receptions.
- Stevenson is the first player in franchise history with 700-plus scrimmage yards in each of his first five seasons: 729 in 2021, 1,461 in 2022, 857 in 2023, 969 in 2024 and 948 in 2025. Curtis Martin, John Stephens and Tony Collins are the Patriots that had 700-plus scrimmage yards in each of their first three NFL seasons.

NOTES OF INTEREST

- Stevenson led the team in receptions in 2022 with 69 receptions. He can join Tony Collins (1985 and 1987) as the only New England running backs to lead the team in receptions in two seasons.

CAREER-HIGH 3 TOTAL TOUCHDOWNS

- Stevenson scored a career-high 3 total touchdowns vs. Miami (1/4/26) with a 2-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, a 15-yard touchdown reception and a 35-yard touchdown run in the third quarter. It is the sixth time in his career that he has had 2 rushing touchdowns in a game and the second time in 2025. He had 2 rushing touchdowns at Buffalo on Oct. 5, 2025.

STEVENSON MOVED INTO FIFTH PLACE

STEVENS ON HAD CAREER LONG RUN

- Stevenson had a career-long 64-yard touchdown run in the second quarter vs. Washington on Nov. 5, 2023. His previous long was a 49-yard run vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022, and his previous longest touchdown run was a 34-yard touchdown run at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022.

STEVENS ON HAS FIFTH CAREER 100-YARD GAME

- Stevenson had his fifth 100-yard game in the 2024 season-opener with 120 yards in the win vs. Cincinnati on Sept. 8. He had a career-high 172 yards rushing at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022. It was his second 100-yard game of the year and fourth overall. He has two 100-yard games of 160 or more yards. In addition to the 172, he had 161 yards rushing vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022. He has two of the teams 14 games with at least 160 yards rushing. Only Curtis Martin and Jim Nance with three have more.

DEDICATION TO HIS GOALS

- While in high school, Stevenson started gaining attention for the impressive stats he posted as a junior. Unfortunately, due to his grades, Stevenson was academically ineligible to receive a football scholarship despite being recruited. Following his senior year of high school, Stevenson took a year off from football and worked part-time jobs at Walmart and Jimmy John's. But after a year away, he decided to follow a group of his friends and enroll in Cerritos Community College. During his time at Cerritos, he shared a two-bedroom apartment with up to six other guys at times and rode his bicycle 20 minutes to and from practice every day. After putting up monster stats in his second season at Cerritos, he committed to Oklahoma. Oklahoma led him to the 2021 NFL Draft where in the fourth round on the third day the Patriots selected Stevenson. In addition, he worked on his academics and made the Dean's List while at Oklahoma.

STEVENS ON HAS THIRD GAME WITH 9.0 AVERAGE

- Stevenson finished with nine carries for 87 yards for a 9.7-yard average vs. Washington on Nov. 5, 2023, the highest average of his career and the third time he had at least a 9.0-yard average. He had a 9.1-yard average at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022 and a 9.0-yard average at Buffalo on Jan. 8, 2023.



WHAT'S IN A NAME?

- Alijah Vera-Tucker was born Solomon Alijah Tucker on June 17, 1999 in Oakland, Calif. He was named Solomon after his father and grandfather, but has always gone by Alijah, a name his mother, Rhonda, was fond of. Rhonda and Solomon divorced before Alijah can remember, and both remarried while he was still quite young, giving him four parents and four families to raise him. Rhonda and her second husband, Sylvester Vera, gave Alijah two little sisters named Velia and Rosalinda. Alijah is close to everyone in his family.
- In high school, he started going by Alijah Vera-Tucker to show respect to his mom and stepdad and to be more connected to his little sisters, whose last names are Vera.
- "I grew up in two households all my life and just being able to show appreciation to the Vera family and the Tucker family at the same time has always been a passion of mine," he said. "Having those two names instead of one, it feels like I have more power. And it feels like I'm closer to each family."
- Once he got to college, Vera-Tucker took two big steps to permanently link himself to both sides of his family. He inked "VERA" and "TUCKER" onto his forearms, and went to the DMV to legally change his last name to Vera-Tucker.

CITY OF ANGELS TO TITLE TOWN

- As part of the Patriots' rookie development program, Head Coach Mike Vrabel brought the 2025 rookie class to a Red Sox game and to the Celtics' practice facility. WR Kyle Williams, a Los Angeles native, quickly recognized the passion for sports in his new city of Boston and uses it as motivation: "It's huge," Williams said. "You see Patriots everywhere. You see Celtics everywhere. Just seeing the love this town has for sports, it makes you want to give back and compete harder."

ROOKIE SCORES FIRST NFL TD ON A 72-YARD PASS

- Williams scored his first career touchdown on a 72-yard touchdown pass from QB Drake Maye at Tampa Bay (11/9/25). It was the longest pass play for New England since QB Mac Jones threw a 75-yard touchdown pass to WR Kendrick Bourne vs. Dallas on Oct. 17, 2021.



THE CONNECTION THAT ALMOST WAS — AND NOW IS

- Jared Wilson started at left guard as a rookie and moved to center in 2026. The Jared Wilson–Drake Maye center quarterback connection was supposed to happen years earlier at North Carolina. Wilson, who initially committed to UNC alongside his fellow North Carolina native Maye, later flipped to Georgia. "It was funny," Wilson said. "He was like, 'You good? Just me and you, right?' It was supposed to happen a couple years ago, but I went to Georgia, he stayed at home [at North Carolina]. We talk about that all the time." Maye echoed the sentiment: "I wanted him to play with me in college, but he went to the SEC; I don't blame him. I think he's done a great job of understanding what comes with playing center. You've got to be loud. You've got to be 'me and you, it's our show.'" For Wilson, the connection "was always meant to be."

JOURNEY TO THE NFL

- As a high school sophomore, football wasn't on Christian Barmore's radar. Barmore played basketball in high school until his junior year, when the football coach at Delaware Valley Charter High School convinced him to give football a chance. Moving to Neumann Goretti High School as a senior after his previous high school closed, Barmore became a highly-recruited prospect in just his second season of organized football, committing to the University of Alabama. Additionally, Barmore has faced plenty of adversity in his life, including the process of overcoming blood clots to return to the field in 2024. PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAMER RICHARD SEYMOUR SEES GREATNESS AHEAD FOR CHRISTIAN BARMORE

- For a defensive lineman, if Patriots and Pro Football Hall of Famer Richard Seymour is in your corner, there are few better compliments or endorsements.
- "I think he has a ton of ability, natural ability, and he plays hard," Seymour told the Boston Herald. "I think he's going to be a problem for (opposing teams) for a long time to come. Hopefully he stays healthy and continues on the path he's on. I think he has a really bright future."

SECOND-MOST QUARTERBACK PRESSURES

- Barmore posted the second-most quarterback pressures for a first-year defensive tackle since 2006, according to Pro Football Focus. His 48 pressures in 2021 were two more than Aaron Donald had during his rookie season.

FIRST CAREER 3-SACK GAME

- Barmore finished with his first career 3-sack game, all in the third quarter, at Denver on Dec. 24, 2023. He had two 8-yard sacks and one 9-yard sack of Denver QB Russell Wilson. He increased his 2023 total to 8½ sacks. He is the first Patriots player with a 3-sack game since LB Joshua Uche had a 3-sack game at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. The last defensive lineman with a 3-sack game for New England was Deatrich Wise Jr. on Sept. 25, 2022 vs. Baltimore.

ADVICE FROM A PATS HALL OF FAMER

- Barmore said he has developed a strong relationship with Patriots Hall of Famer NT Vince Wilfork, who sends him a text before games. "He just gets me fired up every time. You know, every time," Barmore said. "He's a legend. He's one of the best players ever play the game. So every time he texts me or just hits me up, it's a blessing, because you know he a legend. I just I love how he motivates me."

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2026

- Kevin Byard III is second among active players in the NFL in interceptions with 36 and third in total tackles among defensive backs with 953 total tackles. Last season, Byard led the NFL with 7 interceptions for the Chicago Bears.

- Byard has scored touchdowns on three separate occasions: a 66-yard touchdown pass vs at Houston (9/16/18), which was the longest touchdown pass by a primarily defensive player in the Super Bowl era, a fumble recovery for a touchdown at Jacksonville (10/10/21) and a pick six at the L.A. Rams (11/7/21).
- Byard led the NFL in interceptions in 2025 with 7 picks while with the Chicago Bears. If he leads the NFL in interceptions in 2026, he will be just the third player since 1970 to lead the league in two consecutive years, joining Everson Walls (Dallas in 1981-82) and Bill Bradley (Philadelphia in 1971-72).
- Byard led the NFL with 7 interceptions in 2025 with Chicago and also tied for the NFL lead with 8 interceptions in 2017 with Tennessee. Byard joined Bill Bradley (Philadelphia – 1971-1972), Xavien Howard (Miami – 2018, 2020), Ty Law (New England in 1998 and N.Y. Jets in 2005), Ronnie Lott (San Francisco – 1986, L.A. Raiders – 1991), Asante Samuel (New England in 2006 and Philadelphia in 2009), Darren Sharper (Green Bay in 2000 and New Orleans in 2009), Charles Woodson (Green Bay 2009, 2011) and Rod Woodson (Baltimore in 1999 and Oakland in 2002) as the only NFL players since 1970 to lead the NFL in interceptions in two seasons.
- If he leads the NFL in interceptions in 2026, he will join Ed Reed (Baltimore – 2004, 2008 and 2010) and Everson Walls (Dallas – 1981, 1982 and 1985) as the only NFL players since 1970 to lead the NFL in interceptions in three seasons.

REUNITED AND IT FEELS SO GOOD

- "I definitely knew that, obviously, if I wasn't going to be back in Chicago, this was my top destination to go to. Not necessarily just because of the relationship I got with Vrables, and there's a ton of other coaches and people that's in this building that I'm very familiar with. I just think the culture of this team, of this organization, obviously a winning culture. I think the pieces that they have in place—whether it's the quarterback, the secondary, all those things—I think it makes it very attractive to any free agent to want to come here."

MAYEDAY

- "New England has it right with Drake Maye," Byard said. "So I'm excited to be able to play with him, but also to be able to play with some of the pieces this team has on defense who I think played really well last year."



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2026

- LB Christian Elliss had a team-leading 18 total special teams tackles in 2025. If he reaches at least 15 special teams tackles in 2026, he will be the first Patriots player with at least 15 special teams tackles in back-to-back seasons since Matthew Slater had 16 special teams tackles in back-to-back seasons in 2014 and 2015.

LOVE BEYOND BLOOD

- Elliss has six adopted siblings. For the NFL's My Cause My Cleats initiative, Elliss represented "An Act of Love," the agency that his siblings were adopted through. Elliss has three kids of his own with one on the way, and he and his wife look forward to adopting a child one day as well.

RUNS IN THE FAMILY

- Elliss has two brothers that also play linebacker in the NFL: Jonah (Denver Broncos) and Kaden (New Orleans Saints). Another one of his brothers, Noah, played for the Philadelphia Eagles. His father, Luther, was a first-round draft pick by the Detroit Lions in 1995. As a defensive lineman, he was a two-time Pro Bowler in nine seasons with Detroit and Denver. He is currently the defensive tackles coach at the University of Utah where Christian's younger brother, Elijah, plays defensive end.

ELLISS HAS CAREER-HIGH IN TACKLES

- Elliss set a single-game career high vs. Buffalo on Jan. 5, 2025, with a team-leading 13 total tackles. His previous high was 9 tackles at the Jacksonville Jaguars on Oct. 20, 2024, and vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 27, 2024. Elliss' tackle total was the highest of the 2024 season for any Patriots player. LB Ja'Whaun Bentley had 12 total tackles at Cincinnati on Sept. 8, 2024.

ELLISS HAD A CAREER-HIGH 4 SPECIAL TEAMS TACKLES

- Elliss finished with a career-high 4 total special teams tackles vs. the N.Y. Giants (12/1/25). It is the most special teams tackles in a game for a Patriots player since DB Cody Davis had 4 special teams tackles vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021. Elliss had four games in 2025 with at least three special teams tackles. He had 3 at Miami (9/14), 3 vs. Atlanta (11/2), 4 vs., NY Giants (12/1) and 3 at the N.Y. Jets (12/28). Elliss had a career-high 18 special teams tackles. His previous high was 8 in 2024.



GONZALEZ SELECTED TO 2026 PRO BOWL

- CB Christian Gonzalez earned his first career Pro Bowl selection in 2025. He is the first Patriots defensive back to earn Pro Bowl honors since cornerback J.C. Jackson in 2021.



GONZALEZ EARNS 2ND TEAM ALL-PRO HONORS

- Gonzalez earned second-team Associated Press All-Pro Honors for his 2024 season.

ROOKIE OF THE MONTH

- Gonzalez was named the Defensive Rookie of the Month for September by the National Football League in 2023, becoming the fifth Patriots player to win a rookie of the month honor and the third defensive player to earn the award. Gonzalez joins RB TreVeyon Henderson (November in 2025), QB Mac Jones (November of 2021), DE Chandler Jones (September of 2012), LB Jerod Mayo (October of 2008) and WR Deion Branch (September of 2002).

GONZO'S JOURNEY

- Before his collegiate success, even the prospect of going to college seemed out of reach for Gonzalez. He didn't want his family to have to pay his college tuition, and as a sophomore, he was a backup quarterback on his high school's junior varsity team that went 1-9. He almost gave up the sport, but after his family's encouragement and transferring schools, Gonzalez's new coaches switched him to defense, and he quickly attracted the attention of colleges around the nation.
- To understand the athleticism of Christian Gonzalez, look no further than his family. His father, Hector, played basketball at UTEP and professionally overseas. Gonzalez's two older sisters were both on the Colombian National Team for track & field and were college All-Americans. His eldest sister competed in the 2020 Olympics, and his younger sister is a rising star in soccer.

PATRIOTS SCORE ON DEFENSE FOR FIRST TIME IN 2024

- The Patriots scored on defense for the first time in 2024 at Miami (11/24) when CB Christian Gonzalez returned a RB Jaylen Wright fumble 63 yards for a touchdown that was forced by S Marte Mapu. It was Gonzalez's first NFL touchdown. The fumble return is tied for the third-longest in team history.

#50 GABE JACAS

SUPERHEROES AND VILLAINS

- Rookie linebacker and Patriots 2026 second-round draft pick Gabe Jacas refers to his brother, Khaliq, who's seven years older, as his "superhero" – and it's not just a figure of speech. When Khaliq came home to Fort Pierce, Fla., after a three-year Division I career at Florida International University as a defensive lineman, he found his once "chubby" younger brother developed into a leaner and more powerful frame. So, Khaliq had a vision: turn Gabe into an offense's villain. Gabe's brother began coaching him on defensive line drills every day and continued on as his position coach for his junior and senior year of high school. Gabe told the Illini Inquirer that the mentality he plays with today – toughness, dependability, discipline – all traces back to his brother: *"All the things I pretty much know now I learned from him, especially the mental aspect."* Now in New England, Gabe still credits Khaliq for getting him here: *"He's kind of like my superhero. Everything that's before me right now is because of him."*



#5 DRE'MONT JONES

NOTES OF INTEREST

- Since the NFL moved to a 17 game schedule in 2021, LB Dre-Mont Jones is one of four players that has played in 18 games in the regular season due to being traded during the year. Jones played in nine games with Tennessee and nine games with Baltimore in 2025. He joins WR Rashid Shaheed (New Orleans and Seattle), DT Leonard Williams (New York Giants and Seattle) and WR Mike Williams (New York Jets and Pittsburgh) as the players that have played in 18 regular season games in a season.
- Jones played against the Patriots two times in 2025, one with Baltimore and one with Tennessee and sacked QB Drake Maye for a 3-yard loss with Baltimore (12/21) and for a 7-yard loss with Tennessee (10/19).

DRE'MONT JONES ON JOINING NEW ENGLAND

- "Vrabels and winning, to be simple about it," Jones said. "I've never been in the playoffs, so hopefully, now that I'm here, playoffs and Super Bowl appearances will happen again," Jones said.*



#2 HAROLD LANDRY III

FRANCHISE RECORD IN DEBUT

- LB Harold Landry III was credited with 2½ sacks, his seventh multiple sack game, vs. Las Vegas (9/7) in the 2025 season-opener. It is the most sacks by a New England player in his debut. It is second to his career-high 3 sacks at Miami on Dec. 11, 2023, with Tennessee. His last multi-sack game was vs. the N.Y. Jets on Sept. 15, 2024, when he had 2 sacks.

LANDRY III RECORDS MOST SACKS IN FIRST TWO GAMES

- Landry III finished with 1 sack in New England's win at Miami (9/14/25). He had 3½ sacks in his first two games, the most by any Patriots player in their first two games with the team. He previously had 2½ sacks vs. Las Vegas on Sept. 7, 2025. The previous record was set by DL Chris Slade in 1993, with 3 sacks in his first two games with the team.



#14 ROBERT SPILLANE

SPILLANE REGISTERS 15 TOTAL TACKLES

- LB Robert Spillane had his 19th career 10-tackle game after finishing with 15 total tackles vs. Pittsburgh (9/21/25). His 15 total tackles are the second most of his career. He had a career-high 16 total tackles in the last game of the 2024 season vs. the L.A. Chargers (1/5/5) when he played for Las Vegas. He has four 10-plus tackle games in 2025 and has 22 career 10-tackle games in his career.

A REUNION WITH MEANING

- Spillane was originally signed by Tennessee as a rookie free agent out of Western Michigan, the first year Mike Vrabel was head coach of the Titans. In 2025, he reunited with the coach that took a chance on him and made his dream a reality, this time in New England. The day Spillane signed with the team in Tennessee, it was Mother's Day. On the day Spillane signed his contract in New England, it was his mother's birthday.
- "I got hired in 2018 on Mother's Day, and I got to call my mom in tears saying, 'I'm going to be a professional football player,' Spillane said. '[May 13] is her birthday, so I'm signing the contract on her birthday. She's a very important special woman in my life, and I just want to make her proud."*



PATRIOTS DEFENSIVE/SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

UNDRAFTED TO TOP OF THE LEAGUE

- Spillane recorded over 100 tackles in each of his two seasons with the Las Vegas Raiders: 158 in 2024 and 148 in 2023. His 158 tackles in 2024 set a Raiders single-season record and ranked third in the NFL. In 2023, Spillane became the only Raiders player to record 100-plus tackles, 3.0-plus sacks and 3-plus interceptions in a single season since 1987.

THE WHY BEHIND THE NUMBER

- Spillane is the grandson of RB Johnny Lattner, the 1953 Heisman Trophy winner. Lattner secured the award in his senior season at Notre Dame, after he rushed for 651 yards (4.9-yard average) and 9 touchdowns, in addition to catching 14 passes for 204 yards. He had 2 touchdowns off of just 10 kickoff returns and saw some action on defense, recording 4 interceptions in the Irish's 9-0-1 campaign. Notre Dame finished second in the AP Poll in 1953 behind Maryland. Lattner played one season in the NFL with Pittsburgh after he was selected seventh overall in the 1954 NFL Draft. Spillane wears No. 14 to honor Lattner, who wore No. 14 at Notre Dame.

EYES CLOSED, OPEN MIND

- During his introductory press conference as a Patriots player, Spillane mentioned that he does a lot of "eyes-closed training." Later on, he explained exactly what "eyes-closed training" meant and how it helps him in football. Spillane explained that he developed a style of training where he scouts out an area, whether that be a mountain trail or in a forest, walks it, returns to walk it with his eyes shut, then returns again to walk it backward with his eyes shut. When asked how this training came about, Spillane told the Athletic, *"I didn't really learn it from anybody, so it's from the ground up, self-taught,"* Spillane said. *"It's basically just a confidence drill. As a middle linebacker, you want to know where you are on the field at all times — within the positioning of the field, understanding the schematics, where the other players are around you. So, you close your eyes and take away the most basic thing you use to understand that. You've really got to rely on your instincts and your trust."*



FIRST 2-SACK GAME AS A PATRIOT

- DT Milton Williams finished with 2 sacks at Miami (9/14/25), including a 9-yard sack on fourth down with 53 seconds to play to seal the New England win. It is his second career 2-sack game. He also had 2 sacks at the L.A. Rams as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles (11/24/24).

- Baringer led the NFL and set a team record in 2023 with 38 punts inside the 20-yard line. Baringer became the second Patriots punter with back-to-back seasons with at least 30 punts inside the 20-yard line after finishing with 31 in 2024. Jake Bailey had 36 in 2019 and 31 in 2020.

ONLY PATRIOT WITH TWO IN TWO

- Baringer has seven games in his career when he has had at least two 60-yard punts in the same game after a 71-yard and a 65-yard punt at Miami on Sept. 14, 2025. He is the only Patriots punter to ever have more than two games with at least two 60-yard punts in a game.

FROM WALK-ON TO ALL-AMERICAN

- Baringer had an unconventional path to the NFL. He began his collegiate career by earning a walk-on spot at Illinois in 2018 as a true freshman, but due to being buried on the depth chart and the cost of out-of-state tuition, he transferred home to Michigan State as a regular student. Outside of a four-game stint on the Michigan State team due to injuries on the roster, Baringer did not have a walk-on spot available to him in 2019. After a year serving as the team's photographer to maintain access to the facilities to train, Baringer attended an open tryout with a new coaching staff at the Spartans and made the team, establishing himself as the Spartans top punter in 2020 and going on to have record-breaking seasons in 2021 and 2022. In 2022, he was named the Big 10 Punter of the Year and a consensus All-American by all five major associations.

BARINGER SETS TEAM MARK

- Baringer had at least one 50-yard punt in all 17 games in 2023 to set the team record for the longest single season streak in team history (at any point of the season). Zoltan Mesko had a 12-game streak in 2011. Baringer extended his record to 27 games with a 50-yard punt after connecting on a 50-yard punt in the first 10 games of 2024 before the streak ended in the game vs. the LA Rams (11/17/24).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2026

- CB Marcus Jones is second in NFL history with a 14.0-yard punt return average (84 returns for 1,173 yards).
- Jones scored on a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022. If he scores on offense in 2026, he will join current head coach and former LB Mike Vrabel (8 touchdown receptions) as the only defensive player with more than one touchdown on offense in team history. Vrabel also has the most offensive touchdowns by an NFL defensive player with 10 in the regular season.
- Jones has returned three punts for touchdowns during his career, including two in 2025. If Jones returns a punt for a touchdown in 2026, he will join Julian Edelman (4) for the all-time lead in team history.

JONES SCORES ON OFFENSE, DEFENSE AND SPECIAL TEAMS

- Jones returned a third quarter interception 69 yards for a touchdown vs. Cincinnati on Dec. 24, 2022. He scored on a punt return for a touchdown, a touchdown reception and an interception returned for a touchdown to become the fourth player in NFL history to do so in a season, joining Frank Bacon (1920), Bill Dudley (1947) and Tommy Harmon (1947). Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20 and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1 in addition to the pick-6 against the Bengals. The only other player in the Super Bowl era to score a 40-plus yard touchdown in each of those ways in their entire career is Deion Sanders.

- Schooler led the Patriots in special teams tackles in each of his first three seasons with 14 in 2022, 13 in 2023 and 9 in 2024. He finished second on the team in 2025 with 14 special teams tackles.

- Schooler was named to the Pro Bowl on special teams in 2024 after leading the team with 9 special teams tackles. He was also named to the Associated Press All-Pro First Team, PFWA All-NFL and as an NFL-PA Players All-Pro.

Schooler finished tied for second in the NFL with 13 special teams tackles in 2023 and was named an All-Pro as a core special teams player by the NFLPA.

- Schooler saw action at safety in the second quarter at Chicago on Nov. 14, 2024. In 2023, he played in his first and only defensive snaps of his career on a Hail Mary attempt on the final plays vs. Buffalo (10/22/23) and at Denver (12/24/23). Schooler had his first-career sack in the third quarter on a 9-yard sack of QB Caleb Williams on a third-down play. He added his second sack of the year on a 7-yard sack of QB Tua Tagovailoa at Miami on Nov. 24, 2024 in the fourth quarter.
